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FOREWORD

The success obtained by our 1956 pioneer edition of WHO'S WHO IN OLYMPIC TRACK & FIELD has encouraged us to produce a similar reference book for the 1960 Olympics. Once again, this is an attempt to provide all the highly pertinent data on the most likely winners of medals in men's track & field competition. All members of the United States team are listed, along with leading performers from other continents. The number of athletes per event varies from 5 to 12, depending on the degree of uncertainty surrounding the event concerned. Marathoners and walkers, participants in somewhat unpredictable events and competing over varying courses, are very difficult to catalog statistically, and hence are not included. We should be able to remedy this and other minor deficiencies in future editions.

Progression tables are shown only for those events in which the man is expected to compete, but mention is also made of any notable marks he may have in other events.

We wish to acknowledge with thanks the assistance rendered by Dick Bank (Beverly Hills, Calif.), Ian Smith (Blackburn, Lancashire, England) and Heinz Vogel (Düsseldorf, Germany).

The 1956 IC4A champion while at Syracuse U., he could place only 11th in the NCAA meet. He missed the 1957 season because of an operation to remove bone chips in his elbow and transferred to Kansas U. in 1958 but did little throwing. In 1959 he set an American record of 270'1"1/2 (82.33) early in the season and won the NCAA Championship but missed the AAU meet to have bone chips dissolved in his elbow. In 1960 he again won the NCAA title with 268'9" (81.92), after throwing 273'10"1/2 (83.48) at Houston. He placed second in the AAU meet, losing to Al Cantello, and finished second to Cantello again in the Olympic Trials. A week after the Trials, he set a world record of 283'8" (86.46) at West Chester, Pa. World Ranking: 1959, 5th.

Biggest man in the U.S. team, has improved for six straight years. Was third in NCAA as soph, tied with Al Oerter in 1958 with 186'2" (56.74). That year he also won AAU with 187'10" (57.25) and had downhill throw over 200 feet that was "adjusted" to 198'10" (60.60). Defeated Russians and Poles in Europe. Fifth in AAU in 1959 and third this year. Came through in big meet before home town crowd with win in Olympic Trials and personal record of 192'3"1/2 (58.61). Has been over 200 feet (nearly 61 m) in practice. World Ranking: 1957, 2nd; 1958, 1st; 1959, 4th.

Junior member of U.S. hammer team, began throwing at U.S. Military Academy (West Point). Placed second to Ireland's John Lawlor in 1959 NCAA, became Olympic possible with 203' (61.87) throw in same year. Has proved consistent this season, throwing 203' again in Interservice Ch., 205'7" (62.66) for fourth in AAU and 205'11" (62.76) for third in Olympic Trials. A career Army officer.

A good college runner at the U. of North Carolina, he has developed into a world class runner since coming under the tutelage of Mihály Igloi at the Santa Clara County Youth Village late last year. A 4:31 miler in high school, he placed second in the NCAA 2 mile in 1955 with 9:07.6 and was runner-up in the 5000 at the 1956 NCAA meet with 14:51.1. He ran in the Olympic Trials but placed only tenth in 15:36.4. He ran a 4:06.5 mile in 1957 but injured his foot late in the season, although he was sixth in the AAU mile in 4:09.8. Ran the mile only in 1958 and took fifth at the Drake Relays in 4:13.4. Sat out the 1959 season but then returned to running under Igloi and in his first race, a 2 mile at the Los Angeles Indoor Invitational, he won in 8:57.0. He ran the mile in 4:05.4 at the New York A.C. Games, whipping Dyrol Burleson. Outdoors, he set an American mile record of 3:58.0 at the California Relays and a week later set an American record of 13:51.7 for the 5000 at the Compton Invitational, after passing the 3 mile mark in 13:28.0. He was edged out for the AAU 5000 title by Bill Dellinger but won the Olympic Trials in 14:13.6.

An unknown before this season, he has benefited much from competition with teammate Bill Alley at Kansas U. He has improved as the season progressed, throw-

ing 216'6" (65.99) in the Big 8 Championships, 242'8 1/2" (73.98) at the Houston Meet of Champions, 245'7" (74.85) for third in the NCAA meet, 236'9" (72.16) for fifth in the AAU meet and 255'11" (78.00) for third in the Olympic Trials. He did little throwing in 1959, passing up his year of remaining college eligibility for the 1960 season. A major in petroleum engineering while at Kansas, he is a licensed pilot.

