AGE GROUPING.... A CASE FOR Y.O.B.

We have had one full season of track & field competition to assess the merits of the new age-grouping procedure approved at the last national AAU convention. I have heard numerous comments, mostly negative, and realizing that opponents of any program are always more vocal than proponents, I offer the following case for year-of-birth age groupings.

Any system whereby athletes are grouped for competition purposes is necessarily a compromise among those attributes which determine an athlete's ability to compete. Among those attributes is the age factor, but also included are such things as height, weight, speed, strength, maturity, experience, and other possibly more subtle factors.

For years, the U.S. operated on a strictly date-of-birth system, in which athletes changed "groups" on the date of their birth. Good or bad it was simple. Only one factor had to be determined and the only bug was that it had to be determined each day to make sure an athlete had not had a birthday while no-one was watching. Obviously, the only thing which could make it simpler would be if you did not have to check so often, say only once a year! Logically comes the year-of-birth system.

All of the complaints/reservations I have heard about the newly adopted system revolve around two points, one of which is really a misconception resulting from semantics applied to the "old" system. The year-of-birth system is a two-year age grouping system the same as the discarded date-of birth system. At no time will the youngest member in any group be more than 2 years younger than the oldest member.

The other point which is continually brought up, and which is a legitimate criticism, concerns the idea that an athlete born late in the year never gets to compete at the "top" of her group age wise. A girl or boy born on Dec. 31 for instance, never comes than 364 days in age to one born on Jan. 1. This is the extreme example, but it is a fact that athletes born in the fall/early winter will always be competing against others who are several months older than themselves. However, those who argue this point either fail to realize or purposely disregard the fact that the same criticism can be leveled at the old date of birth system.

Under the old grouping, a discus/ javelin/baseball thrower born in say Feb/Mar/Apr faced the same situation; they essentially (in most part of the country) could not compete in their event when they were at or near the very top of their age bracket. Athletes with birthdays in say June, would be prevented from competing in their own nationals in that year in which they were preparing to change age divisions, regardless of their event.

Distance runners, especially those who 'thrived' on cross country, would either miss that season at the top of their age group if they were born in August or September.

Switching to the YOB age grouping system has not created this problem, it has only switched the criteria for determining who is being discriminated against; on the one hand the athlete is penalized for having a birthdate at an inopportune time, on the other hand is penalized for having taken up the "wrong" event.

The advantages of the YOB system over the DOB system are almost too numerous to list here. Athletes are assured of not having to change division in the middle of a season, relay teams can compete intact, cross country teams do not loose their best runner(s) right before important meets, 80m hurdlers do not have to switch to 100m hurdles overnight, 13 year-old shot putters do not suddenly find the shot weighing 2-4 lbs more, etc., etc.

How many times has a coach sick-eningly realized that his top quarter miler in the 10-11 division turns 12, 3 days before the association age group championships? Or had it called to his attention by the athlete herself that she was entered in the wrong age group.

An athlete would find it much more difficult to compete out of age now simply because she or he would have to do it over a longer period of time in order to accomplish anything.

I have heard people cry out against doing something simply because the 'rest of the world' does it, but by the same token there is something to be said for being in step. Refusing to switch to the metric system, for instance, when the 'rest of the world' is solidly on that system can only hurt and continue to hurt our program here.

In conclusion, this is probably one of the most progressive proposals ever passed at a National Convention. Once we are past the initial transition period (the first 2 years) the disadvantages will pale to insignificance and we will have a more workable program than we had.

P.S. - I might add that I have not heard one word of criticism from athletes about the system (although I am sure there have been some).

FLOYD HIGHFILL, Coach, Albuquerque OC, New Mexico It seems that our first responsability should be the development and growth of youngsters, and my experience with the present age grouping system has been that it confuses most, discourages some and the general consensus being that it is unfair!!

After eighteen months of hearing coaches, parents, administrators and the media talk and argue about the subject, I decided to ask some of the youngsters what they thought.

Following are some of their comments:

"It doesn't seem fair to the other kids, but I like it a lot" said a 9 year-old girl who turned 10 in Jan. "Cross Country really scares me. I run with the Juniors until the week before the Nationals, then I get the shift" from a mid-November birthday.

An 11 year-old girl offered her solution, "it seems to me that January is a bad month for the summer events. Some kids are so much older than others by then. I like the Junior Olympics (May 1st) the way it is, because most kids are approximately the same age. I know it is hard to keep up with the changes, but it seems the fairest way."

