

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

## NATIONALS December 10, 1994 Balboa Park, San Diego, CA

Weather - 60-65 overcast (perfect for cross-country). Course 5000 meters with two good hills.

In the 16th Annual Foot Locker National Championship Finals race super soph Julia Stamps (Santa Rosa, Ca) completed a spectacular 1994 Cross-Country season with another huge win, with Matt Downin (Pinkerton Academy, Hampstead, NH) nipping rival John Mortimer (Londonderry, NH) in the most competitive Boys contest ever in this series.

Soph Stamps, who suffered an appendectomy that took her out of her 1993 frosh Fall harrier campaign, led the late March 1994 U.S. Junior Cross-Country team with a 44th place effort in the Worlds, and was last summer's Junior National Outdoor 3000m Champ in track at age 15, while setting a frosh class record of 9:28.50. The San Francisco Bay area star came into the Fall of 1994 like a house afire, taking down respected Course Records at Mt. SAC and Woodward Park in Fresno.

Famous for quick starts, Julia charged out in San Diego at her usual torrid clip, with only defending champ, soph Erin Davis (Saratoga Springs, NY), able to stay close through 600 meters. By 1000 meters Stamps already was fifteen yards ahead, with a 5:11 first mile seriously taking many other regional stars out of their "comfort zones." Ahead by thirteen seconds half-way through the contest, Stamps continued to stretch her lead at the tape to thirty seconds (16:42) over second placer Sally Glynn, with this margin of victory the closest of Julia's Fall. A strong Northeast team to-

talled 23 points for an easy victory, led by the 2-3-4 performances of Sally Glynn (17:13), Mary Cobb (17:17), and defending champ Erin Davis (17:19). The Course Record is 16:40 by famed Coloradan Melody Fairchild in 1990. Of course, Julia mildly blew away the CR for sophs of 17:19, set by Fairchild (1988), so the next two years should be interesting. Ever the bubbly personality, Julia Indicated afterwards that she did

not even know what the course record was beforehand, really had no idea of her pacing with crowd noise at the split posts, and thanked the TV truck crew for letting her know how big a lead she had as the race went along. Keep an eye on this young lady!

The Boys race had no real clear-cut favorite, which made for interesting viewing as the race unfolded. Almost everyone was in close attendance through a 4:42 first mile, with Abdul Alzindani (Fordson, Dearborn, Mi) making the first move and taking the lead up the course's big hill just after that mile point. Midwestern winner Tim Broe (East Peoria, II), Western top qualifier Brandon Leslie (Gallup, NM), and New Hampshire's John Mortimer (Londonderry) were prominent in the top pack through a mile and three-quarters. Through two miles at 9:45 Broe, Leslie, Mortimer, Northeast Regional champ Matt Downin (Pinkerton Academy, Derry, NH) and Eleazar Hernandez (Camarillo, Ca) edged away from the field, with the group basically five abreast as they moved into the "picnic loop" before the

last hill. Broe made the first move, jetting into the lead half-way through that picnic loop, with Leslie reining him in and leading the race the second time up the course's steep hill.


Mortimer and Downin, great friends and local rivals, bided their time close behind, moving in tandem strongly across the top of the hill and into the lead. The duo had met five times previously, with Mortimer taking three of the first four, and Downin the Northeast Regional two weeks previous. Downin later said that the New Hampshire duo had not talked strategy beforehand, but said they would help each other if they ended up near the lead. Guess What? In a tremendously exciting final quarter mile the New England stars battled stride for stride, with Mortimer mounting a big final charge to move into the lead with 120 meters to go. Downin gathered momentum for about fifteen meters, then blast-

ed into his final sprint, racing away to a nearly five second victory over that final 100 meters. It was tremendously exciting for the thousands viewing the contest!

Claiming to have visualized victory for weeks previous, Downin had the race unfold as he thought it would, with himself just behind a lead pack at the mile and a half or two mile mark. The challenge he was able to pull off was to steadily work up to and past that group. Matt indicated it was very exciting to look over as the two leaders crested the final hill and see his local rival. Something to be said for tempering yourself against the best. Matt indicated that he felt truly battlehardened this season after he and Mortimer met in a series of three straight meets at Derryfield Park in Manchester (NH) that ended with the New Englands in which the duo recorded the fastest six times ever on that course.







# FOR SPIES, **ALL RHODES LEAD** TO OXFORD

Becky Spies (pronounced "Speez") (Livermore High School 1991/Villanova University, Philadelphia, PA 1995), daughter of Bob and Ann Spies, has been selected as a Rhodes Scholar!

Bob Spies is a marine biologist, flyfisherman and rock climber, who is the chief scientist on the Exxon Valdez oil spill cleanup project in Alaska. After retiring from the Lawrence Livermore Laboratory, Bob set up his own company-Applied Marine Sciences. Ann is a very conscientious fourth grade elementary school teacher at St. Michael's in Livermore. Bob and Ann have traveled widely to support Becky, including trips to the Penn Relays last spring and the NCAA Cross Country Championships in Arkansas in November. The Spies have raised a wonderful family of three chil-

Becky, who celebrated her 21st birthday on May 23, was one of the finest high school cross country and track athletes in California history. She placed second in the 1989 state cross country meet in 17:33, only six-seconds behind Deena Drossin (Agoura/ Arkansas). Spies won the 1990 and 1991 state track meet 1,600-meter run in 4:48.74 and 4:45.11, respectively. She was a member of the U.S. World Championship Cross Country team that competed in Aix Les Bains, France in 1990. In the summer following her high school graduation, she won the TAC Junior 3,000-meter run in 4:25.16. She also ran the 800-meters in 2:07.25.

Becky's sister Jessica, 30, was also an outstanding runner at Livermore High

School. As a junior in high school, she ran the 800-meters in 2:05.84. Jessica graduated from Stanford University with a B.Sc. in Biology. In June she graduated from the University of Alabama Medical School, and is now continuing her studies at the University of California Medical School at Davis.

Becky's brother Brennan, 28, graduated from the University of California at San Diego in Biology, worked in the biotech industry in La Jolla, and now is working on his MBA in Business and Microbiology at the University of Rochester in New York.

Becky is in the process of applying to the following medical schools: UCLA, UCSD, UCSF, and Stanford. Becky's first choice of medical schools is UCSF, where her great-grandfather Dr. George E. Ebright taught in the early part of this

Track and running has been a common thread weaving its way through the Spies' ancestry. An ancestor on Becky's father's side received a silver bowl from the Queen in the 1800's for completing a city-to-city distance run in Ireland. Her father ran cross country for coach Bob Vincent at San Ramon High School in Danville. Ann's father Robert Thornton Durkee was a half-miler, while her brother Bob Durkee set the pole vault record at Bellarmine Prep in San Jose in the 1950's.

Ann's uncle Charles Webster Doe II, 96, who lives in Rossmoor, a retirement community near Walnut Creek, was a member of the U.S. Olympic Rugby team in the 1920's. Doe's uncle donated funds to construct the Main Library on

the Berkeley campus of the University of California, which

was given his name.

Becky is a senior biology and philosophy major with a 3.86 grade-point average. She expects to graduate with a B.S. and B.A. in May 1995. She is planning to study either an undergraduate philosophy/politics/economics program at Oxford or earn the equivalent of a master's in public health.

"I haven't decided which will better suit my interest of

eventually entering public health care," said Spies to USA Today.

Becky, a four-time NCAA All-American, placed third in the NCAA Division I Cross Country Championship this fall. Villanova won its sixth straight team title. She was co-captain of the Villanova track and cross country teams from 1993 to 1995. Villanova is an independent Roman Catholic comprehensive coed college. It was founded in 1842.

Becky wants to continue competing after college and will try to make the 1996 Olympic team in

the 1,500-meters.

"I have an eye on the (U.S. Olympic) Trials," Spies said to Dave Newhouse of *The Oakland Tribune*, but it would take significant juggling to do the training in Oxford."

There are many people responsible for Becky's success: Virgil Dahl, a physical education teacher and now Vice-Principal at Junc-

tion Junior High School in Livermore; Mr. Ofeish, a math teacher at Livermore High School; Ms. Beery, a Latin teacher at Livermore High School; Nan Davies, a flute teacher; George Gilbert, her coach and family friend from after the eighth grade to the completion of high school; Marty Stern, her coach for the first three years at Villanova; and current Villanova coach John Marshall.

