FIFTY-SECOND ANNUAL TRACK AND FIELD CHAMPIONSHIP MEETING, MAY 25–26, 1928

HE 52nd Annual Track and Field Championship Meeting was held at Soldiers Field, Cambridge, on May 25th and 26th, 1928. The meet which gave promise of the breaking of numerous records was greatly marred by the heavy and continuous downpour of rain of Saturday which was most discouraging to competitors, spectators and officials. After a week of rain, Friday proved a clear, warm and sunny day and the records which were broken were the result of the competition in the field events of Friday. The times made by the track men Saturday were most creditable considering the muddy and soft track covered with a sheet of water and the steady cold rain and wind.

The championship was won for the second time in succession by Stanford with a total of 43 points. Yale was second with 25 1-3 and Penn State third with 16. Syracuse was fourth with 15 points. Yale and Penn State just reversed their positions of last year.

Three field event records were broken on Friday. The meet had scarcely opened when Eric C. W. Krenz of Stanford broke the record in the shot put with a put of 50 feet 1 inch, displacing the record made by Clarence L. Houser of 49 feet 11 3-4 inches made in 1926. Later in the afternoon Krenz added his second record with a discus throw of 154 feet 11 inches, displacing Houser's second record of 151 feet 3 3-8 inches, also made in the 1926 meet. The third record which was broken was the broad jump mark of 24 feet 8 1-2 inches held by Alfred H. Bates and made last year. This year Bates improved his record to 24 feet 10 3-8 inches.

The weather on Saturday also precluded the taking of satisfactory pictures and the effect on the financial return was naturally very great.

100-YARD DASH

The 100-yard dash was won by James F. Quinn of Holy Cross in 9.9 seconds which was under the conditions of the weather and track an excellent performance. In perhaps no other race of the Championships has such a combination of disasters occurred to the competitors as in this race. Charles E. Borah of Southern California, the defending champion who won his heat, had had a cramped muscle early in the season. Weldon Draper, his teammate, who had been forcing him to the tape in previous races, pulled up after his heat in a lame condition. Both of these men were withdrawn before the semi-finals to save them from possible injury for the Olympic Games. Arthur French of Harvard who also won his heat and who had done 9 4-5 seconds earlier in the season suffered a pulled tendon. Folwell Scull of Pennsylvania and Carl Wildermuth of Georgetown each of whom were second in their heats also suffered injuries during their races. At the 50-vard mark it was a close race between Quinn and John G. Harwood of Syracuse but from then on Quinn forged ahead to win by about 2 yards. James S. Daley also of Holy Cross was scarcely a foot behind. Sidney B. Kieselhorst of Yale and Geoffrey Glendinning of Dartmouth followed at intervals of a foot. With the exception of the winner the race was an exceedingly close one.










Upper, Start of First Semi-Final.



220-YARD DASH

The 220 was the second triumph of Raymond Barbuti of Syracuse who had previously won the 440. As in the 100, the semi-finals and finals were won without the presence of Charles E. Borah of Southern California and Arthur E. French of Harvard, both of whom had won their heats. Edward B. Rockwell of Princeton after a very fast start was leading by 5 or 6 yards half-way through. Slowly Barbuti with powerful, determined strides caught up with him and passed him practically on the tape to win by about 2 feet. Lyle D. Filkins of Penn State 3 yards behind fought out a neck and neck finish with Henry L. Henson of Michigan State and Richard G. Kent of Colby. The three finished in the order named a foot apart.





440-YARD DASH

Raymond J. Barbuti of Syracuse scored his first championwhip in this race by winning in 48.8 seconds, a creditable performance in view of the muddy track and cold rain, over Emerson L. Spencer of California who had come to the meet as a pronounced favorite having broken the world's record for the 400 meter and won a number of very fast quarters previous to the meet. Coming down the straightaway to the first turn the pack was well bunched. At the beginning of the last turn Barbut was in third place with Lancelot P. Ross of Yale and Emernon Spencer leading. Spencer and Ross widened out on the track and Barbuti came through on the pole with a tremendous rush and 75 yards from the finish passed the two leaders. Spencer responded with a gallant attempt but was unable to hold the terrific sprint. Barbuti came through with 4 feet to spare over Spencer with Ross 5 yards behind. Gerard Swope of Dartmouth picked up several places by a good sprint and finished 7 yards behind Barbuti and 1 yard ahead of Norman E. St. Clair of Syracuse who was fifth.





ONE-MILE RUN

Probably the most exciting race of the day was the One-Mile, After the thrilling finish of the Indoor Championship Mile where William J. Cox of Penn State, defending champion In both the Indoor and Outdoor Meets, beat Ralph G. Luttman of Harvard by about a foot it was expected that these two would furnish a thrilling race. Cox took the lead at the start. In the first 220 he was challenged by Charles Sansone of Colby, After shifting several times Sansone led at the quarter In 1 minute 9.4 seconds. Cox was ahead at the half in 2 minuter 7.0 seconds, Henry Wylie of Michigan State attempted to pass Cox who fought him off. Ralph G. Luttman of Harvard who was thirteenth at the end of the hundred, tenth at the end of the half and seventh at the three-quarters, started a long and terrific sprint moving rapidly up until at the beginning of the home stretch he was second. Forty yards from the tape he rought Cox and slowly drew away from him winning by about A yards, Henry Wylie was third 20 yards back with his teammate Meredith G. Clark 10 yards behind. Harry T. Carter of California who had greatly improved his position on the last lap was fifth 5 yards behind Clark. Luttman running his awn pace ran a well-judged race. The time of 4 minutes 25.4 seconds was equal to much better on a good track.

