

MICKEY COLLINS SMASHES ALL TIME STATE TWO-MILE RECORD

4/24/71...Senior distance star Mickey Collins of Easton High School shattered the eleven month old two-mile run record of 9:15.4 set last season on Franklin Field by Bill Louv of Upper Merion High School. Collins, in a dual meet against Wilson High School at Easton High's new all weather track Saturday, ran an outstanding 9:13.6 in winning the event by a margin of over a quarter of a mile. In fact, he lapped every other runner in the field Since P.I.A.A. rules limit any boy running the two-mile event to just that one event, this was Collins' first attempt at this event this season. Easton Coach Ray Herman stated he needed Collins in more than one event in regular dual meets to pick up needed points, but wants to give him a chance to compete in as many different events as possible. In other events, he has already run a 1:56.8 for the half, and 4:16.6 for the mile this season. His 880 time is the second fastest in the State this year (Dan Sullivan, Mt. Lebanon 1:56.4) and his mile time is the fastest for '71 to date. The previous best in the two-mile was a 9:25.4 which was set April 5th by Tim Cook of Chambersburg.

.....Maryland track coach Nick Kovalakides announced Jack McQuade, pole vaulter from Wissahickon High School will attend the University of Maryland. As a junior last season, McQuade hit 14-6, but his best outdoor mark this year is 13-6. Other announcements include: Bob Young, Woodrow Wilson's 6-8 high jumper to attend Villanova; Hubie Simpson, John Harris sprinter to attend Temple University.





TRACK.....ACROSS THE STATE Report for April 15-30

Brilliant performances and a rash of season's best marks were record as a host of track & field Invitational Meets and Reday Carnivals were held. As the result of a great upset, Leroy Galloway, William Penn, Harrisburg became the 1971 leader in the 120 high hurdle event finals at the Dickinson Invitational in Carlisle. Galloway was clocked in 14.3 to Ritter's 14.5. Ritter owns the year's best 180 time at 19.1.

Chester Gapinski, junior from Elk County Christian, St. Mary's, Pa. is the new leader in the javelin throw off of his recent throw of 207.7. Another junior, Ron Semkiw, Baldwin is up to 63-814 in the Shot and senior John Reihner of Washington has attained 183-0 in the discus throw to continue to lead their respective events. Danny Sullivan, Mt. Lebanon took the half mile lead from Mickey Collins with his 1:56.4 last week, with still no further reports from Bob Schurko, Bethel Park in this event. Schurko was figured as the man to beat in this event since he was consistently around the 1:55.0 mark last season and had a best of 1:54.5. It has been reported that he possibly suffered an injury this season. Central Bucks East, coached by Marty Stern has fielded the best relay units in two events ... 1 mile and 2 mile. His mile team of Rev Rhodes, Aram Attarian, Jim Frederick, and Ted Perkins won their Bux Mont mile relay race at the Penn Relays with the State's fastest time of the season, 3.22.8. The East clockings (splits) were Rhodes, 50.0; Attarian, 52.1; Frederick, 50.5; and Perkins, 50.2. Marty Stern's two mile relay team has posted a excellent 7:54.3 with his four runners hitting the following splits: 1:59.6, 1:58.9, 2:01.2, 1:54.6. (compliments, Norman Baker).

Rich Jackson, Pittsburgh Westinghouse has a recent 48.9 in the open quarter and a 14.9 in the high hurdles. This eclipsed the previous best in the 440 by Chuck Mozingo of Thomas Jefferson of 49.1. Mt. Lebanon's Dan Rothermal is third with 49.4. All three of these runners are from the Greater Pittsburgh Area (District 7 & 8).

Dave Volkens, Delaware Valley indoor 60-yard dash champ this past season, has outdoor times of 9.8 for the 100...22.5 for the 220...and 20.1 for the 180 yard lows. Volkens is from Bartram in Philadelphia, a school which has a crack 880 relay team which will be shooting for 1:28.0 before the conclusion of the season. Other members of that quartet are: Elliott Jenkins 22.4 for the 220 and 20.0 for the 180 lows; Clayton Salter 22.1 for 220 and 50.8 for 440; Tony Bullock, a junior who has 22.2 for the 220 and 20.5 for the 180 lows; and get this ... a sophomore, Wayne Matthews, 22.3 for the 220 and 49.9 for the 440 yard relay anchor leg.