"Marty helped me a lot with adjusting (to college),"
Spies said to Bill Fleischman of *The Philadephia News*.
"He was always there for me. The track team became my

family.

"I've enjoyed running more than I did in high school. In high school, it's always in the back of your mind that you're trying to earn a scholarship. Now, I'm running for myself and for my team. He's (Marshall) a fantastic coach with incredible potential," Spies said.

"When I learned that Becky had received this great honor, the excitement equalled that of winning the NCAA Championship last month," commented Marshall in a Villanova press release. "I believe that our athletes are here, first and foremost, for academics, and secondly as runners. In the past three weeks, Becky has achieved the highest possible level in both or her endeavors. Becky is someone who cares about everyone around her. When I first met Becky two years ago, one of our freshmen arrived on campus for the university's orientation program without any family, and Becky spent the entire orientation process with her to make her feel comfortable. As a coach you

dream about having upperclassmen like Becky, but with her it is

reality.

"She's the most intense athlete I've ever been associated with," Marshall said to USA Today. "She's tremendously focused and motivated. You have to hold her back rather than push her forward. She's also a truly good person."

"If I didn't have finals, I'd be out on cloud nine, certainly," said

Spies to USA Today.

"I'm shocked (re the Rhodes selection). You don't expect it. You meet the other candidates and learn about them and their accomplishments. You're amazed and wonder how you were chosen."

"It's a fantastic opportunity to study at one of the best universities (Oxford) in the world," Spies said to *The Oakland Tribune*. "They choose people they feel will make an impact."

"I was disappointed that I had finished with my philosophy courses," Spies said to the *Philadelphia Daily News.* "I found the courses interesting. When you're in college, it's time to think about your beliefs and your values. I wasn't sure how I felt about medical ethics, euthanasia and abortion.

"I love French existentialism, which I'd had a brief encounter with in high school. So I started taking philosophy courses and I loved it. I began to see it merge with my inter-

est in science."

Spies is also the second former California high school cross country and track athlete to become a Rhodes Scholar since 1991. Jesse Malkin (Berkeley High School 1987/ Oberlin College, Ohio 1991) was awarded a Rhodes Scholarship in 1991. He has completed his studies at Oxford University, and is now working on his Ph.D. at the Rand Corporation in Santa Monica.

There were 1,253 applicants for the 32 Rhodes Scholarships. Harvard led the list with six winners. About 60 schol-

ars were chosen from 17 other countries, officials said. The program is administered through Pomona College in Claremont, California.

Rhodes Scholarships bring overseas students to study at Oxford University. It is open to nationals of Australia, Bermuda, the Commonwealth Caribbean, Canada, Hong Kong, India, Jamaica, Kenya, Malaysia, New Zealand, Nigeria, Pakistan, Singapore, South Africa, the United States, West Germany, and Zimbabwe. Candidates should be between 19 and 25 years of age and should have at least junior standing or equivalent at a recognized degree-granting university or college. Monetary awards are presented annually. It was established in 1903 by the Right Honorable Cecil Rhodes, a British philanthropist and African colonialist. Rhodes left most of his fortune to establish scholarships to Oxford University. Approximately 70 scholarships are awarded each year. In the United States 32 scholarships are offered each year. Four go to each of eight districts. They last for two years. The original grant for a scholarship-300 pounds--has been raised to more than 2,600 pounds a year.

Rhodes hoped to establish close ties among an Anglo-Saxon elite to "secure the peace of the world." The program's criteria include academic excellence, integrity, leadership ability and athletic prowess.

Many of the students named Rhodes scholars showed interest in community service. Becky was an AIDS Peer Educator, and a volunteer with the Jesse Owens Track & Field Games and the Pennsylvania Special Olympics.

Scholarship winners may select any course of study at Oxford that they are qualified to pursue. In some cases the scholarship may be extended to cover a third year in postgraduate study.

Spies was among 18 women chosen this year, the third straight year that the number of women selected has set a record. Seventeen women were named scholars last year and 16 women in 1992. It was opened to women in 1976.

Spies was the second Villanova woman to receive a Rhodes Scholarship

in two years. Nnenna Lynch became the first Villanova student to ever win one in December 1992. Lynch was also an outstanding runner. As a freshman at Villanova, Lynch won the TAC Junior 1,500-meters in 4:19.9, and as a junior she won the NCAA 3,000-meters in 9:09.46.

At that one, it was certainly no surprise to see Thousand Oaks destroy both the boys and girls fields by scores of 28-61 over Camarillo and 34-92 in front of runner-up Agoura, Individually, Agoura's Amy Skieresz broke her own Lake Casitas course record with a time of 17:48.

All of the commnity colleges were at the Johnny O Invitational which serves as the state qualifying meet. No real surprises there as the Riverside men took four of the first six places enroute to a 76-104 win over runner-up Mt. SAC. In the women's meet, it was San Diego Mesa again outrunning El Camino 71-96.

At the PAC-10, it was Arizona ahead of Washington, UCLA and Oregon by a 49-58-97-97 count with the Bruins Mebrahtom Keflezighi an individual second. The Stanford women were surprise 57-74 winners over Oregon with UCLA fifth. The Bruins Karen Hecox was the individual champion with Shelley Taylor sixth.

There were no major surprises at the Big West meet where the Utah State men eased by UCSB 27-48, while the UCSB female swarm outran a pesky UC Irvine seven 55-62.

In the new American West Conference, it was all Cal Poly SLO as the Mustang women eased past CS Northridge 21-40, while the men outdistanced Southern Utah 27-53.

The West Coast Conference saw Portland run away from Gonzaga and San Diego by scores of 18-60 in the men's race 23-81 in the women's.

The CCAA Championships went to the men of Cal Poly Pomona 33-48 over UC Riverside; and the women of Cal State LA who rolled a perfect 15 in front of runner-up Grand Canyon's 73.

At the SCIAC meet, the conference

meet mirrored the dual meets as the Occidental men defeated second place Claremont-Mudd 37-56, while the Claremont women were 42-56 ahead of tough Whittier.

In community college conference finals, a surprise in the men's South Coast Conference meet where El Camino tied Mt. SAC at 39. In the women's meet, it was El Camino easy over Mt. SAC 19-52. At the Western States Conference Meet, the Glendale men dominated the rest of the conference and runner-up Moorpark 21-76, while the Ventura women were comfortably ahead of Glendale 56-71.

At the NCAA Div | District 8 Meet, the Arizona men outran Stanford 46-58. however the Cardinal women cruised by the Wildcats 55-73.

At the Division III Regionals, UCSD put 5 runners in the top 10 to easily top

Oxy's men 32-64, while the Claremont women continued to hold off Whittier 45-

#### △ November 23

For the first time ever, three high schools won both boy's and girl's championships in Southern CIF Section Finals. Thousand Oaks, Nordhoff, and Morro Bay won Division I, III and IV titles, while the Palmdale boys and Edison girls came away with Division II crowns. The Thousand Oaks boys team time of 77:09 breaks their own course record and makes them arguably the best prep team of all time.

Nordhoff had raced an amazing 79:44 to win the Southern Section Meet at Mt. SAC (Livermore was 81:37 at the Mt. SAC Invite a month earlier). Maybe the best Div III team ever to come out of the Southern California, Nordhoff had welcomed junior star Omar Vega back from a basketball injury, following Javier Ramirez's 15:10 and Will Bernaldo's 15:44, with Coach Ken Reeves keeping Vega busy with alternate forms of training. Lassen (Susanville), with soph star Aaron Harris tearing up courses at the frosh/soph level statewide, was another strong team here.

Nordhoff's Ramirez blasted out, with teammate Bernaldo third as the race headed off the grass at the start. Ramirez continued to lead as the pack headed towards the mile. At 4:52 at the mile marker (thanks to Keith Conning for religiously recording "on the way splits" this day) Livermore's Micheil Jones and Steve Immel were right behind the Nordhoff leader, with Darren Holman (Sonora) off to a determined start. A ton of blue and white clad teams, as was Nordhoff, made this a tough race to call early, with the favorites from the south appearing to be in good shape one-third of the way through the contest.