The Two-Mile Run furnished a good race. At one time or another all of the point-winners took the lead as well as Irving Totten of Union, Andre Cushing of Maine and Henry Coe of Stanford. A half-mile from the finish the eleven runners were within 10 yards of each other in the front group. At the beginning of the last quarter Benson moved out only to be passed in the middle of the back stretch by James L. Reid of Harvard who was third last year. From there on Reid was never headed and won by about 6 yards. Joseph Hagen of Columbia, Indoor champion, finished with a splendid sprint in the last 50 yards probably too long delayed. Entering the home stretch Hagen was fifth and was gaining on Reid rapidly. Lauren P. Brown of Michigan State was third about 9 yards behind leading Edward R. 







Black of Maine was second with 167 feet 4 inches. Last year Black finished in third position with 159 feet $7\frac{3}{4}$ inches. Donald S. Gwinn of Pittsburgh took third with 163 feet 4 inches. Harold N. Cohen with 151 feet 7 inches and Warren L. Worden both of Cornell with 150 feet $6\frac{3}{4}$ inches were respectively fourth and fifth. The performances were uniformly better than in 1927 when the event was won by Marion M. Ide of Penn State with 162 feet $1\frac{1}{2}$ inches. Third place this year was better than the winning throw of the year before.

FIFTY-FIRST ANNUAL TRACK AND FIELD CHAMPIONSHIP MEETING, MAY 27-28, 1927

THE Fifty-first Annual Track and Field Championship Meeting was held at Franklin Field, Philadelphia, on May 27 and 28, 1927. From the point of view of competition and the conduct of the Meet, this year's championships showed an improvement over even the remarkable meet of last

The championship was won by Stanford University with a total of 361/2 points. Penn State was second with 27 points, Yale third with 231/2 and Southern California fourth with 23

points. After nearly a month of rain both days were almost ideal save for a strong wind on Friday. Unfortunate experiences of the past proved to those conducting the meet that the field must be kept clear of inactive officials and competitors. For this reason solely inactive officials were required to sit in the stands and it is believed that the inner field presented very nearly the minimum of crowding.

The competition was uniformly excellent. Four records were broken.

Sabin W. Carr of Yale accomplished the remarkable feat of breaking the world's record in the pole vault at 14 feet after a thrilling competition with Lee S. Barnes of Southern California, who vaulted 13 feet 91/2 inches. W. P. Edmonds of Stanford who was third with 13 feet 61/4 inches was 41/4 inches above the former intercollegiate record. The fifth man in this competition did 13 feet.

Saturday witnessed the breaking of the record in the 220-

yard dash. The last track event to be broken was the 100 yards in 1922. Previous to that the 120 yards hurdle had fallen in 1920; the two mile in 1919; the quarter and the half in 1916; the mile in 1913; the 220 yards hurdle in 1898, and the 220 in 1896. This year's meet saw the breaking of the oldest track record on the books in the performance of Charles E. Borah of Southern California in running the 220 in 20.9 seconds. The old record was made by Bernard J. Wefers of Georgetown and afterwards was equaled by R. C. Craig of Michigan in 1910 and Donald Lippincott of Pennsylvania in 1913.

The record in the broad jump fell to Alfred H. Bates of Penn State with a jump of 24 feet $8\frac{1}{2}$ inches. It is noteworthy that each of the five point-winners jumped over 24 feet.

The record in the javelin throw fell to Creth B. Hines of Georgetown with a throw of 205 feet 75% inches. Vincent Moroney also of Georgetown who was second equaled the previous record of 199 feet 1 inch.

















HIGH JUMP

The high jump proved one of the upsets of the Meet. It was won by Thomas L. Maynard, Dartmouth, '29, with a jump of 6 ft. $4\frac{1}{2}$ in. Robert W. King, Stanford, '28, was compelled to be satisfied with a tie for second place with Henry J. Coggeshall, Southern California, '28, at 6 ft. $3\frac{3}{8}$ in. Last year King not only won the event but broke the Intercollegiate record with a jump of 6 ft. $5\frac{3}{4}$ in. 

BROAD JUMP

The broad jump event saw the breaking of another Intercollegiate record. Alfred H. Bates, Penn State, '28, leaped 24 ft. 81/2 in. or a half inch better than the performance of William A. Cummins, who made the record jump in 1924. The competition in this event was comparable to the pole vault. Every man winning a point jumped over 24 ft., a most unusual competition. Theodore A. Mathias, a teammate of Bates, was second with 24 ft. 53/4 in. Sidney T. Meeks, Stanford, '27, was third with 24 ft. 13/8 in. Fourth place went to Fred B. Zombro, Stanford, '29, with 24 ft. 11/8 in. G. Kimball Dyer, Stanford, '28, took fifth place with a jump of 24 ft. 7/8 in. Not only was the breaking of the record unexpected but even the result of the event. Stanford and California with four entries who had repeatedly cleared 24 ft. were expected to dominate the event. The result showed them only in third, fourth and fifth places. William A. Dowding, Georgetown, champion last year and twice Indoor champion, failed to place.


HAMMER THROW
