WIND SPRINTS

Jolanda Balas of Romania broke womens high jump record with 1.78 (5'10 $\frac{1}{8}$) on June 7 at Bucharest... in comparing Dallas Long with Parry O'Brien it is interesting to note that O'Brien did 47'11 $\frac{3}{4}$ " at 17; 53'10 $\frac{1}{2}$ " at 18; 55'9 $\frac{1}{4}$ " at 19; 57'4 $\frac{3}{8}$ " at 20; 59'2 $\frac{1}{4}$ " at 21; and 60'10" at 22. Long, of course, did 61'1 $\frac{1}{2}$ " at 17. He was 18 on June 13... Lee Calhoun has returned to North Carolina college to begin work on his Masters degree in Health and Physical Education. Coach L. T. Walker reports he ran 14.3 in practice and predicts that Calhoun will be better than ever... captain-elect of the Michigan State team is Fordy Kennedy, succeeding Dave Lean. Kennedy, 22, from Scotland and Canada, will also captain the cross country team... Dave Settele, Boston U. low hurdler, is the highest scorer in the school's history, tallying 170 points in his career... next year's captain at California will be Monte Upshaw, one time broad jump champ turned hurdler, and a recent bridegroom... Jesse Nixon of Wisconsin is the father of two boys... he will captain the track team next year, the third Negro captain in any sport in Wisconsin history... Larry Cafarella of Boston U. is a fine artist...

Joel Wiley, Los Angeles state broad jumper, is only 5'6"... Kansas' Kent Floerke is a Phi Beta Kappa... Marquette vaulter Ed Hoyle won the intramural lightheavyweight boxing title... David Lean of Michigan State, via Tasmania, Australia, won the Brewer Award, highest honor for leadership a senior can win at MS... Mike Page of SC was 21 on the day of the NCAA trials and celebrated by qualifying in the javelin... NCAA champ Don Stewart had a high school best of 6'2 $\frac{1}{2}$ ", but jumped 6'8 $\frac{3}{4}$ " in his first freshman meet... Leamon King, who flunked out of Cal last winter, is married and working in his home town of Delano... miler Fred Dwyer's wife was secretary to distance ace Horace Ashenfelter in the Newark FBI office when Fred met her... Wilbur Ross of Winston-Salem says Dave Sime would score over 8000 points if he would concentrate on the decathlon, and that he could break the pentathlon record easily... Winston-Salem, with Gilbert and Washington back, plus Joseph Middleton (14.4) and Carl Brown (22.8), is eyeing the world shuttle hurdle relay record next year... talk of Texas track is the successful recruiting of Texas Christian U., landing sprinters Bert Coan, Sidney Garton, JimBob Thomas, and others... HUBERT HOUBEN (Germany) 68 points

Hubert Houben of Germany, a contemporary of Paddock and Loren Murchison, was perhaps the first of the outstanding German sprinters. Houben began winning German titles in 1921 and was an Olympic Games competitor in 1928. He scored two victories over Paddock and suffered five defeats from the same man during Paddock's occasional jaunts overseas. Had Germany been allowed to compete in the 1924 Olympics, Houben would have been right in there with a chance to win as he was national champion that year and was considered the worlds best 100 meters man in 1923 and 1925. Paddock told the author Houben was the best campaigner and toughest to beat he met in Europe.

HOWARD P. DREW (USA) 70 points

Howard P. Drew was probably the greatest of the early sprinters with the exception of Ralph C. Craig, the Michigan runner who won two gold medals at the Stockholm Olympics of 1912. Drew reached the final of the 1912 Olympic 100m and, though only a high school boy at the time, would have been the favorite to win had he not pulled a muscle shortly before the race and was forced to withdraw. Drew was the first great sprinter to come under the wing of Dean Cromwell, the famed Southern California coach, though Cromwell has always disclaimed any credit for developing the first great Negro sprinter in track and field history.

MANFRED GERMAR (Germany) 73 Points

Undefeated in either the 100 or 200 meters in 1927 after having placed 5th in the Olympic 100 meters at Melbourne, Manfred Germar is still in the process of compiling a record that promises to place him high on a pedestal as the finest sprinter ever developed on the European continent. He is in the very front rank of non-American sprinters at either distance or in combination of the two.

Germar was a potential finalist in the Olympic 200 meters but was injured in the first heat and withdrew. A few months after this he was winning both dashes at the 1957 World University Games in Paris. His speed accomplishments include 9.5 for 100 yards, 10.2 for 100 meters and 20.6 for 200 meters around a turn. Germar's log as presented here is through 1957 and will be updated later. We expect his total to go up, too, possibly way up.