After thinking about this girl's plan. I drafted a proposal for determining age groups. I know there are administrative and paper work problems, but how about the athlete?

Track & Field - Date of meet, except for progressive meets or postal meets. Cross-Country - September 1st for both AAU and J.O.

Since Track & Field extends over such long period of time, athlete would be more evenly matched in competition throughout the season. Exception should be made for progressive meets and postal competition in that it takes a period of time to conduct elimination rounds or postal competition. In addition, provision should be made to condense the J.O. track & field program, to prevent the 2-3 week gap between Association, regional and National meets.

September 1st is suggested as the Cross Country date for both AAU & JO. Most Championships take place between mid-November and mid-December and the youngsters need at least 10 weeks of training and competition in their age group. This period is important, especially for the younger runner.

I know my suggestions will meet unfavorable reaction by most adults who are concerned with the paper work, record keeping and international image. However, I am talking about the development of kids and that is the only important matter.

Maybe we need a separate committee for age group activities. STARTING LINE would be surprised if they would take a poll of the participating athletes concerning age grouping.

From the Editors

The coming Cross Country season will again be burdened, unfortunately, with a number of different age grouping systems. According to the latest "official" reports, Junior Olympic Boys and Girls will be grouped according to the athlete's age on September 1st (bantam = Girls or Boys 9 or under

(Bantam = Boys or Girls 9 or under on 9/1/75), RRCA Boys and Girls are grouped according to their age as of the date of the meet. The same is true for AAU Boys. On the other hand. AAU Girls will be grouped according their age on January 1 (Bantam = girls born in 1965 and later, just like in track). USTFF and other organizations have still different systems.

Year-of-birth, as we have said before, is the simplest and most commonly used method in the world. As the two thoughtful letters of Floyd Highfill and Jerry Montgomery on the opposite page point out it is not necessarily the fairest. But in fact, NO ARBITRARY METHOD OF AGE GROUPING IS FAIR. As Floyd explains in detail, some athletes are always at a disadvantage under any system commonly used. One athlete's meat is another athlete's poison, so to speak.

There is one fairly simple method of making the Year-of-birth (or any arbitrary system for that matter) more flexible and, therefore probably more fair...removing the lower limit of the age group.

If such a system would have been used this year, the AAU age groups would have been determined thusly: Bantam Division = athletes born 1965 & later; Midget Division = born in 1963 & later (rather than 1963-64)...etc. Or if you insist, 9-Under, 11-Under, 13-Under, 15-Under, etc...

Under this type of system, a younger athlete could compete against boys or girls two, three or four years older if he or she wished, but the reverse would not be allowed. In reality, this was permitted to a limited extent in the Intermediate (really the 1959 & later) girls this year. Eryn Forbes, Donna Campbell, Paula Rose and Roxanne Keating are among the girls who did very well, when they were allowed to compete against older athlete...by their choice.

A system such as this would be much more flexible and not overly complicated to administer. Let us hear what <u>you</u> think. Don't wait until <u>after</u> the rules are made (or changed) to comment...that goes for athletes too.

NATIONAL POSTAL SIX-MINUTE RUN CONTEST

STARTING LINE announces the fourth annual Six-Minute Run Postal Contest for school teams and physical education classes. its purpose is to stimulate physical fitness for boys and girls in elementary and intermediate schools.

Certificates will be awarded to the five members of at least the top three teams in each of the following divisions: (1) ELEMENTARY SCHOOL BOYS (2) INTERMEDIATE SCHOOL ROYS and (3) ELEMENTARY SCHOOL GIRLS. Team winners in each division will be determined on the basis of the furthest total distance covered by five runners in a single six-minute timed run. All runners must attend the same school.

Contest entries may be sent at any time, but must be received by START-ING LINE no later than May 15, 1976, so we may have time to tabulate the results and mail the awards before the school term finishes.

Early entries are encouraged, and you may enter a school team more than once. ANY SCHOOL SCHOOL SUBMITTING AN ENTRY BEFORE DECEMBER 31, 1975, will receive a special prize.

School teachers or coaches may wish to have competition among their gym classes or even arrange a match with other schools. All you have to do is follow the rules and send us the results (you may write for a sample entry blank). Good luck!

