Mel Patton Breaks World Records With 9.1 and 20.2

Wind Will Nullify 100 Mark But 220 Is Okay

Los Angeles, May 7--Running an astounding 9.1 century, which won't be approved, and a 20.2 furlong, which most likely will become a world record, Mel Patton had his greatest day ever in the USC-UCLA dual meet.

A 6.5 miles per hour wind will nullify the 100 yard time which climbed two tenths of Patton's own world wide mark of 9.3, accepted just three days previously. But the wind gauge registered a legal 3.0 m.p.h. as the lean Trojan flyer raced down the fast UCLA track to lower Jesse Owens' 14-year-old record of 20.3.

Three timers caught the Olympic 200m. champ in 20.2 and two in 20.1. Meet officials said they would certify the mark.

Jess Hill, Patton's new USC coach, said after the meet he thought Patton would do "20 flat or better before the year is out."

Patton's two great races overshadowed a pair of outstanding hurdle performances by Craig Dixon as USC downed UCLA 90-40. Olympian Dixon ran 14.0 and 22.8.

BOLEN BEATS MCKENLEY IN 46.9

Boulder, Colo., Apr 30--Olympic fourth-place winner Dave Bolen nosed out Olympic second-place winner Herb McKenley in a blistering early season 46.9 440, a special event of the 25th Colorado Relays. It was McKenley's first defeat in an American outdoor quarter since 1946.

Don Campbell of Colorado won the 100 in 9.5; Rollin Prather of Kansas State put the shot 51'6½" and threw the discus 157'10"; McGraw of Colorado A&M put the shot 51'6" for second, and Allen of Colorado was third at 50'1".

Herb Hoskins of Kansas State broad jumped 24'5 7/8"; teammate Elliott won the high hurdles in 14.7; Todd of Colorado threw the javelin 202'1"; Clare Gregg and NCAA co-champion Warren Bateman of Colorado tied in the vault at 13 feet.

Kansas State won the 440 relay in 42.4.

Drake Relays

Thompson and Gehrman Are Individual Stars

Des Moines, April 29 & 30--Husky Byrl Thompson of Minnesota and slight Don Gehrman of Wisconsin stood out as the stars of the Drake Relays.

Thompson hit 170-1 in his first toss of the discus and then improved two inches, both throws bettering Fortane Gordien's meet mark of 165-5.

Gehrman did a full day's work on Friday, coming from behind to anchor two winning relay teams. He also ran the last leg on Wisconsin's mile quartet but the Badgers didn't qualify and on Saturday the Wisconsin distance stars were withdrawn from the two and four mile events.

In the sprint medley, Gehrman ran the anchor half in 1:51.0 as he made up some 15 yards to nip Harold Tarrant of Oklahoma A.&M. and Jack Diannetti of Michigan State in 3:24.0. Later, the Badger junior turned in a 4:13.1 mile as he came from fourth place to win the distance medley. He made up more than 25 yards on Bob Karnes of Kansas and also caught and passed Bill Mack of Michigan State and California's Kaare Veiling. Passinz Mack in the back stretch of the last lap, Gehrman surrendered the lead in the last drive, then got up to win by six ins.

Michigan State elected not to try for the four-mile relay record, intending to save something for the two-mile. The Spartan milers won easily in 17:32.5 but went unplaced in the two-mile as Kansas won in 7:45.8.

Defeating a strong field, paige Christiansen of Michigan State took the 120 highs in 14.6 while Paul Bienz of Tulane won the 100 in 2.8 again (flip to "DRAKE RELAYS" page 8)

NYU and Wayne Star As Frank, Moore Set Marks

Philadelphia, April 29 & 30--Two individual records and one relay mark were bettered as NYU and Wayne University emerged as the team stars in the 55th annual Penn Relays.

The new individual marks were divided between an Olympic veteran and a virtual unknown.

Olympian Vic Frank, one of Tayle's two great weight men, spun the discus 170-7 3/4 and Charles Moore, Cornell sophomore, raced over the 400m. hurdles in 52.1. Frank also was third to teammate Jim Fuchs, who narrowly missed a meet record with his 55-10 5/8 shot put.

