Statistical Explanation

This publication devotes considerable space to statistical listings, and a number of rules and policies are established to protect accuracy and assure consistency in compilations. A summary follows:

Eligibility: All US high school athletes (not those from possessions such as Puerto Rico) from freshmen through seniors who were eligible by local rules and competed in authorized competitions may qualify so long as they haven't received a diploma from previous attendance in high school and haven't exceeded four years or reached their 20th birthday. The current outdoor list includes marks from Sept. 1, 1968, to Aug. 31, 1969, and the indoor list from Dec. 1, 1968, to April 1, 1969. Spring graduates remain eligible for the lists until Aug. 31.

Records: T&FN's national high school records do not necessarily concur with those of the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations. The inconsistencies are based on five points: 1. While the federation only accepts marks from meets involving at least five teams, T&FN will consider those from dual meets; 2. While the federation only takes winning marks, T&FN lists some non-winning ones; 3. While the federation only lists marks by athletes from its member schools, T&FN does not discriminate against non-member parochial, private, prep, public or minority race schools; 4. While the federation limits the season to the actual semester of track, T&FN will consider marks from the entire year; 5. While the federation only reviews marks registered in interscholastic competition, T&FN will take them from any authorized meet. Indoors, no times made on oversized tracks (over 220 yards) are accepted. For class records, the frosh limit is 16-years, soph 17, junior 18 and senior 19.

Lists: A number of points should be considered individually.

1. Performers/Performances. For regularly contested events, both the 1969 and the all-time outdoor lists include the top 10 performances--indicated by an underscore of the final mark--and continue through 30 performers. Smaller lists are carried for less contested events. For athletes appearing more than once in the performance section, only the indented last name and the year of achievement appear. In relays, teams may be listed more than once in the current year's performances but only once per year in the all-time list. Indoor lists include only performers.
2. Categories. The legal lists include only marks fully verified as to accuracy and wind conditions. Incomplete Wind Information marks are those for which no wind report was received or reports conflicted. Wind-aided marks include those known to have been aided by a wind above 4.473mph. Questionable performances lack documentation but there is still reason to believe they could be legitimate; obvious phonies are thrown out.
3. Timing. Distances over a mile are listed in fifths of a second (.02, .04, etc.), in keeping with international rules? all times submitted in odd tenths are rounded upward to the nearest fifth (8:59.9 becomes 9:00.0).
4. Measurements. High jump, pole vault, long and triple jump, and shot put marks are listed only in quarter-inches (exception: when high jump marks are measured in meters, they may be converted to eighths of an inch). Discus, hammer and javelin performances are carried only to the full inch, not to any fractions of an inch except when converted from meters in which case half-inches are acceptable.
5. Abbreviations: n=non-winning; °=enroute to longer distance; y=yards; m=meters; *=junior; **=sophomore; ***=freshman.

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

Foreword

Carrigan Top 1969 Prep

True enough, success is a beautiful experience. But the higher one gets--in any field, not just track and field--the harder it gets for him to hold his ground and inch higher. It's all relative. Casey Carrigan, the pole vaulter, created such a tough act to follow in 1968 that he would have "slipped" in 1969 even if he'd gone 16'11½". No other vaulter could slip below 17-feet since no other has been over it, but Casey had to go that high just to match his Olympic year best.

Carrigan had a big past to live up to. At Orting High School in Washington, he had set national freshman and sophomore records. As a junior, he twice raised the prep record. He went 17'0" while still 17. He went to the Olympic Games. And then he went back to Orting for his senior year in high school. What next for a young vaulter who already had to go quite a distance to find competitors within two feet of his best?

Casey, a 6'0", 170-lb. all-round athlete, returned from Mexico City and got involved in other sports--football and then basketball. With few meets and no decent training facilities where he could use or develop his vaulting skills, he didn't get back at it until spring. And not until the big meets in June did he really spring back to true Carrigan form.

He had gone 16'7", his highest ever against prep competition, to win his state championship. His first venture outside of Washington and into an open meet was somewhat abortive. Casey placed only seventh at the Coliseum-Compton affair, reaching only 15'6". As it turned out, that 15'6" didn't indicate anything more than an off-night.

Carrigan was in California again a week later. The meet was the Golden West Invitational. The site, Sacramento. He had set a high school record of 16'8¼" here a year earlier in the AAU championships. Before his luck ran out, 18-year-old Casey had gone 17'4¾" up into the night sky without knocking off the bar and came close at 17'10¼" (which would have been a world record). Only nine vaulters in the event's history have topped that, so not surprisingly the performance was voted the best by a prep in any event in 1969. It put Carrigan strongly in contention for high school Athlete of the Year honors, if he kept vaulting well all summer.

The AAU meet was, as always, a crucial one. It not only meant going for the national championship but it also decided who'd go on for a summer of international competition. Carrigan's 17'0" vault--his third over that height--got him third place, and trips to such places as Sweden, West Germany and Great Britain. He never got higher than third the rest of the year, but that of course was against many of the best vaulters the world had to offer.

Casey found success in 1969, in even greater quantities than 1968, though it wasn't as startling since he wasn't so new any more. He is one of the extremely rare prep athletes who leads his fans to casually accept feats they know no one else approaches. Naturally, at 17'4¾", Carrigan was going far higher this year than last. But he also was beginning to find an ingredient lacking in 1968--consistency. Six times he went 16'5" or better, compared to only two marks above 16'1" previously.

For all this, Carrigan has been voted Track & Field News' high school Athlete of the Year, outpolling fellow internationalists Steve Prefontaine, the season's leading runner, and Reynaldo Brown, 1968 Athlete of the Year.

Where now does Carrigan go? Success comes even harder in the coming year. He's going to Stanford for one thing, which brings a number of good prospects his way. He'll be getting help from his Olympic coach, Payton Jordan. He'll be concentrating on track for the first time, even though two of his brothers were Stanford footballers. He'll go right into Pac-8 competition, since freshmen are fully eligible for the first time. And he'll be enjoying first-class training facilities--Tartan runway, Port-a-Pit--for the first prolonged period in his life.

Is there a better candidate for the initial flight over 18-feet?

Prefontaine Outruns All

Setting a high school record against high school competition, employing a pre-planned pace on a uncluttered track is one test of a prep distance man's ability. Holding onto his poise well enough in the harsh and often cruel world of national open competition to move on and do the same internationally is quite another and even more demanding test. And Steve Prefontaine moved from one test to the next this year, passing them coolly as could be.

Oh, there wasn't anything at all cheap about the 18-year-old Oregonian's 8:41.6 two-mile. He prepared for the April 25 race at Corvallis carefully, averaging 10 training miles a day in double sessions through an unusually snowy and cold winter. He paced himself well, backing up a 4:25.0 opening mile with a solid 4:16.6 finish. And he pushed himself along through the planned record attempt without a close challenger. Steve succeeded in wiping away the 8:48.4 mark Rich Riley had owned.

But Prefontaine looked on this as only his beginning. With this statistical test behind him, he was anxious to tackle more man-to-man ones. After setting his record, he said, "I'd like to run the AAU three-mile and maybe go against some of the world's best runners." He treated the Golden West Invitational as something of a warmup, cruising to a 4:06.0 mile win. Then on to Miami. Fellows his age have been known in the past to become overawed when starting the national championships beside runners they've only read about. Steve handled his first major open meet with the same wise pacing and tenaciousness as he'd used in his record race. He stormed through his last lap as fast as anyone in the field, reaching fourth place before the distance ran out.

Close, but not quite close enough, he thought. Prefontaine was the third American finisher and only two were moving on to the summer's international meets. Then, just before the three-way affair with the British Commonwealth and Soviet Union, Tracy Smith withdrew and young Steve was called up.

Steve Prefontaine, 5'9½", 147-lb. graduate of Marshfield in Coos Bay, Ore., got a summer of experience few high school trackmen, and even fewer high school distance runners, have earned or could earn. In his four 5000s, in Los Angeles, Stuttgart, Augsburg and London, he didn't win a race or even come very close to winning. Yet he put out four good-to-great races in three unsettled and travel-filled weeks. None of the rest of the US distance crew competed more and/or held up better.

Steve's record two-mile may be his best-remembered prep performance, but all things considered we have to go with the Americas-Eu-

rope 5000 as his most outstanding. While Gerry Lindgren and West German Jurgen May were cutting a wicked pace, Prefontaine glued himself to them and stayed right there until falling away with a lap left. The prep ran 13:52.8, and undoubtedly had gone past his unlocked three-mile in about 13:25. What's a 13:52? It isn't even a high school record, but it's many seconds better than one-time world record holders Paavo Nurmi, Gunder Hagg and Emil Zatopek ever ran.

Prefontaine took his two-mile time from 9:01 to 8:41 in one season--one race, in fact. What happens now is anyone's guess. Not nearly all prep sensations successfully cross the dangerous gap between high school and college. But his chances are better than most. He'll have Bill Bowerman, one of the sharpest distance coaches in the business, guiding him now that he's at Oregon. And not only has "Pre" gotten some mighty fine times, he also has had a taste of tough competitive life outside of high school. He likes it, and apparently can take it.

Prefontaine is the latest in a growing list of prep distance prodigies who can make their way nicely in meets all the way up through international ones. Bruce Kidd, Gerry Lindgren, Jim Ryun, Rick Riley, Marty Liquori, Steve Prefontaine. There'll be others.

Carrigan's 17'4³/₄" Best



Casey Carrigan, the 18-year-old senior from Orting, Washington, likes the vault pit at Hughes Stadium in Sacramento, California. It was there as a junior in the 1968 AAU meet that he raised the prep vault record to 16'8¹/₄". This year he returned for the Golden West Invitational, the showcase meet for high school seniors, and pushed the record up to 17'4³/₄" which is equal to 10th on the all-time world list. This one vault earned Carrigan honors for the top performance of the year.

Great things were predicted for Casey for 1969 as he had gone on from the AAU meet to raise his record to 17'0" at the Olympic Trials at South Lake Tahoe and then compete at Mexico City, all pretty heady stuff for a prepster. It certainly didn't start like a record year for Casey. After sitting out the indoor season to concentrate on basketball, Casey was delayed in competing until late April due to a bout with the flu and a miserable, wet spring. He managed one 15-footer in April and then a 16-footer at the Highline Relays on May 2, but up until the state meet in late May, he was generally content to vault just high enough to win, once as low as 10'6". At the state meet, he began to move and easily won at 16'7" which ties the federation's national record that Bob Pullard had set in Los Angeles earlier the same day. The following week Carrigan managed only 15'6" as he stepped again into the big-time at the Coliseum-Compton meet, but then came the Golden West and Casey was ready.