The next view of runners on a downhill segment just before two miles where Livermore's

Micheil Jones and Steve Immel joined Javier Ramirez and Darren Holman in a lead pack of four. Nordhoff had Ramirez, Will Bernaldo, and Omar Vega all in the top dozen at two miles, with Nordhoff's last two scorers around Livermore's #4 runner.

This was felt to be beforehand, and would turn out to be one of the most special team contests in state history between the two best teams ever in California at this level.

McFarland, the defending champions, was racing super this Fall, often moving up to the Large Schools level and competing strongly there. Galvin Gonzalez, defending state champ, was having a super Fall, and was the individual favorite. Morro Bay, out of the south, was another special group. At Mt. SAC, McFarland ran in the Saturday Div I-II team sweepstakes event, placing 13th with a team time of 82:53. Morro Bay had fine frosh Isaiah Festa improve to 16:25 in the Southern Section Prelims, with star Dave Mitchell leading the squad to an 82:19 Mt. SAC time there, before winning the Section Div IV title at 15:26 on the tough SAC course. Yreka 9:16.93 3200m star, junior Aaron Gillen, was a strong individual leading a good Northern Section crew.

The sun just broke out from behind the clouds as the Div IV contest, first of the day, took off at 9:00 a.m. The McFarland pack, in all white with red lettering, was easily the top squad as the pack headed off the grass at the start after 220 yards. By the 1320 McFarland's Galvin Gonzalez was the leader with Dave Mitchell (Morro Bay) running second, and Steve Miller (Maranatha, Sierra Madre) near the front.

Gonzalez, with a strong local Central Section cheering section, led through the first mile at 4:53, with a pack close behind, including Kenny Rhoan (Sierra, Tollhouse), the above mentioned runners, and Joaquin Pierce (Midland, Los Olivos). At the mile point it looked like McFarland was the team leaders. They had four inside the top twenty, with scorer number five inside the top twenty-five. The wearing of numbers by athletes obscures the school name listed on many jerseys, with Morro Bay tough to pick out after leader Mitchell.

The runners were next visible heading on a downhill segment just prior to the course's one good hill just prior to two miles. A pack of three, Gonzalez, Rhoan, and Mitchell, had broken away from the race. Up the hill Mitchell put forth a determined move, taking the lead, but not able to break contact with the other two. As the rest of the race started up the hill it

was possible to figure out the Morro Bay uniforms, with Isaiah Festa joining Mitchell in the top ten, and the contest between MB and McFarland, who seemed to pack between fifteenth and twenty-fifth, looking very, very close.

During the final mile it was Gonzalez moving slowly away from his followers, winning by thirty yards over fellow Central Section star, Kenny Rhoan, 15:31-15:37, with Dave Mitchell next at 15:47 and Aaron Gillen 4th at 15:49. Festa held on strong for Morro Bay, racing 16:14 for seventh (an excellent frosh performance!), with Trevor Strohman (MB) 14th at 16:33. McFarland filled the next four spots in the contest between "the big two," with 20th, 26th, 27th, and 28th in before Morro Bay's last two scorers in 34th and 42nd.

Sadly, there were some revisions in the score sheet here. Coach Jim White of McFarland was none too confident after the finish, noting that the Morro Bay "up-front" packing had probably beaten his squad. The first score sheet that came out after the race had Morro Bay winning 57-58. Two more revisions (early ones missed Flintridge Prep athletes) had the contest up front end up in a 62-62 tie, with McFarland winning on the sixth runner rule. 35th to 42nd. To have Coach Cary Nerelli and Morro Bay celebrate a win and then have it vanked away was not a neat way to close a great season for the Pirate group. It was kind of fitting that the State's two best ever groups at this level would tie through five athletes. For the record a dual meet between the two would have gone 27-28 McFarland.

Some very fine teams would do battle here (with an eventual two of the three top team times from the day).

SAC Div III Sweeps effort of 95:58 that was the fastest of the weekend there. The Eagle crew was very, very impressive in races such as the Stanford Invitational, where their top seven was all inside the top fifteen at the mile. Down south Temescal Canyon (Elsinore) was a very tough group that had Shelby Horgan (18:19), Ellen

Muench (18:51), and Sunny Shaffer (19:07)

Canchola, a short runner with very powerful, snappy stride, took out hard and led the race off the grass at the start. Ahead at the mile at, Temescal Canyon, with three in the top dozen and Clayton Valley, three in the top twenty, looked tough through the mile mark.

At the hill just before the two mile mark it was Veronica Sanchez (Wasco), who had won the Central Section by over a minute, and Elaine Canchola the leaders. Sanchez attacked the hill aggressively, with Heather Garritson, Tracy Clark (Corona del Mar, Newport Beach), and Clayton Valley's Heather Wallace were also near the front. Temescal Canyon looked tougher and tougher, having three in the top ten ahead of Clayton Valley's #2 runner.

During a tough third mile it was Garritson who moved the strongest, with Sanchez fading (eventually to 46th), with the Buena Park frosh winning over Canchola 18:01-18:07. Heather Wallace was 5th for Clayton Valley (18:23) over Shelby Horgan (Temescal 6th-18:23) in the team contest, with Ellen Muench (TC-9th), Deborah Osteen (CV-11th), and Sunny Shafer (TC-12th) showing the power of those two teams. A very competitive division here would feature good teams from all around the state. The Northern Section's Central Valley, an impressive Stanford Invitational winner, had been #1 ranked all Fall. A strong West Valley (Cottonwood) team tied CV with 72 points in the Section Finals. The North Coast Section, always very, very tough here, had Miramonte (Orinda) and Branson (Oakland) push #3 ranked statewide Ursuline (Santa Rosa) to the number three (non-qualifying) position in the Section Meet. Yreka, #6 ranked statewide, lost out in the Northern contest to go to state, with this situation a good argument for some "at-large" entries into the State affair. Down South, Morro Bay, which impressed with a big peak and third place here in 1993, had a good Section Finals race and a #4 ranking statewide. Kristen Schreiber (Miramonte) was the defending State individual champ.

By the time the Girls Div IV contest took off (10:14 a.m.), the sun had kind of permanently been lost behind the clouds, with a definite serious chill in the air. This was probably at least fifteen degrees cooler than many from the South had raced in this Fall.

Top-ranked Central Valley came to run, with the red-clad Falcons the leading squad as the race went through the first 220 yards. At 5:53 for the first mile Jenny Spoon (West Valley, Cottonwood) had a huge pack in tow, with defending champion Kristen Schreiber and Shaluinn Fullove (Louisville, Woodland Hills), the Southern Section champion, leading a huge pack. The team contest was tough to figure at the mile, with Central Valley and Miramonte having two each in the huge top pack.

At the downhill before the "two-mile hill" a pack of four battled for the lead, with Kristen Schreiber, Jenny Spoon, Theresa Newman (Marin Catholic, Kentfield), and Shaluinn Fullove all looking strong. Spoon attacked the hill, taking the lead. Central Valley had four in the top twenty-five heading up the hill, appearing to be in control of the team contest, but with about half of the teams here in blue and white it made other identifications tough.

Past two miles North Coast rivals Schreiber and Newman started to pull away from the others. As the race appeared to spectators near the finish line it appeared Newman, with a twenty yard lead, would be the winner over defending champ Schreiber. In a stirring homestretch run, the very spent Newman put forth a strong effort, but Schreiber was able to mount a furious sprint, and just edge by with less than ten yards to go, winning 19:11-19:13. Jenny Spoon was third at 19:21 with Melissa McPherson (Flintridge Sacred-Heart, La Canada) moving up to fourth at 19:26.

Miramonte looked good as a team at the finish, with frosh stars Lindsey Bergen 6th and Kristi Miller 17th. Central Valley had Christina Peacock 9th, Claire Hunter 12th, with #3 runner Kara Hunn 20th overall. CV's steady pack had Carie Irwin 33rd and Barbara Stoizoff 46th, with Miramonte 57th and 58th for their final two scorers. Coach Linda Doniak's CV group totalled 72 with Miramonte 85 and third place West Valley 132.

