NOTED WITH INTEREST

ALEX HENDERSON, the 8:47.9 two-miler at Arizona State, first tried the high jump in his native Australia, but soon gave it up. In his first mile race he collapsed short of the finish and had to be carried off the track. His first clocking was 5:40. "I was dumped down to a class E club rating, and that's as low as you can get. My father was disappointed that I had forsaken soccer for track." But seven years of hard work have paid off. In Australia he trained under Percy Cerutti, cut his time to 4:11, and was persuaded to go to Arizona State by Aussie sprinter Dennis Devallance. He runs about 20 miles per day, rain or shine, and considers running in mud and sand good conditioning for the ankles and legs. He'll often run barefooted in the mud, or slosh through water in the shallow end of a swimming pool. Alex usually works out twice a day, once in the early morning, and then again in the afternoon or evening. He got a big thrill out of breaking Gunder Hagg's Coliseum two-mile record, for Hagg is his idol. He thinks he can break the world two-mile mark. But the big ambition is to join the overcrowded Four Minute Mile Club. Alex admits to being 27, is listed at 25.

Tom Whetstine, the 6'10" Arizona State jumper, stands only 5'10", was only the third high jumper on his high school (Washington, Los Angeles) team, behind Dick Sinclair, 6'6 $\frac{1}{8}$ " and Ernie Shelton, 6'5 $\frac{1}{8}$ "...Carol Lindroos of Finland, who threw the discus 174' last year, has transferred from Vermont to Arizona State, where he has hit 179'9" in practice...Whetstine missed 7'1 $\frac{1}{2}$ " very narrowly the day he cleared 6'10"...an annual New York v. Philadelphia meet is planned, with the first set for May 25 in N.Y...the Scandinavia v. So. California meet is on, will be announced soon...

When John A. Kelley finished 9th in the Boston marathon it was his 20th time in the first 10, out of 28 races. He has run 1019 road races...winner Franjo Mihalic is 5'7", 124, plans to marry a Yugoslavia javelin thrower...Mihalic rates the original marathon course in Athens the toughest course he ever ran, with Melbourne next and Boston third. He comes from a family of 12, of whom 10 were killed during the war...entering his 14th Boston race was one armed Gardner Spooner, 70...Doug C. Klann, 45 year old Glendale, Calif., brick contractor, spent \$350 to run, said it was the best money he ever spent. "If you're not having fun at 40, when do you start?"...

Asphalt and rubber tracks are catching on. Teachers College of Conn. is putting in one next year. Eastern coaches have agreed it is the track of the future...such a track costs \$6000 (with virtually no maintenance costs), while cinder tracks run several times that, and up...fastest 880 at the Penn Relays was by Tom Murphy, 1:49.4...Ira Davis, who amazed with his 46.9 quarter, tipped the future when he ran 47.2 and 46.9 legs at Penn...Ira Murchison says he had never given a thought to track until some giggling girls grabbed his textbooks in his senior high school year. "I chased them and the track coach saw me running and asked me to try out for the team". Ira uses 8 pair of track shoes a year, and receives about 20 fan letters a week...George Eastment is one who believes 10 teams should not be allowed to run in a mile relay. He reports six of the 10 teams at Penn suffered from spikings...

The British Columbia Centennial Games at Vancouver, June 6, has lined up milers Derek Ibbotson, if he is in shape; Stefan Lewandowski of Poland; Merv Lincoln and Alex Henderson of Australia; Norman Lloyd; Jim Grelle and Don Larson. Meanwhile, in Compton, Herb Elliott will be meeting Ron Delany...it was windy at the Big Springs, Tex., meet and the University of Texas runners wore oldtime aviator goggles to keep the sand out of their eyes...miler Maynard Orme ran a 220 leg on California's record breaking sprint medley relay team at the Texas Relays and was so excited afterwards he hardly slept all night. His only previous 220 was five years before in high school...Ernie Shelby says if he could enter only one event per meet it would not be the broad jump, but the low hurdles...Mt. San Antonio College, Pomona, Calif., has scheduled the first annual relay meet for his great new track, will hold it on the same weekend as Penn and Drake Relays...Jim Brewer, who made 15' with the new glass pole, has switched to the Gill Vaultmaster used by Richards and Gutowski...

Dick Hollis, the Occidental 237'5" thrower, was a 10.2, 22.1 sprinter in high school, stands only 5'9", weighs 162. He credits a weight-training program for his development...Ira Murchison says he ran 5.8 for 60 yards twice in training last winter, in handicap races against his teammates...Ted Wheeler was married Feb. 8, had an understanding with his wife that he wouldn't run any more. But when she noticed he was restless in late afternoons she suggested he start training again...Bruce Parker, the Texas javelin ace, says he has improved because he cut down on his last step and can keep better control of his body...He thinks he can hit 240' this year, but says nobody can beat John Fromm. "He is amazing. Doesn't use his body in the throw. It's all arm. And still he almost throws it out of the stadium..."

Mike Herman, who has jumped 25'8 $\frac{3}{4}$ ", doesn't leap for distance in practice. He sets up a high jump crossbar, four feet above the ground, and 10 feet from the take-off, and concentrates on clearing it...Paul Keller, noted Midwest starter, started 49 races in the Ohio Wesleyan Relays, April 26. The interval between get set and gun was timed 47 times: 2.1 seconds, 5 times; 2.0, 29 times; 1.9, 5 times; 1.8, 8 times; There were three false starts and one recall, most races were staggered, and it was a two class high school meet. The average interval was 1.96 seconds...by taking the winning marks from Texas, Kansas, Drake and Penn Relays, and scoring them as a quadrangular meet, Texas would score 52 points, Kansas 51 $\frac{1}{3}$, Penn 40 $\frac{5}{6}$ and Drake 51 $\frac{5}{6}$...Max Truex wasn't pleased with his personal record 8:50.7 at the Coliseum Relays, says he might go after a fast one Saturday...
