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FORTY-SIXTH INTERCOLLEGIATE TRACK AND FIELD CHAMPIONSHIPS 26-27, 1922 CAMBRIDGE, MASS., SOLDIERS' FIELD,

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FORTY-SIXTH ANNUAL FIELD MEETING, CAMBRIDGE, MASS., MAY 26–27, 1922.

THE UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA duplicated its 1921 performance when it won the 46th annual meet at Soldiers' Field, Cambridge, Mass., on May 26 and 27, 1922. This time, however, California won more decisively than the year before. Their team scored 40½ points, leading Princeton by 9½ points. Leland Stanford, whose team was fifth in 1921, this time finished in third place, scoring 26½ points. Cornell was fourth with 21½ points and Pennsylvania fifth with 16 points.

The meet was featured by the addition of two field events, the discus and the javelin throw. Of the ten places made possible by these two events the University of California scored five and Leland Stanford one. Inasmuch as these events were on the I. C. A. A. A. A. program for the first time, the winning performances became in each case intercollegiate records. Glenn Hartranft, Leland Stanford, 1925, won the discus throw with 140 feet ½ inch. George E. Bronder, Pennsylvania, 1924, won the javelin throw with 185 feet 85% inches.

Three old records were broken. In the 100-yard dash J. Alfred LeConey, Lafayette, 1923, established a new mark of 9.7 seconds. This bettered by one-tenth of a second the previous record of 9\frac{4}{5} seconds held jointly by B. J. Wefers, of Georgetown; W. H. Shick, Jr., Harvard, and James C. Patterson, Pennsylvania. Concerning this record, however, it is only proper to call attention to the fact that the 1922 meet was the first in which watches recording time to the tenth of a second were used.

The meet was held on Soldiers' Field through the courtesy of Harvard University. It was managed by H. Payson Rowe, of Harvard.

100-YARD DASH

In winning the 100-yard dash in 9.7 seconds, J. Alfred LeConey, Lafayette, 1923, established a new intercollegiate record. Possibly the use of a new stop-watch, recording time to the tenth of a second, was of some help to LeConey. He won his preliminary heat easily in 9.8 seconds and his semi-final heat in 10 seconds flat. Fredric Kimball Lovejoy, Cornell, 1924, was the only other sprinter to better even time. He won his preliminary heat in 9.9 seconds. In the final heat Lovejoy was second to LeConey, while Clarence R. McKim, Princeton, 1924, was third. Edward Sudden, Leland Stanford, 1924, was fourth and Earl J. Rusnak, Yale, 1923, was fifth.







J. Alfred LeConey, Lafayette, 1923, came within one-tenth of a second of equaling the intercollegiate record of $21\frac{1}{5}$ seconds in the 220-yard dash. His time in the final heat was 21.3 seconds. LeConey won his preliminary heat on Friday in 21.7 seconds and his semi-final heat in 22.1 seconds. In the final heat Edward Sudden, Leland Stanford, 1924, was second two yards back. Fredric Kimball Lovejoy, Cornell, 1924, was third. Although qualifying for the semi-final heats, Allen Woodring, Syracuse, 1923, because of an injury in the final heat of the 109-yard dash, dropped out of the competition in the 220-yard dash.

440-YARD DASH

Although the time was two and one-fifth seconds behind the intercollegiate record, one of the most exciting and bitterly contested races of the meet was the final heat of the 440-yard dash. The winner was J. W. Driscoll, Boston College, 1922. At first it was thought that Driscoll had been tied by William E. Stevenson, Princeton, 1922, but after a conference of the judges it was announced that Driscoll had won.

There were three preliminary heats on Friday. Driscoll was the winner of the first in 50.1 seconds. Harry M. McDonald, California, 1922, won the second heat in 50 seconds flat, with Stevenson, of Princeton, in second place. Walter Koppisch, Columbia, 1924, won the third heat in 50½ seconds. Ocran Otis Hendrixson, California, 1922, and Allan S. Monie, Syracuse, 1924, who were third and fourth respectively in the final heat, were second and third in this preliminary heat. Carl Frank John, Cornell, 1922, who finished third in the first preliminary heat, was fifth in the final.







880-YARD RUN

Laurence A. Brown, Pennsylvania, 1922, although hard pressed, won the final heat of the 880-yard run in 1 minute 55.2 seconds, with nearly two yards to spare over Reginald L. Johnson, Princeton, 1922. There were only two preliminary heats, with the first five men in each running in the final. Brown won the first heat in 1 minute 57.4 seconds, with M. Lawrence Shields, Penn State, 1922, second, and Johnson, of Princeton, third. Thomas Campbell, Yale, 1923, won the second heat in 1 minute 58.2 seconds, but was unable to start in the finals. In the final heat Brown took the lead after the first three hundred yards and never relinquished it. He was challenged by Helffrich, Penn State, 1924, on the last lap, but Johnson, Shields and Charles Crawford Carter, Cornell, 1922, all passed the Penn State man in the home stretch, though none could overtake Brown.







ONE-MILE RUN

M. Lawrence Sheilds, Penn State, 1922, won a fairly easy victory in the one-mile run, in which his time was 4 minutes 18.4 seconds. Shields was content to let others set the pace for the first half mile, which was run in the rather slow time of 2.09. During the third quarter he went to the front and from that time on had the race always well in hand. There was a keen battle over the last two hundred yards for second honors. Malcolm Douglas, Yale, 1924, finished second to Shields, followed closely by Edward Buckler Kirby, Cornell, 1924, and J. William Burke, Harvard, 1923. Daniel Bursk Strickler, Cornell, 1922, was fifth. James Joseph Connolly, Georgetown, 1923, winner of the event in 1921, tried hard to overtake the leaders in the final lap but failed.



TWO-MILE RUN

This race was one of the closest and most exciting of the meet. Raymond Buker, Bates, 1922, running his first race in the I. C. A. A. A. A. championships, set the pace much of the way, particularly after the first half mile, although Norman P. Brown, Cornell, 1922, and Robert E. Brown, Cornell, 1922, continually challenged him. Each time the pace was taken from Buker he regained it. The two Columbia runners, Walter Higgins, 1923, and Robert Moore, 1924, were within striking distance over the entire last mile. Three hundred yards from the tape on the final lap, Buker began a sprint, with Higgins, Moore, Norman P. Brown and Charles Marble Dorr, California, 1922, in close pursuit. Higgins had a sprint equal to that of Buker. He gradually closed up on the Bates runner and beat him to the tape by less than a foot. Moore, Dorr and Brown followed in order The time was 9 minutes 28.1 seconds.










FINISH, FINAL HEAT, 120-YARD HURDLES

220-YARD HURDLES

John C. Taylor, Princeton, 1923, won the 220-yard hurdles in 23.9 seconds, only three-tenths of a second slower than the intercollegiate record. Curiously enough, not one of the point winners in the 120-yard hurdles could score in the longer race, something which has rarely if ever happened before. There was an unusually large field of starters. 