CONTEST RULES

- 1. SCHOOLS ELIGIBLE are any public or private school in the United States (graded or ungraded schools).
- 2. RUNNERS ELIGIBLE for a team must be in <u>current</u> attendance at a single school (AAU registered runners are eligible). In Elementary Boys Division, runners must be in the <u>sixth grade or below</u> and must have been <u>born after 1962</u>. Runners in Intermediate Boys or Intermediate/Elementary Girls Division must be in the <u>eight grade or below</u> and must have been <u>born after 1960</u>.
- 3. A TEAM consists of <u>any five runners</u> at the school, who run as far as possible within a single timed sixminute period on any regulation quarter-mile (or 400m) or 220 yard track indoor or outdoor.
- 4. TIMING (of the six minutes) may be done with any acceptable watch with a sweep second hand.
- 5. MEASUREMENT of the distance covered is figured to the <u>furthest 110</u> yard segment for each runner. A runner must <u>complete 110</u> yards <u>before</u> the six-minute period expires in order to get credit for covering that distance. In case of team ties, the team with the youngest total age will get the higher place.

- 6. SCORING is done by taking the total distance covered by the first five runners on the team in the 6-minute span.
- 7. COMPETITION may be intra-mural (one school only, running by themselves) or inter-scholastic (two or more schools competing against each other). Different divisions may be run separately or combined into one race. A school may submit an entry for more than one team in a division, and may enter any and all divisions. Schools may enter the same team any number of times (have several different races at different times, e.g.). However, all members of a team submitted as an entry must have run at the same time.
- 8. ENTRIES must be received by STARTING LINE Magazine, PO Box 878, Reseda, CA 91335, no later than $\underline{\text{May 15}}$, 1976. Write for entry blanks or submit the following information:
- (a) name of school, with address, (b) site of competition name of field and city, (c) date of competition, (d) first and last names of the scoring athletes, plus grade in school and birthdate of each runner, (e) distance covered by each runner, to the furthest quarter-lap...e.g. $4\frac{1}{2}$ laps, $3\frac{1}{4}$, laps, 3 laps, etc..., (f) the names and positions of two verifying adults (one od which should be an employee of the school).

1975 RRCA BOYS & GIRLS NATIONAL POSTAL MEET OF MILES

COMBINED RESULTS SUBMITTED BY KEN YOUNG COMMENTARIES BY MAX ZUCKER

The fifth Annual RRCA National Postal Miles for Boys and Girls under 15 years of age is growing larger in size very year and has become a traditional yearly event.

Participation of teams from other countries had been encouraged and the Sussex Roadrunners Sports Club of Thonbridge, Kent, England, entered 20 athletes, beginning the trend towards international competition. Canada should be next.

Seventeen sites reported their results with close to 1800 athletes of all ages taking part.

The Rialto Roadrunners of California dominated the team competition with three titles and three seconds, as well as four individual victories in the combined standings.

KEN YOUNG, once again, tabulated the combined standings through computer. There were some difficulties in the age groupings, as all the sites didn't follow the June 25 cut-off date, and some sites didn't report birthdates. Ken will insist that next year birthdates will be required for all participants in order to avoid confusion in what age group anyone belongs.



NATIONAL AAU JUNIOR MEN CHAMPIONSHIPS

KNOXVILLE, TN - JUNE 13 & 14

COMMENTARIES BY MIKE KENNEDY

The fourth Annual National Junior Championships, held for the first time at the University of Tennessee's all-weather track, saw seven meet records set, as College freshmen outdid preps, winning 11 of 19 first places, and finishing second in 12 of 19 events.

Despite qualifying only 15 athletes to face the USSR Junior team, high schoolers, in general, turned in excellent performances, including four national records and seven class records. The meet was limited to athletes born in 1956 or later.

On Friday it rained, which helped the 10,000m but hindered the shot put, long jump and pole vault. Those wvents were the only finals held on that day.

The first two finishers in all events qualified for the USA-USSR Junior meet in Linclon, Nebraska on July 4-5.

100 METER DASH

The key question in the 100 was, WOULD HOUSTON McTEAR run. He did and it was no contest. In the Friday heats, McTear got an average start but showed excellent acceleration over the first 70 meters, then coasted the final 30 to run a hand-timed9.96.

The rounded up time of 10.0 set a National HS record, breaking Marshall Dill's four year old record of 10.1. The time also meet record, cracking the year old mark of 10.4 set by Clancy Edwards.

