

RRCA POSTAL MEET OF MILES

ANSWERS and OBJECTIVE...

We have received many letters concerning last year's staging of the RRCA Meet of Miles, a national yearly event sponsored by the Road Runners Club of America.

Many questions were raised regarding the coordination of this event.

KEN YOUNG, the co-chairman and the man in charge of computer tabulation, has written the following article in order to answer the questions presented by our readers and to explain the regulations governing this event.

In response to three letters in STARTING LINE regarding the Meet of Miles in particular and age-grouping in general, there are a few comments I would like to make.

The receipt of results for the Meet of Miles depends on the particular race director submitting the results prior to the deadline and the delivery of those results by the US Postal Service. The 1976 event included nine sections. However, I know of at least two other sections that were held and the results were not received.

In prior years, we have not had this problem. Henceforth, race directors are instructed to inform me as to their intention to hold a section of the Meet of Miles. I will respond by mail, acknowledging their intent. If results from that section are not received prior to the deadline, I will contact the race director to determine if his section was actually held and, if so, whether the results were mailed. I will respond on receipt of any race results so that race directors will know that their results were received. If they do not hear from me within a reasonable period of time, they should resubmit the results. In this way, I hope to avoid the problems we had with the 1976 Meet of Miles.

Ms. Doody mentions in her letter (December '76 issue) that the Rialto Road Runners "miraculously appear" in the final standings when the Blue Angels did not. The Rialto RR were included from the section held in Pleasant Hill, California. No results were received from Dominguez Hills. Only five Rialto RR's ran at Pleasant Hill.

What type of age cut-off is proper for age competitions? The only physiologically realistic measure is the actual age as of the day of the race.

The running ability of young children improves so rapidly at the younger ages that discrepancies in physiological age of only a few months may drastically affect the outcome of races. For example, the improvement between age 6 years 0 days and 7 years 0 days is roughly 2 minutes per mile. This is 10 seconds per month. Most races are decided by much smaller margins than this.

Thus, it would be unfair to allow a runner 8 years and 3 months to compete in the 7 and under division simply due to the luck of having a birthdate just after January 1st. It would also be unfair for a runner to set an age group record and place second in that division being beaten by another runner who was placed in that age division by happenstance while not being eligible for any record set in that division. For these reasons, the RRCA Meet of Miles will consider age as of the day of the race.

Since we consider age as of the day of the race, the particular time of the year that the performance is made is really of no bearing when comparing to other performances. We assume that the physiological age is the basis for comparison. This is the basis for comparing age records and this is the simplest method of making valid comparison for a nation-wide meet such as the Meet of Miles.

The extremes of climate within the United States make it grossly unfair to restrict the Meet of Miles to even a one month period. Ideal weather in the southern states such as Florida, south Texas and southern Arizona is in January and February. Ideal weather in the northern states is in early summer and during the fall. By allowing sections to be held over an extended period from February thru June, we allow each section to choose the most favorable climatic conditions for them. Otherwise, we would be unfairly penalizing some sections and giving unfair advantage to others. We realize that no system is perfect. We feel this system minimizes the inequities.

Each year, a number of runners enter two sections of the Meet of Miles. Since there is no way each race director can determine whether or not a given runner has already participated in another section, the responsability for screening lies with me. I find that, in general, the two performances by the same runner, differs by less than 10 seconds and usually differ by only a few seconds. This usually makes a difference of a few places but does not greatly affect the overall outcome.

Since the same opportunity is basically available to all runners, I have adopted the procedure of choosing the faster of the tow times. The alternative to this is to choose the first of the tow performaces. In the latter case, a runner would not be able to improve on his/her first performance. I am open to suggestions in this regard. If you have strong feelings one way or the other on this matter, drop me a postcard. I will adopt the procedure that receives the most 'votes" prior to the deadline for the 1977 Meet of Miles results (June 30, 1977).

The complete results of the Meet of Miles are being distributed to race directors following compilation and printing of the results. Over 250 copies of the 1976 results were mailed to race directors at the various sites. The race directors at each site are responsible for distributing these copies to coaches and individuals participating in their section.

The results list the names, places, times, age and birthdates, team names, age-graded point level and site for each finisher. The team standings for all three runners teams are included. Starting with the 1977 summary, the Meet of Miles age records will be included. Sections not included in 1976 should submit their results so that they may be considered for age records.

I hope that the procedures to be implemented in 1977 will reduce some of the problems in co-ordinating the various sites around the country. We will try to remain responsive to the needs and desires of the runners and welcome any suggestions for improvements in the Meet of Miles.

I hope that you will continue to support this program. If you have questions regarding the Meet of Miles, I will try to answer them.

From the Mail Box

NATIONAL STANDARDS FOR MEETS...

Recently we attended a Region II JO qualifier in Washington, DC. Although the club holding the meet did as well as they could, it was much too big for the handful of officials.

There were a number of problems, such as so starting gun, false starts in almost every age group (these were not called back), trouble in the chute, starting before children were out of their warm-ups, one man to handle registration, awards, etc...

The biggest problem was the course and the length of the course. The course funnelled almost immediately into a 4 foot path, in which it was almost impossible to get out of the pack as you could not run alongside the path because of hidden roots. This resulted in many runners being knocked down.

