EDITORIAL

Forging Ahead

Track has fallen on hard times in this country. It doesn't take a genius to note the dwindling number of programs, participants, sponsors, meets, and media coverage. The problems with track and the reasons why have been bantered around many circles, including the pages of *California Track News*. We don't want to dwell on the negative any longer than to point it out, figure it out and do something positive to help. We've pointed it out in past issues and writers like Bob Womack, Bob Fraley and Red Estes have tried to figure it out. Now, what's being done?

Some people have not settled for the lowered status quo, and have tried to implement ideas that could "bring track back." People like Dennis McClanahan's forging out the California Coaches Alliance, or Al Hernandez forming the USA Track & Field HS Coaches Association. Or Don Strametz pushing for a California/Nevada Track Coaches Association

Since it seems college track has been hit the hardest, the college coaches have had to come up with new ideas fast. The California/Nevada Track Coaches Association has already hosted a Cal/Nev. Cross Country Championship this fall (you'll have to wait for next issue for results) and they will be doing the same in track. Coming up in December look for the USATF West Regional Cross Country Championships.

Scheduled for November 13 at Mt. San Antonio College in Walnut, the First Annual USATF West Regional Cross Country Championships show real promise. According to Skip Stolley of Nike Track West, "The Championships are being conducted by Nike Track West in cooperation with Mount San Antonio College to promote the great sport of colle-

giate and club cross country to hundreds of high school teams and thousands of high school runners." The men's and women's USATF Championship races will be centerpiece attractions in the midst of the 1993 CIF Prelims at 11:30 and 11:45 respectively. Both races will be contested on the challenging Mt. SAC 3-mile course that so many collegiate and open runners competed on during their high school careers.

According to Stolley, "This is an opportunity for cross country teams to compete in front of thousands of spectators and for runners to return to the infamous 'Breakneck Hill,' 'The Switchbacks,' 'Reservoir Hill,' and 'Poop-Out Hill' to improve on their best high school performances on the Mt. SAC course ... while 2600 high school athletes representing 384 high school teams from across Southern California compare times."

This should be the largest assemblage of high school, collegiate and club cross country teams ever brought together in the Western States. We hope coaches and athletes will support this landmark collaboration between USA Track & Field, the CIF and the NCAA to promote collegiate/club cross country. Check the schedule in this issue for more information.

P.S. The cover date represents a slight change in the usual format. You are holding the "double" issue we usually name November/December -- this time, October/November. The December 1993 issue will be available soon.

There's No "J" in Cross Country

It's hard to describe to non-runners what cross country is all about. For some people, it's not even worth trying.

At least once a month, I find myself in this situation. That's when all of the coaches in our athletic department get together to hold monthly meetings of the school's 'coaching committee." These meetings are designed to bring together all of the coaches at Central Pennsylvania Business School to discuss fund-raising, coaching philosophies, conference matters and other various topics related to our department. As head coach for the men's and women's cross country teams, I attend to keep myself up-to-date on all issues concerning our two-year, intercollegiate, athletic program.

Unfortunately, there's always that one person in the meeting who says "What's there to coach a cross country runner?" or "How's cross country a team sport?". Sometimes it's the basketball coach or his assistant who blurts this out. Other times the golf coach spits it out, and occasionally the softball or volleyball coach...

Jokingly, or not, they, like many nonrunners, tend to loook at cross country as a "non-team" sport that unskilled

people participate in.

Sure, cross country coaches across the country do not need to teach an athlete to hit the open "J" or to dish out for an assist like a basketball coach does. And, cross country does not prepare harriers to serve, slide or putt. We don't even train athletes to work with round objects designed to be propelled through the air in some fashion.

I can understand why some people make such ridiculous statements that tend to degrade the sport of cross country...after all, it is a sport and not just a game. These people who make uneducated statements about how to train runners obviously don't see the big picture. They only see a group of athletes running through a field, or in the


woods or down the street.

Mechanically, runners need to know how to properly run up and down hills, into turns, and across straight paths. Runners have to understand when to open up a stride and when to shorten it. They need to learn how to run forward and not up-and-down. And let's not forget about pace. There's even an art in passing an opponent.

Coachiing gets even more involved than what's seen be spectators watching a race.

When preparing a workout schedule, cross country coaches have to know when to run LSD and when it's time for speed. Stretching, weight training, pool workouts, and even rest and diet habits have to be comprehended.

Quite possibly, the single-most important part of

coaching runners is understanding what makes that person tick.

Cross Country runners do not catch the winning touchdown pass on national television. Cross country runners do not hit the game-winning homerun which will be in the front page of every sports section in newspapers across the country. And cross country runners rarely gety paid to endorse sodas or fast food restaurants. I've never seen a television advertisement of a distance runner saying "I'm going to Disneyland" after winning the big race. There's really not a solid professional athletic career for runners like there is for baseball, football, and basketball players.

In a sport where there are no multimillion dollar contracts and very little publicity, all coaches need to know is how to keep an athlete motivated. It's essential for coaches to coach the mind as much as, if not more than, the body.

Over the long and lonely roads that distance runners run, mental preparation is very important. Runners should get that self-satisfaction that comes with running. In addition, cross country coaches have to train athletes to enjoy running in all types of reasonable weather conditions and over all types of courses. We don't have the luxury of training and competing at indoor facilities that are often quite similar, no matter where you go.

But, there is one other thing that cross country coaches need to do and it's one of the toughest part of the job (possibly it's the key for a coach to have a successful season) -- to get runners to run as a team.

It's one of those things that good coaches understand and, amongst ourselves, we talk about it. But, it is quite difficult to explain to non-runners-almost like a secret formula.

Today, when another coach in our department asks me one of those stupid questions, I tell them it's a secret formula that only runners and cross country coaches would understand. Then I give them a shot at feleing what a runner feels like by asking them if they'd like to go out for a nice 5-miler after the meeting. So far, no other coach as joined me.

Before beginning this year's cross country season, it would be appropriate to make a few closing comments on last track season. While the State High School Track Championships did take place after all, it's delay did cause some major casualties. Jason Madearis of Hart, who was one of the top qualifiers in the high hurdles, had to scratch from the finals because he was injured in a summer football passing league. Also, Isaac Tumer of Burbank, who was considered one of the top 3 in the 800, had to withdraw in favor of a class graduation activity in Hawaii, for which his family had committed a large non-refundable sum of money. For these two athletes, and a number of others of whom I am not aware, justice delayed turned out to be justice denied.

Southern California has long been referred to as the track and field capital of the world. And, the results of the recent World Track & Field Championships give ample statistical validity to that reference. As it turned out, no less than 5 individual gold medals were won by UCLA alumni. This was more than any country in the world other than the U.S. and equaled the individual total of the rest of the U.S. team.

Getting back to cross country, the Cal State Fullerton Invitational officially opened cross country season in SoCal with the Utah State men serving notice to the rest of the Big West that they are the team to beat. The Aggies showed some impressive front line strength enroute to a 1-3-4 finish and a 31-67 margin over runner-up UCSB. The Cal State Los Angeles women also served notice that they will challenge CPSLO for the CCAA title with a 55-69 win ahead of a good Fresno State team.

Elsewhere, at the Whittier Invitational, the Azusa Pacific men and the Claremont-Mudd women gave notice that they are the teams to beat in their respective conferences with comfortable victories.

The community colleges got their season off to a start at the San Diego Mesa Invitational which, for some reason, has declared a non-scoring format. In any case, both the men and women's teams from Glendale looked surprisingly strong, although most of the schools there were without their best team.