At Sacramento, he did not enter the competition until the bar reached 16-feet which he made on his second effort. Casey then went over 16'8³/₄" on his first try, a height also cleared by Steve Smith (South, Torrance, Calif), but now Casey was warmed up and made a national record 17'1¹/₂" also on his first attempt before raising the mark to 17'4³/₄" on his second try. Casey then went for a world record 17'10¹/₄" and though he had three good attempts, his record breaking was finished, if only temporarily.

Sophs Spark 1969

The 1969 high school season was outstanding, both in the quality of the records established and in the depth and youth of the competitors. A total of 10 national records were tied or broken along with four other prep bests in a season keynoted by youth. Possibly never before in prep annals have so many fine underclassmen, particularly sophomores, put their names on the 30-deep prep list.

Almost as a hold-over from the previous season, two records fell at the South Lake Tahoe Olympic Trials as Reynaldo Brown (Compton, Calif) made the team with a 7'3" prep record and was fifth (7'¼") at Mexico City. The other high school Olympian, Casey Carrigan (Orting, Wash) broke his own prep record of 16'8¼" with a 17'0" vault. After the Olympic flurry, the prep scene was relatively quiet, except for a good indoor season, until late season meets began producing more records which are chronicled below, all too briefly, in their regional settings.

Northeast

The Northeast had a fine all-around season and established several regional bests. Possibly the top star was Zack Gillon (Peekskill, NY), a consistent triple jumper with six meets over 48'10" and a best at the Golden West meet of 50'10", though he won with a windy 50'11¼". Gillon did 50'5½" and 23'8½" without spikes at his state meet as did sophomore Greg Flippen (Riverhead, NY) with a 24'4¼".

Challenging Gillon for top honors were a trio of 880 men. Marcel Phillippe (Mater Christi, Astoria, NY) led the nation with an eastern record of 1:49.4, but Brian McElroy (Massapequa, NY) and junior Joe Savage (Catholic, Roselle, NJ) were real workhorses. McElroy, with superb 1:12.4 (600) and 2:12.6 (1000) indoor marks, ran 1:49.8, 1:49.9, led the eastern milers at 4:12.6 and anchored a swift 3:28.8 sprint medley. Savage was just as impressive indoors with a 1:53.3 anchor on Catholic's national two-mile relay record setter (7:47.4). Outdoors, Savage posted a 1:50.7 and anchored excellent 3:27.2 and 17:53.8 relay teams.

New Jersey produced three fine hurdlers as Joe Abitante (Catholic, Roselle) and John Bykowsky (St Joseph, Montvale) both ran 13.9s with Bill Novo (Woodbridge) at 14.0. Novo's 18.9 just edged the 19.0s of the other two with Abitante adding a 38.4 intermediate time. Montvale St. Joseph edged Roselle Catholic for eastern supremacy with the top sprinter in Robert Hauk (9.5) and junior Steve Adams in the shot (63'6"), an event led by Joe Naughton's (Weston, Mass) 63'9". Russ Frame (Union, NJ) got an all-time eastern discus best with 192'8". All-around leader was Fred Samara (Ft Hamilton, Brooklyn, NY) with a fine 24'11" long jump and a 6734 decathlon score. Junior Gene White (Bristol, Pa) had 24'9" and 48'3" jumps as six easterners were over 48-feet in the latter event. A small but talented hammer group was led by the 196'2" of Manny Rosa (Hope, Providence, RI). Third nationally in the javelin was Ray Mushinski (Ambridge, Pa) at 239'4" (plus a 230'0") followed by Henry Santangini's (Classical, Providence, RI) 228'2".

Trackwise, Dan Moynihan (Catholic, Malden, Mass) ran a fine 9:04.2 two-mile and Robert Carpenter (Mt Pleasant, Providence) showed talent with 21.1st, 21.2tw, and 47.4. Boys (Brooklyn, NY) topped the short relays (41.6, 1:26.8) with McKinley (Washington, DC) running 1:26.9. The Penn Relays produced a thrilling mile relay with Abington (Pa) just edged

Boys as both ran 3:16.6. The two-mile relay was an all-eastern event as Power Memorial (NYC, NY) ran the third fastest ever of 7:40.8 (plus 7:44.4 and 7:49.0) and was challenged by State College (Pa) at 7:45.0.

Sophomores worth watching were state champ Jim Redd (Hamilton, Elmsford, NY) in the 440 (48.1), Dave Herman (Shaker, Latham, NY) in the lows (19.1) and Ken McBryde (Mt Vernon, NY) in the triple jump (47'5").

Southeast

The Southeast had one of its great seasons with four national records and a host of the nation's best. Activity centered in Miami, Fla., where Killian, with a foursome of Porter Tompkins (49.3), Robert Anderson (49.0), Ken Thompson (47.3) and Larry Black (46.2) equaled the national mile relay record of 3:11.8 and also was national leader in the 880 relay with 1:26.1 and 1:26.2 clockings. Black's 46.7 ranked him second nationally in the 440 after an earlier 46.9. Over at Coral Gables, it was sprinter Gerald Tinker with a record-tying 20.6 220 at the AAU meet, a 9.4 100 and anchor on a 1:26.8 relay. A virtual unknown before the season was Willie McGee (Rowan, Hattiesburg, Miss) who ran a record-tying 9.3 at the Golden West meet to prove his earlier 9.3w, 21.1t (21.0tw) times were no flukes.

The nation's finest prep hurdler, Rod Milburn (Clark, Opelousas, La), took home the area's final national mark. Besides a season opening 13.5 and a windy 13.4, Rod went 13.9 over the 42-inch highs to separate Richmond Flowers' 13.8 from the record. Milburn also clocked 18.7st and 37.7 in rare long race appearances. Milburn's constant rival and one of the great all-around athletes was Spencer Thomas (Carver, New Orleans, La) who hurdled 13.7 and 37.7 against Rod, but was just as impressive for his jump efforts of 24'4" (24'5 $\frac{1}{4}$ "w) and 50'6 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", the latter third-best of all-time. The other outstanding all-arounder was Doug Dickinson (Newport News, Va) whose state meet wins included 24'3 $\frac{3}{4}$ ", 48'6 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", 14.3 and 18.9, plus a 9.7 100 (2nd).

The nation's shot leader and heir apparent to Sam Walker's 72'3 $\frac{1}{4}$ " prep record was junior Jesse Stuart (Glasgow, Ky) who was over 67-feet (the old junior record) in five meets with a late season best of 69'2 $\frac{3}{4}$ ". Jesse also added a class record of 59'10 $\frac{1}{2}$ " with the 16-lb. shot. Top area weight doubler was John Hannah (Albertville, Ala) with 63'4" and 181'2".

Bobby Sahuque (Redemptorist, New Orleans, La) became the first sub-4:10 southern miler with a 4:08.4 state title while Del Ramers (Dunedin, Fla) won his state title at 4:10.4. Adding to the fine 440 depth were Marvin Foster (Central, Kansas City, Mo) at 47.0 (plus a super 20.1 relay leg), junior Darwin Bond (Dobyns-Bennett, Kingsport, Tenn) with his 47.3 and sophomore Darryl Triche (Carver, Hahnville, La) at 48.1. Southeast of Kansas City (Mo) had a top brother act of Mike (9.5) and Al (19.1st) Chavis while Barney Hess (Largo, Fla), the vault leader at 15'1", rounds out top area action.

Midwest

Except for the sprints and relays, the Midwest was well represented and produced a superb national record. George Amundson (Central, Aberdeen, SD) went to his state meet ranked fifth nationally in the discus (187'4) but came away with an unheard of 211'4" national record (plus a 204'7"), the first prep ever over the 200-foot barrier, and he doubled back with a fine 62'1". Two weeks later, George again topped 200-feet (200'1").

Two other big names were Willie Thomas (Englewood, Chicago, Ill) and Jim Pearce (North, Shawnee Mission, Kans). Thomas, indoor 880 recordman at 1:52.4, was consistently fast with a 1:50.8 and two 1:51.1s.

Pearce, the nation's javelin leader in a strong year, had the fifth-best ever at 244'7" and added 242'1" and 235'4" tosses. Junior class record holder Bob Obee (Wyandotte, Kansas City, Kans) was next at 229'3". Wyandotte also had Frank Johnson (9.5) who anchored a 1:27.8 relay. The area's other top sprinter was Mark Lutz (Mayo, Rochester, Minn) at 9.6 and 21.1t.

Top distance man was mile leader Garry Bjorklund (Proctor, Minn) at 4:05.1 who later ran 4:08.7 and then doubled with 4:14.5 and 8:48.0 for 3000-meters. Besides Bjorklund, there were Reggie McAfee (Courter Tech, Cincinnati, Ohio) who won a tough state double (1:52.5, 4:08.5) and Glenn Herold (Watertown, Wisc) at 4:09.8 and 14:01.2 (3Mile). Over two-miles, three were under 9:04.0 with Jon Callen (East, Wichita, Kans) nipping Dave Anderson (South, Shawnee Mission, Kans) in a great race as both ran 9:03.4. A soph to watch here was Pat Kreidler (Denfield, Duluth, Minn) at 4:15.1 and age 14 record holder Randy Beebe (Glenbard East, Lombard, Ill) at 4:25.3.

John Morrison (Redford, Detroit, Mich) was easily the class of the central area hurdlers with his 13.7 (13.6w) and 19.1t marks. On the field, Don Phillips (Washington, Indianapolis, Ind) was equally good in the shot at 64'3½" with four other meets over 62-feet. Junior Gayln Sweet (Octavia, Colfax, Ill) had a fine 6'9¾" and Oscar Wallace (Alton, Ill) was the long jump leader at 24'6¼" (25'0"w), but the biggest surprise was the out-of-nowhere windy 50'1¼" triple leap for Len Turner (Dunbar, Dayton, Ohio) at the Junior Champ meet after an earlier 48'6½". Jeff Swenson's (Nicolet, Milwaukee, Wisc) 15'4" gave him the area vault lead over Don Jenness (Marshall, Milwaukee), who went 15'3½". Casey Carrigan's age 14 record fell to Bob Crites of Northwestern, Kokomo, Ind., who cleared 13'9".

Southwest

Sprint speed is the name of the game in the Southwest, and 1969 was no exception. There were stars like David Perkins (Westwood, Mesa, Ariz) with 9.4, 21.0st (20.9w) and 21.4t and Ken Curl (Worthing, Houston, Tex) with 9.6 and 21.2t state titles plus windy 9.3, 9.4 and 9.5 marks, but top honors must go to Lincoln of Dallas (Tex). It had juniors Rufus Shaw (47.8) and the Pouncy brothers, Joe (21.1t) and Gene (9.5, 21.5t), and then added another junior, John Delley, and won the greatest 440 relay in prep history at the state meet. Their time of 40.7 crushed the old mark of 41.1 which was tied by San Antonio Wheatley while seventh was a speedy 41.8. Houston Worthing (41.5) and Austin (Tex) Anderson both ran 1:26.7 880 relays, and Houston Elmore was anchored to 41.6 and 1:27.0 times by a freshman, Charles Dawson. Top all-arounder was Phil Lusk (Moody, Corpus Christi, Tex) who did 9.5, 20.9t and 24'1" in one meet before being injured.