The whole point of this letter is that for a meet of this importance certain requirements should be met: number of officials, exact length of the course, course that can be run safely and competitively, etc.. If these requirements can not be met, then the club should not be allowed to host the meet.

We feel that certain national standards should be set for meets of importance and we would like to know if other parents, coaches and athletes feel the same way.

General interest items (in contrast to news merely of your team or of one individual) are more useful. We want material on both **boys** and girls (such as schedules of upcoming events, new teams or programs, background info on area, athletes, etc.), especially from areas which haven't gotten much space before.

(Photo at left) 17 year-old DWAYNE EVANS from Phoenis, AZ, was without doubt the best young athlete to ever come out from the Age-Group ranks. By taking a bronze medal in the 200 meters at the Olympic Games, at Montreal, he became the first prep medalist in 24 years. We have been covering the career of this young man since he was 10 year-old, back in 1969, when, as a member of the Hornets Track Club, he was running the 100 in 12.2 and long jumping 15-3. Under the careful tutelage of his coach and mentor Richard Thompson, his progression over the years was constant: 1970 (Age 11) - 11.6/100, 27.5/220 and $16-1\frac{1}{2}$ in the long jump; 1971 (12) - 11.1/100, 25.5/220; 1972 (13) - 10.5/ 100, 24.1/220 and 19-11½/long jump; 1973 (14) - 10.1/100, 22.5/220; 1974 (15) - 9.7/100 and 21.4/220; 1975 (16) 9.4/100 and 20.9m/200m (both All-time best performances); and in 1976 (17) 9.44me (equivalent to 9.2 hand timed) in the 100 and 20.22me/200m, both marks the best ever by far. He will be only 21 by the time of the 1980 Olympics in

(photo at right) CHANDRA CHEESEBOROUGH was the top Junior Woman athlete of the year in both sprints in 1976. Her highest achievement was her 6th place finish in the 100m at the Olympic Games at Montreal, as a 17 year-old. In the shorter sprint, she ran fifteen races at 11.49m or better (11.49 electronic timing is equivalent to 11.3 hand timed). She was the Woman's National Champion and the runner-up at the Olympic trials in Eugene behind the great Brenda Morehead (also a former age group star). In the furlong, she was devastating, becoming the fastest U.S. Junior ever. She finished second again at the Trials, going to Montreal where she barely missed the finals in a star studded international field. She ran seven races under 23.2m in '76 with a best of 23.17m. No doubt one of our brightest star for the future.

** NATIONAL JUNIOR OLYMPIC CHAMPIONSHIP Meet, now sponsored by Sears along with the AAU, is scheduled (along with other National JO sports) at the University of Nebraska in Lincoln on August 11-14, 1977. Six new events have been added at the national level (boys discus/1.6 kg, triple jump, javelin/800 gram, and 330 yard hurdles/36" plus girls javelin/600 gram and 400 meter hurdles/30"). Boys javelin and girls 400 meter hurdles are limited to Senior (16-17) Age Group.

ARROW TRACK CLUB

From sleeping tiger to number One in N. California Submitted by LEE HEIZMAN

The growth of track and field for age group boys and girls in the Los Altos and Mountain View areas have surpassed even the wildest dreams of it's founder Greg Elliot.

Elliot formed the local Arrow TC in February 1973 when he perceived that the area was ripe for a sports alternative to Little League baseball. For years Elliot and his teaching partner Dick Liewer had developed outstanding track talent at Santa Rita school in Los Altos, only to see this interest wain due to lack of competition following Los Altos'one and only meet, the Junior Olympics. Consequently, following months of phone calls and sifting through AAU red tape, Elliot received permission to form his track club.

Club supporters remember that 1st season as a "lean" year. By the time the regional championships rolled around, only weight kingpin Diane Bishop could be counted on as a point—getter for the girls squad. The ladies took a long, dismal ride home from Lake Tahoe's olympic track, registering only 9 3/4 points for the entire championship meet! The boys lagged in the same manner with only Ray Spoorenberg gaining prominence with a win in the 100 yd Dash. Of the 120 youngsters who attended low-key practice sessions that first season, only 25 returned to start the 1974 campaign.

Following months of discussion (often very loud) the coaching staff shifted gears and "structured" the Arrow program. Practice sessions were required three nights per week and they were difficult by anyone's standards. The local club progressed slowly like a sleeping tiger, with the girls squad finally astounding the odds makers by finishing third with 125 pts in the regional finals. Perrin Brew spearheaded the Arrow effort and Karyn Hinkelman later became the State high jump champion. Leaping on the bandwagon, the brother team of Dennis and Charlie Lewis, plus tough Dave Stronum led a strong boy's contingent to a similar third place showing. Of the 1974 squad, about 85% returned the following year.

In 1975 Arrow placed third overall in the Pacific Association championship meet, while competing with 21 other northern California clubs. At the national level, young David Smathers won first place for the 9-under in the mile rave walk and set a new U.S. record for that event. Dave was supported by five other boys who finished in the top ten of their individual events. Meanwhile, Beth Harrison and Amy Spangler represented ATC at the Women's and Junior Women's National X-Country meets and Jack Kurr won the state championships for 12-13 boys. In addition, Kelly Brogan, 9, was tops in the country for the triathlon at the National AAU Junior Olympics.