For those prep fans who are trying to figure out who will be the State team champion, your answer may have been at the Buena Invitational where Thousand Oaks High posted a comfortable 1 minute-15 second victory over powerhouse Hart High in the boy's competition. That time spread was about the same in the girl's race with Peninsula High outdistancing a good Hart team.

At the Cal Poly Pomona Invitational, boys' teams from Diamond Bar, Katella, LA Puente and Servite were divisional winners as were girls' representing Chino, Corona, St. Lucy's and Temescal Canyon.

The Aztec Invitational took the spotlight in SoCal cross country last week with the Stanford men edging the Marathon Club Team and UCLA 62-70-71 in a 5-mile race. On the distaff side, the Arkansas Razorbacks defeated the entire rest of the field put together with a 27 point total. Stanford with 69 points was second. A big individual surprise here was UCLA's Karen Hecox, who came in second ahead of such big names as Deena Drossin, who was 4th.

In the lower Aztec divisional race, the Pt. Loma men defeated the rest of the field with 27 points. Grand Canyon College with 82 was second. In the women's race, UC San Diego with 102 points edged out Westmont with 107.

At the Midwest Invitational at Kenosha,

Wisconsin, the Azusa Pacific men took 4th with an 85 point total versus 50 for first place Ohio U.

At the community college level, the men and women from Mt. SAC scored easy victories at the Santa Monica Invitational by scores of 16-107 and 24-43 over Canyons and Santa Monica respectively.

Down at the Orange Empire Conference, the Rancho Santiago men pulled a major upset at the conference invitational by shocking state favorite Riverside 43-44. In the women's race, Irvine Valley looked like they may be a contender again as they eased by Orange Coast 46-53.

Further south at the Mira Costa Invitational, a good El Camino men's team just did manage to outrun an up-and-coming Cuyamaca seven by a 57-62 count. The San Diego Mesa women continue to look tough as they breezed past runner-up Long Beach 51-83.

A limited high school menu saw the Rosemead Invitational as the only show in town. At that one, the boys and girls from San Marino High scored lopsided victories over runner-ups San Gabriel and South Pasadena by margins of 4:08 and 3:14 respectively.

BOOK REVIEW

Queen of the Track: The Liz McColgan Story By Adrianne Blue (H.F. & G. Witherby Ltd., 1992, \$30)

One of the most interesting new discoveries this fall is British sports writer Adrianne Blue's Queen of the Track: The Liz McColgan Story. While it is unusual to write a biography of a star while she is still setting records, Blue provides a creditable explanation of this enigmatic athletic.


To depict the champion's surroundings and training, the author effectively uses Scottish phrasing and cadence. She describes a hill session after school with Harry Bennett, McColgan's first coach and prime impetus behind her early career. "Dundee having quite long steep braes, ... Liz would run a circuit where Harry had somehow arranged it so that every hill went upwards. When Liz felt herself begining to flag, Harry, perched on top of the hill, would shout down to her, 'Come on lassie. You can do it. Rely on your superior strength."

Liz Lynch knew she was strong and from an early age realized the importance of running in her life. "That's been my life since I was 11. I've always needed to run and other things must not interfere. I'm very headstrong and if I want to do something, I go out and do it." She

has, setting world records and winning racesbut also losing a fair share. Two coaches have been pivotal: Harry Bennett and John Anderson. Although she spent some time at college track in Idaho and Alabama, only these two influenced her training. Bennett recognized her talent and Anderson introduced her to speed work. Since 1990, her husband Peter has been her coach, and the future will judge that arrangement. In the 10,000 meters, she won the 1991 World Championships but lost in the Barcelona Olympics.


In any story of a sports personality, the right mix of race times and dates versus personal glimpses can be hard to achiveve. Blue shares many insider stories and feelings, but oddly as told to her by friends other than Liz. While she quotes her a few times, this definitely is not Liz telling her own story, but the writer's view of McColgan. Still, you finish the book feeling more comfortable with this provocative star, and pleased another title about a female athlete will be added to that small section of sports literature.

holder off her 10.28 in the qualifying round. The 200 features Marion as the record-holder for ages 14, 15, & 16. In fact, her 22.76 as a 10th grader is faaster than Chandra's 22.77 at altitude. Our next step is the category of class records. Jones holds the 10th & 12th grade 100-meter records. Of course. Cheeseborough is the 12th grade record holder. A true test of a

sprinter is the ability to carry speed over a distance. Marion ran 52.91 as a 10th grader. Chandra is not on the all-time 400-meter list.

■ How did Katy McCandless make the World Championship Team?

Katy McCandless (Castilleja High School, Palo Alto 1988), who graduated from Princeton and now works in London, England, finished only tenth in the national championship 3,000 meters in 9:10.11, yet she ended up representing the U.S. at Stuttgart.

Every nation can enter one athlete if she has made the "B" standard. To enter two or three, all must make the tougher "A" mark.

The qualifying standards (must be made outdoors between January 1, 1992 and August 4, 1993):

A=8:56.0, B=9:10.0. Annette Peters (Nike W) won the USAT&F in 8:48.59. Shelly Steely (Mizuno)

placed second in 8:52.99, Sheila Carrozza (R TX) was third in 8:55.03, and Gina Procaccio

(SM) was fourth in 8:56.80. The top three finishers made the "A" standard. Procaccio had a best of 8:54.45 as of June 11, so she also had made the "A" standard.

McCandless placed fifth in 8:56.00 in the Weltklasse Meet at Cologne, Germany on August 1, just three days before the deadline. Her time just equaled the "A" standard.

Men

100: Ato Boldon (Trinidad and Tobago, Piedmont Hills High School, San Jose 1991) placed third in heat 1 in 10.51 (wind -0.6) on August 14. Boldon placed a non-qualifying seventh in quarter final four in 10.48 (-0.1) on August 14.

200: Mike Marsh (Hawthorne High School 1985), the 1992 Olympic champion, won heat nine on August 17 in 20.77 (-1.2). Marsh won quarter final four on August 19 in 20.40 (-1.0), the fifth fastest time.

Marsh won semifinal one on August 19 in 20.10 (0.6), the leading time and placed fourth in the final in 20.18 (0.3) on August 20.

400: Quincy Watts (Taft High School, Woodland Hills 1988), the 1992 Olympic champion, placed second in heat four in 45.94 on August 14. Watts won quarter final one on August 15 in 45.07, the sixth best time. Watts won semifinal one in 44.63 (21.8/22.8) on August 16. He posted the fourth best time.

Watts placed fourth in the final in 45.05 (11.45, 10.40 [21.85], 10.97 [32.82], 12.23) (21.85/23.20) on August 17. After the race, Watts took off his shoes and stalked off.

"What happened?" he was asked. He held up his shoe.

"That's the answer," he said, and kept walking. The heel of Watt's shoe had come loose. Watts wears a shoe made by Nike.

800: Johnny Gray (Crenshaw High School, Los Angeles 1978), the 1992 Olympic bronze medalist, placed second in heat one on August 14 in 1:46.28, the third fastest time. Gray finished eighth and last in semifinal two (1:50.89) on August 15, then claimed he was cut off and pushed by Britain's Curtis Robb.

"I was cut off deliberately, I feel," said Gray on television. "I was deliberately cut off. My whole race was just messed up. I'm not trying to make excuses, but I don't like the way it happened. I had position. They shouldn't have a right to cut over on me like that."

"Did you lose your composure after that?" asked the TV interviewer.

