# FORTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL FIELD MEETING CAMBRIDGE, MASS., MAY 30–31, 1924

By the margin of a single point Yale won the forty-eighth track and field championship meeting of the Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America held at Cambridge, Mass., May 30 and 31, 1924. Yale scored 28 points out of a possible 225, its first victory since 1904.

The University of Pennsylvania was second with 27 points. Leland Stanford was third with 24½ and Princeton fourth with 23. Other teams scored as follows: Pennsylvania State College, 21; University of Southern California, 14; Johns Hopkins, 13½; California, 13; Harvard, 13; Boston College, 12; Cornell, 10½; Dartmouth, 8; Georgetown, 7; Massachusetts Institute of Technology, 5; Syracuse, 5; Colgate, ½.

Intercollegiate records were broken in two events. William A. Comins, Yale, 1924, won the running broad jump with a leap of 24 feet 8 inches. His record displaced the former mark of 24 feet 4½ inches made by A. C. Kraenzlein, Pennsylvania, 1900, and which had stood since 1899. S. Glenn Hartranft, Leland Stanford, 1924, was the second record breaker. In the 16-pound shot put his winning put was 49 feet 5½ inches. It displaced the former intercollegiate record of 48 feet 10¾ inches, made by R. L. Beatty, of Columbia, in 1912. It also bettered the collegiate record of 49 feet ¾ inch, made by R. G. Hills, Princeton, in 1923. Although all the five point winners in the discus throw bettered the existing record of 140 feet ⅓ inch, new figures were not allowed for this event because of a favoring wind outside the stadium, where this event was contested.

The meet had an unusual ending in that the deciding event was the hammer throw, the last event to be completed. Previous to its conclusion, the scores of the two leaders were, Pennsylvania, 27; Yale, 25. By virtue of taking third place in this event Yale won the meet by the margin of a single point. The games were held in the stadium at Soldiers' Field through the courtesy of Harvard University.

# 100-YARD DASH

George L. Hill, Pennsylvania, 1925, was the winner of the 100-yard dash in 10 seconds flat. It was because of his tremendous finishing power that Hill won the final heat. Although the start was perfect, Hill was slow to get into his running. At 50 yards both Chester Bowman, Syracuse, 1925, and Louis A. Clarke, Johns Hopkins, 1924, were ahead of him. At the 90-yard mark Hill was second, with only Bowman in front. In the last ten yards Hill managed to gain first place by a foot. Bowman was a similar distance in front of Clarke. Bayes M. Norton, Yale, 1926, was fourth a yard back, with William A. Comins, Yale, 1924, in fifth place, two yards back of Norton. Comins shut out Creighton Miller, Williams, 1924, by inches only.





## 220-YARD DASH

George L. Hill, Pennsylvania, 1925, made himself a double winner by taking first place also in the 220-yard dash. The final of this event he won in 21.9 seconds. He won his preliminary heat in 21.7 seconds. The fastest time of any of the preliminary heats was that made by Louis A. Clarke, Johns Hopkins, 1924, in 21.6 seconds. Both of the semi-final heats, the first won by Clarke, and the second by Bayes M. Norton, Yale, 1926, were run in 22.1 seconds. In the final heat Hill ran a race very much like the 100-yard dash. He was led by both Clarke and Norton for more than half the distance. Norton was in first place at 175 yards, but here Hill began to make up ground and crossed the tape a yard and a half in front of Norton, who beat Clarke by a yard. Henry A. Russell, Cornell, 1926, and Robert B. Edgar, Dartmouth, 1926, were fourth and fifth.







### 440-YARD DASH

A strong wind blowing directly down the back stretch was responsible for the apparently mediocre time made in the final of the 440-yard dash. The race was won by Alan B. Helffrich, Pennsylvania State College, 1924, in 50.1 seconds. The wind was responsible for the fact that not one in the field was able to beat 50 seconds. It was one of the closest finishes ever seen in an intercollegiate meet, for the first five runners were closely bunched. Douglas P. Jeppe, M. I. T., 1925, set pace and took a commanding lead to the first turn. Helffrich went to the front when the home stretch was reached and never relinquished his advantage. Jeppe continued to drop back and failed to score. Harold N. Bates, Dartmouth, 1925, was just beaten out at the tape for second place by Richard G. Croft, Princeton, 1924. Two Yale men, Gilbert W. Chapman, 1924, and Charles S. Gage, 1925, were fourth and fifth.