More than 150 youngsters showed up for the start of the 1976 season, most successful in the ATC's brief history. Arrow girls carried away the Pacific Association trophy in all three age divisions. 11 year-old Laura Heizman took three firsts in her division, breaking her own national record in the 50 yard hurdles, and setting a new PAAU record in the long jump with a leap of 16-1½. 13 year-old Gillian De Lear dominated the 12-13 shot put while Tammy Billik captured the discus event. Elizabeth Pike finished 1st in the 9-under 880 walk, barely missing the record. Vicky Bray and Gillian DeLear both gained state championships in the mile run and discus respectively.

In the boys division, the 10-11 group captured the PAAU trophy, while the 12-13 were third and the 9-under fourth. Dave Smathers, 10, set another national record in the mile Race Walk (8:22.2). Jeff Rossman, also 10, captured a 1st in the triple jump, setting a national standard and David Cowell set a new N. Cal record in the 12-13 discus (141-7).

Other outstanding performers were Brian Bergstrom, Brian Kovacs, Steve Castro, Glen Olds, Jim Palmisano, Reid Johnson. Charlie Lewis, Bill Lull, Mark Ibrahim and A.J. Grossman, to name a few whose performances were among the best in the nation.

Arrow finished the season as the number one club in Northern California and is now looking ahead to 1977. The club is planning to offer specialized assistance to beginners or less mature tracksters who are not yet ready to meet the heavy practice or meet schedule demands of the AAU.

The coaches are considering forming an Arrow J.V., a neophyte branch of the parent club that will participate in some meets and many low key "fun-run" type activities.

Arrow is getting ready and with its own "farm system" should pounce again...and again...and again.

Since 1971 STARTING LINE has ranked the top ten USA Junior Women on the basis of the entire season record. As in previous ratings, the rank of each athlete for 1976 is based on her competitive record outdoors, as known by the compiler of the Junior lists, Bill Peck. In other words, the rankings are merely the subjective opinion (hopefully based entirely on objective facts) of one person, to indicate the realtive value of the series of performances of each athlete throughout the year. The rankings are not based on a hypothetical clash of the athletes concerned.

Girls were ranked on the basis of three actors: (1) performance in the most important meets of the year ... National AAU Junior & Senior Championships at Westwood, Olympic Trials in Eugene, US International Team meets in West Germany and the Soviet Union, National Junior Olympic Championships in Memphis as well as other major school, AAU and other competition, (2) consistency throughout the year...determined by the series of marks in the event considered, and (3) best mark in the event for the year...as reflected in the Best Performers List for 1976, which follows each ranking.

High school programs continued to add depth to the general quality of Junior Women's track in the United States (though it proved more difficult to obtain results of interscholastic competition in 1976). Some events remain very weak (long jump the most notable example) while others (like the high jumps, middle and long distances) continue to improve at a rapid rate, both in quality and depth. For some juniors (as well as recent junior graduates), 1976 was an Olympic year, and several achieved the dream of competing in greatest of all (even with politics and commercialism) athletic occasions

100 Meter/ 100 Yard Dash

1-CHANDRA CHEESEBOROUGH, cool and stylish all the way thru the Olympic finals at Montreal (sixth place), ran fifteen races of 11.49m (= 11.3m hand timed) or better, while winning the Senior AAU and finishing runner-up at the Olympic Trials /ranked 2nd in 1974 and 9th in 1973/. 2-KATHEY CRAWFORD, the high school discovery of the year, was undefeated in junior competition outdoors after a brilliant indoor season, winning the AAU Junior plus USSR and West German dual meets and running 11.5m+ six times. 3-PAM WATERS, whose raw talent carried her to the California high school title, third and fifth places in the AAU Junior and Senior meets (recording five times under 11.5m), passed up the international tour for religious reasons. 4-BRENDA CALHOUN, daughter of two-time Olympic gold medallist hurdler Lee, was consistent under pressure, placing sixth in the Senior AAU and reaching the semis at Eugene. 5-BRENDA WINSTON, though failing to make the final in the Junior AAU, returned to place eighth in the senior meet, after many fast early season races (five under 11.5m).

6-LORENE SPEARMAN, sped to fast times in Indiana high school meets (totaled at least seven races of 11.88m or better) and ran a solid fifth in the AAU Junior meet.
7-ELAINE PARKER, though not as fast on the clock as those above (11.8m or better nine times), beat Spearman and Winston at Westwood (fourth) for spot on European tour.
8-LISA HOPKINS, skipped the meets at Westwood, but reached the Olympic trials finals (eighth) and beat fast people.
9-BRENDA FULLER, reportedly ran 10.4y in South Carolina HS competition, then won the Junior Olympic Nationals.
10-LORI GREEN, was USTFF champ, had two races of 10.6y but finished behind Fuller (third) at the JO Meet in Memphis.

Many others, such as Freda Hancock, Rhonda Brady and Val Boyer (who had fast times) plus youngsters Felicia Dupuch and Gwen Laud (who proved better than average in big meets) were hard to leave out of the top ten. Even age grouper Michelle Glover, who was by far the best of her class, could be considered. Always good depth in AAU competition, though not as much as might be expected in high school programs in the short sprint.