"Everything," said Gray. "They cut me right off; you're supposed to have a stride."

"Who cut you off?" asked the interviewer.

"I didn't look at the names," said Gray.
"I'm in a race I can't look only at such and such. I was cut off by a number of runners."

Afterward, the angry Gray confronted Robb in the mixed zone area and screamed at him, "If you cut in front of me, don't slow down." Later Gray was heard to shout, "This guy should have been disqualified."

After his race, Gray stormed off the track, screaming that if he had done what someone had done to him, he would have been disqualified.

The United States filed a protest. U.S. coaches claimed that Gray, the six-time national champion, and Mark Everett, this year's U.S. champion, were both interfered with during their races.

3,000 Steeplechase: Marc Davis (San Diego High School 1987) tumbled in the semifinals on August 19 after another runner bumped him while they were going over a hurdle. He leaped to his feet, resumed the race and finished fifth in 8:26.49. That was remarkable, but not good enough to qualify for the final.

Fortunately for Davis, the U.S. coaches did complain. After they had protested, the jury of appeals made room for Davis in the final. Davis placed 11th in the final in 8:28.74 on August 21.

5,000: Greg Whiteley (University High School, Irvine 1985) placed 11th in heat three on August 14 in 14:11.48.

Matt Giusto (San Mateo High School 1984) suffered an Achilles' tendon problem and decided not to compete.

"I picked it up right after the nationals," Giusto said to Keith Peters of the Palo Alto Weekly. "It put me out for a week. Then it took me three weeks just to get back to track workouts."

50KM Walk: Jonathan Matthews (North Hollywood High School 1974) placed 19th in 4:02:52 on August 21.

100 Hurdles: Mark Crear (Rowland High School, Rowland Heights 1987) placed second in heat four in 13.47 (0.4) on August 19, the fourth best time. Crear placed fourth in semifinal one in 13.38 (0.0) on August 19. He was the fastest non-qualifier ever. The first two finishers in each of the three semifinals plus two fastest times qualified for the final.

400 Hurdles: Kevin Young, the Olympic champion and world record-holder (46.78), won his first-round heat six easily in 49.15 on August 16. Defending world champion Samuel Metete of Zambia posted the best first-round time of 48.49. Young won semifinal three in 47.99 on August 17.

Young won the final in 47.18 on August 19. It was his second straight world title. It was the fastest time in the world this year. He had lost three of his four previous races. But here, he beat Samuel Matete of Zambia, the defender, by 3 meters, equaling the seventh fastest time ever. Then Young took off his shoes, and on a victory lap kept waving them to the crowd to make sure everyone saw the logo.

"I'm the big daddy in this house," said Young. "I took charge over the seventh (of 10) hurdle. I ran disciplined today, something I didn't do in my previous three races."

4 X 400: The U.S. team of Andrew Valmon 44.5, Quincy Watts (Taft High School, Woodland Hills 1988) 43.6, Butch Reynolds 43.23, and Michael Johnson 42.94 (the fastest split ever) set a world record of 2:54.29 in the final on August 22.

Pole Vault: Dean Starkey (Logan High School, Union City 1984) was a non-qualifier at 18-2 1/2 on August 17.

Long Jump: Mike Powell (Edgewood High School, West Covina 1981) said to Frank Litsky (*The New York Times*) on August 18: "I don't want to say what I hope to do because I don't want to give anybody pin-up material."

"I can't neglect some of the young jumpers," and he mentioned Ivan Pedroso of Cuba and Kareem Streete-Thompson of the Cayman Islands. "But if I jump well, I think it will be pretty difficult to beat me."

At 29, Powell is the world record-holder and Olympic champion. Since Carl Lewis beat him in the 1991 world championships, Powell has won 22 consecutive competi-

"I miss jumping against Carl," Powell said.
"Without him, some motivation is gone.
There's not as much of a show as there could be. But a world championship is a world

championship. I really hope he comes back to the long jump. The last time we competed, he beat me. I want to get back."

Powell qualified at 26-9 on August 19, the third best jump. Powell won his second consecutive world long jump title at 28 feet, 2 1/4 inches on August 20. After fouling on his first attempt, Powell produced the five longest jumps in the competition, capped by his winning effort on his final attempt. Powell's series: foul, 28-9 1/4, 27-2, 26-11 3/4, 27-8, 28-2 1/4.

Discus: Mike Gravelle (St. Ignatius, San Francisco 1983) placed 24th in the qualifying at 185-1 on August 16.

Women

100: Gail Devers (Sweetwater High School, National City 1984), the 1992 Olympic champion, won heat three in 11.16 (-0.2) on August 15, which was the best time in round one. Devers won quarter final four in 11.04 (0.7) on August 15, the third best time in the second round. Devers won semifinal two in 11.03 (-0.3) on August 16, the third best time in the semifinals.

"Devers is the favorite," said Jamaica's Merlene Ottey, the two-time World Championships bronze medalist who also advanced. Devers beat Ottey at the finish line in the final on August 16. The Jamaican team immediately filed a protest, claiming Ottey was the winner, but after reviewing the photo finish, officials upheld the result.

The decision left Ottey yet again without a gold medal in a major championship meet after more than a decade of top international competition.

"I thought I won the race," Ottey said. "I caught her in the last five meters."

Devers was timed in a championshiprecord 10.81 seconds, fastest in the world this year and her best ever. Ottey was timed in 10.82, with Gwen Torrence third in 10.89.

While IAAF spokeswoman Jayne Pearce said the result would stand, she added the times would be reviewed. Ottey believes she won because Devers patted her on the back after the race in an apparent victory gesture.

"What amazes me is how long it took to decide the result," Ottey said. "It took forever."

The race was so close that it took several minutes before the result was announced. When Devers was finally declared the winner, she embraced Ottey, hugged her coach Bob Kersee and ran a victory lap.

Kersee said it was obvious Devers won.

"She got her head down at the finish line.
It isn't surprising they're filing a protest.

There is a millimeter of difference at the finish line. If the head goes in," he said, "the torso rolls forward. Ottey kept her head up and forced her torso across the line."

The rules say that the runner whose torso reaches the finish line first is the winner. The torso is defined as the trunk of the body-everything except head, arms and legs.

The finish was similar to the 100 at last year's Barcelona Games when Devers was declared the winner-also by one-hundredth of a second--over Juliet Cuthbert, another Jamaican.

Devers and Ottey said the dispute was not personal. And they said it had nothing to do with the new \$28,000 Mercedes-Benz automobile that goes to each winner of an individual event here.

"I won," Ottey said. "Everyone knows I won. I don't care about the Mercedes. If they don't want to give away two Mercedes, they can give two gold medals."

Kersee sympathized with Ottey.

"If anybody in this sport deserves a gold medal, she does," he said.

Devers, who is from Palmdale, said she had no idea if she had won.

"I never know where I am in a race," she said. "When I cross the finish line, I wait for someone to say, 'Gail Devers, you won' or 'Gail Devers, you lost."

Devers, 26, struggled for two years with the effects of Graves' disease before reemerging on the international scene in 1991, when she set the American record in the 100meter high hurdles and finished second in that event in the World Championships in Tokyo. Officials reviewed the times of the final and listed both Devers and Ottey at 10.82 seconds. Originally, Devers was clocked at 10.81 and Ottey at 10.82. Devers became the first non-German ever to win a sprint title at the World Championships, now in its fourth edition.