In the final McTear appeared very tight in running 10.2, but easily defeated preps DWAYNE STROZIER (10.5) JOEL ANDREWS (10.5) and LAMAR PREYOR.

High school junior TONY DARDEN of Norristown (PA) paced himself well and entered the stretch in fourth, just five yards out of first. Suddenly he effortlessly pulled away from the pack to win by .2 in 46.2.

McTear, with a best, at that time of 21.4, didn't qualify to run, but even if he had, he would have been pressed to place in the top four.

After the heats and the 100 final DWAYNE STROZIER looked to be a solid choice. However, in the final, junior DWAYNE EVANS, in lane 4, just inside Strozier, ran an outstanding curve to take a one yard lead over the field going into the straight.

The tall and spindly Evans was able to maintain about two feet of his lead, to win in an American age 16 record of 20.9. Strozier was also clocked in 20.9, closely followed by RONNIE HARRIS and PREYOR (both 21.0).

The University of Nebraska, the setting for last year's National AAU Junior Olympic events, was the scene of the fourth USA-USSR Junior Track & Field meet.

The American 19-and-under squad, selected from the winners at the National AAU Junior Championships in Knoxville, TN, and White Plains, NY, celebrated the holiday weekend with an impressive triumph over their Soviet counterparts. The meet's biggest surprise was the ease with which the American women outdistanced their opponents, scoring an unprecedented 88-58 victory, while the Junior Men's count was 129-105 for the U.S.

Nine meet records fell and another four were tied in the two days of com-

petition.

Highlighting the U.S. assault was HOUSTON McTEAR of Milligan, Fla., America's schoolboy sprint sensation. The 18 year-old McTear finished the 100 meter in 10.2, equalling the old meet standard, and ran second leg on a record tying relay team.

BRENDA MOREHEAD, 17, of Toledo, Ohio, was the meet's on;y double winner, capturing both sprint events in record times, as well as running on a record

setting relay team.

NANCY KINDIG, a 16 year-old high school junior from nearby Hastings, NB, gave the highly partisan two-day crowd of 11,000 plenty to cheer about with her excellent performance in the pentathlon events. Kindig overcame a first day Soviet advantage to nip USSR's GALINA ZHILO, 3,918 points to 3,737.

Other standout performances from both sides:

* USSR's IVAN GROMOV set a new mark with a javelin toss of 254-1;

* DARRELL ELDER, a 6-7 giant from USC, gave the USA a record 192-8 in the Discus;

 Triple Jump winner PAUL JORDAN, had a record setting 53-9 performance;
 USSR's ALEXANDER VOSTRIKOV's 17-1

* PAULA GERVIN sailed over the bar at
6-0, tying the meet record;

Petr Stepanenko, USSR chef-de-mission, scored a victory of his own on the diplomatic front. Stepanenko told the crowd at opening ceremonies he'd be rooting next fall for Nebraska to take over the number one spot in the college pigskin polls.

NATIONAL JUNIOR OLYMPICS DECATHLON & PENTATHLON CHAMPIONSHIPS

"I figured if I could stay close to Jeff until the pole vault, I had a chance. But I was hoping that it wouldn't be as close going into the last event as it was."

The speaker was ROBERT THAYER, of Marysville, WA, after establishing a new AAU-Chevrolet Junior Olympic:Decathlon

record in national competition.

"I had it figured," added Thayer, "I had to finish within at least a couple of seconds of Jeff in that 1,500 meter run. And, for awhile there, I wasn't sure I was going to make it."

Jeff is JEFFREY QUAZZA, of Cedar Grove, NJ, a favorite going into the national Senior division (16-17) of the two-day, 10-event action. Quazza was the first-day leader, who finished in the runner-up position, nine points behind Thayer.

The Nationals were held at Southeast Missouri State University's Houck stadium, with a total of 12 Senior participants, nine Intermediate division (14-15) entries and 13 girls in two divisions of the national pentathlon.

JOHN HOLLOWAY, 15 year old youngster from Festus, MO, won the Intermediates, totalling 5642 points, 207 more than runner-up BILL WELCH of Graham, OH, who was also the runner-up in this division a year ago.

JULIE HARRIS was the Intermediate girls pentathlon Champion winning three of five events to pile up 3664 points, a whopping 594 in front of STEPHANIE DONALDSON of Memphis, TN.