200 Meter/ 220 Yard Dash

1-CHEESEBOROUGH, capped a brilliant Florida high school career and became the fastest USA junior ever, without doubt (seven times under 23.2m in 1976 alone), finishing second at Eugene and barely missing the finals at the Montreal Olympics (sixth in semi-final) /ranked 1st in 1975/. 2-GWEN SMITH, four times Texas high school champ, confirmed her class by finishing runner-up (to fellow Texan Stephanie Brown) in the AAU Junior and winning against West German juniors after seven races under 24.0m /9th ranked 1975/. 3-FREDA HANCOCK, more successful as a long sprinter, was a finalist twice at Westwood, finished a solid sixth at Eugene and was under 24.00m four times /3rd ranked in 1975/. 4-FRIEDA COBBS, was ahead of Hancock in the AAU Junior (third) but behind her in the Seniors, traded places with Smith in the International Junior meets in Europe and somewhat slower on the clock (7 under 24.2m) /rated 4th in '75/. 5-WATERS just about duplicated her high school and open performances in the 100y/100m, finishing fourth in the long sprint at the Junior AAU and running under 24.5y four times.

6-"NETTA" YOUNG was consistent in mid-season, reaching the AAU Junior final (eighth) and running at least five races of 24.5m or better.

7-LOREME SPEARMAN did not compete in furlong in national meets but was very fast in high school meets in Indiana. 8-VAL BOYER ran often and consistently against the best, barely missing the finals twice at Westwood and recording at least 8 races of 24.6m or better /10th ranked in 1975/. 9-CHERYL GILLIAM, Michigan high schooler, was below par at Westwood but won over many speedsters at the National JO. 10-JENNIE GORHAM, had a very fast race in local competition but failed to duplicate the time, while running second to Gilliam at Memphis.

Kansan Lori Green and Connecticut's Brenda Calhoun could have been ranked on the basis of, respectively, one fast time and a place in the AAU Junior. Age grouper Glover wasn't far behind, as a never ending supply of sprinters (especially Texas high schoolers) begin to get more national exposure.

440 Yard Dash

1-ROBIN CAMPBELL ranks with Mable Fergerson as the best American junior ever in this event. Though she didn't come close to her brilliant international and domestic record of the previous year, Robin was the top true junior at Westwood (second in the Junior AAU) and at Eugene (semi-finals) in addition to four sub-54.0m races /ranked lst in 1975, 6th in 1974 and 5th in 1973/.

2-CHRIS MULLEN started the year as a promising Massachusetts high schooler and finished with a fast-closing third in the AAU Junior, followed by a third and second, respectively vs. USSR and GFR, recording four under 54.5m efforts. 3-KIN THOMAS added to the strong metropolitan New York middle distance tradition with four 54.6m or better outings, besting Mullen at Talinn, and just behind her at Westwood. 4-JENNIE GORHAM improved on her exceptional age group credits by trouncing the best intermediates at the Westwood and followed with a decisive National JO win, with 3 x 54.2y,s. 5-SHERRIE GOLDEN, a Texas school sprinter, was not as fast generally as the top four, but finished sixth at Westwood then dipped under 54.0m as a non-scoring winner in Germany.

6-SUE HAYNES, Iowa high school product, finished just ahead of Golden at Westwood and had three races under 55.lm.
7-MARQUITA BELK, California prep champ on the day after her fifteenth birthday, was seventh in the Junior AAU and had at least six one lapper of 56.0y or better.

8-CAROLYN DIGBY, completely unknown as the season began, dominated Oregon high school competition, then belied her age (15) and inexperience by reaching the AAU Junior finals 9-PAMELA SEDWICK took all-comers in dominating Indiana high school meets, then finished a solid third at the National Junior Olympics, recording three 55.0y races or better.

10-SHERRYLYNN BROWN, another age group phenom, finished one place ahead of Sedwick at Memphis and was a consistent runner up in big meets, but not nearly as fast clockwise.

Other young talents, like Linda Portasik of Virginia and Dana Arnim of Washington, plus New York's Rosemarie Giampalmo could have been ranked. There is an unending supply of talent in this event, though age group talent was down a little from 1975 - "only" 33 age groupers (youth and midget) under 60.0 seconds for 440 yards, compared to 36 the previous year. And the juniors contribute mightily on the international scene, Sheila Ingram's impressive year (especially at Montreal) being the most recent example.

1-KATHY WESTON, having abondoned shorter races altogether, chose the right moment to run her best two-lapper, qualifythird at Eugene for the Olympic team. Previously she had run a strong second in the Senior AAU and later ran a respectable 2:03.3m in a heat at Montreal in super company. Along the way, Kathy recorded no less than seven races under 2:05.0m for the second year /1st in 1975, 3rd in 1974/. 2-LYNN HOLLINS, after a year away from track, trained in Florida with Brooks Johnson and returned better than ever, winning the AAU Junior, finishing seventh in the AAU Senior and getting the runner-up spot in both International Dual Meets in Europe /5th ranked in 1974 and 1973/. 3-KAREL JONES, New York newcomer, was very consistent with no less than nine races under 2:09.5m, finishing third in the Junior AAU, one place ahead of Hollins in the Senior AAU and just behind Lynn at Talinn and Ludenscheid. 4-JOHANNA FORMAN ran very well to make the finals in the AAU Senior and reached the semi-finals at Eugene, but generally ran in the 2:14 range /3rd in 1975, 8th in 1974/. 5-JULIE STIBBE, at 15, improved greatly to grab a solid sixth in the AAU Junior meet at Westwood.

