## SULLIVAN MEDAL WON BY JIM BAUSCH

James Aloysius Bausch, former University of Kansas foot ball player who won the decaathlon at the Olympic Games last August with a record-breaking point total, was awarded the James E. Sullivan Memorial Medal as the outstanding amateur athlete of 1932. More than 600 leaders in the world of sport voted on the award and the announcement of the result by the Amateur Athletic Union gave Bausch the medal by the margin of thirty-nine points over William A. Carr of the University of Pennsylvania, Olympic 400-meter champion.

More than a hundred names were sent to the A.A.U. tribunal when votes were first cast. In making their nominations the voters were asked to consider "acts of sportsmanship, excellence of performance, strength of character, qualities of leadership, force of personality and high ideals of amateurism." From those nominated the tribunal selected the ten competitors considered most worthy and asked for a vote on them. The voters were requested to ballot for three athletes, first places receiving five points, second three and third one. The vote was as follows:

Bausch began his athletic career at the Garden Plain (Kan.) High School. He attended the University of Wichita for a short time and then starred in all sports at the University of Kansas. On his way to Olympic fame he topped all in the Missouri Valley games at Lawrence, Kan., and then won the Olympic try-outs at Evanston, Ill.

## BARNEY BERLINGER WINNER OF THE 1931 AWARD

Bernard E. Berlinger of Philadelphia, all-round track and field star, was voted the competing athlete who, by his performance and by his example and influence as an amateur and a man, did most during the year 1931 to advance the cause of sportsmanship. Berlinger gained the distinction by a margin of two votes over Miss Helene Madison, America's outstanding woman swimmer. Mrs. Helen Wills Moody, famous international tennis player, was third in the voting.

Berlinger was presented with the James E. Sullivan Memorial Medal, an annual A.A.U. award, by President Avery Brundage of the amateur sports governing body, at a dinner tendered to the recipient, April 29, 1932, by the Amateur Athletic Union, the University of Pennsylvania and the Penn Athletic Club. Governor Pinchot of Pennsylvania was present and he lauded Berlinger in generous but justifiable terms. The vote was as follows:





Finish of the 100 meters run, the race in which Eddie Tolan (nearest lane) and Ralph Metcalfe of the United States hit the tape so nearly simultaneously that Tolan is estimated to have gained the victory by a margin of approximately two inches. Tolan equaled the world record of 10.3s., but so close was the finish that Metcalfe was clocked in the same time and shares the American record at that figure.

A series of prolonged blasts, sounded by a group of trumpeters, served as a signal for the Parade of the Athletes, who entered the stadium headed by Greece, while the members of the two committees formed a semicircle on the field, facing the tribune of honor.

Greece, as the nation in which the games originated, received the position of honor in the parade, the other countries following in alphabetical order, with the United States last. As each delegation passed the reviewing tribune its flagbearer dipped the colors, with the exception of the United States. In conformity with the tradition that the national emblem shall never be lowered to man or nation, the Stars and Stripes were borne aloft by F. Morgan Taylor of Quincy, Illinois, throughout the march around the enclosure.

When the last American had circled the track the army of athletes were drawn up in columns across the entire stretch of turf, their color and standard bearers standing in front of them, awaiting the official words that would proclaim the opening of another Olympiad.


Mr. Garland, president of the Olympic Organizing Committee, then spoke the words of welcome to the nations and introduced the Vice-President.

Mr. Curtis, as the representative of the nation's Chief Executive, arose and delivered the following proclamation:

"In the name of the President of the United States, I proclaim open the Olympic Games of Los Angeles, celebrating the Tenth Olympiad of the modern era."

A fanfare of trumpets sounded from the top of the peristyle as the Vice-President concluded, and the Olympic torch which burned for the sixteen days duration of the games, burst into flames. Ten cannon roared the Olympic salute and the huge choir rendered the Olympic hymn while the Olympic flag was slowly hoisted to the central mast.