A fine all-around performer from Tenn. A.&I., he now ranks as one of the best broad jumpers in the world. At the Olympic Trials he won with a wind-aided 26'6 1/2" (8.09) but had legitimate leaps of 26'4 1/4" (8.03) and 26' 1/4" (7.93). Won the NCAA title by a half inch (1.27 cms) but could place only sixth in the AAU meet. Won the NAIA title at 25'7 1/4" (7.80) and jumped 7.80 (25'7") at Istanbul, Turkey, in April. Came into prominence last year when he placed third in the NCAA broad jump and fourth in the AAU. Is a fine decathlon prospect, with bests of 14.1 in the high hurdles, 6'9" (2.057) in the high jump, 13'8" (4.16) in the pole vault and 22.4 in the low hurdles. Has fair speed and can do a 9.7 100 yards. He experienced a great deal of step trouble at the NCAA and AAU meets. World Ranking: 1959, 8th.

Although ranked third in the world in 1956, he missed out on the Olympics because a leg injury slowed him down in the Trials and he could only place eighth. He won the 1955 NCAA title but was second in the same meet in 1957. He

was second in the 1957 AAU, tied for second in the 1958 AAU and won in 1959. During the 1959 indoor season he set a world indoor record of 15'9 5/8" (4.81). At the 1960 Olympic Trials he upped the world outdoor mark to 15'9 1/4" (4.80). Was the 1959 Pan American champion and won in the 1959 U.S.-U.S.S.R. dual meet. This former Villanova athlete was a good high school vaulter. His nickname is "Tarzan" and he would like to play that part in the movies. World Ranking: 1955, 2nd; 1956, 3rd; 1957, 3rd; 1958, 9th; 1959, 1st.

A former Villanova U. distance runner who is in his first year of marathon running. He placed sixth in the Boston marathon but was the fourth American in 2 h 28:44. Then placed third in the AAU marathon with 2 h 32:41. Although born in the U.S., he was raised in Scotland. Later came back to native country and enrolled at Villanova. He was the 1955 IC4A indoor mile champion, running 4:19.9, and in 1956 won the IC4A outdoor two mile in 9:20.1. He finished fourth in the 1957 NCAA two mile in 9:03.4 and ran 4:09.3 for the mile the same year. He did not compete in 1958 but the following year he moved up to the longer distances and placed fourth in the AAU 10,000 and took sixth in the same event at the Pan American Games in 31:18.6. His best 5000 meter time last year was 14:32.1. He started road racing in the fall and won National AAU titles at 15 and 30 kilometers.

A former New Jersey schoolboy champion, he was eliminated in the semis of the 100 meters at the NCAA meet but placed fourth in the AAU team and won a place on the team by taking second at the Trials. Only a sophomore, he won the Millrose Games 60 yards and repeated in the same event at the IC4A indoor meet. Placed second in the IC4A 100 yards. He also took third in the 220 (straightaway) in 20.8. He has a withered calf from polio.

Latest of Oregon distance stars (in the wake of Jim Bailey, Bill Dellinger, Jim Grelle), came to attention when he ran best ever high school mile (4:12.2) in 1958 AAU heat. Defeated only once as a freshman (outkicked by Grelle in minor meet). Won AAU, Pan Am Games and Russian dual meet, all with big finish after slow pace. Set collegiate freshman mile record of 4:06.7. This year he was beaten twice by Jim Beatty (indoors and at California Relays). Ran 3:58.6 for national record but lost it to Beatty's 3:58.0. Won NCAA in 3:44.2 and Olympic Trials in 3:46.9, after suffering bad cold all week. Has run 1:50.0 for 880 yards.

A great hurdler since 1956, stands out as an extremely hard to beat competitor. Runs better with the chips down. Scored upset by tying world record holder Jack Davis in 1956 Olympic Trials and beating Davis in great 1956 Olympic Final as both ran 13.5 into strong wind on soft track. Swept the boards in 1957, winning NAIA, NCAA and AAU, then sat out 1958 on AAU suspension for being married on television and receiving gifts. Came back in 1959 to win AAU (14.0). This year started slowly, losing indoors, but with definite plan in mind. Worked hard for six weeks before Olympic Trials, running second in AAU with 13.6 and winning Trials with 13.4. Aims to recapture world record, feels it may come at Rome or elsewhere in Europe. Service veteran, graduated from North Carolina College. Has run lows in 22.8. World Ranking: 1956, 2nd; 1957, 2nd; 1959, 3rd.

Noted for his colorful dive style of throwing, this onetime LaSalle College athlete finished seventh in the 1956 AAU meet but fouled out of the Olympic Trials. He was the 1953 Penn Relays champion and won IC4A javelin titles in 1953-54-55. He finished third in the 1954 NCAA meet and second in 1955. He missed most of the 1957 season because of illness but returned in 1958 to place second in the AAU meet with a 244' (74.37) effort. He placed third in the US-Russia dual meet. In 1959 he won the AAU title after setting a world record of 282'3 1/2 (86.04) at the Compton Invitational. He took the javelin at the US-Russia dual meet but could place only third in the Pan American Games. He was bothered by a bad back in the early part of 1960 but won the AAU title with a heave of 271'9" (82.83) and took the Olympic Trials with 277'7" (84.61). He has defeated Bill Alley the two times they have met this season. He is usually very consistent and he says this is his last year of throwing. World Ranking: 1959, 4th.