6-ANN REGAN, just 14, was right behind Stibbe at Westwood and was under 2:12.4y on at least three occasions.
7-DANNA GLIDDEN, Minnesota high schooler, scored a tremendous upset win, over tough competition at the National JO.
8-ROBIN BLAINE ran behind teammate Jones in several races and faltered in the AAU Junior finals though she was faster at times than some of those ranked above /5th in 1975/.
9-CINDY WORCESTER, top prep runner in Kansas, got the runner-up spot at the National JO meet in Memphis.
10-DEANNA COLEMAN improved her superior age group bests with two races under 2:09.0y in local races, but could not keep up with Glidden, Worcester and others in her one big chance at Memphis in the National JO meet.

Spots fifth through tenth could have been ranked in any order and Texan Kathy Vetter could have been in the top ten as well. Most ran well once or twice, but had their inconsistencies. Several others were in the 2:11-2:15 range and fifteen age groupers were under 2:20 for 880 yards as well. The best prospects in the "half", however, are probably quarter-milers moving up (Weston, Jones, Regan, Blaine are examples) as the two-lappers go to the longer distances.

1500 Meter/ ONE Mile Run

1-JULIE SHEA, near the top of her age class for six years or more, became an internationalist for the first time by virtue of her third place finish at the AAU Junior. She was only fourth vs. the USSR juniors but scored a nice win in West Germany, accumulating five 1500m races under 4:31 during the year /9th ranked in 1975, 10th in 1974/.
2-MARGARET GROOS, though bothered by injury and illness in mid-season, hung on for fifth in the AAU Junior then scored with two good third places in both international dual meets while recording five 4:30.0m times or better /2nd in 1975/.

Times made at metric distances (marked "m") have been listed without conversion, but have been inserted into the proper position on the basis of average pace for the respective equivalent English distance.

3-LYNN JENNINGS followed up a fine cross country season with a solid fourth (ahead of Groos) at Westwood and dipped under 4:34.5m four times, after school meets in Mass.
4-PAULA ROSE, even faster than Shea as an age grouper had no less than seven races under 4:33.0m, but was just seventh in the AAU Junior /ranked 6th in 1975/5-ERYN FORBES, ran early and often in school and AAU meets, leading to a foot injury, lack of condition and under-par performances at Westwood and Eugene, yet she recorded six

1500m races under 4:34.0m /ranked 3rd in 1975/.

6-TANIA WELLS, feather-footed fourteen year-old, fought to a sixth place finish in the AAU Junior meet, then finished the season grandly, including a thrilling triumph in the National Junior Olympic meet in her hometown, Memphis.
7-AILEEN O'CONNOR, 15, paced Wells to fast times twice (including the exciting Memphis mile) trounced the best intermediates at Westwood and dipped under 5:00 miles five times.
8-ROBIN CAMPBELL whipped a top field in the Penn Relays 1500, but ran too seldom to be ranked higher /3rd in 1974/.
9-LYNN HOLLINS was runner-up to teammate Campbell at the Penn Relays, but like Robin concentrated on other events.
10-DEANNA COLEMAN reportedly was under 4:50 in a meet in Washington state, finished eighth in the AAU Junior and had three marks under 4:32.5 for 1500 meters (or equivalent).

Californians Kathy Adams and Linda Broderick could have been ranked on the basis of consistency. A five minute mile (4:37.1 for 1500 meters) "barrier" is a thing of the past. No fewer than 20 USA juniors accomplished the task in 1975. Too many of the young phenoms are not continuing to improve in their late teens, however. Some day these athletes - and more importantly, their coaches - may learn that 25 to 40 meets per year can have disastrous consequences.

1-AILEEN O'CONNOR early in 1975 was known in an about the District of Columbia, but by the end of 1976 she had established herself as the successor to Lynn Bjorklund as the top junior distance runner in the country, by virtue of a long string of wins from April thru cross country season, including National AAU Junior and Junior Olympic two mile wins (she ran at least five times under 10:49 for 2-miles). 2-KAREN CRAMOND makes up for lack of speed with a real fighting spirit which carried her to runner-up spot at the AAU Junior Women's meet /ranked 7th in 1975/. 3-JULIE SHEA, by far the longest strider among her peers in his event, lasted for fourth in the AAU Junior /8th in '75/ 4-BETTY SPRINGS emerged from Florida school competition to take a very solid second place at the National Jr. Olympic. 5-IRENE GRIFFITH, high schooler from the state of Washington, was not far behind Springs at the Memphis National JO. and ran under 11:00 for two miles no less than four times.

6-KATHY ADAMS regained most of her form of former years with a solid fifth in the AAU Junior and at least least three races under 10:09.0 for 300 meters /7th in 1974/. 7-LORA CARTWRIGHT ranked highly on the boys team at her Indiana junior high school so her solid fourth place finish at the National JO meet, at 14, should be no surprise.