Gary Reuben and John Manges both of Lower Merion High School have reportedly both run identical times of 21.6 in the furlong (straightaway) which puts them in a tie for first in this event. Danny Rothermal of Mt. Lebanon has a wind-aided 21.4. Craig Anderson who sustained a serious spike wound of his instep has just returned to competition. His best is 21.7. His teammate, Steve Musser, only a sophomore has a pair of 9.8's and knocked off the best in Central Pa. last week in winning at The Dickinson Invitational at Carlisle into a wind at 9.8. He finished three yards ahead on Larry Ford of Lancaster and four yards ahead of Jerry Urich of Red Land who has a 9.8 to his credit. Bob Young, high jumping sensation from Woodrow Wilson, Levittown has gone 6-8 once again, this time outdoors in placing second at the High School Invitational at Penn Relays. In the same event Laniel Crawford of Wilkes-Barre Coughlin reached 6-4. Get This! Steve Behr of Erie McDowell shattered the All-Time Pa. unofficial discus record with a tremendous heave of 193-0 two weeks ago. Previously, Behr had thrown 183-0 and should be commended in view of the fact that he and other Erie McDowell athletes have had very little track competition since the four other Erie High Schools are all shut down due to teacher strikes and walkouts which has seriously hampered sports competition this spring in Erie. Another athlete from McDowell, Rick Kissman, who possibly may have been the top threat in the 440-880 events has all but been sidelined due to this problem. It has been confirmed that Bobby Schurko, outstanding half-miler and miler from Bethel Park High

PTFR 5/4/71

School (1:54.5/4:15.2) has been sidelined with a serious pulled leg muscle, which has not responded to treatment by the team trainers and physician at Pitt University. It is hopeful he will return in time for the District 7 championship meet.

A college Note... The University of Pittsburgh's two-mile relay chose to compete at The Drake Relays held in Iowa the same day as The Penn Relays, and whipped up a swift 7:26.4 in placing 4th. Splits for Pitt were Doral Watley 1:52.3, Mike Schurko 1:50.9, Ken Silay 1:52.3, and John Aiken 1:50.9. This time compared favorably with Villanova's winning time of 7:25.5 at Penn.

PENN RELAYS AT FRANKLIN FIELD, PHILA. 4/24/71

Central Bucks East won the mile relay championship event for the Bux-Mont League with a time of 3:22.8 which was the fastest winning time of all Pennsylvania Schools. The team consisted of Ted Perkins, Jim Frederick, Aram Attarian, and Rev Rhodes. In another race, Boys High of Brooklyn, New York won their morning trial heat in a blazing 3:15.7, then came back to win the High School Championship Mile in 3:16.2 over a fast closing Huntington of Newport News, Virginia 3.16.9. Boys High who is shooting for the national record of 3:11.8 before the close of the season, has a best time this year of 3:14.8.

Kerry Streets of Germantown High School ran his anchor leg in 49.8 which helped his team win the Philadelphia Mile in 3:24.5 far ahead of Bartram (they fell down on first exchange) who moved from seventh place to second off of a fine anchor effort by Wayne Matthews.

In the open high jump event, Gene White 1970 graduate of Bristol High School, competing for the Penn A.C. cleared 7-2 in winning the high jump competition. He cleared the height on his first attempt, but missed at 7-4 on three tries. White uses the Fosbury Flop.

Villanova captured the two-mile relay in 7.25.5, the four mile relay in 16.43.7 and Greg Fredericks, fabulous Penn State senior won the Championship three-mile in 13.36.1, which is an automatic record since it is a new event which replaced the former two-mile event. The University of Pennsylvania's Frosh team edged the University of Maryland Eastern Shore in winning this event in 3.21.6 in their heat.

LATE NEWS

.....May 1, 1971..... Track & Field seems to be growing in popularity...at least, as far as Central Pennsylvania is concerned. At the Cedar Cliff Relays at Camp Hill, 4,000 paid fans gathered to watch. York High's Bill Goodman long jumped 23/0½ in the long jump relay but Chambersburg's team with Ed Wingerd 22-9, and Beanie Waters 21-8, copped the event with a total of 44-7. The crowd came to their feet as Pierre Ritter, Pa.'s fastest hurdler (19.1 lows), running anchor on York's shuttle hurdle team, took the tag 25 yards back of the leading team, Chambersburg. He caught Tim Garnett and won by 4 yards, but unfortunately, no one had a watch on Ritter, who possibly went the distance of 120 yards over five lows in 12.0 to 12.5 range. Ritter is the fastest Pa. hurdler since Jan White (18.7) who later went on to Ohio State football fame. Lower Dauphin became the Mid-State's fastest one-mile relay team 3:25.8, and Tim Cook of Chambersburg took the mile in 4:27.9

.....Also on May 1, Norristown's Brilliant 880 Relay Team comprised totally of underclassmen bettered their statewide best mark in this event (1'31.3) with a 1:30.9 effort. Coach Bob Shoudt of Norristown has operated during the last two seasons primarily with sophs and juniors and has come up with a 3:23.8 mile unit and 8:16.1 two-mile team at Norristown, both times recorded May 1.