The girls Senior division was closer, TERI SEIPEL, of Dayton, OH, was the winner with 3764 to 3446 by LISA MITCHELL.

Thayer, a recent graduate of Marysville HS, and coached by Roger Cramer, trailed Quazza after the first day's activity by 94 points and was down by 143 points going into his pole vault specialty. But a vault of 13-6 netted him 835 points and vaulted him into the lead by 152 points.

But Quazza, a 6-foot-6, 205-pounder wasn't finished. He heaved the discus $173\frac{1}{2}$, to cut the margin to 13 points going into the day's final event, the 1500 meter run.

Quazza led by 10 to 15 steps until the final turn before Thayer put on a finish that ended with him only a step and a half behind the eastern entry. And when the total was tabulated, it revealed: Thayer, 6713 points, Quazza 6704! All four final totals represented new J.O. records.

NATIONAL AAU JUNIOR WOMEN CHAMPIONSHIPS

WHITE PLAINS, NY - JUNE 24 & 25

This meet superceded the Girls (14-17) Championships and for the first time in nearly a decade, a major Women's meet was held on the east coast. Judging from the quality of the results, it should be located there more often.

There were many reasons for the superior competition. The weather proved to be mostly agreeable and windless. The all-weather track at White Plains High School proved to be fast for sprinters and distance runners alike. Even the limited number of lanes (6) may have been a spur to faster qualifying. According to most observers the organization was adequate, despite the very large fields in many events.

Unlike 1974, where the National Championships (Bakersfield) and the qualifying meet at Gainesville for the USA Junior team for the USSR Junior Dual Meet were separated, this meet served both purposes.

A great influx of high school champions was seen for the first time, especially from the east, midwest and south. The difference was noticeable in the high jump, discus and sprints. In addition, the meet was open to Women born in 1956 or later, which effectively extended the age span for those eligible by more than one full year.

100 METER DASH

Three qualifying rounds were needed. Last year's champ Angel Doyle was missing due to injury, but the top five places were taken by other high school products. BRENDA MOREHEAD, Ohio prepchamp, and CHANDRA CHEESEBOROUGH, Florida's best (both wearing the colors of Tennessee State for the occasion) dominated.

Close on their heels were California HS winner SANDRA HOWARD and Kentucky champ LYNN MAXWELL. In between these two was EVELYN ASHFORD, who ran with the boys, since her school didn't have girls' track. The top placers ran 11.6 or better tem times.



North Carolina's KATHY McMILLAN eliminated herself in the qualifying rounds with three fouls, just as she had done in her district Junior Olympics two weeks before. But her day was yet to come.

Former champs DIEDRE WILSON and KIM SCHOFIELD were missing. Last year's runner-up JODI ANDERSON led the qualifying, but Miami's LORRAINE RAY got off the only 20 foot jump on the meet on the fifth round of the final. GRESHAM, OREGON - JUNE 18 & 19

Initially, when the concept of a Boys Age Group National Meet was discussed, the question was raised whether such a meet could ever grow beyond just a gathering of local athletes, with a few out of staters thrown in.

For awhile it may have seemed that way as, until last year the general participation stood around 300.

Last year, in California, it was much better, but there were disappointments and a great many clubs confided that the meet wasn't worth the trip nor the expenses. The general interest among organising clubs must have been pretty low, because, as far as we know, no one besides Steve Hansen of the Woodland TC even bothered putting in a bid for this year's meet.

Concern about a possible fiasco was in the air, but was soon dissipated, as we feasted on probably what may have been one of the finest Age Group meet ever put on. Over 800 of the best athletes in this country, representing 90 clubs from over 20 states were in attendance and everyone was treated to a fantastic spectacle of Age Group Athletics.

With the new January 1 age group ruling in effect, only eight meet records, of the 51 events on the program, resisted the concerted assault on the record book.

Co-sponsored by the Woodland TC, Portland TC, Mt Hood TC and the Mt Hood Community College, and expertly directed by STEVE HANSEN and his most able staff, the meet was an undeniable athletic and artistic success and (if one listens to envious rumors) a financial one as well.

After the meet was over, a great deal of heightened interest was apparent concerning the location of the 1976 Boys Nationals. In contention,

at this writing, was New Orleans (LA) Philadelphia (PA), Pleasant Hill (CA) and Miami (FL).