In the relays, main business of this track carnival which attracted 35,000 fans on Saturday, both NYU and Wayne won a pair of the eight major varsity events. New York U. added a pair of relay seconds while Wayne's Lorenzo Wright starred in two individual events.

But it fell to North Carolina to crack the only relay record as the Tar Heels won the shuttle hurdles in 59.3. The quartet of Bob Morrow, Jack Moody, Bill Albans and Dick (flip to "PENN RELAYS" page 8)

EIGHT RECORDS GAIN APPROVAL

London, May 5--Six new world track and field records and two ties were written into the books on acceptance by the International Federation.

The new records, all made in 1948:

Boston, Apr 19--Karl Gosta Leandersson, a 30-year-old, 5-foot-10-inch, smiling Swede, became the fourth foreigner in a row to win the Boston Marathon as he limped home half a mile in the lead. Leandersson suffered from an aching Achilles tendon over the last ten miles but managed to win in 2:31:50.8, slowest winning time since 1938.

Leandersson is a two-time Swedish champion at the marathon. Last year he won races in 2:31:12 and 2:34:46, but lost his chances at the Olympic title when he cut his foot while training barefooted.

Second place in 2:34:42 went to Vic Dyrvall of the Millrose AA, running his first marathon. Dyrvall won the AAU championship at every other road race distance last year.

Lou White, plucky, 5-foot, 1-inch Negro from Boston, was third in 2:36:48.

National AAU champion and two-time Olympian Johnny Kelley of Boston was fourth in 2:38:07, just 23 seconds ahead of former record holder Joe Smith of Medford.

Gerry Cote, jaunty little cigar smoker from Canada, who has won four times, including last year, was 6th in 2:42:55.

Jesse Van Zant of San Francisco was bothered by cramps and could finish no better than 24th, while another pre-race favorite, Lloyd Evans of Montreal, dropped out with leg trouble. Other finishers:

PREP JUMPS 25-2½

Los Angeles, April 1--George Brown, 17-year-old Negro, broad jumped 25-2½ in a high school dual meet to better Jesse Owens' 16-year-old world record mark.

Representing Jordan H.S. of Los Angeles, Brown surpassed the 24-11½ record set by Owens as an East Tech, Cleveland star in 1933. Brown's best jump last year was 23-10½.

RESULTS FROM THE MIDWEST

WISCONSIN 97 1/2, MARQUETTE 43 1/2

Milwaukee, April 16 - The Wisconsin track team won its first outdoor dual of the season in beating Marquette 97 1/2 to 43 1/2. Badger star Don Gehrmann chalked up a double win by taking the mile run in 4:26.9 and then coming back for a first in the 800 at 2:01.2. Cold weather kept the athletes from turning in any sensational marks. Two other Wisconsin stars who won Big 9 Indoor titles last month copped firsts in their specialties, Jim Urquhart winning the 2 mile in 9:43.6 and Tom Bennett winning the polevault at 13'.

ILLINOIS RELAYS

Champaign, Ill., April 23 - Four teams took part in an informal relay meet held at the Univ. of Illinois with the host team copping most of the events. The Illini won the distance medley, 1 mile, and 2 mile relays. Northwestern took the 440 and 880 relays and Iowa won the sprint medley relay. The times were all slow because of a strong wind which knocked over hurdles on occasions. Some good marks were posted in the field events however. Pike Middleman of Illinois made his 1949 debut in the highjump with a 6'6" leap. Don Laz, also of the Illini, won the polevault at 13'. Jim Holland of Northwestern took the broad jump at 24'5 1/2. Norm Wasser of Illinois won the SF with 50'4 1/2.