3,000: Sheila Carrozza (Durham High School 1981), which is located near Chico, placed a non-qualifying eighth in heat three in 9:01.41 on August 14. Katharine McCandless (Castilleja High School, Palo Alto 1988) placed a non-qualifying 12th in heat one in 9:10.13 on August 14.

100 Hurdles: Gail Devers (Sweetwater High School, National City 1984) won heat five in 12.74 (-0.1) on August 19, the fastest time in the heats. Devers won semifinal one in 12.67 (-0.3) on August 19. Devers scaled the biggest hurdle of her career.

Devers, who missed a sprint-hurdles double at last year's Olympics when she stumbled over the final barrier while leading the 100 hurdles, had no mishaps this time and won in 12.46 (0.2) on August 20, breaking her American record of 12.48.

Devers, who only three years ago was hobbled by Graves' disease, a lifethreatening thyroid condition, won the 100 Monday night in 10.82, matching the championship record.

Only one other woman has won a sprinthurdles combination in a major championship --Fanny Blankers-Koen of the Netherlands won the 100 and 80 hurdles at the 1948 Olympics.

10-Kilometer Walk, Final: Sara Standley (Norco Senior High School, Norco 1985) placed 43rd in 51:01 on August 14.

400 Relay: The United States team of Michelle Finn, Sheila Echols, Wendy Vereen, and Gail Devers (Sweetwater High School, National City 1984) won heat one in 42.34 on August 21, the fastest heat time.

The U.S. team of Finn, Gwen Torrence, Vereen, and Devers placed second in the final on August 22 in a new American record of 41.49. The old American record of 41.55 was set by the National Team of Alice Brown (Muir High School, Pasadena 1978), Diane Williams (Cal State Los Angeles 1983), Florence Griffith (Jordan High School, Los Angeles 1978), and Pam Marshall (Jordan High School, Long Beach 1978) at the ISTAF in Berlin on August 21, 1987.

High Jump: Sue (McNeal) Rembao (Carlsbad High School 1980) was a non-qualifier at 6-1 1/2.

Triple Jump: Sheila Hudson (Rio Linda High School 1985) of Elverta, the U.S. record holder and the dominant American female in the sport for the last six years, failed to reach the final round in the event.

Hudson placed 17th in the qualifying at 43-7 1/4 on August 20. It took a jump of 44-0 3/4 to qualify for the final. Thirteen qualified for the final.

Shot Put: Ramona (Ebert) Pagel (Schurr, Montebello 1979) was the twelfth and last qualifier for the final at 60-10 on August 14. Pagel placed 12th in the final at 58-3 3/4 4 on August 15. Her series: 58-3 3/4, 57-5, 57-0 1/4.

■ Paraguay's Civilian-Elected Leader Sworn In

Asuncion, Paraguay, August 15--Juan Carlos Wasmosy was swom in as president yesterday, and he promised to live up to the challenge of being the first elected civilian leader to govern Paraguay in 39 years.

Wasmosy, 54, received the red, white, and blue presidential sash from the outgoing president, General Andres Rodriguez. The new president, a construction engineer and the grandson of a Hungarian immigrant, promised to improve the economy, education, health care and transportation.

A member of the Colorado Party, which has been in power since 1947, he won a narrow victory May 9 in elections that were hailed as the most dramatic in Paraguay's 183-year history, marked by long periods of dictatorship and military-backed authoritarian rule.

Wasmosy, who is beginning a five-year term, is the first elected civilian to govern Paraguay since President Federico Chaves, who was ousted by General Alfredo Stroessner in 1954.

No sports fan can hope to fill this empty seat

August 17--An athlete needs to know
there is someone in the bleachers who knows
that in the last calm before the starter's gun,
his heart is raging against his jersey. I know
that as a parent of one All-America son and
one Olympian son.

Like much of the nation, I was filled with sadness seeing the casket of Michael Jordan's favorite fan--his father--being carried out of the church in a draped coffin last weekend. On grief's scale, the loss of a father is enormous. The loss of a father who also was an honest-to-goodness fan adds a dimension that those who have "lived" in bleachers through their children's athletic victories and defeats understand.

I cannot imagine what it is like at the level of Michael Jordan. I do know that he and the Chicago Bulls will pack stadiums next season and that one seat can never be filled.

Parents who become true fans have few limits to their loyalty. I remember the time my husband, suffering lower back spasms so bad he could barely walk, got in the van and drove to Texas because our son was competing there alone in a national high school meet.

I say "alone," though the stadium was lined with people. But crowds are there to see performance and winners—not to view an athlete as a son or daughter. They have no reason to be concerned, as a parent might, that the sturdy-appearing athlete—down on the track, on the basketball court or on the tennis court—might have palms that are sweating, a stomach that has tightened into a painful knot or legs that have become rubbery with fear. And the star athlete always walks a balance beam, ever in danger of falling from favor should he or she perform poorly.

When the masses of fans are screaming for faster times, higher scores and new records, an athlete needs what my sons had in their father and what I suspect Michael Jordan had in his.

They need to know there is someone in the stands whose allegiance will never stray. They need someone who will never jump to the winner's camp when the trophy has departed. They need someone who always will believe that if the performance was sub-par, the blame surely belonged on the weather, or the travel, or the pulled hamstring, or the missed training, but never on any chance that the athlete had no promise.

For someone of Jordan's extraordinary talent and popularity, it must have been important to have his father as a buddy-someone he could trust and someone who wouldn't ask him to autograph a dinner napkin. Maybe it was just nice to be around someone who remembered him as an imperfect, runny-nosed kid. Most of us need validation once in a while. Masses of fans can do it for athletes for a time.

But the king of hurdlers, Edwin Moses, gave way to the youth and speed of young-sters such as Danny Harris. Aging sprinter Carl Lewis is pulling on his spikes and looking over his shoulder at talented young sprinters such as Andre Cason. That is when you need a fan that is your very own. That is when you need someone who will cheer you in third place and someone who will go into the dark comer behind the bleachers when your lights begin to dim and weep with you.

Because they loved you before you were a star.

■ Everybody's getting wild about Buckey at Stanford

Sophomore guard is only one not talking about his athletic skills at 6-5, 280 By Jerry McDonald

Oakland Tribune Staff Writer Stanford -- People are talking about Jeff Buckey, and they aren't holding back.

"He's going to be great," Stanford coach Bill Walsh said of his sophomore guard. "He's a marvelous athlete." Cardinal offensive line coach Monte Clark, who put together one of the finest lines in NFL history with the Miami Dolphins in the 1970s, looks at Buckey and sees a 6-foot-5, 280-pound package of skill.

Clark said he expects Buckey to be an early first-round NFL draft choice by his senior year.

"I don't see anything that he hasn't got," Clark said.

Count Chris Dalman, a rookie guard with the 49ers and a Stanford starter last season, among the believers.

"He has all the tools. He's explosive, he's big and strong, he has a good head on his shoulders, and he really moves well," Dalman said. "As long as he believes in himself, he'll reach the status everyone expects of him."

The only person uncomfortable talking about Buckey is Buckey.

"I try and do my talking on the field," he said. "I don't like to talk, basically."

Actually, Buckey is polite and friendly, even if he's no Bob Whitfield. Whitfield, a first-round draft choice of the Atlanta Falcons, held nothing back. Before the first game of his junior year, Whitfield said Stanford would beat defending Pac-10 champ Washington by 50 points in the season opener. Washington won, 42-7.

Stanford opens the season against

Washington Sept. 4.