..... The Dickinson Invitational held at Carlisle (Dickinson College) drew a crowd in excess of 2,000 fans. 4/24/71.

.....April 29...Mickey Collins from Easton ran 4.17.5 in the mile, then came back with a fast 1:56.4 in the half, a time which returns him to a tie for first, statewide, with Dan Sullivan, Mt. Lebanon. John Clark of Titusville threw 221-0 in the javelin, only 1'4" off of his Pa. best mark of last season. Jack Mc Quade, Wissahickon senior who had trouble getting started this season, is now up to 14-0 in the pole vault, taking the top spot from Brian Mondschein (13-7). McQuade hit 14-7 last season.

A LOOK AT THE LEHIGH VALLEY TRACK & FIELD SCENE

Possibly the finest performance in District
Eleven history was turned in by Easton's great
Mickey Collins who unloaded the fastest two-mile time in state annals on April 24. Competing in a dual
against neighboring Wilson Boro, Collins was clocked in a sensational 9:13.6 as he lapped every runner in
the race at least once.

The talented but most modest Easton star has also run 51.4 for the 440 (just half a second off the school mark), 1:56.8 for the 880 and a sizzling 4:16.6 for the mile (equal 11th on the all-time Pa. prep list). Collins' main problem between now and the state meet will be staying healthy and sharp. He has virtually no competition locally except perhaps for Emmaus' fine soph Charlie Norelli who has a 1:59.3 half to his credit but has the potential to run 3 seconds faster.

With Collins' teammate, Shawn Tice out with a leg injury, the former may run the 880-mile - 2-mile relay at the Districts and pass up the two-mile run where he'd be a strong favorite for the PIAA Class A title. Collins would be a cinch for a high number of points in the 880 and mile thus giving Easton an excellent chance at another District Eleven "A" team title.

Another mid-season standout is Notre Dame's (Easton) sophomore pole vaulter, Mike Shriver who cleared 12'0" in a dual meet vs. Northampton. It was Shriver's personal best and established a new school mark.

The 5-10, 150 oiybd vaykter

The 5-10, 150 pound vaulter started track last season and hit 11-0 in the PCIAA state meet at Lancaster where he took a third place in the Class B competition. Shriver, only 15 years old (he turns 16 on June 6) is tied for the area lead with Mike Ziatyk of Northampton and John Perich of Palmerton. In the Northampton dual Shriver defeated Ziatyk, a football star, on fewer misses.

CAPSULE LOOK AT OTHER TOP PERFORMANCES ...

Sprints.....Art Owens of Stroudsburg still leads with 9.9/21.9 clockings. Easton's Nick Zarate has clocked a questionable 9.9 (may be windy) and sprinted a 22.8.

Middle Distances....Palisades' Bob Schaefer turned in a good half when he defeated Nazareth's Craig Hunt in 2:03.5. Hunt was credited with the same time losing by inches. Dave Cope of Parkland has a mile best of 4:37.0 while soph Bryan Kelly of Easton has done 4:41.2. Charlie Norelli of Emmaus has done 1:59.3 and 4:418.

Jumps.....Art Owens and Easton's Tom Riley have both done 21-9 in the LJ with Riley also leaping a wind-aided 22-9%. Dim Alestas of Wilson Boro has LJ 20-10 ("windy" 21-11) and triple jumped 43-5% ("windy" 44/5%). Stroudsburg's Mark Adams (a Jr.) leads the area triple jumpers with his early season 43-9%. Dieruff's Barry Pavlik has been most consistent with a best mark of 42-8%. Weights.....Mike Hartenstine of Bethlehem Liberty is way out in front with a shot put heave of 58-7%. Gary Hein of Catasau qua is the discus leader with 151-5 but Hartenstine (150-2) and Dieruff's Jeff Bleamer (also 150-2) are right behind. Allentown William Allen's Dave Miller set a new school mark with his 187-3 javelin throw. Parkland's Bill Younger (a Jr.) is second with a 185-6 best.