In commenting after the race, Central Valley's Coach Doniak said, "With schools such as West Valley in our League the girls just went out and competed as they had all year long. We ran the race that we expected to. The girls have pulled together so well all season long, with a couple of team members moving up strongly when our fifth scorer went down with a stress fracture. I just wish our sport received more publicity in our area. Next year we ex-

pect to move to Division III with a slight rise in enrollment."

(McFarland High, Central Section)

A three-time California Track & Running News Coach of the Year, Gary Adams has led the McFarland boys' team to three state championships. Only Hart High with four titles has won more. McFarland has won six straight section titles with Adams in charge.

#### **■** Ernie Aguirre

(Bell High, Los Angeles City Section)
In just five years in charge of the Bell High

cross country program, Ernie Aguirre has experienced a great deal of success. His boys' team placed as high as seventh at the state (1991). Besides cross country, Aguirre has coached basketball, softball, football, soccer, and volleyball during his coaching career which began in 1973.

Steve Brown (Bishop O'Dowd High, North Coast Section)

The president of 800-SOFTWARE, a computer software sales company, Steve Brown – like so many cross country coaches – does it for the love of the sport. ■ DEATHS Clarence (Bud) Houser

Gardena, October 1--Clarence (Bud) Houser died of natural causes at the age of 93. Houser won shot and discus golds at the 1924 Olympic Games and repeated in the discus in 1928. He won the NCAA discus title for USC in 1926 and that year also raised the World Record to 158-1. He captured 5 national shot titles (the first as a prep senior) and 3 national discus crowns.

## ■ NCS Honor Coach Selection Process

The NCS Honor Coach program is designed to recognize those coaches who meet a specific set of criteria in all sports that culminate in NCS/Toyota Championship Series Events.

Nominations are made to the selection committee from any league/conference in the NCS. The NCS is empowered to nominate coaches when nominations have not been submitted with respective deadlines.

In order to be eligible, nominees must have coached varsity or non-varsity teams at the interscholastic level for a minimum of five years, (Non-credentialed coaches are also eligible if this criteria is met). Nominees need not be currently coaching a sport.

Selection is based on professional standards of conduct, service to the sport, accomplishments, and contributions to the school and community. Selected individuals are presented a certificate at a major NCS event or school awards ceremony, are recognized in the NCS Prep Magazine, receive a one year NCS pass, letters for personnel file and releases to media.

The selection committee is composed of a California Coaches Association member, an NCS Administrator, an individual appointed by the NCS Executive Committee, and two members from the Sports Advisory Committee. Due dates for nominations are set by the NCS and appear in the Master Calendar.

Berkeley, as girls cross country coach and as an assistant track coach, is that the dedication, rewards and enjoyment can continue long after

If there is ever a conflict between academics and athletics, I believe that the academics come first."

During 27 years as a teacher and coach in Berkeley, one of Conning's crowning achievements was leading the girl's cross country team to a third-place finish in the 1989 NCS championships. Team honors run a close second, though, to the personal achievements of his student-athletes. Two of his most memorable athletes were Shumeye Mamo, who left wartom Ethiopia for a better life in the United States and became a three-time CIF State Meet qualifier, and Ben Turman, a four-year runner at Berkeley who went on to become a two-time qualifier for the Pac-10 Champion-ships in the 1,500 meters.

In addition to coaching, serving as high school editor of California Track News and as the track announcer at numerous high school and college track meets, Conning remains involved with various civic improvement and Crime Watch organizations in his Berkeley neighborhood.

It happened almost 10 years ago, but for cross-country coach Helen Lehman, it was an experience she's not likely to forget.

Lehman, now coaching at Carondelet, was the coach at El Cerrito High in 1985 and the North Coast Section Meet of Champions was at hand. With three outstanding runners—a fourth had been slowed by injuries but was still competing—chances appeared excellent for the team to advance to the NorCals, which was the ultimate at the time with no CIF/Toyota State Meet then in existence.

The race went well for Lehman's girls. As the leaders crossed the finish line, she realized El Cerrito had nailed down sixth, eighth and ninth place--three top 10 spots, usually a lock for a finish in the top three--but her mind was still back on the course at Hayward High School.

"I wasn't sure about our next girl..she'd been near the top all year but had been hurt," recalls Lehman. "I was hoping she'd finish somewhere between 40 and 50, which she did."

But Lehman's major concern was that final scoring spot, a team's fifth-place runner. And in this case, the No. 5 girl finished close to 100th and El Cerrito failed to place in the top three, just missing out on a trip to NorCals.

It was a situation not uncommon to cross-

country coaches and participants, although maybe not so well-known to those who view the sport from more of a distance.

"We'll be at a meet and people don't always understand why I'm running around and yelling when the winner has already crossed the finish line," says Clear Lake cross-country coach Bob Mayer.

They usually don't have a clue, explains Mayer, that the competition is far from over, that in some cases it has only just begun.

Doug Courtemarche, coach of perennial powerhouse Santa Rosa High, remembers a meet earlier this season against cross-town rival Montgomery.

"Our girl took first, their top two girls were second and third and our girl took fourth," Courtemarche says. "So the top four runners are done but both teams have the same points so absolutely nothing has been decided yet."

The way it turned out, Santa Rosa got six girls across the finish line before Montgomery did, and won the dual meet, 27-29.

Coaches know it's not even just the five scoring places that are critical, but often the nonscoring sixth and seventh runners who decide the outcome of a dual meet, invitational or season-ending event like the NCS/Toyota Championships.

"From a coaching standpoint, it's essential to stress to your runner that every person is important, all the way down to the seventh person in a race," says Keith Conning, a veteran cross-country coach working with the girls' team at Berkeley High.

"It's not just something you might say as a coach to motivate," Conning continues. "It's absolutely necessary that your team understands it and believes it."

As Clear Lake's Mayer explains it, the sixth and seventh runners, although in non-scoring positions, can still displace the runners from other teams and, as all cross-country coaches will tell you, that single point or two can make all the difference when the final total is tallied.

"We were in a dual meet this season that we won because our sixth runner finished ahead of the other team's fifth guy," Mayer says. "Tell me that kid doesn't realize the importance of going all out all the time."

There is also a lot of strategy that goes into coaching a cross-country team. It's more than just running as fast as you can and hoping for the best.

"We always talk about matchups before a race," says Santa Rosa's Courtemarche. "Our kids know who the ones are they need to finish ahead of, and sometimes they get going and finish even higher than we expected them to."

That's one of the many joys cross-country coaches like to talk about. The self-motivation that leads to self-improvement that often leads to some surprising results.

For Castro Valley coach Pete Brewer, it's often that so-called mediocre runner that brings as much satisfaction to him as the superstars.

"I call them true believers," Brewer says.
"They have to finally believe that all they need
to do is put out the effort and they'll see the improvement."

Last year, there was a Castro Valley freshman who, Brewer recalls, "was slow as molasses. Most kids like that might have quit, but not this one.

"He's worked hard and has gradually improved...now he's nibbling at the back pack of regular runners," Brewer says. "The other kids are in awe of what he's done. He's shown the others what hard work can do and I think it's spurred them on."

Lehman sees the role of the less-talented runner as vital to team success. And some of the season's most pleasant surprises can come at the most unexpected times.

"Every once in a while, one of the girls you really aren't counting on for points runs the race of her life," Lehman says. "It's something you can't really anticipate but it's great when it happens."

Berkeley's Conning says some of his best memories are of runners who came out of nowhere to turn in a gutsy performance when it was not expected.

"It's so rewarding to see that happen," Conning says. "Maybe the winners have been in for a while, but you see a tremendous battle between two kids and then one of them makes a last-second lunge at the finish line...it's exciting."

Most cross-country coaches feel a sport often depicted as a primarily individual one is as much of a team sport as many of the others.

"It's a bonding sport more than the others because unlike other sports that have specialties, everybody is doing the same thing in crosscountry," says Brewer. "They all suffer the same, they've all been through the same thing and they gain respect for one another."

Adds Brewer: "Any runner respects all runners."

With rare exceptions, the stars support the lesser luminaries on a cross-country team. Coaches talk about their top runners winning a race, then hustling back to the finish line to watch their teammates battle for points.