The favorites seem to be Philadel-phia, as the east has never hosted a Boys National before, and New Orleans because....the national Convention (where the bids are presented) will be in session there.

The editors of STARTING LINE would like to congratulate and thank all the officials for their most courteous assistance to them in covering the meet. In particular, our thanks to meet director STEVE HANSEN for his invaluable assistance in providing us data on participating athletes, MYRNA WIERSON for supplying us with wind reading information and other pertinent material, BETTY & PORTER MARTIN for their graciousness towards us and to GORDON RABING, whose photography is displayed throughout this issue.

BANTAM DIVISION (born in 1965 & later)

Long Beach Lancer (CA) DENNIS PRICE was his outstanding self, whipping a great sprint field while recording the 2nd best Age-10 all-time mark in the 100 in 11.7 and 3rd all-time in the furlong in 27.2. His L.B.L. teammate KENNY BROWN (last year's 100 Champion) was the runner-up in both events.

KIRK JONES, another member of the L.B. Lancers (a team that won five of the ten events in this division), who was the '74 50y Dash Champ, moved up to the 440 and won it unopposed, although eight of the competitors were under 70.0.

WAYNE WILLIAMS of the DC C.Y.O., virtually unknown before the meet, ran the race of his life in the 880, improving his personal best by over 10 seconds and defeating strong and all-around RICKY ROMERO of the Supremes TC of New Mexico (Romero went on to win the high jump!). In the mile, Wayne was edged by the tiniest of margin by N. California's distance ace JOHN LATTING (lat year's double distance champion in this division), with Romero and GEORGE NAUGLES (also with the Supremes TC) leading the rest of a tighlty bunched group.

Arrow TC's DAVID SMATHERS and Cupertino Yearling's PAUL WADE dominated the mile Race Walk, with Dave beating the old meet record by over a minute.

Beautiful long jump duel over 15 feet with MARK WALKER of the Lancers (again!) winning by less than a couple of inches over Denver's VINCENT COLLINS.

Very good competition in the baseball throw, with five boys over 160 feet, and highlighted by the mighty throw of 170-4 of DAVID WARD of the Bayou TC (louisiana).

The outstanding 440 Relay team of the LONG BEACH LANCERS with PRICE, BROWN, JONES and DERRICK GIVENS had no problems at all , taking the title home with utmost ease.

Duke City Dashers' (NM) FRANK MORGAN seems to have the uncanny ability to come up for the big meets. He is primarely remembered for his win in last year's Cross Country Championships. He came to this meet with marks of 2:27.2 and 5:25 (his mile time wasn't even good enough to enter him in the fast rated flight). When it was all over, there he was the surprise winner of the 880, with the third best Age-11 mark of 2:18.9 having defeated one of the best field ever assembled (only Pennsylvania's Ernest McComb, who was on the program and was one of the favorites, failed to show up).

In the mile, Frank took a solid third, highlighted by MIKE ASSUMMA's Age-11 all-time Best mark of 4:57.1 (just a family affair, as his brother Charles was the previous record holder).

TRAVIS VEON, of the Maturango Milers (CA), showed great potential in the Race Walking event, winning unchallenged by over half a lap.

Washington's LEX LUDTKE, who was the favorite in the high jump, won this event but not without a close struggle with up-and-coming CHRIS BATES of the Portland TC. Chris was also third in a tightly contested long jump, which saw seven boys leap over 16 feet and won by the smallest of margin by ERIC BROWN of the Track City Track Club from Eugene, OR.

Following in the footsteps of his brother, former age group great Howard, JIM BANISH was untouchable in the Shot. There was a good contest for second place...over 5 feet behind him. as he recorded a new Age-11 Best heave of 44-114.

The PHOENIX HORNETS (AZ) took care of their nemesis, the Long Beach Lancers, in the 440 Relay in meet record time.

100y Dash - MORRIS COLE of the Faith Streakers (CA), last year's double sprint champion in this division and the Age-13 record holder, edged his teammate and fierce rival AN-THONY GIBSON who took advantage of the competition to tie Cole's Age-13 Best performance. Supreme's MICHAEL MARTINEZ justified his number one rating in New Mexico, by being in the thick of the battle all the way, earning a solid third.