MICHIGAN STATE 85, NOTRE DAME 56

East Lansing, Mich., April 23 - In a meet hampered by a strong and gusty wind the Michigan State Spartans beat a Notre Dame team by a score of 85 to 56. The only noteworthy mark of the meet was made in the broadjump by Spartan Fred Johnson. The Negro star did 25'2 1/4 for a new meet record. He suffered a leg cramp however and dropped out of the 100 yd. dash. The latter event was won by teammate Horace Smith in 10.2. Smith became the only double winner by taking the low hurdles in 24.6, although Spartan distance star Warren Dretzler figured in two wins also. Dretzler tied with teammates Mack and Irmen in a 4:30.6 mile and then came back to win the 2 mile in 9:46.9. Paige Christiansen, Michigan State's 1044 champ, won the highs in 15.4. John Helwig of Notre Dame won the shot at 51' 1/2.

IOWA TEACHERS COLLEGE RELAYS

Cedar Falls, Ia., April 23 - Three Minnesota athletes bettered meet records in the annual Iowa Teachers Relays. Tom Mason took the century dash in 9.6. Fred Brass won the high hurdles in 14.7. Charles Lindenkugel won the discus throw at 166'5". Because of a strong following wind only the discus mark was allowed.

OHIO STATE 81, FURDUE 49

Columbus, April 23 - Ohio State, Big 9 defending champs, overpowered Purdue in their first outdoor appearance of the season by a score of 81 to 49. Buckeye Olympic Champion Mal Whitfield scored a double for his team by taking the 440 in 47.9 and returning to beat Purdue's Charley Kay in the 220 in 22.7. Kay had previously won the 100 in 16.6. Harold Omer, Purdue's Big 9 Indoor 60y champ was 2nd to lay in the 100. Other Buckeye winners were: Whittaker, 880 yds. in 1:56.9; Don Washington, 1 mile in 4:24.2; Frank D'Arcy, 2 mile in 9:47.8; Dick Maxwell, high hurdles in 14.2; and Miller, discus throw at 151'. Maxey of Purdue won the polevault at 13'4".

NORTON WINS DECATHLON

Pasadena, Apr 27 - Brayton Norton, USC frosh star, won an open decathlon meet with 6177 points. Norton, whose regular events are the 440, javelin, and broad jump, came from behind with a 179-foot javelin toss and a 4:36 1500 meters. Don Winton of LAAC was a close second with 6146. Hal Dennis, Occidental frosh, was third with 5644.

100 YARDS IN 9.2

Baton Rouge, La., Apr 30 - Aided by a 14-mile wind, C. Neely of Mississippi State won the 100 in 9.2 in a dual meet with LSU. All five timers caught Neely in 9.2.

ANOTHER 14-FOOT VAULTER

Martin Korik, a junior at Tennessee, has joined the ranks of 14-foot pole vaulters with his victory over Harry Cooper of Minnesota in the Florida Relays. Korik, who won the Southeastern AAU vault last year at 13'8 7/8", cleared the record height of 14'1 5/8". Cooper was second at 13'10". Korik earlier won the North Carolina Relays at 13'8 5/8".

GEHRMANN RUNS 4:10.1 IN KANSAS RELAYS

Lawrence, Kans., April 23 - In a thrilling dual with Jerry Thompson, Texas graduate student, Don Gehrman of Wisconsin won the featured Cunningham mile at the 24th Annual Kansas Relays. The 120 lb. Thompson set the pace through a 59 first quarter, 2:03 half, and 3:09 three quarters before Gehrman made his move. Gehrman pulled even with Thompson but the Texan spurted and held his lead until the Badger staged a finish kick which left Thompson 30 yds. back at the tape. Gehrman's time of 4:10.1 equaled the meet record set by Blaine Rideout in 1940. Gehrman later turned in a 4:15.1 mile in anchoring the Wisconsin distance medley team to victory.

Another thrilling duel figured in the 2 mile relay when Harold Tarrant of the Oklahoma Aggies came from behind to catch Pat Bowers of Kansas in the anchor leg. The time of 7:41.0 was a new meet record.

The title of outstanding athlete of the day went to Bob Walters of Texas who set a new meet record in the high jump with a leap of 6'8"3-16. The old mark was 6'7"9-16, set by Gil Cruter of Colorado in 1938.