8-ROXANNE BIER, though small in stature and young (14) in age, gave little ground in finishing sixth in the AAU Junior and whipping the intermediate field at Westwood. She garnered at least five sub-ll:01 (2 mile) clockings.
9-MARY KUNKEL, who high jumps as well, was the winner of the unseed flight (fifth best time) at Memphis.
10-DIANE BARRETT, National AAU Junior Women's Marathon Champ at age 15 (one of the few females ever to run under 2 hours and 50 minutes), dropped down to the two-mile "sprints" often enough to better 11:13 at least thrice.

100 meter Hurdles 30 Inch - 33 Inch

1-RHONDA BRADY, quicker than ever, repeated as the top ranking junior by winning sensationally at Westwood (over the strongest AAU Junior field ever) and, surprisingly, at Eugene. She had faltered somewhat in the AAU Senior (fifth) and was overmatched at Montreal (fifth in first round heat) but compiled an impressive nine races (33" hurdles) under 14.0 and fast 30" hurdles as well /lst in '75, 3rd in '74/. 2-SONYA HARDY exchanged places with Brady at Westwood (second in AAU Junior and an impressive third in the Senior). but narrowly missed the Olympic team with a fourth at Eugene. She had at least seven races of 13.7 or better to garner second place ranking again /2nd in '75, 2nd in '74/. 3-KAREN WECHSLER concentrated on hurdling, rather than the sprints, ran quick low hurdles in early season, placed a solid third behind the top two in the AAU Junior (and was a semi-finalist in the Senior) to qualify for International Duals, where she was fourth vs. USSR but first vs. West Germany, with six 13.7 or better races /ranked 4th in 1975/. 4-LORI DINELLO, approaching Brady for quickness, ran at least seven times under 14.2 (including an excellent fourth in the AAU Junior after reaching the semis in the Senior) then picked up two third places in the European dual meets. 5-NANCY KINDIG, mostly a pentathlete, was nevertheless a solid fifth in the Junior AAU and recorded at least four 14.1 or better times /7th ranked in 1975/.

6-DEBI KILHOFFER returning to her form of 1974, recorded the nations fastest reported high school 110 yard low hurdle time in hot Illinois interscholastic competition, ran well at Westwood (seventh in Junior) and recorded at least four times of 14.2 (highs) or equivalent /5th in 1974/. 7-DEBBIE JACOBSEN did not retain her form of the previous season, but nevertheless reached the finals (eighth) at Westwood with at least four races (33") under 14.50. She also placed fourth at Memphis and had at least three 14.1 low hurdles races, including a fast windy time /5th in '75/. 8-TAMMY ETIENNE, Pennsylvania high school champ with one of nation's fastest 80 yard low hurdle times, held excellent form in late summer, dominating the JO field at Memphis, but had no opportunity to try the 33 inch barriers. 9-JANET BEALL was runner-up to Etienne in her hometown at the National JO and a winner in the 33 inch hurdles at the East Coast Invitational at Fort Meade in late summer. 10-PATRICIA KNIGHTON had the nation's fastest 80 low hurdle time in Connecticut high school meets, ran poorly in the "highs" at Westwood, then placed fifth at Memphis.

The top four (three of whom are still Juniors internationally) are definitely world class, while a few others are getting there. 1976 was a banner year for "timber-toppers", though limited opportunities for good competition over the 33 inch barriers inhibit the development of depth.

400 Meter Hurdles

1-TERESA WIERSON finally got some competition in this event and proved herself up to the challenge by placing second at Westwood (to great collegiate champ Debbie Esser), dipping under 60.0 twice.

2-STEPHANIE VEGA, from the powerful Atoms Track Club (New York)stable, was third in the AAU Junior and fifth in the Senior, bettering 61.0 at least five times.

3-PENNY FALES, New Jersey high schooler, turned in a series of creditable times (four times under 62.60) and a fourth place in the AAU Junior after reaching the AAU Senior semis 4-DEBORAH ROMSEK was fifth and eighth in the AAU Junior and Senior, respectively, with three races under 62.60s.
5-MELINDA OBEY, a teammate of Vega, placed sixth at Westwood and had at least three 62.6 races or better.

6-TAMI ESSINGTON was not as fast on the clock as others ranked, but she did beat all except those above in placing seventh in the AAU Junior and reaching the Senior semis. 7-DEBBIE CUEVAS was eighth at Westwood, finishing ahead of those ranked below.

8-ALISON REED ran very fast in the semi-finals at Westwood but faltered in the finals (eighth).

9-THERESA FAUCETT had one superior time and another good time, but did not get a chance to face most of those above. 10-CAROLYN BING narrowly missed the finals at the Junior AAU and had three races under 64.0 /ranked 5th in 1975/.

Very little competition in this event during the season, but theoretically the situation will change beginning this year, since the one lap hurdles is being increasingly accepted nationally.

Among the meets that had high priority in selecting were the Age Group Nationals, the East Coast Classic and the highly competitive Junior Olympics such as the Missouri Valley, Midwestern, Pacific, etc, as well as some of the better State AAU meets. For the 16-17 Group, we also included the Junior Men Nationals and the National Junior Olympics.

We hope that you will find this review interesting, and we would like to hear your comments (critical or otherwise) so that we may improve upon it in the coming year. HAVE A GOOD SEASON!

Philadelphian Regina White or Texas school standout Sandra Lambert might have been ranked along with half-a-dozen others, had they been in more major competition. The largely dismal jumping in high school and age group programs, gives little promise yet of relieving a record of decades which has produced just three world class jumpers (Willye White, Martha Watson and happily - young Olympic medallist Kathy McMillan from North Carolina's high schools).