Not to be outdone were the hurdlers topped by Ron Washington (South Oak Cliff, Dallas) with 13.6, 13.7 and 38.2 marks, and Efern Gipson (Refugio, Tex) at 13.9 (13.8w) and 37.5. Indoor 120 high hurdles record holder (14.4) Donnie Rogers (Bay City, Tex) also ran 13.9, as did junior Eric Elkins (Jesuit, Dallas) three times, but the most exciting marks came from sophomores Randy Lightfoot (Plainview, Tex) at 13.9 (13.7w) and Scottie Jones (Elmore, Houston) at 14.0 (13.9w). Weight men also were impressive. Don Randell (Sunset, Dallas) ranked second nationally with 67'11½" and 57'½" (16lb) tosses which is a feat for someone only 5'8½" tall. Mike Marks (Richardson, Tex), Randell's rival, had a good 63'2¼". It was closer in the discus where the early 190'4" by Gary Butler (Conroe, Tex) held off the 189'11" by Pryor Nunn (Coronado, El

Paso, Tex).

Houston Wheatley defeated San Antonio Wheatley for the state mile relay title, 3:13.5 to 3:14.9, as the Houston team, anchored by Willie Blackmon, had three more races under 3:15 in a state where 12 teams were under 3:18. Blackmon ran six 880s under 1:53.0 with a 1:50.5 best as his rival, George "Crazy Horse" Jones (Yates, Houston), had four under 1:53 topped by a 1:51.7.

In the 330 hurdles, Joe Wylie (Henderson, Tex) neared the national mark when he topped Mike Cronholm (Lake Highlands, Dallas), 37.0 to 37.4, in a late season meet. Wylie also did 37.2, 37.4, 14.0w, 22'4 $\frac{3}{4}$ " and 167'9" discus throw while Cronholm ran fine 53.2 and 53.5 hurdle races. Youth excelled here with juniors Frank Anderson (Westchester, Houston) and David Stephens (Conroe, Tex) at 38.0 plus soph record holder Henry Sulak (Ganado, Tex) at 38.5 just edging soph Francis Ford (Lincoln, Port Arthur, Tex) at 38.6.

On the field, long jump topper was 24'4" by Wayne Kinney (Duncan, Okla) though Danny Colbert (South Oak Cliff, Dallas) had a windy 24'6". Easy leaders in the javelin and pole vault were George Stevens (Del Norte, Albuquerque, NM) at 231'5" and Dave Roberts (Conroe, Tex) at 15'8" while Danny Brabham (Roswell, NM) odd-doubled with 24'1 $\frac{3}{4}$ " and 14'7". Worth watching were junior Barry Schur (Palo Verde, Tucson) with 6'7 $\frac{3}{4}$ " and 5884 in the decathlon and sophs Darrell Hughes (Yuma, Ariz) at 23'11 $\frac{3}{4}$ " and Rick Slifer (Duncan, Okla) at 6'7 $\frac{1}{2}$ ".

Rocky Mountains

The Rocky Mountain area can't compete depthwise, but quality wise it produced two of the most outstanding javelin marks on record. Little Craig Stiles (5'10", 160-lbs) from Malta, Mont., won the state title at 242'7" which ranks among the top 10 performances of all-time, and Craig is just a 16-year-old sophomore. He clobbered the old class mark by 30 feet (and the age record by 20). He wasn't alone as another soph, 15-year-old Richard George (Millard, Fillmore, Utah) added 15-feet to the age record with his 224'0" state win.

Top school in the area was Muller (Fort Logan, Colo) which produced a 3:18.1 mile relay and top individuals in junior Tom Scavuzzo (9.6, 21.1t, 48.2 and a 5.3 indoor 50) and Pat Shields (21.3t, 47.8). Impressive Nevadans were Gary Dankworth (Reno) at 15'6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " and Ray Lisby (Las Vegas) with a 6'9 $\frac{3}{4}$ ". Top hurdler was junior Ralph Fisher (Manual, Denver) at 14.0 while Palmer (Colorado Springs) had two stars in David Holmes (9.6, 21.6t) and indoor jump leader, junior John Duvall at 6'8 $\frac{1}{4}$ ".

Pacific Coast

The Pacific Coast again led the nation depthwise and produced the year's two finest prepsters, both from the northwest. Casey Carrigan's fabulous 17'4 $\frac{3}{4}$ " vault record and consistently over 16-feet earned him High School Athlete of the Year honors over runner-up Steve Prefontaine, the wonder runner from Marshfield of Coos Bay, Ore. "Pre" set a two-mile record of 8:41.6 and proved his versatility with fine times from the mile to 5000-meters. Their feats are more fully chronicled elsewhere.

Never before has distance running had such depth. Prefontaine had competition at home with the likes of Doug Crooks (North Eugene) at 4:07.5 and 9:03.0 and Mark Hiefield (Milwaukie, Ore), who lost to Fred Ritcherson (Salesian, Los Angeles) at the Golden West meet as both ran 8:55.2. Ritcherson, along with Chuck Smead (Santa Paula, Cal), are the two finest long distance runners of all-time. Fred ran a prep marathon

best of 2:27:01 and later ran the third-fastest one-hour clocking by an American with 12 miles 23 yards--an amazing average of 4:59-plus per mile. Smead lowered the marathon best to 2:23:04 and covered 11 miles 1468 yards in one hour. Smead also ran short races of 29:25.8 for six-miles and 9:07.6 for two. California state champ Ruben Chappins (Excelsior, Norwalk) ran 8:57.0, 8:59.0 and 9:00.2, while junior Randy James (Ferris, Spokane, Wash) clocked 9:03.2 and class records of 14:49.8 over 5000-meters and 31:38.2 for 10,000. Two other great juniors were class and age 16 record holder Ron Johnson (West, Torrance, Calif) and Dave White (El Modena, Orange, Calif) at 8:59.0 and 8:59.8.

Rivals Steve Smith (South, Torrance, Calif) and Bob Pullard (Los Angeles) battled each other to second and third on the all-time vault list with 16'8 $\frac{3}{4}$ " and 16'7" bests. Reynaldo Brown, 1968's outstanding prep, had 15 marks of 6'10 or better, four over seven-feet, to far outdistance the 6'9 $\frac{1}{2}$ " by Robert Joseph (Washington, Los Angeles). Top soph was Randy Fulkerson (Santa Fe, Santa Fe Springs, Calif) at 6'9" while the frosh leader was Joe Wyrick (Mt Pleasant, San Jose, Calif) at 6'3".

California sophs were everywhere. Best of the lot were class record breakers Dave Tucker (San Joaquin Memorial, Fresno) in the triple jump (50'1 $\frac{1}{2}$ "), Chris Hoffman (St Bernard, Playa del Rey) in the three-mile (14:26.0), and Kasto Lopez (Sanger) over two-miles (9:06.2). Just missing a record was Percell Keeling (Morningside, Inglewood) at 1:52.8. Oregon had a super-soph in Tinker Hatfield (Central Linn, Halsey) who did 15'1", 19.3t, and 14.0.

State 880 champ Ricco Sanchez (Canoga Park, Calif) ran six races under 1:52.0 with his 1:51.3 best losing to the 1:51.0 by junior James Baxter (Los Angeles). Besides Baxter and Pullard, Los Angeles earned team honors with Al Hearvey (9.5, 9.4w, 21.2t) and Ronnie Welch (9.6, 21.2t) and produced 41.5, 3:15.2 and 3:28.4 relay times.

Jerry Wilson (Roosevelt, Fresno, Calif) was the top hurdler with two 13.7s, a windy 13.6, 18.3 and 18.5 lows marks, 18.8t and two state titles. Charles Rich (Washington, Los Angeles) challenged with 13.7 (13.6w) and 18.7 (18.6w) marks, but the real lows challenger was Larence Jones (Lemoore, Calif) who ran 18.4 and 18.7 and just happened to be the national 440 leader at 46.6. An all-rounder was talented Mark Low (Pomona, Calif) who ran 21.0st, 13.8, 18.5 and 18.6, and a 52.7 440 hurdles. Another top 440 man was Bill Sims (Whittier, Calif) at 47.1 (plus 47.2, 21.4t).

All the discus news came from the San Francisco Bay area where four men, led by the fine 195'4" of Tom Birtwhistle (Gunn, Palo Alto), were over 185-feet. In the shot, Sam Cunningham (Santa Barbara, Calif) just edged Kerry Eskeli (Serra, Gardena, Calif) in a sectional meet, 64'9" to 64'8 $\frac{3}{4}$ ". Top doubler was junior Billy Joe Winchester (Mt Miguel, Spring Valley, Calif) at 62'2 $\frac{3}{4}$ " and 180'0" (plus 150'11" international disc).

The nation's long jump was co-led at 25'1 $\frac{1}{2}$ " by Heulon Hewitt (Merced, Calif), who also had a windy 25'6", and state champ James McAlister (Blair, Pasadena, Calif), a junior. Harry Freeman (Santa Clara, Calif) triple stepped a windy 50'7 $\frac{3}{4}$ " plus a legal 49'3 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", while western javelin leader at 229'4" was Bob Daniels of Central Linn (Halsey, Ore).

The junior record in the steeplechase fell to the 9:20.4 of Jim McLaughlin (North Eugene, Ore).

In the relays, Edison of Stockton (Calif) was 440 leader at 41.4 while Centennial (Compton, Calif) ran 3:15.1 and 3:15.3 mile relay times. El Cerrito (Calif) broke into the eastern two-mile relay times with a state record 7:44.2 while Point Loma (San Diego, Calif) topped Monte Vista (Spring Valley, Calif) over four-miles, 17:52.2 to 17:59.2.

Golden West: 1969 Peak

The Golden West Invitational comes the closest to a national high school championship of any event staged in the United States. Which may well rank this track and field championship limited to athletes--usually seniors--completing their final season of prep track eligibility the number one prep sporting event in America.

While this unique athletic contest has brought together many of the nation's very best high school track and field stars since its inauguration in 1960, the GWI has not been without its problems.

Aesthetically and competitively, the Golden West is certainly a track nut's dream. But somehow, the meet has seemed to escape the fancy of the casual track or general sports fan. The largest crowd has not exceeded 6500 fans in a decade of meets. And the meet has changed venues four times, thrice in Los Angeles before moving to Sacramento for the past five competitions, as well as sponsors three times before forming its current Golden West Track and Field Association in alliance with the Active 20/30 Club of Sacramento. The meet lost money five consecutive years beginning in 1962 despite the fact that meet management does not foot any of the transportation expenses of athletes and coaches.