"It's great to watch your top people standing

at the finish line cheering on their teammates," says Mayer. "They know the race isn't over until everybody's finished and they appreciate their teammates' efforts."

An occasional bad apple sneaks in the superstar barrel exhibiting what Brewer calls the "prince or princess" mentality, a person who has little respect for his teammates or the competition.

"Team members are just baggage to a person like this," Brewer says. "I have always felt that if you're going to wear the [school] uniform, be part of that team."

Coaches also agree that cross-country runners are, generally speaking, more selfmotivated and self-disciplined, that they have almost complete control over their progress, which isn't the case in many team sports.

As Conning puts it: "It's more than just ability in cross-country. If you're willing to put in the miles, it's amazing what you can do."

It's that concept that makes cross-country a sport that carries over to a youngster's future. Few high school football players are playing the sport 10 years later, but the same can't be said for cross-country participants.

"The key to motivating is to make something fun," says Carondelet's Lehman. "If you can do that, it may become part of their lifestyle."

Conning says part of his philosophy is to develop an interest in the sport that will carry over to adult life.

"I think it's important not to place winning over participation and improvement because you have to remember you're dealing with a large cross-section of individuals."

Lehman says the public, including the media, would be better off looking at the whole picture and not just the cream of the crop.

"Who won the race...that's usually the story you read," Lehman says. "Maybe it seems more exciting and it's not doubt an easier story to write."

But what about the other people, who work as hard--maybe harder--on a team? Maybe they've been overlooked for too long.

## School Violence Rising in Cities, Suburbs

Boston, November 21—If Americans needed any more confirmation that many of their public schools are far from safe havens for learning, a recent survey by the National League of Cities provides it.

The NLC queried cities and towns about violence in their schools and found that 39 percent of the 700 respondents said violent incidents have increased significantly over the past five years. Forty-five percent said the levels had remained constant. One quarter noted serious injuries or deaths during the past year. Only 11 percent reported violence was not a problem, and 6 percent said it had decreased.

Contrary to perceptions that school crime and violence are concentrated in central cities, the survey indicated that officials in many suburban and rural communities also worry about the problem. Around 30 percent of the cities in all categories reported significant increases in school violence. Among cities with populations of 100,000 or more, the proportion reporting increased violence was 55 percent.

Many communities are addressing school violence by assigning police officers to schools. About 70 percent said they had regular patrols or other activities on campus. The police involvement often includes talking with students about illicit drug use and other topics. One positive aspect of the school-violence issue-it is forcing closer cooperation among city hall, police departments, and school officials.

High School athletic programs find alternative methods for raising money

November 22--Skyline High football coach
John Beam reads the business section of his
morning Oakland Tribune more closely than he
read the sports section.

Beam reads Sports Day for sheer enjoyment. He reads Business Day because it contains information he needs to do his job better.

"Right now, fund-raising is the only way that you can run a program like ours," Beam said. "So I keep my eye on the business sections.

"I need to know which companies are doing well and which are not. It's important that I know which companies have given money to charitable organizations and which haven't."

Beam is among a growing number of coaches, school administrators and booster club leaders who, because of cutbacks in school district funding, have turned increasingly to alternative revenue sources to support and enhance their athletic programs.

A recent study by two national high school administrator organizations found more than 60 percent of schools nationally rely on fundraising to supplement shrinking athletic budgets.

That trend, though controversial, is apparent at every level.

The California Interscholastic Federation, traditionally the regulatory body for high school athletics in the state, has raised \$1 million in corporate sponsorship money this year. It hopes to increase that amount to \$6 million annually by 1997.

The North Coast Section, which governs most athletic leagues in the East Bay, has averaged \$130,000 in sponsorship revenue the past five years.

"The CIF is becoming more sponsorshipdriven," said Bob Seagren, the former Olympic

pole vaulter who is now a member of the marketing firm that represents the CIF. "We're breaking through the myth that education is selling out to corporate America. The fact is, high school athletics need corporate America in order to survive."

That has become apparent at the grassroots level, where fund-raising activities organized by teams, booster clubs or athletic foundations are commonplace in practically every school in the East Bay.

For many groups, fund-raising still consists mainly of the occasional car wash or candy sale. For others, however, it has become a more sophisticated and demanding enterprise.

Last year, Skyline received \$5,000 in district funds for boy's athletics. The sum was reduced to \$3,000 this year.

Through an array of imaginative fund-raising activities and by effectively tapping into the corporate community in Oakland and elsewhere, however, Beam and his Skyline players raised in excess of \$23,000 this season.

The money not only helped meet the basic operating costs of the Skyline football program, it also covered the tab for a road trip to Hawaii the team took for a pre-season game.

Others have found innovative ways to raise

✓ In San Leandro, the local youth swim club used a method similar to Skyline's to come with \$25,000 to repair the swimming pool at San Leandro High.

✓ In Santa Rosa, the Schools Plus Foundation worked through the local cable company to air a telethon fund-raiser each year to support co-curricular activities, including athletics.

✓ A San Ramon Valley High, which receives no funding for athletics from the school district, the booster club annually raises \$50,000 to support athletics.

Technology has been a major factor in the success of these relatively small, non-profit groups, said John Tarman, the marketing director for the NCS.

"Because booster clubs and coaches now have access to computer hardware, it has become much easier for them to keep a data base for mailing lists for fund-raising solicitations or advertising solicitations. I've talked to a number of different booster groups and I'm very much impressed at how they've been able to target local merchants for support."

At Skyline, success at raising money has been the residue of a polished fund-raising organization that begins with Beam and which utilizes fully the team's primary resource--its players.

Beam sent out hundreds of letters to companies up and down the state, explaining the goal of the Skyline football team and requesting a donation.

Beam keeps the mailing list of companies and the basic form letter on a computer disk at his house. The body of the letter he personalizes to the target company. "You don't want to hit up the same person every year," he said.

The most important elements in successful fund raising for high school athletics, however, are high school athletes, Beam said.

"The most important thing is that the kids be involved," Beam said. "By each kids working toward the goal, they get a sense of accomplishment. They sweated for it."

The players also provide a valuable resource. Often, they turn out to be quite resourceful. One of the largest donations to the Skyline football program came from American Presidents Line, the Port of Oakland's largest cargo hauler from Japan to the Bay Area. Beam made contact with the company through one of his players, Aaron Potash.

## Schools End Shower Requirement

November 23, Hollidaysburg, Pa (AP)-School officials dropped a requirement that high school students shower after gym class, after the American Civil Liberties Union threatened to sue.

The ACLU argued that the requirement violates students' privacy by forcing them to go naked in front of their classmates.

"This is 100 percent what we were looking for," said Vic Walczak, executive director of the ACLU's Greater Pittsburgh chapter.

"If they want to hold seminars about the values of showering, that's fine. It was the mandatory nature, the intrusiveness that we were concerned about."

The dispute began when Wendy Hardie circulated a petition over the summer asking the school to lift the physical education department's requirement. Hardie graduated last spring from Hollidaysburg Area High School.

The school district, just south of Altoona in central Pennsylvania, refused.

On Tuesday, the physical education department and school Superintendent Leo Gensante agreed in a closed-door meeting of the school board to drop the requirement, said school board president John Seasoltz.

One year later, Lori is the NCS Division II champion. Elissa is the runner-up. That's because Lori beat Elissa last week at the NCS Meet of Champions.

Saturday, the Riedys will cap their high school careers at the Division II state championships at Woodward Park in Fresno. Marden expects them to challenge for the championship.

"I think this is going to work in our favor," Marden said, referring to Lori's victory over Elissa. "Lori is red-hot. And Elissa probably feels like she has something to prove."

Elissa finished fifth at the state final last season; Lori was 20th.

## ■ Whites Lead Florida Dropout Rate

Tallahassee, Florida, November 24 (AP)—Florida's dropout rate jumped the last school year, and white children dropped out at a much higher rate than blacks or Hispanics.

A total of 29,584 students, or 5.63 percent, dropped out in 1993-1994, a rate nearly a full percent higher than the previous year, the state Department of Education said Wednesday.

Almost half of those dropouts were white, 31 percent were black, 18 percent were Hispanic and 1.3 percent were Asian American or American Indian. The rate of pupils graduating also was down, from nearly 79 percent in 1992-93 to almost 76 percent in 1993-94.