The raising of the Olympic standard was the signal for the release of thousands of pigeons, which winged their way aloft to fill the sky above the stadium

before soaring away. Dr. Robert Gordon Sproul, president of the University of California, delivered the benediction, and as the choir sang the sacred hymn the flagbearers of each nation's athletic contingent formed a semicircle in front of the tribune of honor.

Then came, as the climax of the scene, the most impressive bit of ritual of the day—the administration of the Olympic oath. Lieut. George C. Calnan of the United States Navy advanced to the foot of the tribune of honor, holding in his left hand a corner of the American flag, carried by F. Morgan Taylor, and surrounded in a semicircle by the flagbearers of all the other countries. With all of the athletes joining in, Lieut. Calnan then raised his right hand and pronounced the oath:

"We swear that we will take part in the Olympic Games in loyal competition, respecting the regulations which govern them and desirous of participating in them in the true spirit of sportsmanship for the honor of our country and for the glory of sport."

The two thousand athletes, in the order in which they made their entrance, then left the stadium to rest until the following day, when the intensive competition began. Explanation of the reference marks and abbreviations used in the Olympic summaries are as follows:

























**KIRBY ELECTRIC TIMER USED AT THE OLYMPIC GAMES**

Four or five years ago Mr. Gustavus T. Kirby, Chairman of the Advisory Committee of the Intercollegiate Association of Amateur Athletes of America (I.C.A.A.A.), who has been interested in amateur sport activities for many years, conceived the idea of photographing the finish of a race in order to determine the proper position of the contestants. He included in his plan the idea of a motion picture camera which photographed both the finish of the race and the race of an ordinary stopwatch. The scheme which he used was that of starting the stopwatch before the race was started and recording on the motion picture film a flash of light operated by a contact in a starter's gun. By subtracting the readings on the photograph of the stopwatch at the beginning from those of the finish of a race the time could be determined to the nearest tenth of a second.

In the summer of 1931 several individuals at Electrical Research Products Company, discussing the possibilities of applying to the problem in some way the system technical knowledge of precision timing work. This was done in complete ignorance of any progress which had been made along this line and, largely enough, the same conclusion was reached that was found by Mr. Kirby and his associates, namely, that the only satisfactory method by which the race could be timed and judged was through the use of a high speed motion picture camera arranged to photograph both the performance and the time.

While investigating the matter these individuals chanced to meet Mr. Kirby and discussed the problem with him. They were very much interested to learn of his activity along this line, but felt that the company could make an important contribution to the improvement of timing apparatus, in that it could supply a frequency that would permit timing if necessary to one-hundredth or one-thousandth of a second. After the discussion work was begun to develop a timing apparatus for experimental use at the I.C.A.A.A.A. and the Olympic Games in 1932, for which permission had already been granted.

In the development of the plan it was decided to make two clocks, one associated with the camera in which the time and finish of the runner could be photographed adjacently on the same film, and another clock which would be started in the same manner as the first but so arranged as to be hand stopped so that one of the timers could use this precision clock by means of which the time, except for human error at the finish, could be read to the hundredth of a second immediately following the race.

The resultant timing system was first tried out at the Columbia-Syracuse track meet at Baker Field, New York, May 14, 1932. At Palo Alto on July 15 and 16 the American Olympic tryouts were held and photographs were obtained of the finish of every heat and final.

From July 31 to August 7, inclusive, this apparatus was in use at the Olympic stadium at Los Angeles. A few days prior to the opening of the games some of the pictures taken at Palo Alto were shown to the Olympic Committee, and based upon that evidence the following status was given the timing system: (1) it would be used officially for judging; (2) the hand stopped clock associated with the system would be used as one of the timers, of which there were two; and (3) it would be used officially for timing the Decathlon.

At a meeting of the International Amateur Athletic Federation after the games were over, this body in an official report praised the use of the timing system and recommended that hundredth-second timing be adopted as a world standard. It also officially invited the sponsors of the system to time the Olympic games to be held in Berlin in 1936.