"I don't have a prediction," Buckey said. Whitfield talked tough to put more pressure on himself to perform. Buckey uses quiet but harsh self-analysis. Whitfield and Buckey missed each other at Stanford, but they appeared on the cover of an issue of Cal-Hi Sports when the former was at Stanford and the latter a senior at Bakersfield High.

"He was one of the first guys I ever talked to about Stanford," Buckey said. "He's a great player, a real talented guy."

The only man to have coached both players said he thinks Buckey may be better.

"You're talking percentages with players of that caliber, but I think Buckey is a better athlete than Bob," said Scott Schuhmann, Stanford's offensive line coach (1989-92) before becoming recruiting coordinator this sesaon. Schuhmann said Buckey's track and field background gives him an advantage. As a shot put and discus thrower, Buckey was named the *Track and Field News* Athlete of the Year as a senior. He won the high school national championship in the shot (64-8 3/4) and discus (208-11).

Buckey will compete for Stanford's track team this season, and he hasn't ruled out trying out for the Olympics in 1996 or 2000.

Buckey joined his first track club in the fourth grade, but he didn't get serious until the eighth grade, winning an age-group national championship in the discus.

"I had a lot of success with it and kept at it. It really helped me with my footwork and explosiveness in football," Buckey said. "Getting off the ball in football, getting off the end of a throw, getting your hips through, it's similar."

In football, Schuhmann said, Buckey is "his own worst critic. He experiences frustration because he tries to be an expert."

Walsh, who is an expert, began talking up Buckey last season and hasn't let up.

"The first time I read some of the things he said, it blew me away," Buckey said. "It's good he has confidence in me, but it puts a lot of pressure on me to do better."

So there's no time for talking.

Mile Record

Rieti, Italy, September 6--When Noureddine Morceli broke the world record in the mile by 1.93 seconds Sunday, it was the biggest reduction in the event's time since the USA's Jim Ryun lowered the 3:53.6 of France's Michel Jazy by 2.3 seconds in 1966. Morceli ran 3:44.39. The old record of 3:46.32 was set by Steve Cram at Oslo, Norway on July 27, 1985.

Ryun (East High School, Wichita, Kansas) set the national high school mile record of 3:55.3 in the AAU Championships on June 27, 1965 in San Diego.

I witnessed both of Ryun's records in 1965 and 1966. The world record by Ryun in 1966 at Edwards Stadium in Berkeley is the track highlight of my life, which has included three Olympic Games (1972, 1976, and 1984).

Only three U.S. high schoolers have broken four minutes for the mile. Tim Danielson (Chula Vista High School) placed fourth in the San Diego Invitational in 3:59.4 on June 11, 1966. Marty Liquori (Essex Catholic High School, Roselle, New Jersey) ran 3:59.8 in 1967. Danielson set two California State Meet mile records in 1965 (4:08.0) and 1966 (4:07.0).

The fastest 1,600 meters this year in the U.S. was 4:07.47 by Nick Middleton (Lawrence Central High School, Indianapolis, Indiana). He won the mile in 4:13.72 at the Golden West Invitational in Sacramento on June 12. The fastest Californian was Brian Wilkinson (Merced) in 4:08.13 (1,600m).

■ Richmond High Drops Varsity Football

Not enough qualified, interested players this year

Wilson Chronicle East Bay Bureau September 8--Of 1,300 students at Richmond High School--once a football powerhouse that went undefeated in 1971--only five young men were ready and willing to suit up for this fall's varsity team. That dismal tumout prompted the school to drop varsity football for the first time in its 66-year history.

The move gives Richmond High the distinction of becoming one of the first schools in the state to ax its varsity football programs for lack of interest. Salesian High, a Catholic school also in Richmond, dropped its varsity team this year, but reportedly that was mainly because several good players left this summer after a popular coach's contract was not renewed.

"With all the budget crunches, I know a lot of teams have looked first to cutting junior varsity," said Jim Duel, spokesman for the California Interscholastic Federation, which governs high school athletics. "But I haven't heard of any varsity teams being dropped in football."

As the Class of 1994 tries to imagine a year without a homecoming and a chance to turn the school's sagging standings around, the few athletes who had counted on making varsity have not quite come to terms with the loss.

"I'm still upset," said senior class president Euldrago Johnson, who was one of only two seniors eligible for the varsity team. "I had gotten stronger and faster. I was ready. It's a big letdown."

Second-year coach Darrin Zaragoza said he is just as disappointed as the seniors. Many in the senior class made an unsuccessful last-minute attempt to gather at least 25 people--the minimum needed for a varsity team. The coach, administrators and some students in Richmond, an industrial city with nearly 88,000 people, say that after more than a decade of losing games, Richmond High lost its varsity team because of a lack of interest and poor grades.

Sixty-three percent of the students are of Latino and Asian descent, said Principal Al Acuna, and they bring with them interest in other sports such as soccer and badminton. In fact, the school's soccer team, made upmainly of first-generation Latinos, has reigned as the district champion for several years, and many Asian students are turning out for badminton.

"Soccer is great now," said Paul Gaddini, North Coast Section commissioner for the background interscholastic Federation. "It accould very well be that the sports of the world will become the sports of this nation."

According to Zaragoza, black students. who make up 27 percent of Richmond's student body, continue to show interest in football--which remains the most popular sport in California, according to a statewide survey. Buy many of the players on the varsity team have not been able to maintain the state requirement of a 2.0 GPA or better and have been deemed ineligible for the program.

Kevin Zaragoza, the coach's younger brother who helped coach last year's team, said it is disappointing that a school of Richmond's size cannot get even 30 players together for varsity football. He proudly showed a reporter last season't football photographs, in which 32 players formed the varsity team, then sadly counted the number of players who had left for one reason or anoth-

"We should have had 14 guys out of the 32 varsity players return," the younger Zaragoza said.

This summer, only two seniors, Johnny Irwin and Johnson, showed the commitment to play varsity football and met the 2.0 gradepoint average requirement, the coach said. Three other eligible students attended preseason practice.

A few other players who had missed spring and summer workouts had expected to walk in on the first day of school--but by that time, the decision had been made to drop the team.

Zaragoza has tried to improve grades by tutoring many of his players after school. Last year, he was voted coach of the year by the Alameda-Contra Costa Athletic League for his efforts, although his team won only one game last season.

But trying to help students who may be struggling to overcome gang pressure, drugs, poverty and crime has been an uphill battle, he said, and this year he felt he had lost his fight to convince young people that athletics can make a difference in their lives.

There are a lot of distractions in the course of the years," the coach said. "Nobody keeps them on the right track. That's what school is all about. In the football sense; they just don't see how important it is in life to be involved in athletics."

In a sad testament to the modern urban life, one of the star players from last year, Lee Phelps, was killed this summer in a street shooting. Johnson had hoped to dedicate the season to his fallen teammate but will now have to remember Phelps in other ways, he says, because "the brothers let me down by

not keeping their grades up."

Tamera Amey, a promising basketball and volleyball player, said the students' apathy about doing well in school has hurt other programs as well.

A lot of people I know who can play well don't want to keep up the grades because they don't want to participate," Amey said. "They want to go home, or they have something better to do. I know it's not jobs."

As Zaragoza strolled through the campus on Friday, looking for more junior varsity recruits, the challenge that apathy presents was illustrated when the youthful coach spotted a 15-year-old sophomore he has actively wooed for the team. Zaragoza tried one more time: "Hey Troy, why don't you come play for us?"

"I might," said the young man, who looks as if he could play some serious defense-they looked down and kept walking. Although Troy has expressed some in-

terest in football, Zaragoza said, he had not

shown up regularly for practice.