Nevertheless, the cast of characters, both super-preps at the time as well as many champs of later years, has been impressive. And they have accounted for the destruction of 10 national records with two others matched. Check some of these names: Charlie Greene, Jim Hines, Bill Gaines, Willie McGee, Ullis Williams, Tommie Smith, Larry James, Ron Freeman II, Ron Whitney, Tommy Sullivan, Dennis Carr, Wade Bell, Jim Ryun, Dave Patrick, John Camien, Morgan Groth, Tim Danielson, Steve Prefontaine, Marty Liquori, Tracy Smith, Doug Brown, Fred Ritcherson, Earl McCullough, Mel Renfro, Bill Tipton, Bob Bornkessel, Lorenzo Allen, Clarence Johnson, Brian Sternberg, Marc Savage, Bob Steinhoff, Paul Heglar, Casey Carrigan, Doyle Steele, Jerry Proctor, Bob Beamon, Karl Salb, Sam Walker, George Amundson, Mark Murro, and Roger Collins.

The list of super-preps who have not competed has detracted very little from the meet: Clyde Glosson, Richard Joyce, Gerry Lindgren, Rick Riley, Richmond Flowers, Reynaldo Brown and Randy Matson.

The meet was first conceived by a group of Los Angeles track buffs who joined forces with the Monterey Park Junior Chamber of Commerce in the planning. It was first set up to pit the two major sections in and about Los Angeles, then was to match southern vs. northern California, and eventually was to include five or six west coast states--hence the name of Golden West Invitational. But by the time the first meet got off the drawing boards, athletes from 14 states were invited to participate in the 1960 meet at East Los Angeles Junior College where only 3300 fans turned up.

The concept remains the same as in the beginning. Invitations are limited to eight performers in each event who are completing their last year of track eligibility in high school. And the philosophy of competition is unique: no athlete can compete more than once; there is no second chance. There are no trial heats, no eliminations in field events. As the promoters advertize, every event "is a one-shot, go-for-broke situation, and the competitive pressure build-up is perhaps unequalled anywhere in prep sports".

There have been many fine performances in this meet--both compe-

tively and mark-wise. Here are the national records set in this meet:

Here is a capsule summary of the competitive highlights and records established in this golden decade of the Golden West Invitational:

1960: The initial effort began somewhat modestly--both in terms of results (only one of two meets not to bear witness to a national record) and spectator interest (3300 spectators yielded a net profit of \$170 for charity). The East Los Angeles Junior College track has rarely yielded top performances, and this was no exception. Mel Renfro (Jefferson, Portland, Ore) was named the meet's outstanding performer off his high (13.8) and low (19.4) hurdles victories and fourth place finish in the long jump. The biggest future name star to win an event was Ron Whitney (Downey, Modesto, Calif.), who snagged the half-mile in 1:54.4.

1961: The meet moved to Los Angeles State's new stadium, where the competition improved with athletes from 18 states represented but as local television, fog and wind limited the crowd size and profits. The first national record to fall went to Morgan Groth (Alhambra, Martinez, Calif), who out-elbowed John Camien (Sewanhaka, Floral Park, NY) to win the mile in 4:10.0--a full second under the established mark which Camien also bettered by nine-tenths. But the athlete of the meet title went to Tommy Sullivan (St George, Evanston, Ill). He won the half-mile handily, in a prep record equaling 1:50.6 clocking. Ullis Williams (Compton, Calif) bagged the 440 in 47.3.

1962: The meet grew in its national scope as athletes from 24 states came to compete, once again at LA State. A crowd of 5384 watched unheralded Doug Brown (Red Lodge, Mont) win the first-ever two-mile by over 15 seconds in 9:16.2. The time smashed the previous record of 9:21.4. He finished fifth in the mile at 4:22.0, and earned meet athlete honors. Bad winds hampered the sprinters, hurdlers, high jumpers and long jumpers for the second straight year.

1963: Marc Savage (Claremont, Calif) arched over 15'½" to establish a national vault prep standard and was named athlete of the third meet at LA State--once again before a mediocre-sized crowd. Four 1968 Olympians-to-be claimed wins: Charlie Greene (O'Dea, Seattle, Wash) 9.5 (21.6 for second), Tommie Smith (Lemoore, Calif) 47.3 (9.8 for fifth), Wade Bell (Ben Lomond, Ogden, Ut) 4:17.1 and Tracy Smith (Arcadia, Calif) 9:17.0. Two other big names of the late 60s were winners here--Dennis Carr (Lowell, Whittier, Calif) in 1:50.8 and Bruce Wilhelm (Fremont, Sunnyvale, Calif) 63'7½" in the shot.

1964: In a desperate move to salvage the meet, the directors took the GWI to nearby Cerritos JC in Norwalk where it would be co-sponsored by the Southern California Striders with open events intertwined. But less than 3500 people showed up, and it was a financial, if not competitive, disaster. Earl McCullough (Poly, Long Beach, Calif) and Elvin Bethea (Central,

Trenton, NJ) were both double winners, but McCullough was named the best athlete of the meet off his hurdle wins in 13.7 and 18.1. Bethea was an easy winner in both the shot and discus at 64'1½" and 185'8½". Jim Hines (McClymonds, Oakland, Calif) was upset by Roger Cox (Redlands, Calif) in the 100 as both sprinted 9.8 but he returned the favor in the 220, 21.5 to 21.7. The mile and two-mile were the most competitive, as Gene McClain (Salina, Kans) zapped Dave Wilborn (Albany, Ore) and Dave Patrick (Kenwood, Baltimore, Md) in the mile, 4:13.3 to 4:13.7 and 4:14.4, while Charlie Messenger (Kenwood, Baltimore, Md) took the two-mile from Chuck Schulz (Evanston, Ill) by two seconds in 9:17.6.

1965: The meet directors decided that southern California simply could not be receptive to such a competition, and, after considering several sites including Abilene, Texas, moved the Golden West to Sacramento where it would be contested at Hughes Stadium of the City College. The best crowd ever of 5061 fans witnessed a doozy of a meet including three double wins. Jim Ryun (East, Wichita, Kans) was the obvious headliner, having just previously become the first prep to better four-minutes for the mile. And he responded with a 9:04.0 two mile two hours before he took the mile in 4:04.3. The two-mile was virtually a solo as Mike Ryan (Wilcox, Santa Clara, Calif) held back and finished second in 9:08.2. In the mile, Jim Olson (Kirkwood, Mo) and Bruce Bowman (Proviso West, Hillside, Ill) provided stiffer competition before slipping at the end to 4:07.3 and 4:08.7 clockings. Other double victors included Bob Hawke (Butte, Mont) with 61'7¼" and 187'11" and Ralph Wise (Pasadena, Calif) in 9.5 and 22.3. The national record fell twice in the triple jump, ultimately to Bob Beamon (Jamaica, NY) at 50'3¼" after placing fourth in the long jump at 23'11" behind Eric Klein (Ingraham, Seattle, Wash) at 24'10½". Larry Freeman (Poly, Long Beach, Calif) also topped Beamon's existing triple jump standard by two-inches for a second place finish at 49'8". Ron Freeman II (Jefferson, Elizabeth, NJ) copped the quarter in 46.8.

1966: This was certainly the best of the seven meets, as 31 states were represented (a record to date), but the novelty had apparently worn off and less than 4000 people showed. Following Ryun's fine double of the previous year, the directors invited America's last world record holding miler, Glenn Cunningham, to be on hand in anticipation of two top races at a mile and two-miles. Tim Danielson (Chula Vista, Calif) earned top athlete laurels with a sizzling two-mile win over Ralph Gamez (Berkeley, Calif), 8:55.4 to 8:57.0, and an impressive mile victory in 4:07.0--a second ahead of Gary Lineburg (Oak Harbor, Wash). A national record fell, as Ron Beiter (Wichita Heights, Wichita, Kans) lowered the 330-yard intermediate hurdle best to 37.9 in beating Larry James (White Plains, NY) by a tenth. Clyde Peach (Brebauf, Indianapolis, Ind) was the meet's second double winner with his 9.6 and 21.4 clockings. Field events accounted for the remainder of the top performances. Doyle Steele (San Diego, Calif) annexed the long jump at 25'5" with a wind, Paul Heglar (Muir, Pasadena, Calif) the vault at 15'7", Dave Murphy (Sunny Hills, Fullerton, Calif) 66'11½" and Roger Collins (Livingston, NJ) 242'10½" in the javelin.

1967: Once again financial problems plagued the very existence of the meet. This time, the Golden West Track and Field Association joined forces with one of Sacramento's most involved service clubs, the Active 20/30 Club, and the meet drew over 6000 spectators and showed the first profit since 1961 which enabled the directors to pay off 50% of its past obligations. And they invited Jesse Owens, perhaps the most renowned track athlete of all-time who among other things collected four gold medals in the 1936 Olympic Games in Berlin, as the meet's honorary referee. Three national prep marks were officially topped and three more were bettered

though unrecognized because of excessive aiding wind. The athlete of the meet, and the sole double victor, was Bill Tipton (Central, Pontiac, Mich) with a windy 13.4 highs and an 18.3 lows in his first-ever turn race. Karl Salb (Crossett, Ark) inched up by three his own 12-lb. shot record on his first put offer of 69'6". And Joe Kurzrok (Mt Vernon, NY) sliced the 330-yard intermediates mark by a tenth to 37.3. The records nullified by wind the 26'5 $\frac{3}{4}$ " long jump by Jerry Proctor (Muir, Pasadena, Calif), 9.3 100-yards by Bill Gaines (Clearview, Mullica Hill, NJ) in addition to Tipton's 13.4. The best meet yet also produced a 247'4" javelin toss by Mark Muro (Essex Catholic, Newark, NJ).

1968: A record crowd of more than 6500 fans, including two-time Olympic vault champ Bob Richards who watched his son take second in the vault, viewed still another national record, by Sam Walker (Samuell, Dallas, Tex) as he pipped the 16-lb. ball one inch over the standard with his 61'1 $\frac{1}{4}$ " here which tagged Doug Lane (Cedar Rapids, Ia) by 15 inches. Walker also smashed Lane in the 12-lb. duel, 69'8 $\frac{3}{4}$ " to 65'10 $\frac{1}{2}$ ". But Walker was not named the athlete of the meet, an honor which went to Bob Bornkessel (Shawnee Mission North, Shawnee Mission, Kans) to make him the fourth hurdler to receive this accolade. He won the highs in 13.7 before falling in the 330-yard intermediates, his specialty. The top race was the half-mile, where John Drew (Memorial, Houston, Tex) wiped the oldest meet record off the books with a 1:49.5 effort that beat John Brady (St Helena, New York, NY) by a tenth. Three others got under the former 1961 meet standard and all five became the leaders of the 1968 season. In the upset column, Scott Hiles (Madison Heights, Ind) upset the year's only sub-nine minute two-miler in Rich Elliott (Proviso West, Hillside, Ill) as he reduced his PR by 12.4 seconds to 8:56.6. Elliott ran 9:02.4 here.