The higher dropout rate was due in part to schools having tougher curricula resulting from higher educational standards statewide, education officials said. Another part of the problem, officials said, is that spending cuts make it more difficult for pupils to get extra help. There have been more than \$1 billion in education cuts since the early 1990s.

The cuts have forced many schools to trim dropout prevention programs and led to overcrowding of classrooms.

Reduction in spending three or four years ago when pupils with learning problems were in middle school could be showing up now that they have reached the age of 16, the legal age for guitting school, the report said.

School advisory committees are preparing improvement plans for each school as part of outgoing Education Commissioner Doug Jamerson's Blueprint 2000 program. The program give more power over curricula and school administration to local districts.

Jamerson also has asked the Legislature for \$404 million for the 1995-96 year to reduce class sizes for students enrolled in basic courses. The proposal would increase per-pupil spending for basic students by \$180, the Education Department said.

## ■ Track Hurdler Harris' Nightmare Officially Ends

BARCELONA, Spain, November 28 — American Danny Harris cleared the biggest hurdle of his career Sunday when the International Amateur Athletic Federation reinstated him in the sport and quashed his four-year ban for cocaine use.

"I'm relieved, pleased, excited," Harris said

from his home in Brentwood, CA.

The unanimous decision by the council of the world governing body officially brought to an end the 1984 Olympic 400 meter hurdles silver medalist's nightmare descent from world class athlete to cocaine addict.

It also ended a lengthy legal battle which began when Harris, now 29, failed a test for the drug in February 1992. Although the ban was due to run until Feb. 28, 1996, the IAAF invoked its "exceptional circumstances rule" for the first time.

The IAAF lifted the ban, with immediate effect, because it is convinced Harris has broken his addiction to the drug. IAAF President Primo Nebiolo, in urging the council to lift the ban, said, "We are very serious and very hard on doped athletes but in some cases we must show we are human."

Arne Lundqvist of Sweden, the IAAF's drug committee chairman and an International Olympic Committee member, also told the council before they voted, "I am convinced Danny Harris is now clean and will stay clean — even if you refuse to reinstate him."

Harris said he was surprised after getting a call from Bob Kersee, his coach.

"I thought he was calling about a workout. I didn't think I'd get the news until Tuesday or Thursday. It was real nice to have it come from him since he's the one person who has truly been there the whole time," Harris said.

He said he has been working out regularly since October and his goals for next year are to make the U.S. teams for both the world indoor and outdoor championships.

"That's very important to me," he said. He was uncertain when his first race would be. "Whenever it is, I'll be ready."

Kersee said Harris could run as early as December, but definitely by January and said Harris had to overcome an extra obstacle.

"Most 400 meters hurdlers have a race with 10 hurdles," Kersee added. "He has had a race that had an 11th hurdle and it's his responsibility to continue to stay strong both on and off the track."

Harris' case was complicated and went through a number of legal twists.

The athlete, who in Madrid in June 1987 became the first man to beat the legendary Ed Moses in 122 races, later began using cocaine heavily and in February 1992 failed a routine test for the drug.

He had been ranked second in the world the previous year but the four-year ban meant he missed the 1992 Barcelona Olympics and the 1993 world championships in Stuttgart. But by

June 1992, Harris had decided to check into a substance abuse program and later began a lengthy battle to clear his name.

Earlier this year he was reinstated by the U.S. federation and ran in four European meets before the IAAF belatedly discovered he was running while still officially banned. He was pulled out of the London Grand Prix on July 15 only hours before the start of the meet. But 10 days later came the first indication that the IAAF was prepared to review the case, when Nebiolo told Kersee that although Harris was not yet allowed to compete, he should take his case for reinstatement to the IAAF.

IAAF spokesman Winner said on Sunday:
"The Danny Harris decision does not represent
a softening of the IAAF's anti-drugs policies.
The council intends to ensure that anti-doping
measures are increased, but agreed that special matters arose in this case. Danny Harris will
also continue to be tested frequently and randomly in the future."

■ Teen Is King Of Cross Country

Albany, New York, December 7 (AP)--Barely 16, Erin Davis is already a defending national cross country champion. She also owns three New York state high school cross country titles — the first coming when she was an eighth grader — and is gunning for a second national high school title this weekend.

But for all her success, Davis' most impressive performance may have come at a community road race last March. She took off in a pack of about 15 runners, mostly older men, leading a field of 300. Roughly a quarter of the way along the 5-mile oval course, one competitor turned a street too early, sending Davis and her group off course. When they were finally alerted to the mistake, many runners gave up on a good showing and trotted in -- not Davis. The diminutive teen-ager tore through the field to regain the quarter-mile she lost, finishing about where she started.

"We went the wrong way, but I made it all up," she recalled recently.

Davis, a sophomore at Saratoga Springs
High School in northeast New York, has shown
the same kind of determination ever since becoming a top-flight cross country runner three
seasons ago, according to one of her coaches,
Linda Kranick.

"In seventh grade, Erin just had a good time.

She wasn't even the best runner on the team," Kranick said. "But in eighth grade, she really developed. She has dedication, focus and a real love of running."

She'll need all those qualities if she plans on repeating as girl's champion at the Foot Locker Cross Country National Finals in San Diego.

At the 1993 finals, held annually at Balboa Park, Davis became the first freshman ever to win the national high school title when she kicked past Melissa Lucas of Portland, Oregon, with less than 200 yards to go.

"She was mature enough and poised enough not to panic," said Kranick, who heads the running program at Saratoga Springs with her husband, Arthur.

Davis cruised through most of her races this season, winning the New York public high school championship at Albany last month in a record 17 minutes, 18.1 seconds for the 5-kilometer course. Her nearest competitor, Dana Ostrander of local rival Shenendehowa High School, was more than 26 seconds behind.

Staying motivated is no problem, even with a big lead, Davis said. "I just think, the faster I finish, the sooner I can stop," she said.

However, not everything this year has been as easy for Davis as the state championships were. The Kranicks, who have guided several teams to state cross country titles, have been embroiled in a well-publicized controversy over their coaching methods. Parents of some former Saratoga Springs runners have accused the Kranicks of administering unhealthy doses of vitamins to their children, requiring Sunday practices and exerting an abnormal amount of control over runners' lives. An investigation by the Saratoga Springs school district found the Kranicks broke no regulations. The case, however, has been appealed to state education commissioner Thomas Sobol, who is expected to make a ruling shortly.

Opponents have taunted the Saratoga Springs runners with jeers of "druggies," but Davis said she has put the controversy out of her mind.

"It doesn't mean anything to me," she said.
"We just focus on our running and nothing else."

Meanwhile, the competition for Davis at this year's nationals promises to be tougher than last year. Julia Stamps, a sophomore from Santa Rosa High School in California, won the Western Regional qualifier last weekend in a blazing 16:45, breaking the regional record by six seconds.

Davis won the right to defend her title by

placing in the top eight at the Northeast Regional, but suffered through an uncharacteristic off day. She finished fourth in 17:44, and lost to Ostrander for the first time this season.

"I hung off Erin, stayed with her and then ran by," said Ostrander, who finished third in 17:37. "I was excited because I qualified for the na-

tionals, but beating Erin was an extra bonus."

Linda Kranick played down the pressure on Davis to win a second national title. Winning isn't as important for Davis as running to the best of her ability.

"Erin has nothing to prove to anyone," Kranick said. "Her coaches, parents and teammates are happy with her performance and that's enough."

#### ■ Giusto, Barrios Head Field for Men's 5K Race

On Sunday (Dec. 11), USA Track & Field's 1994 road race championships make their final stop in Palm Desert, CA, for the men's 5 kilometers. The deep, competitive field includes a mixture of former Olympians [Arturo Barrios, Reuben Reina and Brian Abshire (De Anza High School, Richmond 1982)]; road and track veterans Matt Giusto (San Mateo High School 1984), Tim Hacker and Dan Nelson; and young, promising runners Brian Baker, Brian Grosso and Jason Pyrah.