But the coach, who grew up in Richmond, is not giving up. He hopes to use the junior varsity and freshman teams to instill discipline and motivation in the players and bring varsity back to Richmond High--bigger and better.

Bob Roberts, commissioner of the Alameda-Contra Costa Athletic League, wholeheartedly backs the coach's approach.

"Not playing at varsity level is going to divert the kids into junior varsity and freshman programs, which will strengthen those skills and allow them to experience success," Robarts said

"If the programs are successful, then kids will return," he said. "It's something they want to be associated with. For teenagers, that's very important."

Some nearby residents also worry about possible repercussions in the community. Ted Pendleton, 68, says he prays that varsity football will return and other after-school programs will stick around because without such activities, young people may turn to *doing no

"I hate to see football go," he said, "because it's just one less activity for young people, and it will give them more time to be out of the streets."

Chinese women set marks, raise evebrows

By Phil Hersh, Chicago Tribune September 14--In less than a week, Chinese women runners have made a shambles of track and field's established standards by setting four world records. Some would say they have also made a mockery of the sport.

"If they ratify these records, it will set women's middle-distance and distance running back 25 years," said Mary (Decker) Slaney (Orange High School 1976) of Eugene, OR, the greatest middle-distance runner in U.S. history. "It will ruin the sport."

The most recent record came Monday, when Wang Junxia ran the 3,000 meters in 8 minutes, 6.11 seconds in the 7th National Games at Beijing's Workers Stadium. That was six seconds faster than the record of 8:12.19 Wang set in Sunday's preliminaries, when she took 10 seconds off the 9-year-old record of 8:22.62 set by Tatiana Kazankina of the Soviet Union.

Last Wednesday, Wang, 20, broke the 7year-old world record in the 10,000 meters by 42 seconds. In Saturday's 1,500, both Wang, the runner-up, and Qu Yunxia, the winner, broke the oldest record in women's track and field, which had stood 13 years.

"I would love to jump up and down and say, 'Fabulous!' but to smash those records by that much, it needs investigation," said

Patti Sue Plumer of Menlo Park, a lawyer and the top-ranked U.S. runner in the 3,000 meters from 1989 to 1992.

The International Amateur Athletic Federation, the governing body of world track and field, will review the performances when it receives record applications from the Chinese. Each application must include a doping-test result from a urine sample provided by the athlete immediately after setting the record.

"We really don't have any excuses," Tom Clarke, general manager for the shoe company, told shareholders Monday. "We simply didn't get the cements activated properly." Watts, 1992 Olympic gold medalist, finished fourth at the Worlds Aug. 17 after the sole fell off his shoe midway through the race.

■ Gloomy outlook kicks down Nike

September 21--Nike is showing a lot of wear. Stock in the world's largest athletic shoe company was off 4 points Monday before rebounding to close down 1 3/4 at \$46 1/ 4. The drop came after Nike said net income for its fiscal first quarter, ended Aug. 31, was \$114.1 million--7% below net income of \$122.6 million a year ago. Quarterly earnings per share fell 7% to \$1.49. Analysts expected Nike to earn \$1.65 a share, Zacks Investment Research reports

The company's outlook for the rest of 1994 isn't much better. "We now believe earnings for fiscal year 1994 will not match the record sales and income reported in fiscal 1993," Nike Chairman Philip Knight said in a statement.

Monday was just the latest piece of bad news for Nike investors, who have seen the stock lose almost half its value since peaking last November. "They is not a one-day event," says Gary Jacobson, analyst at Kidder Peabody. "Nike has been missing expectations for the past year."

Nike and other shoe companies have been hurt by the shift of fashion tastes away from high-price athletic shoes. "It's not company specific, it's industry specific," Jacobson says.

During the latest quarter, Nike said a big reason for its soft business was weak economies in Europe dragging down international sales. Knight told shareholders at the company's annual meeting Monday that Nike will counter earnings troubles by laying off 3%-4% of its 9,700 workers.

But prospects of lower costs from layoffs didn't allay concerns about the maker of the Air Jordan. Jacobson on Monday lowered his estimates for Nike's 1994 earnings again. He now expects Nike to earn \$4.40 a share this year; his previous estimate was \$4.60. In 1993, Nike earned \$4.74 a share. He rates the shares a weak hold: "It's going to be a long while before we see a \$90 price on that stock again."

September 22--American Olympic shot put champion Mike Stulce faced a life ban Tuesday after failing a drug test at last month's World Championships in Stuttgart, Germany. Stulce, winner of the gold medal at the Barcelona Olympics last year and the bronze in Stuttgart, tested positive for the second time in his career.

Michael Duane Stulce was born in Killeen, Texas on July 21, 1969. He is 6-3 and 270. He competed for St. Pius X High School in Houston, Texas until 1987 and Texas A & M until 1991.

In 1987 as a high school senior he was the tenth longest thrower in the country and third best in Texas at 65-0 1/2 with the 12 pound shot. He threw the 16 pound shot 53-7, which made him the 5th best in the U.S. Only one Californian, Dave Bultman (Royal High School, Simi), had a better throw with the 12 pounder at 67-0.

■ Ann Trason sets another world record

62.137 miles at 6:54.6 per mile!

Amiens, France, September 25-East Bay runner Ann Trason (Pacific Grove High School 1978), already the world record-holder at 50 and 100 miles, went metric Saturday, shattering the 100 kilometer world record by more than nine minutes.

Trason, 33, of Kensington (north of Berkeley), covered 100 kilometers (62.137 miles) in 7 hours, 9 minutes and 44 seconds. That was more than 21 minutes faster than runner-up Valentina Liachova of Russia.

Trason's time bettered the previous world record, as recognized by the International Association of Ultrarunners, of 7:18:57, set by Birgit Lennartz of Germany in 1989.

The men's winner of the Amiens 100 kilometers was Konstantin Santalov, 26, of Russia, in 6:23:15.

■ 23rd Annual San Ramon Valley Invitational

San Ramon Valley High School, Danville, September 25-The Livermore Cowboys captured their third consecutive invitational by winning the large school team title with 60 points. Santa Rosa placed second with 80, Montgomery (Santa Rosa) was third with 86, and De La Salle (Concord), the four-time defending champion, was fourth with 93.

"When you hear De La Salle is at a meet, nobody else could show up and you know you have your hands full," said Livermore coach Ed Salazar to Mitch Stephens (Valley Times).

Stanford receiver has hands, heart

Stanford, October 1--Recruiters began
arriving with regularity when Brian Manning
was a junior at Ruskin High in Kansas City,
Mo. Ruskin coach Gerald Partridge had one
in the office one day, and recalls telling him
Manning, aside from his considerable athletic
ability, "might just be the best kid in the whole
school." As if on cue, another teacher
walked in. Partridge asked him who the best
kid in the whole school was. Without prompting came the answer: "Brian Manning."

In Manning's senior year, Stanford assistant Tom Holmoe brought Bill Walsh to Ruskin to meet Manning. While the three were walking through the school grounds, Holmoe said, a sophomore girl couldn't contain herself. She was impressed by the famous visitor, but even more so by her classmate.

"She walked right up and said, 'Brian Manning, we are so proud of you that a school like Stanford would come to visit you," Holmoe said.

A freshman at Stanford, Manning is drawing comparisons with the likes of James Lofton (Washington High School, Los Angeles, the 1974 State Meet long jump champion) and Gene Washington as a game-breaking talent. Walsh likens his athletic ability to the 49ers' John Taylor.