1969: This meet marked the 10th anniversary of the competition, and with 6000-plus fans and performances the likes none of the other nine meets had produced it appeared the competition was here to stay. The performances were solid throughout. The athlete of the meet title, presented by 1948 and 1952 Olympic decathlon champ Bob Mathias, went to Casey Carrigan for his national prep vault record of 17'4 $\frac{3}{4}$ ". He also had three good tries at 17'10 $\frac{1}{4}$ ", which would have been a world record had he negotiated the height. Surprise of surprises was Willie McGee (Rowan, Hattiesburg, Miss), who copped the fastest mass 100 finish in history with a record tying 9.3 (aided by a 3.98 mph wind). Seventh and last place was a scintillating 9.5. Gerald Tinker (Coral Gables, Fla) was second in the century at 9.4 but topped McGee by four-tenths in the 220 with a windy 20.8. The two-mile produced three marks under nine-minutes, as Fred Ritcherson (Salesian, Los Angeles, Calif) mustered unexpected speed in the stretch to take Mark Hiefield (Milwaukie, Ore) as both clocked times of 8:55.2. Ruben Chappins (Excelsior, Norwalk, Calif) was third in 8:59.0. Steve Prefontaine (Marshfield, Coos Bay, Ore), prep record holder at two-miles with 8:41.6, elected to make a bid for a sub-four minute mile time but a stiff breeze held him to 4:06.0. Some of the other leading performances included a 47.0 quarter by Larence Jones (Lemoore, Calif), 1:49.8 half by Brian McElroy (Massapequa, NY), wind 13.4 high hurdles by Rod Milburn (Opelousas, La), 25'6" long jump by Heulon Hewitt (Merced, Cal) and 50'11 $\frac{1}{4}$ " windy triple jump by Zack Gillon (Peekskill, NY). He also had a legal 50'10" which ranks him second all-time. Spencer Thomas (Carr, New Orleans, La) was second in the triple jump at 50'6 $\frac{1}{2}$ ". Now the meet had really come of age. The performances of this meet were superior to those registered in two national collegiate championship meets, the NCAA College Division and NAIA, as well as two open invitationals, the Houston Strider and Orange meets, held on the same weekend.

1969 GWI Best Ever

Sacramento, Calif., June 14--Casey Carrigan (Orting, Wash) smashed his own national pole vault record and Willie McGee (Rowan, Hattiesburg, Miss) tied the 100-yard dash standard to highlight the 10th annual Golden West Invitational.

Carrigan cleared 17'4 $\frac{3}{4}$ " on his second effort at that height to earn the Governor's Trophy as the meet's outstanding competitor. He then had three good tries at a world-record height of 17'10 $\frac{1}{4}$ " before a horde of spectators who ringed the vault area following completion of this running events.

Carrigan broke his own mark of 17'0" as Steve Smith (South, Torrance, Calif) placed second with his career-best clearance of 16'8 $\frac{3}{4}$ ".

McGee, after a false start, shot out of his blocks and sped to victory in a 9.3 century, probably the fastest in prep history as seventh and last place was timed in 9.5 in a tightly-bunched field.

Although not in the record category, an estimated 6000 fans witnessed numerous other strong efforts. These included a 242'1" javelin throw by Jim Pearce (North, Shawnee Mission, Kans), a 1:49.8 880 by Brian McElroy (Massapequa, NY), 47.0 in the 440 by Larence Jones (Lemoore, Calif) and Marvin Foster (Central, Kansas City, Kans) with Jones declared the winner, a wind-aided 13.4 high hurdles win by Rod Milburn (Clark, Opelousas, La), windy 25'6" long jump by Heulon Hewitt (Merced, Calif), 64'3 $\frac{3}{4}$ " shot put by Don Randell (Sunset, Dallas, Tex) and 4:06.0 mile by Steve Prefontaine (Marshfield, Coos Bay, Ore).

The two-mile saw three runners dip under nine minutes with Fred Ritcherson (Salesian, LA, Calif) leaning into the tape inches ahead of Mark Hiefield (Milwaukie, Ore). Ritcherson ran 8:55.2 and Hiefield was given the same time as California state champ Ruben Chappins (Excelsior, Norwalk) ran 8:59.0 in third.

The triple jump provided a spirited battle between Zack Gillon (Peekskill, NY) and Spencer Thomas (Carver, New Orleans, La). Gillon bounced 50'11 $\frac{1}{4}$ " with wind to edge Thomas' 50'6 $\frac{1}{2}$ ". Gillon also had a legal 50'10" leap.

Long Running Upsurge

It would have been unrealistic to think that the growing restlessness and irreverence of the younger generation wouldn't touch athletics. The kids are probing, they want what they want "Now!", and they aren't much concerned about the truths their forerunners lived by. They want to find out for themselves what they can and can't do, not take an authority's word for it. Often, the uninhibited and undisciplined actions of youth take paths which enrage their elders. But just occasionally they plunge into work so progressive that those same elders are left in stunned admiration.

Fred Ritcherson and Chuck Smead hardly can be typed as young revolutionaries. Neither fits the image of a bearded, long-haired, wild-eyed radical spouting dogma about "overthrowing the system". They didn't have revolution in mind when they set about running long distances. Yet they've quietly inherited leadership of marathoning's "New Youth Movement", which reflects perfectly the generation's restless irreverence.

The "truths" about long distance running had held up well, largely because no one bothered to challenge them:

"The mile and two-mile are long distances, plenty far enough for anyone and particularly for high school boys."

"Going anything longer than a mile or two, particularly if it's on the hard roads, can do serious damage to young legs."

"Road training and racing slows you down so much that you're worthless in track races like the mile and two-mile."

"Road racing is an old man's game. You don't go into it until you're well up in your 20s, have built up your endurance through years of running and have begun slowing down in track racing."

Others began chipping away at these firmly-embedded ideas before Ritcherson and Smead arrived on the roads. Gene Carson of Redlands, Calif., High School traveled a previously unheard of 2:40 for the marathon back in 1962. Craig Streichman, whose South Torrance team has blasted away en masse at high school marathoning myths, shook up the complacent older running generation in 1968 when he did 2:31. He'd just turned 16 at the time. Though they weren't the first preps to venture onto the open roads, Ritcherson and Smead certainly have been the best.

Both are southern Californians, as have been nearly all the top young marathoners so far. The Los Angeles area isn't new to trend-setting, be it in life style, music, or track and field. The area's weather normally gets credit for everything its athletes accomplish, but other factors probably play a bigger role. Races abound, for one thing. The local AAU holds a weekly distance race the year-round, open to all comers. Upwards of 100 runners show up for each of them, with abilities ranging from world class to YMCA jogger. The races provide a unique combination of competitiveness and casualness, of fun and demanding toughness. Most of all, the roads offer a challenge not found in the restricted high school arena. LA area preps--plus scattered others elsewhere--have picked up on it. They're helped along by coaches, like Dick Scully at South Torrance, who are hot to experiment in new fields such as marathoning.

Ritcherson entered the long run in grand style. In December 1968, he raced the Palos Verdes course in 2:27:01 and finished second only to Bob Deines, one of the two or three best marathoners in the country. Smead came home less than three minutes later. With this race, Ritche-

son and Smead became fast friends. Up to the time they entered college (Fred at Southern California and Chuck at Westmont), one of the two took every Southern Pacific AAU race (some 15 of them) they entered.

Fred, who was 18 when he ran his best marathon but turned 19 on Feb. 8, is a member of a minority group within a minority group. Not

only is he a high-class high school marathoner but he is also black. Myths persist about blacks being unable and/or unwilling to run marathons, too, even though Abebe Bikila and Mamo Wolde--winners of the last three Olympic championships--should have doused that idea.

Ritcherson's 70-100 miles of weekly training rewarded him richly. By mid-summer, he was ready for the biggest victory and the best race of his life. It may have been one of the best races at any distance in prep history, though he received precious little mention for it. This was the national senior AAU one-hour run championship at Goleta (near Santa Barbara). Freddy lapped the track 48 times before his hour ran out--12 miles and 23 yards. Let's put that in some kind of perspective: 12 back-to-back miles at a hair under 5:00 each, four consecutive 15:00 three-miles, a six-mile in 30:11 (an en route time which ranked him third on this year's national high school list) followed immediately by another six-plus in 29:49. Only two other Americans--mature internationalists Buddy Edelen and Mike Kimball--have topped Ritcherson's one-hour total. He won the US title by 200 yards. Second was, who else, Smead.

Fred's frequent road-racing ventures left his legs with plenty of speed and life for the track, in case there were any doubts. He wrapped up his career at Salesian High School in Los Angeles by winning the Golden West Invitational two-mile--the closest thing there is to a national championship--in his best of 8:55. 2.

Smead's story is perhaps even more startling than Ritcherson's. Chuck, who lives in the small town of Santa Paula and away from the sprawl of Los Angeles, is 1½ years younger than his long distance cohort (he

wasn't 18 until Aug. 4). What began as something of a disastrous spring season for Smead developed into quite a rewarding one. He injured a leg and lost his chance to race in the year's major track meets, including the state. But that freed him from the tight grip of the California Interscholastic Federation, which bars open competition during the season, and allowed him to run the Palos Verdes marathon in late May. Backed up by 90-140 miles of weekly training in two-a-day doses, he roared the hill-infested route in 2:23:04. That brought him in ahead of Nigerian Olympian Martins Ande, who was a minute back, injured Bob Deines, over six behind, and he whacked close to four minutes from Ritcherson's high school "record" (there are no official marks since courses vary so widely) set on the same route six months earlier.

Smead, who like Ritcherson races best and likes it best on the far side of six miles, returned in a six the week after his marathon. You could hardly say his legs were falling off or that road running had slowed him to a crawl as he ran 29:25.8--placing him third behind Gerry Lindgren and Rick Riley on the all-time high school list.

Dozens of others have joined the rush to the roads. A few years back, a distance man in his 20s could enter a race and be surrounded only by others more or less his age. Recent southern California races, though, have been packed with boys hardly old enough to shave. Half the 200-400-man fields for the Palos Verdes, Culver City and San Diego runs were reported to be high schoolers. Most are at least as well prepared as their elders, some are just dreaming when they think they can go 26 miles. Some aren't far behind Ritcherson and Smead, most are well above the three-hour mark which separates runners from plodders. Marathoning is a democratic sport and there's room for all of them.