JOHN N. WATTERS, HARVARD, WINNING FINAL HEAT OF 880-YARD RUN






# ONE-MILE RUN

Schuyler C. Enck, Pennsylvania State College, 1924, proved to be the winner of a stirring though slowly run mile in 4 minutes Thomas F. Cavanaugh, Boston College, 1926, 23.8 seconds. was the runner up. He was unequal to Enck's sprinting ability and finished about eight yards back. It was not an exceptionally Cavanaugh insisted upon being pacemaker. passed the quarter mile mark in 61 seconds, with Smith of Leland Stanford and Enck following in the order named. Cavanaugh was timed at the half mile mark in 2 minutes 10.2 seconds. Although Enck pressed him hard on the third quarter, Cavanaugh continued to stay in first place and was still leading at the threequarter mile mark in 3 minutes 18.2 seconds. Enck was still in second place, with Gerry of Cornell and Douglas of Yale running third and fourth. Enck did not make his effort until the back Cavanaugh answered his challenge with another sprint, and it was not until the men rounded the last turn 150 yards from the tape that Enck could pass the Boston man. Enck proved the better sprinter and won out by ten yards. was a similar distance back of Cavanaugh. Douglas was fourth, while in the last rush B. R. Cutcheon, Harvard, took fifth place.

# TWO-MILE RUN

Twenty-five runners lined up for the two-mile run which was won by Verne H. Booth, Johns Hopkins, 1924. Booth led for virtually every step of the way, although Edward B. Kirby, Cornell, 1924, was nearly always a dangerous contender. So also was George W. Lermond, Boston College, 1925. Booth, however, did most of the pace making and finished the first mile in 4 minutes 51.8 seconds. Willard L. Tibbetts, Harvard, 1926, came up into second place in the last mile and at one time drew up almost on even terms with Booth. As soon, however, as Booth began to sprint, which he did for the last 300 yards, he drew away from the Harvard man and finished in first place with a lead of fifteen yards. Lermond was third, with Kirby fourth and Harry Helme, Georgetown, 1926, in fifth place. Booth's time was 9 minutes 36 seconds.

# 120-YARD HURDLES

It was an unusually even field of hurdlers that Charles W. Moore, Pennsylvania State College, 1926, defeated in the 120-yard event. Moore had a desperate race with Hugo Leistner, Leland Stanford, 1925, and Leighton W. C. Dye, University of Southern California, 1926, who were second and third. The three men cleared the last hurdle almost in the same stride. The slight advantage which Moore held he increased to about one foot at the tape. Raymond Wolf, Pennsylvania, 1926, just managed to beat out George L. Scattergood, Princeton, 1925, for fourth place. Moore's winning time was 15.2 seconds, one-tenth of a second faster than the second semi-final heat, which he also won.





# 220-YARD HURDLES





2. Cole, Yale, winning second heat.





# RUNNING BROAD JUMP

William A. Comins, Yale, 1925, broke the intercollegiate record twice in the running broad jump. His best jump in the preliminary round on Friday was 24 feet  $5\frac{5}{16}$  inches, which displaced the record of 24 feet 4½ inches made by Alvin C. Kraenzlein, Pennsylvania, 1900, just twenty-five years earlier. In his second jump of the final round Comins improved this performance with a leap of 24 feet 8 inches. Albert E. Rose, Pennsylvania, 1924, also came close to a new intercollegiate record. His first jump in the final round, which won him second place, was 24 feet  $3\frac{11}{16}$  inches. One other contestant also bettered 24 feet, the first time in the history of the Association that three men have done this. Paul S. Boren, California, 1924, was third with a leap of 24 feet 15% inches. R. Earle Wilson, Southern California, 1926, was fourth with 22 feet 91/2 inches. Fifth place resulted in a tie between Norton Canfield, Dartmouth, 1925, and Benjamin J. Watson, Jr., Colgate, 1924, at 22 feet 13/4 inches.





## POLE VAULT

After making one balk at this height, Owen cleared the bar at the successive heights of 11 feet 6 inches, 12 feet, and 12 feet 6 inches on the first jump. When the bar was raised to 12 feet 9 inches he missed on the first trial but cleared it on the second. After winning the event at this height, the bar was raised to 13 feet 1 inch to give Owen an opportunity for a new intercollegiate record. 