220y Dash - That was the race that everyone wanted to see, as it brought together three of the most sensational Age Group Athletes in the history of the sport - MORRIS COLE, ANTHONY GIBSON and DAVID SAUNDERS. After casual heats and fast semis (all three under 23.0), the final was as good as promised. No one was cheated at the start and coming around the turn it was, surprisingly, Saunders (Washington, DC CYO), the 440 champion, who was in the lead. At this point, Cole, with his loose and fluid style, strode past him and stayed in front to the end. A step or two behind came the battle for second, in which Gibson's power outmatched the endurance of Saunders. All three were separated by .1 of a second.
MICHAEL MARTINEZ just couldn't stay with them, finishing 4th ten yards behind. A great race that had everyone on their feet

440y Dash - DAVID SAUNDERS, already the Age 11, 12 and record holder in this event, didn't take long to show who was in charge, winning his heat in a stunning 50.8, destroying his own Age-13 standard (52.2 earlier in the year). In the final, he took off with a scintillating first 220 (unofficially 23.8) and then proceeded to hang on for dear life. From the stands, his coach, Skip Grant, tried to tell him to "stay loose" as David held off tying up just long enough to record 50.5, a full 2 seconds ahead of anyone else all-time! He beat a good field, in which the mark of second placer ERIC SCOTT of Edmunds (WA) would have won at last year's meet.

880y Run - In the heats there were six runners under last year's winning time of 2:07.0. BRIAN PHARR of the Morris Estate TC (PA) who came into the final with the fastest time of 2:02.7, went on to win over a brilliant field, with the first four recording personal bests.

Mile Run - CHUCK and FRANK ASSUMMA plus PHIL SHIRLEY, teammates of the Rialto Roadrunners (CA) had a great 3-men race. Up to the 1320, they were more or less together, but then Frank and Phil just took off, with Frank holding a slim margin to the wire. Chuck faded badly in the stretch and fell to a very much out of it third. The first 13-year-old in the field was TIM HURTADO of New Mexico in 7th place, and in tenth, was 12 year-old DAVID NEIDORF of Encino, CA, a converted jumper and quarter-miler, whose 4:49.2 stands as 2nd best performance all-time at that age.

2-Mile Run - Just like last year, only the order of finish changing, the ASSUMMA twins were too much for everyone in their favorite event. They spread their lead with every passing lap, to finish a good 220 ahead of the pack, with Frank spurting to his second national title. His 9:31.0 beats by one second the already great Age-14 best of Craig Virgin.

70y Low Hurdles - Double sprint champion MORRIS COLE combined fair hurdling with stunning speed, to win his third gold medal in 8.96 (9.0). DONOVAN NOLCOX of the Springfield TC of Ohio, who is more of a hurdling specialist, was a valiant runner-up in an event that saw 11 runners break 10.0.

Mile Race Walk - Cupertino Yearlings' (CA) ISAAC MILLER, up and down all year, put it all together for this meet, taking off with two laps to go to upset NICK SAKELARIOS of Redwood City in an excellent 8:21.1.

Long Jump - The Age-12 and 13 record holder in this event and others, was the super favorite ANTHONY GIBSON. Although he was below par his usual awe inspiring jumps, he still managed a meet record 20-10, to win by over half a foot over Denver's DARRELL WILSON, the only other 20 footer in the country this year. Anthony, on the other hand, has half a dozen marks over 21 feet and two over 22-0 (!)

<u>High Jump</u> - Portland's TERRY DODSON, who reportedly had jumped $6-1\frac{1}{4}$ (still to be confirmed), an all-time best performance, won only by virtue of fewer misses at $5-11\frac{1}{4}$ (2nd best ever) over versatile $(37-10\frac{1}{4}/\text{TJ} & 18-1 \ 3/4/\text{LJ})$ and previously undefeated this year DOUG JONES of the Denver PAL. Terry and Doug have improved well since last year, when both were at 5-5 as 12 year-olds. There was a good battle behind them for the next three places over 5-9.

<u>Triple jump</u> - JIM SOLBERG of Corvallis, OR, was the victor in a meet record 39-9 over MIKE WALLACE of the Spokane Kiwanis, a steady 39 feet and over performer. Jim also showed good versatility, by taking a third in the shot at $53-8\frac{1}{2}$.

Pole Vault - JIM LUSHINA of Hillsboro, OR, and GEORGE BUCKINGHAM of Gardner, KS, provided the fireworks springing 11-6 and 11-1 respectively. No one else was over 10 feet.