1-PAULA GIRVEN, though only eighteenth in the finals at Montreal, nevertheless confirmed her reputation as a tough competitor by beating everyone (including Joni Huntley) at the Olympic trials and negotiating six feet or better at least three times outdoors /ranked lst in 1975/.
2-ANNE GILLILAND, consistent as ever, improved her level three inches in 1976, with at least eight meets over 5'9" which included a win in the AAU Junior, third place in the Senior AAU and seconds vs. USSR and GFR juniors /5th in 75/.
3-LOUISE RITTER straddle jumped over 5'9" in at least six outdoor meets and was sixth in the Olympic Trials, though only eighth in the Senior AAU /4th in 1975, 3rd in 1974/.

4-KARI GOSSWILLER, 15, surprised by winning the California high school championship and finishing runner-up at the AAU Junior meet, with at least four meets over 5'8" (2 x 5'10"). 5-LISA PLUNMER consistenly jumped in Illinois high school meets (though only second in state) and at Westwood (two fifth places) plus Eugene (seventh), recording at least least three 5'8" meets or better and six 5'7" outlings.

6-BECKY DEETZ, New Jersey high schooler, was up for the AAU Senior (fourth) but down for Junior AAU (eleventh) and Olympic Trials, with at least two 5'9" meets /10th in 1975/. 7-JALENE CHASE, Maryland prepster, reached the heights at Eugene (placing an excellent fifth) after to jumping to a poor conclusion in the AAU Senior (thirteenth).
8-PATSI WALKER, a most versatile horizontal/vertical jumper, came on late to take the National JO title after a terrific battle, jumping 5'8" or better twice at season's end.
9-DENISE CORNELL, like Walker a real pentathlete, nevertheless qualified for USA International Junior team by placing third in the AAU Junior, though failing to qualify in the AAU Senior and placing fourth vs. the Soviets and Germans. 10-TERRI GOETHALS, high school state champ in Washington, also garnered fourth spot in the Junior AAU.

Many others might have been ranked in the last six places above. Among them were high school standouts Mary Cragoe (Illinois champ), Sharon Burrill (Colorado), Candy Ross and Chris Remmling (both California), all of whom cleared outstanding heights and beat some of those who were ranked on occasion. The increased availability of good equipment, improvements in the "flop" and the migration of versatile athletes to this "fun" event, make the high jump full of promise for the production of more Joni Huntley's.

1-DEANNA PATRICK, Kentucky's best ever, was easily the best of the true juniors, though just fifth at Westwood. Unfortunately, she could get only third places against both Soviet and West German juniors, topping 42'11" with 4 kg. shot in four major meets (equivalent to 44'll with 8 lb.). 2-KELLY CURRAN improved greatly to garner the National JO championship and reaching the finals at Westwood (seventh in AAU Junior) and recording five meets over 43'0" (4 kg. or equivalent).

3-KERRY ZWART, 15, showed her power by recording ten meets over 41'0" (4 kg) and reaching the finals twice at Vestwood (ninth in Junior, eleventh in Senior AAU) as well as shoving the shot in the two Junior International Duals, despite spending time with other pentathlon events.


4-ANN MOON, also a sprinter, was the class of a good crop of Texas school girls, with at least three meets over 44'0". 5-JANICE STUCKY, from Kansas, powered the eight pound shot over 44'5" in at least three major meets, including runnerup spot at Memphis and sixth place in the USTFF Nationals. 6-DEBRA EVANS was runner-up to Moon in the Texas AAAA Championships, in a very strong interscholastic field.

7-CINDY KISER, another midwest high school star (Missouri), was a strong third in the National JO Meet.

8-CARYL VAN PELT, reached the finals at Westwood (eighth in Junior AAU) after Washington school meets /10th in '75/. 9-EARLY DOUGLAS, Texas AA high school champ, reached very good distances, in outstanding competition.

10-MARY ANN JOHNSON, reached the finals in the Senior AAU, . after faltering the Junior AAU and winning the Illinois high school championships.

A heavy toll was taken by graduation from the USA Junior ranks, Kathy Devine, Marcia Mecklenburg, Emily Dole, Pam Porter and other superior weight tossers moving on to senior ranks. This made 1976 a down year, but help is on the way as the high school programs, particularly in the great plains, have potentials in vo-

1-HELENE CONNELL improved about thirty feet, first in local New Jersey high school and AAU meets, faltered in Junior AAU (sixth place) but finished with her best throw of the year in winning the National Junior Olympic title. 2-MARY ANN STEVENSON was the only tosser who achieved distances close to Connell, first in Oregon high school meets and later at Westwood (second in Junior and fourteenth in Senior), then in Europe (third and second vs. USSR and West German Juniors). /1st ranked in 1975/ 3-CHRISTI PYLE, 15, was over 141' three times and over 133' ten, taking fourth in the AAU Junior /2nd ranked in 1975/. 4-GINA PIATT, also 15, edged Pyle in the Junior AAU (though losing to Christi two days earlier) had at least five meets over 135 feet, including her best mark against the West German junior after finishing fourth vs. the Soviet juniors. 5-CINDY KISER, was the best double medallist in the weights at the National JO meet, including a solid second in the discus with her best mark of year.