Fartlek

by Gösta Holmér
Swedish Olympic Coach

When I got my first number of "Track & Field News" and read there that American Coaches have discussed what distances in cross country running are good for American athletes to run at the American championships in order to gain the Swedish standards, I recognize an old problem of mine. We have had such problems too, here in Sweden, and we solved them by having 4000 meters as well as 8000 meters at our Championship. My opinion is, however, that it is not the races run that make the runner, but rather his training methods. Here in Sweden we saw ourselves conquered by the Finns; we gained a certain standard, until I, in the middle of 1930, decided to try to create something new, something that suited our mind and the nature of our country. I rejected the American opinion, that the runner should have fixed distances to run during their daily training schedule; I realized of course the great importance of that, but I wanted to give the boys a feeling of self-creating. I wanted them to get to understand themselves, and then fix the training according to their own individuality. Speed and endurance are the marks a runner should follow in his training. Following these lines I made up a system, that I call FARTLEK (meaning in English, Play of Speed, or Speed Play), and it runs as follows:

The running should be done on cross-country where the surface is soft and springy; although in the large cities, where it is difficult to get to a forest, you should make a path on or around a sports field, and make the path soft by covering it with sawdust.

The athlete should train from one to two hours each day, according to the following schedule:

1. Easy running from 5 to 10 minutes (as a warm up).
 2. Steady, hard speed for 3/4 mile to 1 1/4 mile.
 3. Rapid walking for about five minutes.
 4. Easy running, broken by wind-sprints of from 50 meters to 60 meters and repeated until you feel a little tired.
 5. Easy running with 3 or 4 swift steps now and then. (In reality, these swift steps would be like the sudden speeding up of a runner during a race when he tries to fight off a challenger who is trying to pass him. The body lurches forward, and 3 or 4 quick, sudden steps are taken.)
 6. Full speed uphill 175 to 200 yards.
 7. Fast pace for one minute following this trial of strength described in (6). The above described work can be repeated until the end of the period of the workout; but every athlete must remember that he must not feel tired but rather stimulated after the training. Always finish the training by running on the track from one to five laps, depending upon what distance you run in competition. (This work on the track would be called pace work by Americans.)
- Fartlek, rightly used, can be practiced 3 to 5 times a week. Running uphill should be done only twice a week, preferably on Mondays and Thursdays. An athlete would be wise in running uphill only once on Thursdays and twice on Monday.

What good do you get out of Fartlek?

1. Fartlek brings us back to the games of our childhood; where nature decided that we should expose our inner organs to much effort, so that our bodies will develop. A child plays while sitting, walks some steps, runs to its mother, walks or runs back to the playground, makes a longer excursion to get a toy, etc. To keep its balance, a child prefers running to walking. The swift, but short, runs dominate, and develop the inner organs.
 2. The runner gets to learn his ability. He doesn't tie himself up on a certain task (such as a run of 2 English miles on the track, or 3 separate 220 yard sprints at a certain pace, for example), but he is forced to explore. It is not the fixed courses that make a Professor out of a student, but the student's spirit of exploration, his studies of other explorers and his friendship with them. It is the same thing with an athlete. Fartlek is such a field of investigation. Fartlek is rich in contests, richer for the athlete with a creative power and the ability of deciding where there is a limit for his strength; that is to say, the ability to decide for himself when the training is no longer improving him, but destroying instead.
- But don't believe now, that Fartlek can work wonders. It might open the eyes of American runners and teach them that the road to success is called WORK, hard work! And sleep and rest; that is, to give the body back what it has given out during the training. Lots of sleep and rest is just as important as the training itself.
- Another detail that belongs to my school of running besides Fartlek, and which I find just as important for a runner's development as Fartlek is: two to four hours walking on cross-country once a week, on the day when the athlete is free from his work or his studies.
- If these lines can help American boys in gaining better results, I'd feel very glad, because then I have in some small way, for myself and my Country, been able to thank

INTERNATIONAL CROSS COUNTRY

Dublin, Mar 26—Alain Mimoun of France, runner-up to Zatopek in the Olympic 10,000 meters, won the International Cross Country championship over a 9-mile course. Mimoun caught Raphael Pujazon, France's three-time international champion, 20 yards from the tape and won by three yards.

