#### FIFTIETH ANNUAL MEETING

University of Southern California Wins Championship at Cambridge Before Record Throng

IIIE University of Southern California won its second consecutive championship at the fiftieth annual games of the Association, held on Soldiers' Field, Cambridge, Mass., May 28 and 29, 1926, with a score of 35½ points. Leland Stanford University was second with 25½, while Yale was third with 25½ points. The other teams scored as follows; Harvard 20, Syracuse 17, California 16, Penn State 15, Cornell 12, Georgetown 10½, Pennsylvania 10, Princeton 8, Columbia 6½, Boston College 6, Massachusetts Institute of Technology 6, Colgate 5, College of the City of New York 3, Swarthmore 3, Dartmouth 1, Holy Cross 1.

It was the most successful meeting the Association has ever held, both in the number of competitors and the attendance. The official attendance was 14,600.

Four new records were created and one tied. In the running high jump Robert W. King, Leland Stanford 1926, cleared the bar at 6 feet 534 inches, thus displacing the record of 6 feet 45% inches made by Leroy Brown, of Dartmouth, in 1923. Clarence L. Houser, Southern California, was responsible for two new records. In the discus throw he bettered the record he made in 1995 with a throw of 151 feet 3\% inches. In the shot put he made a put of 40 feet 1134 inches, thus improving by 21/8 inches the mark made the previous year by Ralph G. Hills, of Princeton. Sabin W. Carr, Yale, 1928, established the fourth new record when he cleared 13 feet 2 inches in the pole vault, thus breaking a record that had stood for fifteen years. One other record was equalled, this being in the 100-yard dash, in which Henry A. Russell, Cornell, 1926, did 9.7 seconds. In the 220-yard dash Russell's time was 21% seconds, but the judges disallowed it on the ground that he had an assisting wind.

The meet was managed by Stanley deJ. Osborne, of Harvard.

#### 100-YARD DASH

The sprinters who faced the starter in this event were of unusually high caliber. During the preliminary season six of them had done 9.8, three 9.9, four 10 flat, and three 10.1 seconds. Five of the heats were run in 9.9, one in 9.8 and only one in 10. The final with such a field met expectations in a performance that equalled the record made in 1922 by J. Alfred LeConey, of Lafayette. Henry A. Russell, Cornell, 1926, won by a yard from Bayes M. Norton, Yale, 1926, in 9.7 seconds. Alfred H. Miller, Harvard, 1927, was one foot behind for third. Francis V. Hussey, Boston College, 1928, was fourth by  $4\frac{1}{2}$  feet and Donald M. Charles, Colgate, 1928, fifth by 5 feet.





#### 220-YARD DASH

Henry A. Russell, Cornell, 1926, for the second successive year was the winner in 21 seconds. While this time is better than the record, a record was disallowed owing to the strength of the wind. However, it was a remarkable performance. Ray B. Clark, Yale, 1926, was second by 4 yards, Bayes M. Norton, Yale, 1926, third by 14 feet, Donald M. Charles, Colgate, 1928, fourth by 5 yards and Philip S. Barber, California, 1926, by 16 feet. The starters were of equal class with those in the 100. Ten men had bettered 22 seconds and three had done 22 flat.



John N. Watters, Harvard, 1926, winner of the event in 1924, repeated his achievement by winning in 1 minute 55.8 seconds, after a gruelling race. The first quarter was run in 53 seconds and mistakenly announced as 58 seconds. The result was an exhausted field. The winner was but a foot ahead of Francis H. McCloskey, Boston College, 1927; Pincus Sober, College of the City of New York, 1926, 8 feet behind for third; George J. Leness. M. I. T., 1926, by 5 yards and W. H. #### TWO-MILE RUN

Willard L. Tibbetts, Harvard, 1926, for the second successive time won this distance event in a remarkable finish. On the last turn he was third and boxed, with Loucks and Schmid in the lead. Checking himself, he ran wide and in a sprint that opened up 12 yards on James C. Loucks, Syracuse, 1927, won in 9 minutes 27.8 seconds. William Schmid, Columbia, 1926, was third by 17 yards. Charles R. Payne, Pennsylvania, 1927, was fourth by 20 yards and Macaulley L. Smith, Yale, 1927, was fifth by 27 yards. Thus ended a rivalry of two years in the Two-Mile and Cross-Country between Tibbetts and Loucks that has furnished a goodly share of interest to all their races.







# FORTY-NINTH ANNUAL FIELD MEETING, PHILADELPHIA, PA., MAY 29–30, 1925

HE University of Southern California, competing in the Intercollegiate championships for the second time, celebrated the event by winning the forty-ninth annual games, held on Franklin Field, Philadelphia, under the auspices of the University of Pennsylvania, on May 29 and 30, 1925. Their winning score was 33 points. Princeton was the runner-up with 29½ points. Yale was three points behind in third place, while Georgetown and Pennsylvania were fourth and fifth, with 23 and 22 points respectively. The other teams finished as follows: Cornell 16½, California 12½, Harvard 12, Penn State 12, Syracuse 11, Massachusetts Institute of Technology 7, Columbia 5, Holy Cross 5, Bowdoin 4, Dartmouth 4, and Boston College 2.

The performances were of an unusually high standard, although only two records were made. In the shot put Ralph G. Hills, Princeton, 1925, made a put of 49 feet 95% inches, thus bettering by 33/4 inches the previous record. In the discust hrow Clarence L. Houser, Southern California, 1926, established a new mark of 150 feet 21/4 inches, thus displacing the old mark of 140 feet

1/8 inch.

The Southern Californians had an unusually well rounded team and scored in seven of the fifteen events. They picked up 3 points in the 100-yard dash, 13 in the two hurdles and the remainder in

the shot put and discus throw.

To add to the interest of the meet, a loud speaker was installed for announcement purposes. The Association also took slow motion pictures of the finishes. Splendid weather greeted the athletes on both days. The meet was managed by H. Jamison Swarts, Pennsylvania, 1925.



#### 100-YARD DASH

Chester Bowman, Syracuse, 1925, after winning his heat and semi-final handily, won the final in 9.9 seconds from a very strong field. Of the starters, five had done better than 10 seconds and 11 had done 10 seconds flat. Both semi-finals and the final were won in 9.9 on a rather heavy track. Bayes M. Norton, of Yale, who also won his heats, was second by 2 feet and George L. Hill, of Pennsylvania, defending champion, was forced to third place a foot behind. Keith Lloyd and Brice T. Taylor, of Southern California, were fourth and fifth respectively, but 6 inches separating each of the last three place men. Bowman led from the start and after 50 yards was leading by open ground. Hill, with a poor start, picked up toward the finish and bettered his position.