Dick Scully's South Torrance team has contributed more to the "Youth Movement" than any other. No doubt his regular track and cross country seasons still have priority, but Scully keeps turning good short runners into great marathoners. The 1969 marathon list has these South Torrance names: Jim French 2:33:06, Craig Streichman 2:33:24 and Mike Baer 2:34:21. French and Streichman were juniors and Baer was a sophomore, and the school has a half-dozen others on both sides of three hours. Across the city, at West Torrance High School, an even faster sophomore than Baer popped up. Jim Everett ran 2:33:50.

The southern California shockwave is spreading across the country. In New Mexico, freshman Richard Jaramillo of Bernadillo ran 2:57. John Warnecke of Edina, Minn., traveled to the Boston marathon, where he did 2:47. Everywhere there's a marathon, there are high schoolers running. They're totally unswayed by reasoning that 26 miles is too far for them to be running, that 2:30 is too fast, or that they're too young and inexperienced to be attempting it.

Older, wiser and more experienced marathoners may spend an entire career trying to do something as modest as breaking 2:45 or 3:00. They're both frightened and intrigued by the "Youth Movement" which is shaking the status quo in their sport. They're starting to look back at the upstarts for some answers. While doing research for a book on marathon training methods, I sent a questionnaire to Craig Sterling of San Clemente, Calif. One question asked for a year-by-year listing of his times. "I haven't been running a year yet," he answered. Craig ran 2:37 in his first and only marathon. Exciting as his and others' prospects are, stories like this are enough to make us old-timers of the sport feel broken-down and obsolete at 26. That is, until we remember that marathoning is more a personal experience than a competitive test. First or 301st, 2:23 or 3:33, the experiences are similar and nearly as satisfying.

South Rising in Track

Willie McGee and Gerald Tinker are not a famous musical combo. Yet, the words of "California, Here I Come" could clearly be heard in the rhythm of their feet.

Jesse Stuart is not a movie stunt man, nor is Rodney Milburn an acrobat, yet the former has the strength and nerve of a Hollywood specialist, the latter the speed of a freeway driver.

California is the movie capital of the world. California is also the track capital of the world. But fellows like McGee, Tinker, Stuart and Milburn are closing the gap. This foursome represented the Deep South at its 1969 high school track best. And like the rhythm of McGee's and Tinker's feet, they announced to everyone in particular that "California trackmen, here we come".

McGee and Tinker didn't put their feet in their mouth, either. At Sacramento's fabled Golden West Invitational, attracting the nation's top senior stars, they finished one-two in the 100-yard dash--McGee running a 9.3 and Tinker 9.4. Tinker came back to win the 220 in 20.8.

Stuart was, plain and simple, the strong man of prep track, tossing the 12-lb. shot as most would a meat ball. His distance of 69'2 $\frac{3}{4}$ " was the best in the US. Milburn was the country's number one prep hurdler, skimming the timbers in 13.5. He also proved adept at the taller international barriers, clipping Richmond Flowers' national prep record of 13.8 with a sensational 13.7 clocking at Houston.

These are not products of California's brilliant track and field system. They do not hail from Santa Clara, Los Angeles, Sacramento or San Diego. Instead, McGee comes from Hattiesburg, Miss., Tinker from Coral Gables, Fla., Stuart from Glasgow, Ky., and Milburn from Opelousas, La.

Yet, these are the products that will challenge California products for track and field supremacy at higher levels. It's not only the Tinkers and the McGees and the Milburns and the Stuarts.

Spencer Thomas and Doug Dickinson were so versatile and so representative in so many events that they were named to co-captain the Orlando Sentinel's second annual All-Southern track and field squad. And Miami Killian's mile relay team put the finishing touches on the greatest prep track and field meet held in the Sunshine state, equaling the national high school record in the final race of a blistering afternoon at the University of Florida track.


Thomas triple jumped 49'5", long jumped 24'4" ran the high hurdles in 13.7 and the lows in 19.2. Dickinson won the Virginia State championships in the highs (14.3), lows (18.9), long jump (24'1 $\frac{3}{4}$ "") and the triple jump (48'8") and managed to finish second in the 100 (9.7). A busy lad.

Larry Black anchored Killian's mile relay to its sizzling 3:11.8 clocking, matching the time set by Memorial of Houston, Tex., and Dave Morton four years ago. Black's partners in speed were Kenneth Thompson, Robert Anderson and Porter Thompkins, who led off in a line-swiping 49.0. Black anchored in 46.2 and Thompson was timed from exchange zones in 47.2.

What these youngsters accomplished this past year is really a work of art. They have created a renaissance in Southern track. Gone are the shackles of football. Gone are the shackles of segregation, at least in ath-

letics. These Dixie Darlings have so impressed college coaches, so raptured younger athletes that track is on the same upsurging path that took Apollo 11 off a Cape Kennedy launching pad to the moon.

There is still plenty of room for improvement, although Texans will already accept California's challenge of track supremacy. And with Florida fast moving into the competitive picture, the eyes of California better be on both.

McGee, Tinker and South Carolinian Harry Blake were just three senior sprinters with the necessary raw talent to compete anywhere. And they leave a legacy for 1970.

Like the tailwind of a Texas tornado, Kenneth Curl returns for his senior year. He has run wind-aided 9.3s as both a sophomore and a junior for Worthing High in Houston.

Dallas Lincoln's brilliant 440 (40.7) and 880-yard relay (1:26.6) teams return intact, led by two brothers with interesting names--Joe and Gene Pouncy. The twins pounce on the tape like a lightning bolt. And teammate Rufus Shaw (9.6, 21.5, 47.8) makes it three of a kind, a winning hand in most poker games.

Completing the 1969 sprint legacy is Darwin Bond, the Tennessean with a theory about speed. He has gone from 9.5 in the 100 to 47.3 in the 440 as a junior. Thus, this is one Darwin theory that coaches would like to know about. And Kent Merritt, an ambling Virginian from Charlottesville. Kent doubles between the 100 (9.6) and the low hurdles (19.2).

Like the broken record, the beat goes on. And on.

And Dixie's upsurge in track goes on. And on.

The next big jump is expected in the distance races where California and the big fir country of the Great Northwest dominate.

Last winter, the track committee of the Florida Athletic Coaches Association brought in FBI man, Track Technique editor and former Olympic distance runner Fred Wilt to speak on--you guessed it--distance running.

The improvement in cross country for 1969 has already revealed the merits. Two-miles, which are run sparingly throughout Dixie, are expected to get better with competition. The milers are there, but not enough of them get together except for the state meets or the Florida Relays, thus hampering efforts to bring down the times.

Despite the handicaps of the lack of a competitive edge, the lack of an authoritative track coach, the lack of proper facilities, Bobby Sahuque ran one of the fastest miles in the country. The New Orleans product, with help from John Morvant of the New Orleans Track Club, improved his distance times to 1:54.4, 4:08.4 and 9:23.0.

It's interesting to note that the well doesn't seem ready to run dry but rather to overflow. Better coaching, better facilities, better understanding of track and field performers have made a difference.

Men like Julie Conn at Newport News, Va., Bob Mosher at Winter Park, Fla., and Sam Roberts at Columbus, Ga., have inspired others.

Some of these "others" include Dick Roberts, an enterprising young assistant at Florida State University who developed an envious distance program at Dunedin, Fla., High and fought for the addition of the two-mile run.

And Jimmy Carnes, an unbeaten Georgia high school coach who has built the University of Florida program into one that has received national recognition and is on the threshold of gaining prominence.

And Chuck Rohe, the brash, daring recruiter for the University of Tennessee who has built a program that has gained national stature and even hosted the NCAA meet, the first time this happened in the Deep South.

It's all part of the track and field upsurge and image that is slowly

grabbing its share of the football spotlight that has blinded Dixie for so long. Fellows like Richmond Flowers, Robert Hayes, Willie Davenport and Ralph Boston didn't hurt the Southern image either.

Hayes didn't start out as a trackman. Sure, he was a football player at Matthew Gilbert High School in Jacksonville. But he was a baseball player, too. One day, in his uniform and spikes, he questioned the speed of a track sprint candidate. The track coach questioned Hayes' ability to question his classmate and challenged him to race. Nobody knows for sure what Hayes' time was that hot afternoon but he did run track full time after that.

Florida's track upsurge really began in the early 1960s when the Miami Jaycees sponsored a meet of champions after the school year ended. It brought together for the first time the outstanding athletes of the then Negro and white associations.

Fellows like Harvey Nairn, later a member of Southern University's championship sprint relays, Major Hazleton and Gene Milton, later members of Florida A&M's sprint relay domination of the Penn Relays, came to the forefront.

It has been a decade of progress for Florida in particular, the South in general.

From the time North Miami's John Turek became the South's first publicized sub-14 second high hurdler (13.7) in 1960 until Killian's meet-ending, national record equaling mile relay last spring, the progress made has been evident.

The John Pennels, Henry Wadworths, Ron Jourdans and Bob Redingtons have kept the South image growing on a national level.

And the presence of tall Olympian Jack Bachelier, running for the Florida Track Club and coaching the University of Florida cross country team while working on a doctorate in entymology, hasn't hurt either.

There are those that continue to echo some thoughts of the past "That the South shall rise again". It will indeed. But in track and field.

Three Vaulters Supreme

Three young prep jumping-jacks dominated the pole vault during the 1969 season which saw Casey Carrigan soar higher than any prep in history.

The other two were a pair of Los Angeles area schoolboys, Steve Smith of South Torrance and Robert Pullard of LA High--and they chased Carrigan up the pole so constantly that the Orting, Wash., vaulter eventually was pushed over a national record 17'4 $\frac{3}{4}$ ".

Smith and Pullard weren't far behind, either. When Casey cleared his record height, Smith earlier had topped his career and seasonal best of 16'8 $\frac{3}{4}$ ". Pullard got over 16'7" to win his city's championship--and became the highest black vaulter ever, outdoors (Peter Chen has cleared 17'1" indoors).

With those marks, moreover, these three vaulters occupy the top three positions on the all-time prep performers list.

For Smith and Pullard, their high leaps were the literal high points of a year in which they battled each other on numerous occasions.

Smith collected the California state title at Pullard's expense, clearing 16'0" to Pullard's 15'6". It was Smith's second consecutive championship and erased the 15'6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " meet record of former world record holder Paul Wilson.

Later that same day, at the Compton-Coliseum Invitational, Smith knocked off Carrigan himself, again clearing 16'0", while Casey, like the earlier-vanquished Pullard, cleared 15'6".

Just a week later, at the Golden West Invitational, the roles were reversed as Carrigan cracked his own prep record and Smith established his best-ever. Smith had three narrow misses at 17'1 $\frac{1}{2}$ ".

Steve and Bob met again at the AAU in Miami and this time Pullard emerged higher. He cleared 16'6" for fifth place while Smith could clear only a foot less to place ninth.