Going into the game Saturday against No. 4 Notre Dame at Stanford Stadium, Manning has seven receptions for 141 yards (a 20.1 average) and touchdown receptions of 37 and 36 yards.

People watched Manning closely in high school. A cluster of fans would show up for his 7-on-7 summer passing league duels with Leroy Pruitt of Blue Springs, Mo., a childhood friend and also a Stanford freshman.

Track meets grew quiet when Manning went to the jumping pit, as fellow athletes and fans wondered how far he'd go. He eventually went 51-4 in the triple jump to win the state title as a senior and has gone as far as 23-8 in the long jump.

What impressed Manning-watchers the most, however, had nothing to do with athletic success. In the first game of his senior year, moments after Raytown High used a two-point conversion to beat Ruskin 15-14, Manning learned that his mother had died of cancer. Marvelyn Manning was 45.

The moment Manning saw two policemen escorting his brother Loren to the sideline, he knew his life had changed forever. Earlier in that game, Manning suffered a sprained ankle that hampered him all season. He managed to rush for more than 100 yards and make 12 tackles at comerback. His season totals of 500 yards rushing and eight touchdowns, and two interceptions and 18 breakups on defense, didn't approach what could have been.

Rushkin, 8-4 when Manning was healthy as a junior, finished 1-9.

Besides the grief over his mother's death, an underlying concern was the injury. It hampered an emotional outlet for his mourning and caused Manning to wonder whether recruiters would lose interest. Manning could have put his head down, wallowed in grief and taken on a "why me" attitude--as many 17-year-olds would in the same circumstances--and few would have thought less of him.

It never happened. Marvelyn Manning wouldn't have approved.

"I'm a very spiritual person. That, plus my friends and family, is what got me through," Manning said. "I know she would want me to carry on. She wouldn't want me feeling sorry for myself."

His grades, so important to his mother, never slipped. His attitude never soured. Football coaches consider adversity to be third-and-10 at their own 10-yard-line. Manning had faced the real thing, and by his own admission, it only helped him grow up. Recruiters noticed.

Manning considered Colorado, Illinois, and Kansas but was swayed by Stanford's academic reputation and the coaching staff. Although he played at a school known for running the ball, Manning adapted to Stanford's sophisticated passing scheme quicker than any of the freshmen.

"Coach (Mike) Wilson put us through drills and I couldn't even run a slant," Manning said. "I just paid attention and picked it up as best I could."

Manning has given Stanford the capability for an instant touchdown, and his confidence has surged since catching a 37-yard touchdown pass from Steve Stenstrom against Colorado.

"I thought of my mother even as it happened," Manning said. "I think about her every time I walk into the stadium, how she has been at all my games even since Little League."

Manning's first touchdown was shown on tape to classrooms at Ruskin the following Monday. The cheering probably still hasn't stopped.

■ Calvin Harrison (North Salinas, Salinas) on world 400 meter list

Calvin Harrison, the State Meet 400 meter champion, was the 20th fastest 400 meter runner in the world this year at 45.07 according to the November issue of *Track & Field News*. He was also the 10th fastest in the United States.

Harrison was the only high schooler from the U.S. to make the world list. Even Marion Jones (Thousand Oaks) and Amy Acuff (Calallen, Corpus Christi, Texas), who set a new high school high jump record, didn't make the list. Acuff missed by 3/4 of an inch.

Quincy Watts (Taft High School, Woodland Hills 1988) was the third fastest in the world and the U.S. at 44.13 at altitude. Steve Lewis (American High School, Fremont 1987)

was the 8th fastest in the world and sixth in the U.S. at 44.54.

Livermore, ranked ninth, won the Division Three boys' team title with 119 points (1, 3, 33, 39, 43) 83:03. Nordhoff, ranked seventh, placed second with 129 (4, 7, 14, 48, 56), and Cresent Valley was third with 140 (10, 17, 18, 36, 59).

Steve Immel (Livermore), 20th in the State Meet, won the Division Three boys' race in 15:42 (5:03/mile), the seventh fastest time of the day. Jason Balkman (Lynbrook), the defending State Meet champion, placed sec-

ond in 15:46 (5:04/mile), and Darren Holman (Sonora), 15th in the State Meet, was third in 15:53 (5:07/mile).

McFarland, ranked second, won the Division Four boys' team title with 39 points (4, 6, 8, 9, 12) 82:31. Morro Bay, ranked first, placed second with 77 (1, 3, 7, 19, 47), and Santa Ynez, ranked tenth, was third with 115 (11, 16, 23, 32, 33).

Dave Mitchell (Morro Bay), seventh in the State Meet, won the Division Four boys' race in 15:41 (5:03/mile), the sixth fastest time of the day. Aaron Gillen (Yreka), third in the State Meet, placed second in 15:52 (5:06/mile), and Joe Tavemer (Morro Bay), seventh in the State Meet, was third in 16:04 (5:10/mile). Defending State Meet champion Steve Brown (Piedmont), who has been injured this fall, was fifth in 16:13 (5:13/mile).

Bend, the Oregon State Meet champion, won the Division One girls' team title with 36 points (1, 4, 6, 12, 13). Peninsula, ranked second, placed second with 94 (2, 8, 19, 32, 33), and Esperanza (Anaheim), ranked fifth, was third with 111 (9, 11, 15, 37, 39).

Freshman Julia Stamps (Rincon Valley Junior High School, Santa Rosa) won the Division One girls' 5,000 meter race in 17:40 (pace: 5:41 per mile). She won her race by 43 seconds! Her time would have placed her 12th in the college women's invitational race. Kortney Dunscombe (Bend) placed second in 18:23 (5:55/mile), and Molly Mehlberg (Peninsula) was third in 18:37 (6:00/mile).

Rich McCann (Rainier High School, Des Moines, Washington 1976), who ran the 10,000 meters in 32:02.0 as a high school senior and holds the University of California record at 29:24.44, sent me the following fax: "Stamps dominated the race. Dunscombe of Bend apparently was stunned by Stamps' performance."

But those of us who have been following Stamps since the Mizuno meet at Kezar Stadium in San Francisco last track season, were not surprised. After all she ran 4:38.35 for 1,500 meters, 5:07.39 for a mile, 10:01.7 for 3,000 meters, and 10:57.76 for two miles last spring. Last week she ran 17:30 at the Aggie Invitational 5,000 meters against open women. One bit of good news for the Division One girls is that Stamps will run in Division IV at the North Coast Section and the State Meet. However, she will meet them at Foot Locker.

Edison (Huntington Beach), ranked first in Division Two, won the Division Two girls' team title with 67 points (7, 9, 11, 16, 24).

Canyon (Anaheim), ranked sixth, placed second with 83 (1, 10, 14, 28, 30), and Bishop Amat (La Puente), ranked fifth, was third with 114 (4, 17, 18, 33, 42).

Kim Nelson (Canyon), second in the State Meet, won the Division Two girls' race in 18:40 (6:00/mile), the fourth fastest time of the day. She won by 22 seconds. Nicole Silva (Aptos) placed second in 19:02 (6:08/mile), and Taryn Lawson (Ocean View), ninth in the State Meet, was third in 19:22 (6:14/mile).

St. Ignatius (San Francisco), ranked only seventh in Division Three, won the Division Three girls' team title with 64 points (4, 7, 11, 14, 28) 100:07. S.I. certainly will move up in the next state rankings. Corona Del Mar (Newport Beach), ranked first, placed second with 78 (1, 3, 19, 23, 32) 100:16, and Carondelet (Concord), ranked fifth, was third with 107 (2, 12, 24, 27, 42) 101:41.



