28 of 30 countries eligible for the European Championships have entered 808 athletes (595 men, 213 women) (and 240 officials). Russia has a maximum team of 48 men and 32 women and 20 officials, as does Germany (East-West combined)... Albania and Lichtenstein are the only countries without entries... Steve von Devan, the German expert, dopes the USA vs. USSR meet at 128 to 106 for the U.S.... using only the standard collegiate events, with 3 men to a side, the US would be doped 89 to 42... Don Bowden, in a letter to Bert Nelson, signs "4:02.9 NP (no place)" after his Bakersfield AAU mile... Don says he is looking forward to a few fast miles and 800s in Europe... Southern California track writers named Rink Babka athlete of the year; Rafer Johnson most valuable; and Dave Davis most improved... Oxy coach Chuck Coker says quarter-miler stepped on a rock in the stretch of the NCAA and lost his sprint... coaches Leo Johnson (Illinois 1938-58) and Jack Rourke (Colgate, 1912-57) and six athletes were named to Helms Hall of Fame--Loren Murchison (sprints, 1920s); Don Lash (two-mile world record breaker, 1930s); Tom Conneff (world record one mile, 4:15.6, 1895); Dave Albritton (AAU HJ champ 7 times, 1936 to 1950); G.R. **THE GREATEST SPRINTERS --10**

**E. McDONALD BAILEY (Trinidad & Great Britain) 86 Points**

Born in Trinidad, educated in England and representative of Great Britain in the 1948 and 1952 Olympic Games, Emanuel McDonald Bailey is outranked (through 1957) only by Lloyd La Beach of Panama and possibly Manfred Germar of Germany among the non-USA sprinters of the world. Bailey's greatest bid for enduring fame was at Helsinki in 1952 when his third place finish in the Olympic 100 meters was within inches of Lindy Remigino and Herb McKenley. Bailey was then 32 years of age, yet had he been in the brilliant form he displayed in 1951 at 31 he well might have won a gold medal.

**BERNIE WEFERS, SR. (USA) 88 Points**

No victory points are given or defeat penalties assessed for Bernie Wefers, Sr., because of insufficient data on the races he ran and the ability of the men he defeated. Wefers, for 41 years coach of the New York AC teams, must have been a man who would rank with the very top men in the world were he in his prime. He produced a son, Bernie Jr., who was one of the best of the 1920-1 era. Wefers Sr. was actually the first man to run 100 yards in 9 2/4 seconds, which he did in the last 90s, more than 30 years before Frank Wykoff first did it officially. But an AAU official who was referee of the meet scoffed at it, contended it was impossible for a human being to run that fast, and arbitrarily threw out all five watches. But 100 yards has been run in 9.4 so often in recent years that who is there today to say it was not possible for Wefers to have done it before the turn of the century? Though he never competed in the Olympic Games, Wefers' record of championships won indicates he was a man of 9.4 calibre long before his time.

RALPH C. CRAIG (USA)

74 Points

Ralph C. Craig of the University of Michigan went on from three IC4A sprint titles to become the second of the six men who up to and through the 1956 Olympic Games have scored an Olympic double. Other winners of both the 100 and 200 meters at the same Olympiad were Archie Hahn (1904), Percy Williams (1928), Eddie Tolan (1932), Jesse Owens (1936) and Bobby Morrow (1956). Craig's 100m time at Stockholm, 10.8, shared the Olympic record until Harold Abrahams cut it down to 10.6 in 1924. Especially noteworthy were his Olympic triumphs over Donald F. Lippincott, Charles Reidpath and Alvah Meyer of the U.S., George Patching of South Africa and William Applegarth of G.B. He was beaten here by Howard Drew.

HELMUT KOERNIG (Germany)

78 Points

Helmut Koernig was one of the three greatest German sprinters until the advent of Heinz Futterer and Manfred Germar, the others being Hubert Houben and Arthur Jonath. Houben completed his career with 68 points and Jonath with 51. These figures testify that Koernig was a real power in an athletic nation which over a period of years has possibly turned out more capable sprinters of world class than any other than the United States.

Koernig conquered both Paddock and Loren Murchison. It was he and Percy Williams who eliminated the favored Charley Borah in a heat of the 200 meters in 1928, a trail in which only two men were to qualify. Koernig compiled an impressive record in Europe but was never quite at his best in an Olympic year. He did, however, tie Jackson V. Scholz, the 1924 champion, for third place in 1928.