Their battle continued into the summer all-comers season at home. Smith cleared 16'4" in one meet. But in the championship meet in late August, Pullard again triumphed at 16'0", while Smith cleared 15'6" in third.

Such frequent, keen, head-to-head competition certainly influenced both vaulters.

"Robert always made me work harder, especially at the end of the year," Smith commented. His coach at South Torrance, Dick Scully, added, "Whenever Robert got a higher vault, Steve would want to do better. Steve is a fine competitor but he seemed to be at his fiercest against Robert. He brought out the best in Steve."

"Certainly, Steve was always stiff competition," Pullard related. "In training, though, he wasn't on my mind. In competition, I would perform to best help the team, not against any particular individual."

Both athletes helped their respective schools in more than just the vault. Pullard high-jumped 6'4" in addition to his vaulting achievements. Smith cleared 6'2 $\frac{3}{4}$ " with the flop, long jumped 22'0", ran the hurdles and relays. He was also a member of South's cross-country team, which included several outstanding prep long-distancemen.

Smith has been vaulting since he was 10, while Pullard began as a 16-year-old. Smith's older brother Chuck was a 15'8 $\frac{1}{2}$ " vaulter at Stanford, and even while Chuck was still at South Torrance, young Steve accompanied him to workouts with Scully. Steve finally tried vaulting him-

self--using an old television antenna as a pole. There is no record of his initial clearance.

In his first competitive season, as a fifth-grader, he vaulted 7'0". By his freshman year of high school he was up to 11'6" and went on to 13'7" as a sophomore. Steve's 15'5½" clearance was second-best among juniors in 1968, only Carrigan--naturally--at 16'8¼" being higher.

Smith had 29 competitive vaults over 15-feet in 1969 and eight over 16-feet. Scully feels this consistency is Steve's strong point as a vaulter.

"Even fellows like Bob Seagren and John Pennel have off days," Scully pointed out. "Steve was the most consistent prep vaulter all year.

He got ready psychologically for every competition and then concentrated very hard to vault well. Despite his intensity, though, he is a very gracious athlete. He will always try to help his fellow competitors."

Unlike Smith, Pullard didn't begin his vaulting career until he was a 16-year-old sophomore at LA High. He cleared 13'0" in his first year and 14'3" as a junior. His first-ever clearance of 16-feet came this year and he had an inch to spare.

Then he tacked a full half-foot on to that height to win the city championship. He ultimately wants to claim the world record and he asserts he has topped 17'2" in practice.

Like Smith, Pullard places great importance on preparing psychologically for his event. "It's vital that you concentrate on every phase of the vault--from the run-up to pushing off on top of the bar--in order to achieve the best results," Bob said.

A left-hander, Pullard's athletic ability ranges from his jumping talent to a sprinter's speed (9.8) to a basketball player's agility.

Smith has his sights set on 18-feet, and with Pullard eyeing the global standard, their race is certain to continue in its fierce, competitive, high-flying fashion.

Amundson Whips 200'

When George Amundson was an entering sophomore at Aberdeen, South Dakota's, Central High School, he had one athletic ambition to fulfill before he graduated. He wanted to better the state discus record of 190'5".

He reached 168'5" as a sophomore and then shot up to 182'5" as a junior, the longest mark by a junior in the nation during 1968. All through the spring of 1969, Amundson inched closer to his goal. He upped his best to 184'9", then 185'4" and finally to 187'4". His last chance would be in the state meet at Rapid City.

When he stepped into the circle on May 18 for his second throw of the prelims, the conditions for discus-throwing couldn't have been better: a right quartering wind, perfect for long throws, plus the stimulus of championship competition, and the knowledge that his chances to achieve his goal were growing ever smaller.

So Amundson wound up, spun, and whipped the plate a staggering 211'4", over 14-feet past the national high school record.

And he wasn't content with obliterating Kelvin Korver's old mark of 197'3" just once. He came back in the finals with another superb effort, 204'7".

Amundson's startling improvement is probably best explained by his prep coach Ron Stocking, who now coaches Amundson at Iowa State University.

"George isn't really that big for a discus thrower at 6'3½" and 210-lbs.," Stocking pointed out, "but he has tremendous speed across the circle which is vital. Also, he is a tremendous competitor. He has a fierce desire to excel and this often pushes him to do his best."

Amundson's excellent throwing didn't stop after he had achieved his goal of the state record. He produced throws of 191'7" and 189'3" and then, at the South Dakota AAU meet, uncorked another 200-footer as he exceeded that barrier by an inch. He won the Golden Mid-West competition at 179'7" in a driving rain-storm and then took the prestigious Golden West Invitational title with 193'6".

George's domination of the event during 1969 is evident by the fact that he turned in four of the top six performances of the year, five of the top nine and the top two performance of all-time (one throw per meet). He averaged 184'4" for his undefeated season.

What makes Amundson's performances all the more amazing is the fact that he doesn't even specialize in the discus--or even track.

"George is a fine all-around athlete," Stocking commented. "He was all-state in both football and basketball, and won both state titles in the shot (with his best of the year of 62'1") and discus. Then he played baseball in the summer. He never has done much weight-training because he is always so busy in various sports."

Amundson's track talent is just as wide-spread. He has run 15.5 in the highs, high jumped 6'3½" and thrown the javelin besides the other weights. The decathlon seems a natural for talents like those.

One thing is certain: George Amundson, once an aspiring state record-holder and now the national prep recordman, the only high-schooler over 200-feet and probably the greatest prep discus-thrower in history, has proven beyond any doubt that the discus is a natural for him.

1970 Just A Beginning

Alarmists who think track and field performances in the United States are on the downgrade just haven't been paying attention to what the preps have been doing.

All too many stories are written about the negative aspects of the sport, most of them about the continued NCAA-AAU hassle and others about the complaints US athletes may voice in foreign lands.

It may be that not enough is written about the performances of our high school athletes who continue to better all-time bests and national records each year. A slowdown may be ahead, but, more important, competition looms more heated because a greater number of boys are participating and each section of the country is represented by outstanding talent.

Kids are bigger and stronger, the coaching for the most part is superior and improved facilities combined to uplift the standard of high school track.

Talent is spread across the land, and this has added to the overall interest. No longer are the top class athletes confined to states like California and Texas who still produce them in great numbers. The southeast, northwest, New England, Atlantic Coast and the Plains states are all represented on the honor rolls of standout trackmen. All have competitors who a few years ago would have been classed in the super-star category.

The upcoming year promises to be another scorcher, and there appears to be no letup in the immediate seasons to follow as many of the 1970 toppers will be juniors.

To say there will be athletes to match super-heroes like Casey Carrigan, Reynaldo Brown, George Amundson and Steve Prefontaine may seem ridiculous to some. Yet, how can one overlook such glittering athletes as Craig Stiles (Malta, Mont.), 242'7" in the javelin, or Dave Tucker (San Joaquin Memorial, Fresno, Calif), 50'½" in the triple jump? We tab both to obliterate current all-time prep bests of 252'8" and 51'8". We think both will do it in 1970, and since they are now only 11th graders there is reason to speculate they will be world class athletes as seniors the following spring and perhaps even members of the 1972 Olympic team.

Over-optimism can result in looking silly, but did not Carrigan and Brown land berths on the Olympic team before their senior year in high school?

And one may ask if other standards will be falling by the wayside? Yes, no doubt there will be others, and there are always one or two athletes who blossom suddenly and catch one by surprise?

The shot put could be the first mark to fall in the spring. Among those appear in most danger include the 880, two-mile, long jump and the 440 relay.

Sprint marks are always vulnerable, although the 9.3 shared by two athletes of recent vintage is one of the better performances in the prep record log.

Jesse Stuart (Glasgow, Ky.) is perhaps the surest bet to crack a national standard, his 69'2¾" as a junior being only three-feet off the mark set two years ago by Sam Walker (Samuell, Dallas, Tex) at 72'3¼". Jesse is dedicated to this event, and hit 59'10½" with the 16-lb. bulb in early summer, giving him junior class record for the 12- and 16-lb. balls.

The 880 mark of 1:48.8 (Richard Joyce, Sierra of Whittier, Calif

in 1962) is not safe as long as Joe Savage (Roselle Catholic, Roselle, NJ) stays healthy. Joe clocked 1:50.7 last spring and will be running in an area where keen competition is usually provided for middle distance runners.

Although two Californians became the first preps to crack 9:00 as juniors, Randy James (Ferris, Spokane, Wash) may have more incentive to crack the 8:41.6 record set last spring by Prefontaine. The former record holder was Rick Riley from the same school James attends. Riley did 8:48.4, James 9:03.2 last year as a junior.

A good crop of last year's best return in the long jump, and one of them, James McAlister (Blair, Pasadena, Calif) may blossom into the all-time best on the prep level. Fellow townsman, Jerry Proctor (Muir, Pasadena) was the national record claimant at $26\frac{3}{4}$ " in 1967, and that in itself should be the incentive McAlister needs.

McAlister came fast at the tailend of the 1968 campaign to win the State championship. He claimed a best of $25\frac{1}{2}$ " which he achieved in the State meet trials for a track mark at UCLA. He appeared to be just learning about the event at the end of the season and still seemed plagued with foul problems. If he can curb this tendency, this great natural talent should jump past Proctor's record.

Lincoln of Dallas, Tex., crushed the prep standard for the 440 relay last spring with a blistering 40.7, and the school should go far below that in 1970. And why not? Lincoln will have the same foursome--John Delley, Rufus Shaw and twins Joe and Gene Pouncy handling the baton again. In Texas, one can count on coming up with a team, or teams, to push Lincoln, but only injuries could stop this great group from lowering the mark to the low 40s--or better.

A number of other records could fall as standout athletes return in each event and all will be pressed by the usual crop of emerging stars.

The latter group, in fact, make previews such as this look as ridiculous as the collegiate football magazines forecasting the ratings for a coming season. There will be many new names leading the pack at the end of the 1970 season, and all for the better. This is what makes track and field so interesting to so many.

It is not so important that an athlete set a national record. What is important is for one to recognize his own potential and strive to reach that goal.

We hope the following event-by-event analysis will be serve as a helpful guide to a season we believe will be the best-ever on the high school level.

100 YARD DASH

A healthy Ken Curl (Worthing, Houston, Tex) would be our choice to head the nation in this event. He should at least threaten the national mark of 9.3 during his senior season if for no other reason than another Texas, Gene Pouncy (Dallas Lincoln) will be around to push him--or perhaps pull him.