Giusto, 28, from Albuquerque, and new U.S. citizen Barrios, 31, from Boulder, Colorado are among the favorites to challenge for the championship. Giusto, two-time national 5000 meter champion (1993, 1994) has the experience, desire and speed to claim his first road title. This year, Giusto fias the fastest American 5K time, a 13:34 at Carlsbad.

Brian Abshire (Piedmont, CA) has the fourth fastest U.S. 5K time (13:49 at Carlsbad).

The prize purse totals \$18,000 with \$10,000 set aside for American men (\$3500, \$2000, \$1250, \$1000 down to \$100 for tenth place). In addition, an athlete breaking the American record [13:26 by Greg Whiteley (University High School, Irvine 1985), in 1993 Grand Bahamas 5000] earns an extra \$1500 bonus, while a time that breaks the world record (13:12 by Kenya's William Mutwol, Carlsbad, 1992), earns an extra \$2500.

The first-year event features a flat, double-looped course designed by Steve Scott (Upland High School 1974), American record holder in the mile. The championship will be featured on ESPN's Foot Locker Road Race of the Month and the Sports Channel's American Athlete.

I had attended the Foot Locker National High School Cross Country Championships on Saturday morning, then drove here in the afternoon.

The four-star Marriott Desert Springs Resort and Spa was the meet headquarters. Normally rooms go for \$200 plus per night, but they had a \$75 special for runners, so I said "let's splurge". It sure beats the \$40 Best Western. However, a cup of coffee was \$2.00, but you could opt for a sea-weed massage if you were so inclined. Or you could take a boat from the lobby to your choice of restaurants.

Palm Desert is located south of Palm Springs. It is entirely a gated community. Its prime shopping district is like Beverly Hills. I felt out-of-place in my Hertz Ford Escort rental car. All around me were luxury cars--Lexus, Rolls Royce, Mercedes, etc.

From Palm Desert I drove to the new Joshua Tree National Park. It had been dedicated the day before by Senator Diane Feinstein and the Secretary of the Interior. I even saw a roadrunner (a long-tailed bird of the southwestern United States, the chaparral cock, characterized by running swiftly instead of flying).

#### **EDITORIAL BY PREP EDITOR**

I am opposed to "at large" entrants to the state meet as proposed at a meeting of the Coaches Alliance.

I think it would be too political. Who would decide? Even Doug Speck, who does the team rankings, can't be everywhere. A case in point is Jason Balkman. Doug was surprised by his performance at the state meet, but if you had seen Jason at the Artichoke Invitational and the Central Coast Section as I had, you would not have been surprised.

What criteria would they follow? Would they select certain invitationals? What would that do to the invitationals not selected? For example, if the Stanford Invitational were selected, that could take teams away from other invitationals held that day. The Artichoke Invitational has been able to compete head-to-head with Stanford, but could they if teams are aiming for an "at large" slot?

I think this would be a move in the wrong direction for our sport.

I think the current method is the best. That's the way we select our U.S. Olympic Track Team. You either produce at your section meet or wait until next year.

Incidentally, my view did not prevail at a meeting of the North Coast Section Cross Country Management Committee.

If "at large" are allowed, I would hope we could preserve existing cross country invitationals

Incidentally, the Stanford vs. Artichoke conflict will be resolved next year, because Stanford is moving back to the last Saturday in September. It was a shame that two of the best invitationals in Northern California, had to be on the same weekend each year.

His best open 440 for that season was 47.1 at the CCS finals at Foothill on May 30th. The track coach at Los Altos that year was Leo Long, not Dave Maggard, nor was Maggard an assistant coach."

### ■ USA Track continues steroid probe of Noon

December 23-A lawyer for USA Track and Field plans to question University of Georgia coaches, athletes and other personnel about allegations of steroid use by two-time NCAA shot put champion Brent Noon.

The latest salvo in the two-year legal battle between USATF and Noon came as federation lawyer Michael Rubino said he wanted to talk to Georgia assistant track coach Ralf Uebel

- Track coach John Mitchell.
- ✓ Two trainers and two university physicians.
- ✓ Current or former track athletes Allessandro Urlando, Jan Belecki, Boris Stoikos, Hans Schmidt, Hrvoje Verzi and Volker Mai.

The move comes less than two weeks after a judge threw out a \$983,000 award to Noon in his suit against USATF on drug-testing procedures and ordered a new trial. The ruling followed the emergence of a diary, allegedly written by Uebel. A photocopy of the diary, with an Athens, GA., postmark, was anonymously sent to a USATF official. It suggests people at Georgia had knowledge of use of steroids by Noon.

Tuesday in San Diego, Superior Court Judge Richard Haden ruled the lawyer for USA Track & Field could take depositions by Noon.

Hoke Wilder Jr., assistant athletic director for compliance, said Thursday that Uebel has been in Louisiana and is expected to be on campus next week. Georgia athletic director

Vince Dooley said he wants to meet with Uebel as soon as possible.

### Realignment appealed; Berkeley unwanted in EBAL

Dublin, December 24-The appeals are on. The proposed realignment of the North Coast Section has some cracks, according to three schools and one league.

NCS Commissioner Paul Gaddini announced Friday that Amador Valley, Livermore and Richmond high schools, as well as the Alameda Contra Costa Athletic League, have filed appeals concerning a realignment proposal made by section principals Nov. 16.

The four-year realignment cycle is set to begin in the fall of 1996. Among other things, the proposal placed Berkeley into a revamped 31 (large-school) East Bay Athletic League, along with Amador Valley, Livermore, California, Monte Vista and San Ramon Valley.

Principals Steve Dellanini of Amador Valley and Sheila Cooper of Livermore are appealing on grounds that Berkeley is not geographically proximate to their schools.

"It is not fair for our students to have to be out of class longer and to pay higher transportation fees when there are schools that are much closer to Berkeley High," Dellanini said.

Cooper and Dellanini have proposed that the Yellowjackets be placed in another league and Castro Valley be moved to the EBAL.

Gaddini and an NCS alignment and classification committee are scheduled to hear the appeals Jan. 11 at Dublin High. They may vote to keep the plan the way it is, or come up with a new one if they support one or more of the appeals.

Cooper and Dellanini are also appealing the principals' decision to release 3A schools Richmond, El Cerrito, De Anza and Alameda to the 2A (small-school) conference. Cooper and Dellanini said the NCS provides guidellines only for a school to raise its classification, not to

Had those schools remained 3A and joined Berkeley and Bishop O'Dowd, a natural and proximate six-team league could have been formed.

Saturday, November 19. Mt. San Antonio College. Weather sunny and cool (perfect conditions)

In really one of the great days of prep cross-country in Southern California, the Southern Section came to the tough three mile course at Mt. SAC on November 19th for its Section Finals and

State qualifying meet. Wow!!! was the only way to describe the day's action, with runners basically going crazy on the super moming for running. It is hard to recall a day when a group of individuals and teams peaked so nicely with a series of superb efforts.

Thousand Oaks, with its special group finally rounding into top shape after injury early in the year, had Jeff Fischer (15:18) and Kevin Marsden (15:19) join 1994 team leader Keith O'Doherty (15:16) as the Lancers blew away their own old Course record of 77:56 with an amazing 77:09 team clocking! An average of under 15:30 (15:26 to be exact) for a scoring five on this course is unbelievable. Coach Jack Farrell, other scorers Todd Disney (15:34) and Josh Carolan (15:42), and the entire TO program need to be saluted for their great effort. The Lancer Girls were not far behind, with the #10 Section team time ever at Mt. SAC with their

94:51 in taking the Div I title, led by Kim Mortensen's 18:00. Kingwood Texas, which defeated both Lancer teams during an early October trip to Texas and took both Lone Star 5A team titles, is the only program nationally that can compare overall to Thousand Oaks.

There was some great individual running during the day also. A great Div I Boys race had one of the Section's better groups ever battling. Mt. SAC winner Eleazar Hemandez (Camarillo) (15:02) had rivals Brett Strahan (4:09 1600m runner), the TO crowd, and upstart Adalberto Sanchez (Capistrano Valley, Mission Viejo) who raced 15:08 in qualifying the previous week. In a tremendous race Hernandez and Sanchez battled the entire way, with a duel down the "air-strip" homestretch ending with Hernandez the winner by a bare two yards at 14:54-14:55, times that broke into the Section all-time top ten senior listing.

