



LONG SLOW DISTANCE Humane Way to Train By Joe Henderson Only \$2.50

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JAMES E. ("TED") MEREDITH...This great Mercersburg Academy track star copped the 1912 Olympic 800 meters gold medal with a fantastic time of 1:51.9 while only 19 years old. He was also clocked at 1:52.5 for the 880 during the same race - both times breaking the world record. In 1916 Meredith broke his old world marks with 1:51.1 and 47.4 clockings while competing for the University of Pennsylvania. Meredith's 880 time of 1:52.5 still stands as the fastest ever run by a Pennsylvania high school athlete. Meredith died on November 2, 1957

ACROSS THE STATE

In a great dual between two excellent high school mile relay quartets, German town and Bartram, both of Philadelphia, Wayne Mathews, sophomore anchorman for Bartram made up a ten-yard deficit and surpassed Kerry Streets of Germantown with a good 48.4 leg which gave his team the high school victory at Martin Luther King Games Saturday, 5/16/71. Bartram time was 3.210 while Germantown recorded 3.21.1. Ron Semkiw, Baldwin improved his best in the shot with 64.11%, but we now have more sixty footers... Mike Hartenstine of Bethlehem Freedom 62 11%, and Tom Pavlik of Thomas Jefferson, Pittsburgh 60.3. Another good toss was made by Ron Powley of East Pennsboro, best Class B Schools putter in the state with 58.434. Steve McIntyre of Pennsbury has three good marks for early part of May, 46.1 in the triple jump, 14.5 in the highs and 19.9 in the lows. Mike Shine on Young sville has 144 and 19.5 in the highs and lows, respectively. Soph pole vaulter Steve Alexander, of Clarion who has been injured for the best part of the outdoor campaign, got started off with a 14.2 in this event. He's going to be a good one. Steve Behr, Erie McDowell still holds the state lead in the discus with 193.0 ... in fact, here's a short note we received from Jack Shepard, Editor of Track & Field News High School Division, California: Dear Lowell: Thanks for the info on Behr's fine discus mark. He is number one in the nation unless you consider Jim Howard's (Phoenix, Arizona) 201-7 in February. Track & Field News is recognizing Howard's mark which was not made in prep competition, so you could say Behr is #1 in a prep meet. Steve's mark is also equal to 9th best of all time, nationally, signed, Jack Shepard. Pa has another fine discus spinner this season in John Reihner of Washington High who has a 1841 to his credit this season. This puts Reihner third on the all-time Pa. List behind Behr and Ty Higgins of Lower Moreland who let one go the distance of 187-34 last season. Pierre Ritter. York junior who is by far the fastest low hurdle man in the state, lowered his time from 19.1 to 18.9 in the 180 yard event. He has one problem this season; he cannot find any stiff competition to make him go faster, as he runs away and hides in every race. Ritter has many 14.4's in the highs, and looks as if he's capable of under 14 seconds in this event. Keep your eyes on him at the P.I.A.A. Meet at Penn State. He runs the first leg on York's 880 relay team and you will be able to see his raw flat out speed, which has to be in the vicinity of 21 seconds. A sad note on the Pa. prep scene, Gary Bush, a senior at Kane High School, who has an official best of 159-11 in the discus and has been over 170-plus on several occasions in practice, was rushed to the Jamestown, New York Hospital as the result of an accident while warming up for his event during the Warren vs. Kane dual meet. Bush, who is also a good shot putter, was hit in the head with a discus and suffered a depressed fractured skull, which ended his care er prior to District competition. As we receive more news on his condition from Head Coach Dave Brown of Kane we'll keep you posted. Central Penn Area usually noted for good mile relay teams, is lacking in this event this season. The best in the area this year is the Lower Dauphin, Hummelstown team comprised of Kevin Patrick, Kim Witmer, Bruce Cox, and Mike Slough are the best in the area with 3:25.8 and are the District 3 Class A Champs. The fastest hurdler in the State, Leroy Galloway (14.3) has recently accepted a grant to attend West Virginia State College. Galloway didn't qualify for the PIAA State Meet since he placed 3rd in his District 3 high hurdle final behind Ritter, and Darell Hardcastle of Lancaster. Biglerville junior Dave Gorman who has 13-64 in the pole vault stands only 5-6 inches tall and has a jump of 6-2 in the high jump. There are now four 23 footers in the long jump: Terry Jackson of Wilkinsburg leads with 23-10, followed by Rod Allen , West Mifflin North 23-714, then Tom Riley of Easton 23-44, and William Goodman, York who has 23-01/2. Bruce Skiles, javelin thrower from Allegheny-Clarion Valley has a

220-8 and a 210-9, both good throws, but not enough to pass John Clark's (Titusville) 221-0.*





A "world's record" 19.8 for the 220 on a turn was clocked by Parkland's Johnson in a trial heat. Obviously the distance run was way short as the Trojan star covered about 190 yards. The officials tried to correct the course for the next two trials but both winners only covered approximately 210 yards. The course was finally corrected to the proper 220 yards distance for the final. This occurance is typical of the LNL where anything and everything can happen and usually does in the annual League meet.