First attracted attention with 20.8yt in heat of 1958 NCAA, but was only 7th in final. Had been star football player, mediocre sprinter in high school. Won Army European Championship in 10.5 in 1956, ran 10.3 at Bad Hersfeld, Germany. Placed third in both NCAA (21.1yt) and AAU (21.2mt) in 1959 and second in Pan American Games. This year he was unheard of until May but placed second in AAU (21.0mt) and third in Trials (20.9mt). A strong finisher. Had professional football offer while at Ohio U. World Ranking: 1959, 7th.

One of the surprises on the 1960 Olympic team, he finally realized his potential by clearing 15'3" (4.65) at the Trials, an improvement of six inches (15.2 cms) over his previous best. He was hampered by injury in the 1958 and 1959 seasons, but won the Missouri Valley Conference title this year. He tied for second in the NCAA meet at 14'6" (4.42). While at North Texas State, he also competed in the high jump, broad jump and javelin. His seasonal best prior to the Trials was 14'9" (4.49), which he made in a pentagonal meet at Abilene in April.

A fine competitor who does best running when it counts. In 1958 he ran 4:07.3 for seasonal best to finish fifth in NCAA mile. In 1959 NCAA mile he also ran seasonal best, 4:05.6, for second place. Competed for St. John's in New York City. Now in the Marines, came into Trials with best of 3:44.7, again in the biggest meet of the year, the AAU. Finished fast to catch fading Ed Moran in last yard of Olympic Trials with 3:49.0 third place in slow-paced run.

Regular improvement and strong competitive ability feature this two-time NCAA champion. Went from 160'3" (48.84) as a frosh to (180'8"1/2) 55.08 as a junior, when he first broke into the big time. His 1959 season included an NCAA win with 178' (54.25), third in the AAU with 180'8" (55.07) and second in the Pan Am Games, all of which earned him the No. 8 spot

in World Ranking. This year he started slowly due to lack of competition, but came strongly at the end of the year. Won the NCAA again with 188'3"1/2 (57.39) and placed third in the Olympic Trials with fifth round heave of 181'11" (55.45) (* High school discus--31lbs9oz/1.61 kgs)

Prepared for steeplechase for four years before 1956 Games, won Olympic Trials in 9:00.3. Ran two miles in still national record 8:48.0 just before Games but had a bad cold in decisive test and went unplaced (9:10) in heat. Did not steeplechase in 1957 but came back strongly in 1958, placing second in AAU and earning overseas trip. Ran 8:47.6 for second against USSR, then lowered national record to fine 8:40.8 against Poland and finished with 8:43.4 vs. Hungary. Last year he won AAU in slow 9:19.3 in high altitude and took Pan Am Games in 8:56.4. Won this year's AAU in 8:55.6, was upset by George Young in final Trials with 8:51.0. Competed for Southern Illinois U., now for U. of Chicago Track Club. Ran 4:03.8 indoor mile this year, won indoor AAU. World Ranking: 1958, 6th.

World ranked since 1955 and world record holder since 1956. Is tough competitor, who has suffered from lack of competition at home. Has short, withered left arm, is married to the 1956 women's Olympic discus champion, Olga Fikotová, formerly of Czechoslovakia. Won Olympics in 1956 with 63.19 (207'3"1/2) after setting world record of 224'10"1/2 (68.54) in pre-Olympic meet. In 1958 he upped the world record to 225'4" (68.68) in winning AAU, then beat Russians with 67.28 (220'8"1/2) In 1959 he got one off to 226'1"1/2 (68.92) but lost record because of over-

size ring. Won AAU, lost to Rudenkov in US-Russia meet and to Hall in Pan Am Games. Won AAU this year with near record 22'4"1/2 (68.39) although injured, and placed second to Hall in Olympic Trials with 21'2"3"1/2 (64.71) while suffering additional injury. The slowest of America's top half milers (49.2 for 440y), obviously has to depend on fast early pace. Usually hits 600 meters in about 1:18, produces fast races and lively finishes. Has had two good seasons, finishing third in both NCAA and AAU in 1959. This year he was third in NCAA with 1:47.6m after 1:48.3m heat. In Olympic Trials he set pace then tied for second with 1:47.8 in heat, set pace again and finished third with 1:47.5 in final, edging Jim Dupree by narrow margin. Ran mile in 4:12.1 last year, improved to excellent 4:00.4 this year, after setting stage for Burleson's US record (3:58.6). Suffered mid-season illness. An excellent student who has graduate fellowship for next year.

Placed second in NCAA in 1959 (51.3) and won this year (50.8). Was third in final trials (49.9), fastest intermediate hurdle race ever.