6-KATHY PICKNELL emerged from Oregon high school meets to record at least five meets over 132 feet and reaching the finals (ninth in Junior AAU) at Westwood. 7-JOANNA NORTON was just back of Picknell at Westwood and had three tosses, at least, over 135 feet /7th in 1975/. 8-MARY WALSH was second only to Connell in New Jersey high school circles and was seventh at Westwood. 9-SUE KOBZA, Nebraska school girl, was a solid third in the terrific National JO competition at Memphis. 10-SUSAN SPRINGER was over 130' in seven meets and second in the California interscholastic meet at age 14.

The promise of 1975 began to blossom in 1976 as all the top ranked throwers improved greatly. Three of the top four and many of those over 125 feet return in the junior ranks. Still USA throwers have a long way to go to reach top world standards, though talents like the 5'9", 175 pound Connell make the prospects at least in-

Javelin Throw

1-CATHY SULINSKI is only the second javelin tosser in the six year history of these rankings to lead the list (Karin Smith. Olympic sixth placer at Montreal, led the first three rankings). Cathy, by virtue of one tremendous toss another AAU Junior Championship, sixth place at the Olympic Trials (four meets, at least, over 163 feet) takes her spot alongside a long line of great junior spear throwers, including Karen Anderson, Barbara Friedrich and Kathy Schmidt /1st ranked in 1975 and 1974, ranked 7th in 1973/. 2-KERI CAMARIGG, another New Jersey high school product. was not in Sulinski's class, but nevertheless consistent in the 140 foot range, with a thirds in the Junior AAU as well as USSR and West German duals. 3-LISA van BENTHEM threw very well early in the year, finished fifth (Junior) and tenth (Senior AAU) at Westwood and had nine meets over 145 feet /7th in 1975, 3rd in 1974/. 4-JACKIE NELSON was fourth in the Junior AAU, at age 14, and threw against the Soviet and West German juniors(though outdistanced) after dominating the best intermediates in

6-CHARM BISHOP, 15, was over 139 feet three times and over 132 two more, while placing seventh in the Junior AAU. 7-JEANNE EGGART was the top thrower in Washington, the best state for high school javelin tossing in the nation. 8-SUE BANTA was the class of Oregon high competition. 9-DEBBIE DIBB, 15, exceeded 136 feet in three meets including an eighth place finish in the National Junior AAU meet. 10-RAEDEAN RONA (like Dibb, Bishop, Gassen, Nelson and van Benthem, a southern California age group product), was over 132 feet in six meets and placed ninth at the Junior AAU.

5-CONNIE GASSEN suffered back problems all year, but excee-

ded 142 feet in three meets, though placing just tenth in the Junior AAU /6th ranked in 1975, 5th in 1974/.

early season, achieving 142' or better three times.

Like 1974, javelin throwing in 1976 took a downward turn at the upper echelons. Though a few great talents enter the picture each year, it doesn't appear enough areas (outside of the Pacific Coast and some areas in the Northeast U.S.) are encouraging the event, so that the shallow depth does not encourage continuous steady improvement.

Pentathlon

1-DANA COLLINS was clearly the top junior in the USA, placing fourth at the National AAU Senior at Goleta, then fifth at the Olympic trials in Eugene and scored over 4000 points three times. Her best event was the high jump and she had no glaring weaknesses, though improvement could be made in all five events /ranked first in 1975/.

2-NANCY KINDIG competed against the USSR juniors for the second year (dropping from first in 1975 to third in 1976, though improving her total score) after narrowly missing winning the Junior AAU by 26 points. Strong potential in the hurdles and jumps, but weak in shot /ranked 2nd in '75/3-KERRY ZWART, 15, was an impressive National AAU Junior Champ and had three pentathlons over 3688 points, though faltering somewhat, in her first international meet against the Soviet juniors (fourth place). Strong in the shot, but needs to improve in other events, especially hurdles.
4-TERI SEIPPEL, who has been showing her versatility for many years, was third in the AAU Junior, showing strength in the jumps and weakness in the shot /4th ranked in 1975/.
5-PATSI WALKER, a super potential in the jumps, needs more work in the runs and strength for shot /ranked 6th in '75/.


6-LISA KINIMAKA, former pentathlon internationalist, concentrated on the long jump, but placed in the AAU Junior Meet at Goleta /ranked second in 1974, third in 1973/.
7-LINDA KARECKI, 14, had very good all-around marks for her age (particularly in the 33 inch hurdles) in placing sixth at Goleta, but needs more speed.

8-DENISE CORNELL, outstanding in the high jump, took up pentathloning well enough to garner seventh place at Goleta despite some weakness in speed events.


9-ANNE GILLILAND, another superior high jumper and fair hurdler, scored enough to place eighth in the AAU Junior. 10-JULIE FARIS, good long jumper/sprinter, garnered ninth spot in the Junior AAU.

Very little movement in 1976 among the juniors. The top scorers improved little and the depth was actually thinner. Expect some changes beginning in 1977, since the 200 meters has been junked in favor of 800 meters, which should be good news for the real pentathlon specialists (like Collins, Zwart, Seippel and Karecki). One request: let's schedule more pentathlons folks.

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
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