Other toppers by sections with 1968 bests: Far West: Jackie White (Santa Ana, Calif), a rangy boy who may develop into a top 440 runner, and Ralph Ligon (Pittsburg, Calif) 9.5w. East: William Collins (Mt Vernon, NY) 9.6 and Chris Schlauch (Carey, Franklin Square, NY) 9.5w. Southeast: Darwin Bond (Dobyns-Bennett, Kingsport, Tenn) 9.5w, James Pinckney (Raines, Jacksonville, Fla) 9.5w. Midwest: Mark Lutz (Mayo, Rochester, Minn) 9.6. Plains and Rocky Mountains: Tom Scavuzzo (Mullen, Ft Logan, Colo) 9.6, Dean Williams (Tech, Omaha, Nebr) 9.5w. Southwest: Harvey Ryan (Tecumseh, Okla) 9.4w, M. L. Best (Flafurrias, Tex) 9.5w.

220 YARD DASH

Same holds true for the 220, a healthy Ken Curl could threaten the national mark of 20.6. Ken scooted 21.2 last year and has won the Texas State crown two years running. But he's capable of much faster. Joe Pouncy (Dallas Lincoln) and twin brother Gene will be around to provide needed competition along with Mike Holt (Lee, Midland).

Others: Top returning talent is not as plentiful here as in the 100 but it will be as new stars emerge. Rocky Mountains: Scavuzzo is rated better here than in the 100 and off his 21.1 turn time as a junior, he's really promising. Midwest: Lutz did 21.1 on both a straight and turn course, and is regarded as the finest sprint prospect from Minnesota.

440 YARD DASH

The top returning prospects are confined to the southeast and southwest, with Darwin Bond our choice to emerge number one. He has been a standout for two years and could threaten the all-time prep best of 46.1. He did 47.3 as a junior. Eddie Sutton (Jackson, Miami, Fla) is another flash off his 47.9. Texas has goodies in Bill Goldapp (Memorial, Houston) at 47.6n and Rufus Shaw (Dallas Lincoln) 47.8n. Don Fisher (Locke, LA) came fast at the end of the 1968 season to give the Far West a top returnee at 48.0. He has also a 9.5w century.

880 YARD RUN

Joe Savage (Catholic, Roselle, NJ) is a tremendous competitor and distinct threat for the national mark of 1:48.8. He did 1:50.7 in 1968 and had many good relay legs. Cross country and the indoor seasons should have him in prime shape for a big campaign outdoors.

Other returnees with top credentials: Far West: James Baxter (Los Angeles), tiny but talented with a best of 1:51.0 from his junior campaign, James Beaver (Skyline, Oakland, Calif) 1:52.8n, and Percell Keeling (Morningside, Inglewood, Calif) 1:52.8n as a soph in his state meet. New England: Jim Euell (Norwich Academy, Norwich, Conn) is a strong competitor who could bring his 1:52.3 best as a junior well down. Midwest: Two great prospects loom in Kevin Reabe (Waterford-Kettering, Drayton Plains, Mich), the National Juniors champ with 1:52.3, and Mike Slack (Hardin, St Paul, Minn) 1:53.3n. Atlantic Coast: Bob Wheeler (Dulaney, Lutherville Timonium, Md) 1:52.8.

ONE MILE RUN

The midwest has the two outstanding prospects, and if they hook up during the season they should produce a great race. Dan Cautley (Memorial, Madison, Wisc) is highly rated off his 4:09.8 as is Mike Slack (Harding St Paul, Minn) at 4:11.6.

Other toppers: New England: Hollie Walton (Hope, Providence, RI) comes from a school noted for its hammer throwers but his 4:13.2 makes him one of the best milers in the country. Metro New York: Denis Fikes (Rice, NYC) could be best if he avoids injuries; he has done 4:13.8 but is capable of much faster. Plains: Bob Pelikan (Dubourg, St Louis, Mo) 4:14.0. Far West: Kurt Mench (Castle, Kaneohe, Hawaii) ran 4:12.2 as a junior. Rich Tschudin (Palisades, Pacific Palisades, Calif) 4:13.4 is the top returnee in a state producing many good distance runners.

TWO MILE RUN

Far West boasts all the top returnees, including the only juniors to dip under 9-minutes: Ron Johnson (West Torrance, Calif) 8:59.0n and Dave

White (El Modena, Orange, Calif) 8:59.8n. They'll more than likely meet on many occasions before the big late season meets leading to the state finals. Best of the bunch, however, may well be Randy James (Ferris, Spokane, Wash), mentioned earlier. Other prime ones are Kasto Lopez (Sanger, Calif) 9:06.2n for the all-time sophomore class best, and Eddie Grannillo (East Bakersfield, Calif) 9:12.0. Metro New York: Fikes could be among the best here as well as in the mile.

120 YARD HIGH HURDLES

Rodney Milburn graduated in January, leaving the field wide open to a number of worthy candidates. We tab Randy Lightfoot (Plainview, Tex) as the one destined to assume number one laurels in this event off his tremendous performances as a sophomore during which he placed third in the Texas State 4-A championships with a 13.9. He also had a windy 13.7 to his credit and beat many of the outstanding timber toppers in an area that produces swift hurdlers. And he will have no reason to loaf since most of the better hurdlers hail from the Lone Star State. All boast impressive clockings and not all are wind blown efforts.

Others: Texas: Eric Elkins (Jesuit, Dallas) 13.9; Scottie Jones (Elmore, Houston) 14.0 and 13.9nw as a soph; Gary West (Permian, Odessa), another hot candidate for number one off his 14.1n and 14.0w. Michigan: Pontiac has produced some of the greats of the past including 1964 Olympic champ Hayes Jones and current national record claimant Bill Tipton. Now Pontiac Northern has come up with Mel Reeves who did 14.0nw as a junior when he was only learning the event.

HIGH JUMP

Nevada is best known for gaming tables and sparse population. It also has a great high jump prospect in Ray Lisby (Las Vegas) who did 6'9 $\frac{3}{4}$ " as a junior and who is apparently destined to exceed 7'0" in 1970. Another in the same category is Gayln Sweet (Octavia, Colfax, Ill) who also did 6'9 $\frac{3}{4}$ " as an 11th grader.

Others: Far West: Jerry Culp (Oceanside, Calif) placed high in his state meet. He has a best of 6'9" and is consistent. Randy Fulkerson (Santa Fe, Santa Fe Springs, Calif) cleared 6'9" as a soph. Another hot soph last year was Rory Kotinek (Millikan, Long Beach, Calif) at 6'7 $\frac{3}{4}$ ". Barry Schur (Palo Verde, Tucson, Ariz) did 6'7 $\frac{3}{4}$ " and is also a top decathlon hopeful. Southwest: Rick Slifer (Duncan, Okla) is a rare talent; his 6'7 $\frac{1}{2}$ " as a soph was one of the best Sooner feats in 1969.

POLE VAULT

Casey Carrigan's 17'4 $\frac{3}{4}$ " prep record appears safe for at least a year. Only two honor roll vaulters return and only one was over 15-feet. Leading prospect is Tinker Hatfield (Central Linn, Halsey, Ore) who did 15'1" as a soph and who is a great all-round track athlete. Mark Mondschein (Haverford, Havertown, Pa) 14'7", only other returnee from the 1969 top 30.

LONG JUMP

James McAlister (Blair, Pasadena, Calif) and his 25'1 $\frac{1}{2}$ " have been featured elsewhere in this article. If he should stumble, there are good prospects to take over. One of these is Gene White (Bristol, Pa) who did 24'9" last spring, or it might be 1969 soph whiz Greg Flippen (Riverhead, NY) at 24'4 $\frac{1}{4}$ ". Flippen is a crack competitor and was consistent, a rarity in a sophomore.

Others: Far West: Darrell Hughes (Yuma, Ariz) 23'11 $\frac{3}{4}$ " and Ger-

ald Singletary (Garfield, Seattle, Wash) 23'11" and 24'1"w, two super sophs should be even hotter as maturer juniors. Atlantic Coast: Schley Williamson (Washington, Atlanta, Ga) 23'10½", Sherman Couser (St Aloysius, Jersey City, NJ) 23'8" and Carl Capria (Carey, Franklin Square, NY) 23'10"w.

TRIPLE JUMP

Dave Tucker (San Joaquin Memorial, Fresno, Calif) is the clear standout. Other top hopefuls are led by Gene White (Bristol, Pa) 48'3" and Ulysses Walker (New Castle, Pa) 48'2", both of whom could push each other past the 50-foot mark.

Others: East: Harvie Oliver (Valley, New Kensington, Pa) 46'10½" and Ken McBride (Mt Vernon, NY) 46'6½" (47'2"w as a soph). Far West: Ernie Lopez (Central, Fresno, Calif) 47'7¾" and Randy Williams (Edison, Fresno, Calif) 46'11"w as a soph.

SHOT PUT

Jeane Stuart (Glasgow, Ky) was featured earlier in this article. He could emerge as one of greatest athletes in prep history. He should be the class of his event, one loaded with class even without the Glasgow Giant.

Top returnees: East: St. Joseph's in Montvale, NJ, has two of the best in Steve Adams at 63'6" and Bob Brady 60'9½". Joe Zelezniak (Mt Pleasant, Schenectady, NY) 61'1½". Southwest: Millard Neely (Brackenridge, San Antonio, Tex) 62'11¼". Southeast: Ken Addy (Lee, Baton Rouge, La) 60'10". Midwest: Steve Nelson (Central, Battle Creek, Mich) 60'11". Far West: Billy Joe Winchester (Mt Miguel, Spring Valley, Calif) 62'2¼" and Randy Withrow (Pasadena, Calif) 61'½".

DISCUS THROW

Chris Adams (Los Altos, Calif) qualified for his state finals with a life-time best toss of 189'1", and won it with a mark just one inch shy of his best. A tough competitor following in the tradition of great weightmen developed at his school. Second best returnee who hopes to become number one comes from the same section as Adams. That would be Mike Davis (Hillsdale, San Mateo, Calif), whose 185'7" beat Chris in their sectional meet. Another good one returning is Billy Joe Winchester (Mt Miguel, Spring Valley, Calif) 180'0" who may devote more time to the shot put.

HAMMER THROW

Hope of Providence, R.I., produces great talent each year and Kenneth Zuckerman is just the latest in a long line of top hammer tossers from Hope. His best last year was 180'11". James Berrien (Choate, Wallingford, Conn) did 168'2" and is headed for a big year.

JAVELIN THROW

One of the shockers of 1969 was the phenomenal 242'7" toss by sophomore Craig Stiles (Malta, Mont). He should throw the spear out of sight as a junior, leaving no world to conquer by the time he's a senior. Good competition looms from the likes of Bob Obee (Wyandotte, Kansas City, Kans) 229'3" and Richard George (Millard, Fillmore, Utah), another who blossomed as a soph when he did 224'0". Best in the east should be Jack Hall (Pulaski, New Britain, Conn) 214'0".

DECATHLON

Two good prospects return in the decathlon. Barry Schur (Palo Verde, Tucson, Ariz) reached 5884 points and Mark Mondschein (Haverford, Pa) 5735.
