FORTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL FIELD MEETING, PHILADELPHIA, PA., MAY 25–26, 1923

POR the third year in succession the University of California won the track and field championship of the Association. The forty-seventh annual games were held on Franklin Field of the University of Pennsylvania, Philadelphia, on Friday and Saturday, May 25 and 26. California won with a score of 39½ points. Princeton was second once more with 33 points. Yale was third with 23 and Pennsylvania fourth with 22½. The other colleges scored as follows: Cornell, 15; Syracuse, 13; Penn State, 13; Dartmouth, 11; Johns Hopkins, 11; Georgetown, 7; Harvard, 6; Lafayette, 6; M. I. T., 5; Rutgers, 5; Bowdoin, 5; New York University, 4; Williams, 3; Pittsburgh, 3; Boston, 1.

Two new intercollegiate records were made, both in the preliminaries on Friday. Frederick D. Tootell, Bowdoin, 1923, threw the 16-pound hammer 181 feet $6\frac{1}{2}$ inches, bettering by ten feet the record set by John W. Merchant, California, 1922, the previous year. C. C. Storrs, Yale, 1923, threw the javelin 199 feet $\frac{1}{2}$ inch, thus bettering the record of 188 feet $\frac{55}{8}$ inches made by George E. Bronder, Pennsylvania, 1924, the previous year.

Once more California's supremacy was in the field events. In fact, this team's total of $36\frac{1}{2}$ points in six field events would have been sufficient to win without the three points which represented its work on the track.

All of the events were exceedingly well contested. The 100-yard dash was won in 9\frac{4}{5} seconds. The winner, Harold B. Lever, Pennsylvania, 1923, ran all three heats in 9\frac{4}{5} seconds. In the pole vault Alan Norris, California, 1923, and Benjamin F. Owen, Pennsylvania, 1925, tied for first at 12 feet 9 inches. The running broad jump was notable for the fact that all five point winners cleared 23 feet. The winner, W. A. Comins, Yale, 1924, made a leap of 24 feet 4 inches, just one-half inch less than the intercollegiate record.

Splendid weather conditions featured both days. About 7000 persons were present for the finals on Saturday. The meet was managed by Richard J. Kearns, Pennsylvania, 1923.
