Ashleys Bethel, who will be in the eighth grade this Fall in El Toro, shocked with a 19-7 1/4 Long Jump in the Age 13-14 division of the USA Track & Field Youth Nationals at the University of Houston in early July. The mark for the obviously very advanced junior high star would have been the third best California high school mark (behind Marion Jones' 22-0 1/2 and Amy Littlepage's 20-5) this past season, and amazingly would have been the equal #10 performance by a high schooler this past outdoor season. Along with fellow seventh grader, ANGELA WILLIAMS (Ontario), whose sprint career continues in fine style, with an 11.79 100m best this past summer (equal #15 high school auto-timed mark of the year), there should be some great viewing and action for track fans over the next five years before these stars leave the prep ranks!

✓ MEBRAHTOM KEFLEZIGHI throws out national challenge

Coach Ed Ramos of San Diego H.S. may be blessed with another star of the ability level of his school's Marc Davis, 1986 Foot Locker National Cross Country Champion, with current charge, soft-spoken twelfth grader, Mebrahtom Keflezighi, indicating a seasonal goal of doing a good job at the Foot Locker National Championships. Keflezighi, a native of Etria, an area that recently broke away from Ethiopia, has steadily improved during his running career at San Diego High School, with a sterling effort in his first 1993 Invitational competition at San Buenaventura State Beach in the Seaside Invitational on September 11th. Breaking away from a good pack of runners after 660 yards, Mebrahtom charged through the flat and fast cement trail course, passing two miles in 9:26 on the way to a 14:15 finish. The course record here is 14:14 by former Foot Locker National Champion Louis Quintana (Arroyo Grande HS) 1990, with Bryan Dameworth (Agoura), another Foot Locker national titlest, 14:24 here in 1989. Obviously our current star is in very select company.

Last spring in track Keflezighi was 4:11.48 for 1600m (nation's #4 returnee this year in that event) and 9:09.26 for 3200m (#8 returnee nationally). A steady summer of running had him put in a minimum of five miles per day, "taking a day off every couple of weeks," with a long effort of ten miles.

Tenth in last year's Western Regional in the Foot Locker Championship series, Keflezighi's eyes lit up when questioned on the possibility of showdowns with fellow African, Kenya's Robert Keino, a twelfth grade student at Ridgewood HS in New Jersey, the top returnee from the Foot Locker National Championships, at third, and last year's Arcadia/Foot Locker Invitational 3200m champion over a top field at 9:02.73.

The Foot Locker National Finals race at San Diego seems to always have a local favorite, with the successes of area stars Mark Dani, Kira Jorgensen, Marc Davis, and Milena Glusac adding to the Championship weekend crowd support. If all goes well this Fall, it seems as if another local, one who can daily jog past the Morley Field course, will help to make the early December weekend a big one for locals.

✓ PASSING OF THE GUARD--The New Young Ladies on the Block

Some pretty spectacular running took place during the weekend of October 2nd, with two female ninth grade stars, neither new to the running game, but relatively unknown nationally at the prep harrier level, exploding to the fore-front with amazing races.

At the Magic City Invitational in Birmingham, Alabama, Erin Davis, frosh leader of the #2 ranked nationally Saratoga Springs, NY team, individually handled third place finisher from last year's Foot Locker National Championships, Amy Skieresz (Agoura, Ca), with a 16:38.5-17:19.2 margin of victory. Davis, latest star out of the annually very strong Saratoga Springs program of Art and Linda Kranick, has some "pre-high school" credentials, racing the fastest 3000m by an 8th-12th grader in the nation last year at 9:43.47 (worth under 10:30 for 3200m) while winning the New York State High School outdoor title (7th graders and up can compete in New York during the high school season).

"Out West" some of the same quality action was taking place that 10/2 weekend at the Stanford Invitational, with ninth grader from Rincon JHS in Santa Rosa, Julia Stamps, taking apart a pretty good group, led by Bend (Or), the nation's top ranked female team, with Kortney Dunscombe (22nd in last year's Foot Locker title run), that squad's leader. Blasting a 5:15 first mile on the rolling Stanford golf course, Stamps raced away to a 200 meter triumph over Dunscombe and the pack, shocking with her 17:40 effort to the Bend star's 18:23 in second. While not listed

in official meet results, it is believed that Stamps' 17:40 is a course record for preps (and would have placed twelfth in a good quality Women's Collegiate Invitational race the same day there). Julia has done some fine running previous to her effort here also, racing 4:38.35 for 1500 meters and 10:01.7 for 3000m on the track during her eighth grade vear. Not vet fifteen. Stamps showed a special competitiveness during a fifth place performance in the U.S. Junior Nationals last June over 3000m against girls as much as five years older than her.

Dan Aldridge, fastest prep 880 vard runner in the nation at 1:49.7 in 1975 for nearby Petaluma HS and two-time NCAA Division II 1500m champ at Cal Poly, SLO, has assisted Stamps the last couple of years, and we caught up with him the day after her great run at Stanford. When asked if her performance at Stanford was a surprise, he replied, "When she broke a good local two mile course record by 40 seconds a couple of weeks back we figured she was ready for something big." Stamps has competed in track and crosscountry since age nine, with Aldridge indicating that she averages 30-40 miles per week year-round in her training, with an eye to undertraining at this stage in her career. Aldridge notes a special intensity in the weight room by our young star, leaving her guite a bit stronger than girls her age. Santa Rosa, the high school Julia will attend next year is a three year (grade 10-12) school, with her junior high, Rincon, having the sport at the frosh level, so she is restricted to competing there this season. Her junior high is placed at the Div IV "Small Schools" level, meaning she can probably waltz through competitions all the way up through the state finals. With California preps going through a four weekend consecutive cycle in November and December of Section Finals-State Meet-Foot Locker Regional--Foot Locker Nationals, the perceptive Aldridge figures her comfortable domination of competition at her level up through the state meet will leave her fresh for the Foot Locker series.

Ah, yes (I), Julia has the same goals as every teenager in America who straps on her running shoes, to do a good job in her Foot Locker Regional and qualify on to the National Finals in San Diego in December. The Coach did wonder where Julia fit in against the other top girls in the nation. Interestingly, the Stanford course does not run too tremendously different timewise for most from the Foot Locker Regional course at Woodward Park in

Fresno or the National Finals course in San Diego, with a comparison in recent years showing that our star should be a "front pack favorite" in both affairs. Stamps will travel to the Mt. SAC Invitational the weekend of October 23rd to do battle with Amy Skieresz. Carrie Garritson, and the rest of the Golden State's best

In events up through 200 meters only Accutrack marks were considered with wind-aided or "no wind info" marks not considered. As always, this is a compilation done in the spirit of fun, with obvi-

ously many more teams able to score than the June State Track competition.

WOMEN

Given a little bit of time you could have probably come upwith the main "team actors" on this Women's side, with the Long Beach Poly 1993 team one of prep track history's greatest squads ever. Coach Don Norford's Jackrabbits scored in eleven spots in the flat events up through the 800 meters, led the state in both relays, and had fine field eventers Savant Williams and Pam Simpson add to

the school's monster 629.5 total. A new visitor to the top ranks is Skyline (Oakland), dropping in at fifth place, with Coach Darrel Hampton showing the difference that one person can make with a concentrated effort with what he figures is a special group of teenagers. The Skyline crew traveled far and wide to face the best, with more coming forth from this talented young Bay Area crew.