The meet's official program still carried the pole vault record as 13'-2 7/8" when in actuality it should have read 13'-3/4" (Bob Plarr of Parkland set the mark at Nazareth High two years ago. Nazareth has an illegal 6-inch box). This writer contacted meet director Jim Lutz (a Parkland High School teacher, by the way) about this inaccuracy in the record and he admitted the incorrect mark. During my phone conversation, Lutz reported that the record will stay at 13'-27/8" "as a monument of My (Lutz's) mistake." (Lutz was an official and measured Plarr's performance, himself, two years ago). Another incorrect meet record appearing in this year's LNL meet program was the 220 listing of 22.05 set by Hellertown's Greg Stauffer in 1968. As any track fan knows, the time should be "rounded off" to 22.1. WILL THE LNL

If one is a native Pennsylvanian, and hasn't heard the name Earl Flickinger mentioned, then he's missed out on an eminent part of track & field associated with the Keystone State. Flickinger, a life-long resident and native of Harrisburg, recently reached age 76, was once regarded as one of the nation's premier long distance runners.

He made his debut in long distance running way back on 1910 when he heard that a group of local cross country promoters were going to sponsor a five-mile race along the banks of the Susquehanna River. In that day and age, an event such as this, which incidentally lurred top name foot racers, comparable to names such as Ron Clarke, George Young, among others of this era. An event such as this coming to town had just about as much appeal to the public as a circus parade. Flick, a frail looking fifteen year old kid thought he'd try his hand in this contest, so entered the competition with all the other runners being several years his senior.

Just prior to his initial track competition, a grammar school buddy of Flick, made a wager that he would run dead last in this field of notable distance runners. Well, he not only won the bet, but completely surprised himself when he finished in tenth place out of about twenty-five runners. This race was all he needed. He was now determined to become a great road runner.

Now, a few years passed by, the 1912 Olympic Games come and gone, and with them, a host of new prominent national and international names. Flick, although improved, was still relatively unknown outside local track circles. However, twenty miles south of Harrisburg, at the Carlisle Indian School, had come an Indian by the name of Watali Umitowah, of International fame. Watali was a teammate of the great Jim Thorpe, and was the holder of the world record for the one-hour run. Legend has it that the entire Carlisle team was enroute to a track meet by motor coach and after traveling only a few miles, developed engine trouble. Three of the distance runers, including Umitowah got out and resumed the journey on foot, running the remaining twenty miles. They arrived at the meet site just moments after the starting command was given for the five-mile run. The great Watali Umitowah supposedly caught and passed every runner, leading the Indians to a 1-2-3 sweep.

The track promoters at Harrisburg decided to stage another gala five-miler at the old Island Park at the Susquehanna, in order to give local fans an opportunity to see the great Indian runners and several other top calibre distance men of the day. Come day of the meet, and all eyes were on Umitowah, the overwhelming favorite. Little chance was given to the other runners even finishing close... for the Indian was in a class by himself.

The gun sounded, and true to expectation, Watali took the lead from the outset, setting a torturing pace for three miles in an attempt to dispose of the field hastily. Well, his plan worked for the most part...with one exception. Surprisingly, this unheralded teenager named Flickinger was able to maintain this tremendous pace, dogging Umitowah's every footstep, whereby all the other contenders, most stars in their own right, dropped far out of contention at this point. The biggest surprise came, when at the four mile marker, Flick zipped pass the great Indian runner and headed for home, all by himself...Umitowah a fading and beaten runner.

Flickinger's career, as far as running is concerned was shortlived, however. In 1919 he was offered, and accepted the job of head track coach at the former Camp Curtin Junior High School in Harrisburg, a job which he held until 1936 when he moved up to become the head mentor at Harrisburg Catholic High School. His teams at Harrisburg Catholic were outstanding, winning serveral P.C.I.A.A. State team titles, and producing many individual champions.

In the forties, he became a board member with the Middle Atlantic States A.A.U., and eventually became vice-president of this organization. During his tenure with The A.A.U., he sponsored countless numbers of Championship meets, but perhaps the highlight of them all was the acceptance by The National A.A.U. of his bid for the 1952 Women's Olympic Trials, which he staged in Harrisburg that year. Serving in a dual role as A.A.U. board member, and head coach for The Harrisburg A.A.A. track team, Flickinger personally coached a girl, Janet Dicks who qualified for the 1952 U.S.A. Olympic Team bound for Helsinki, Finland. In 1954, he brought The Women's National A.A.U. Championships to Harrisburg at a time when the great Tennessee State teams were coming into recognition.

In 1955, Earl Flickinger was selected head coach for The United States Women's National Team for The Pan American Games at Mexico City. He vividly recalls preparation for those Games and how he readied his girls for the pressures of this outstandingly great international competition. He often speaks of his great sprinters, Maye Faggs and Barbara Jones and the psychology he would use to get the best performance from each. Flick's hope of leading his girls to a team victory at Mexico City were shattered, when shortly after the opening ceremonies, he suffered an attack of spinal meningitis, and had to be flown back to emergency treatment at a hospital in the States. "I believe the water in Mexico was a contributoring factor in my illnexx that year. As you probably know, our teams carry their own food and water to the Pan American Games nowadays." Speaking of Olympic Games, Flick was chosen head coach once again of the Women's National team for the '56 Games at Melbourne, Australis, an offer which he turned down for various reasons.

During his eventful coaching care er he encountered difficulties as well as success. He recollects how during the early years of coaching, he was cheering his mile relay team to victory on the edge of one infield, when a javelin was thrown wildly, hitting him in the leg, entering in the calf and coming out four inches in the front. A week later he was hobbling around rooting for his team at The Penn Relays. Another near disastrous incident occurred when enroute to a track meet he was hit broadside by a slow moving freight train at a crossing. The car was demolished, but he walked away with minor abrasions.

Although Flickinger hasn't sponsored a meet during the last few seasons, he is still a commissioner with the Middle Atlantic A.A.U. Says Mr. Flickinger, "I still enjoy track & field as much now as ever, but now I'm willing to view it as a spectator."