On the Girls side, one of the sport's amazing stories continued here. Elaine Canchola, a frosh at Nordhoff (Ojai) had started the season with respectable times near 21 minutes. As the season went along she seemed to drop about 30 seconds each time out, racing a fine 19:00 at the Mt. SAC Invitational here, then improving to mid-18:00's in the Ventura County Meet. In the Prelims she blasted a 17:53 here, the #4 sec-tion frosh time ever! The Finals would be a heck of a race, with Heather Garritson (Buena Park), winner of the Mt. SAC Div III Sweeps at 17:49 (#3 area and #4 all-time frosh from anywhere on course), and defending Div III State champ Annie Ebiner (St. Lucy's, Glendora) not giving up without a fight. The amazing Canchola continued her steady improvement this morning, purring over the three mile course with a determined, powerful form that had her win comfortably at 17:35 to Garritson and Ebiner's 18:04's. The 17:35 is only a Mt. SAC frosh course record, breaking the 17:37 by Deena Drossin (Agoura), who had done a heck of a lot of running before her high school career. Canchola is simply the most improved athlete over the length of one season in area history! As a matter of fact, Coach Ken Reeves probably took both Ranger teams farther than any Coach in area history over the length of one season. # STATE HIGH SCHOOL CROSS-COUNTRY MEET

In that our sport is the only at the State Championship team level with four divisions, while Basketball and Volleyball have five, it would be nice to include more deserving Cross-Country teams in the State Championship affair. The Fresno group that has run the meet the past few years has indicated that a few more teams would cause no problems with enough room on the course, and there are teams that could legitimately compete for the three team plaques awarded in a division that are not allowed in the meet from some sections. It would be nice to include them under the guidelines discussed below.

#### TEXT OF PROPOSAL:

In that a small group of High School Cross-Country teams who could be competitive for one of the three team awards at the State Cross-Country Meet are not able to advance from their Section Finals competition, it is recommended that there be a small number of "at-large" team entries allowed from Section Finals to the State Cross-Country Meet in Fresno.

The decision as to who these squads will be would be based upon the following:

- 1) High ranking in a division during the competitive season (State rankings turned out by State Office 10/15, 11/1, and 11/15 of each season).
- 2) After an exceptional performance in Section Finals which had such teams one place from moving on to the state meet, consideration by a panel of repre-

sentatives (from all areas of the state) via phone conference Sunday morning following the last Section Championship. "At-Large" invitations could be extended to schools chosen by this group. Guiding philosphy in these "at-large" entries would be the ability for a team to be competitive for one of the three State Championship Team plaques awarded at the State Meet.

As you can see from the examples below, all areas of the state would be helped by such a proposal.

The 1994 World Junior Championships in Lisbon, Portugal was a spectacular one for the Junior National team, with the U.S. almost doubling the medal (gold-silver-bronze) count of any other nation with a total of seventeen first, second, or third place awards. Preps who brought home medals were from Pennsylvania, Tennessee, California, Texas, Louisiana, Georgia, Colorado, South Carolina, Virginia, and New York, showing the geographically diverse nature of the U.S. Championships and participation from across the country.

A number of National High School Records have been set in recent years in the USA Track & Field Junior National Championships or by members of the U.S. Junior National team chosen from that competition during summer international meets. Seven of the top ten on the Boys side in voting for 1994 US Prep Male Athlete of the Year, and nine of the top ten on the Girls side for that honor were all participants in the U.S. Junior National Championships during their prep careers. Many of these athletes were members of the U.S. Junior National team in summer meets, picking up invaluable international experience. The presence at the U.S. Junior Nationals of these top male and female stars shows the importance of that competition in the seasonal plan of top prep athletes. # **Shot Put and Discus** Workouts Through the Season

By TONY CIARELLI Newport Harbor High School, Newport Beach, CA

THE SHOT PUT AND DISCUS both take an enormous amount of time to perfect. The philosophy at Newport Harbor is to start slow and early. We begin our season in January with a program that takes us to the state finals in June. We feel you must have high expectations for the season ahead and set your goals according-

The formula for distance is technique plus strength and speed. We work on all three all year round, putting emphasis on two of these disciplines at a time, depending on the time of the year.

#### **▼ EARLY SEASON**

In the early season, although we throw, we focus on speed and strength. Speedwork includes running sprints, footwork drills (such as dot drills), stadiums, box jumps, jumping rope and medicine ball throws, along with a certain amount of technique work. We feel our strength program is second-to-none. We use the Olympic lifts as the basis of our strength development. The Olympic lifts apply directly to the throws because of the speed, power and technique involved in performing them. Along with the snatch and

clean-and-jerk, we do the front squat, back squat, bench and overhead press as our base workout. The time factor is a problem, but to throw far it is unavoida-

Our early season timetable is about 30 minutes of throwing and technique work, 1 hour of plyometrics and about 2 to 3 hours of lifting. An example of our early season workout would consist of plyometrics, 20 stadiums, 10 sets of dot drills. In the throwing part of our workout, we use a 15 pound medicine ball for trunk rotations and overhead throws. with sets of 15. The lifting portion of our workout might consist of:

Power snatch + overhead

(65%x4+4, 70%x4+4, 75%x3+4) 3

Power clean + front squat

(70%x4+2, 75%x4+2, 80%x3+1) 2

Front squat - 1 set of box jumps between each set

(75%x%, 80%x5) 3

Push Press - 1 set of 10 seated medicine ball pops between each set

(50%x5, 55%x5, 60%x5) 3

Hyperextensions


4x15 plus Russian twist with dowel

Roman chair sit-ups

4x15 plus Russian twist

#### MID-SEASON

During mid-season workouts, we tend to push the technique and strength, with

less emphasis on running and plyometrics. We throw with mostly lightweight shots to work on speed and technique. We will attempt to correct any leftover errors in our technique at this time to get ready for the championship part of the season. Throwing over a fence to work on height, throwing with no reverse to get better use of the legs, or working on extension are examples of drills that can help us throw farther. We throw the discus into nets to focus on our technique and not distances. We also throw the discus with no reverse. We throw a rubber discus over our football stadium to work on lift. We throw a lighter girl's discus to work on speed and we will also throw blindfolded to get a feel for the movement.

Our timetable for mid-season is 1 1/ 2 hour of throwing, 20 to 30 minutes of plyometrics and 2 to 3 hours of lifting. The plyometric portion of the workout includes 30 yard sprints,

depth jumps with sets of 10, and medicine ball throws using the 10 pound medicine balls. An example of our lifting program is:

Snatch

(75%x4, 80%x3, 85%x3) 2

Clean + jerk

(75%x3+2, 80%x2+1,

#### ▼ CHAMPIONSHIP SEASON

During the championship part of the season, we increase the intensity and lower the volume of the throwing and lifting. On ploys, we try to emphasize quick explosive hand and foot movements. We try to shorten our entire workout to 2 to 3 hours. We throw light and regulation shots usually in a sequence, such as 2 throws with the 10 pound shot, 2 throws with the 11 pound shot, and 3

throws with the 12 pound shot, repeating this sequence 4 to 6 times. We will also have inter-squad competition with handicaps in shot weight. This is so all throwers throw about the same distance to see who can overcome under pressure and prepare ourselves for the tough competitions coming up. We do the same in the discus.

During the championship part of the season, the plyometrics we might do would include 5 sets of 5 box jumps and throws using the 8 pound medicine ball for sets of 6. The lifting during this time is cut to one or two lifts a day at 85-90%+ for 1-2 sets of 12-15 reps. Our lifting program for this part of the season might be as follows:

Monday - Front squat

(90%x2, 95%x1,

100%+x1) 3

Tuesday - Bench

(90%x2, 95%x2, 100%+x1) 3

Wednesday - Clean + jerk

(85%x2+1, 90%x1+1, 95%x1+1) 3

Thursday - Snatch

(85%x3, 90%x2, 95%x1) 3

Friday - Rest

This is a general overview of the track season at Newport Harbor. Of course, I adjust the workouts for any individual needs. I work the athletes very hard psychologically to prepare them for championship performances. This is a must in order to become champions. I hope this can help you in your season to become champions yourselves.