SOUTH AFRICAN STARS

South Africa is developing several athletes of international class. Although their best-known athlete, Denis Shore has been laid up with a bad Achilles tendon, he has managed to run 600 yards in 1:09.9 and won the Northern Transvaal 440 for the 15th consecutive year in 48.3.

Several young stars are developing fast. George Lubbe, 19, has twice run 53.2 for the 440 hurdles. Ian de Jong, 18, has high jumped 6'4 7/8" and ran the high hurdles in 14.8.

Another 18-year-old, Imelius Pienaar has run a 1:54 880. D. Hasenjager, a consistent 24-foot broad jumper, has a best of 24'10 1/2". In the marathon, Olympic 4th-place winner, Coleman, 6th-place winner, Luty, and Hayward have all run under 2 hours 33 minutes this year. High jump record holder Les Barnes has cleared 6'5 3/4".

TADDIA THROWS HAMMER 176'10"

Bologna, April 10—Hammer thrower Tesco Taddia of Italy was the outstanding performer in the inaugural meet of the Italian track season. Taddia, who narrowly failed to reach the Olympic final last year, did 175'10" to win his event by a comfortable margin. His teammate Adolfo Consolini showed normal early season form, winning the discus throw at 168'4 7/8", while Tosi (Triest) apparently started out in low gear, doing 165'6 1/4". Tonino Sidi (Brescia) won the 400 mtrs. in slow time (49.7), but was unexpectedly beaten by Roghi (Rome) in the 100 mtrs.

BRAZIL HAS TOP-FLIGHT MEN IN HOP, STEP & JUMP

The hop, step and jump was the top feature of the Brazilian Championships held at São Paulo on March 18. Three men, all members of the Brazilian Olympic team, exceeded 15 meters (49'2 1/2"). The winner, Helio Coutinho da Silva, did 49'1 7/8", while Olympic finalist Geraldo de Oliveira was a close second at 49'10" 3/8. Ademair Silva was third at 49'3 3/4". Sprinter Haroldo P. Silva ran the 100 mtrs. in 10.6. Other noteworthy marks: 400 mtrs. R. da Costa Ramos 49.5; 400 m.h. E.A. Abreu 55.5; Hammer, B.C. Barros 152' 3/8".

Reggie Pearman anchored both winning NYU efforts, scoring easily in the 3:15.6 mile relay and holding off Mal Whitfield's drive in the sprint medley. Whitfield was clocked in 1:52.5 for his anchor 880 and Pearman in 1:53.5 as the Violets beat Ohio State by eight yards. NYU finished second in the distance medley and four mile relays.

Ohio State was a surprise elimination in the mile heats as Whitfield ran a 47.7 leg but was nipped at the finish by Frank Fox of Seton Hall who qualified his team with a 47.4 lap. NYU won the heat in 3:16.6 with Cornell second and Seton Hall third. Pearman, passing Whitfield with 60 yards to go, tried to rouse the latter by yelling "Come on, man, they're coming up", but the Olympic champ didn't lift in time.

Wayne's victories were in the sprint relays. Leon Winzo Irving Petross, Wright and Buddy Coleman captured the 440 in 41.7 and the half mile in 1:28.0. Wright added to Wayne's weekend of glory with a victory in the broad jump at 23-8 1/2 and ran second to Chuck Peter's 9.7 hundred with Coleman third.

Ohio State salvaged the two mile in 7:44.4, Penn State took the four mile in 17:35.4 and Syracuse the distance medley in 10:08.1. The latter was a real thriller as Neil Pratt ran a 4:14.2 anchor to beat NYU's Larry Ellis (4:15.9) by 10 yards with Ronnie Wittreich of Princeton (4:16.5) another four yards behind. George Wade of Yale stepped a 4:15.4 mile to beat out Manhattan's Tom Comerford (4:19.5) for the fourth spot.