Shot Put/Discus - Valley Roadrunners teammates MIKE SHILL and BRIAN CURRAN of Spokane, WA, battled it out and settled it by splitting the weight titles. Mike, who came in the meet with a best of 58-8 3/4 (2nd best all-time mark by a 13 year-old), was slightly off form and barely edged his training partner in the shot. Curran improved his P.R. in the Discus by over ten feet and made it look easy, although the field claimed 15 boys over 100 feet. This particular event, however, was marred by an unfortunate misunderstanding, which deprived the very talented FLETCHER MANSHACK of the Caddo TC in Louisiana, of his 144-10 effort, which would have been the winning throw.

440 Relay - MORRIS ESTATE TRACK CLUB, with only one runner under 11.0, used great teamwork and technique to step through a quick 47.6, the challenge being provided by DENVER PAL and CORVALLIS TRACK CLUB (47.8).

 $100y\ \text{Dash}$ - Powerful MIKE CARTER, of the Supremes TC, the New Mexico State HS double sprint champion as a freshman at 9.7 and 21.9, didn't disappoint. He ran his best in the semis in a meet record 9.58 (9.6), then went on to win by a slim $1\frac{1}{2}$ feet over the talented Columbus Community TC (Ohio) trio of RUSSELL WEST, JAMES CHESTNUT (3rd last year) and ROBERT JONES (5th in '74). In an event dominated by 16 year olds, 15 year old TERRY SMITH of the Colorado Spring All Stars was far from outmatched and stood his grounds to the wire. Terry was the double champion in the 12-13 group back in 1973.

 $\underline{220y\ \text{Dash}}$ - This time Carter was at his best in the finals, charging to a 22.0 win, six yards up on Smith, who had his hands full taking care of Mallery Challenger's CONRAD DOWNES. Behind them was a mad scramble, everyone within .3

440y Dash - After a fast 50.1 in the prelims, CONRAD DOWNES seemed to be the favorite to take the event. However, 15 year-old JEFF RAMSEY of the Thurston County Striders (Olympia, WA) felt different, blasting to a meet record 50.0 just ahead of Downes. SANDY PANIELLO from Louisville, KY, kept up his steady improvement taking a good third in 50.4 (54.7 in '73, 52.4 in '74). Following was Portland's outstanding 14 year-old JOHN ANDERSON, who is definitely an up and coming threat for the title in this division in 1976.

880y Run - This was a most exciting race. After a lap and a half, there were still at least six runners in contention and remained bunched up until the last 100. Consistant and reliable BOB BUNDY of the Mead AC (Spokane WA) kept his cool and pulled out an upset win over the pre-race favorite FRANK REILLY from Laramie, WY, who finished third. The big surprise and possibly hero of this race was 14 year-old NATHANIEL CHRISTIAN of Denver, last year 880 champion in the lower division. Nathaniel, who was badly boxed in, suddenly broke free and proceeded to put on a terrific kick. One could hear his breathing in the stands. Passing Reilly, he came out about a foot short of overtaking Bundy, recording a great 1:58.6, 3rd Best all-time Age-14 performance.

Mile Run - Before the race, KEVIN PITCHFORD of Spokane, had the slowest qualifying time in the fast rated heat. When it was over, he had the fastest in 4:27.5, stomping his best by 12½ seconds. Behind him, local star GENE STONE was an easy second over a tight group of five runners separated by 1.2 seconds. MARK DAGG of Portland, was the best 14 year old in 7th place and in an excellent 4:32.5.

2-Mile Run - 15 year-old CLANCY DEVERY of Salem, OR, put on a terrific last lap, beating his best by 17 seconds, and winning over a brilliant field. Runner-up BURT SHIRLEY of North Hollywood, CA, after a disappointing mile, ran one of his best race of the year, improving on his P.R. by almost ten seconds; he'll be back in this division in '76. Mile Champion KEVIN PITCHFORD had enough left to chop 25 secs. off his best, to lead the rest of a talented group, where 9:53 was only good enough for 8th place.

120 High Hurdles - Eugene's (OR) MARK REYNOLDS was a favorite after a 14.8 heat victory over AL GRAY of Philadelphia. But Gray came right back to take it all, while Mark completely faded out in the final. Gray's competition came from the fine hurdler MIKE HOLLOWAY of Columbus, OH, and versatile KIT REDMAN , another Eugene product. Kit was last year's Decathlon champion, as well as this year's runner-up in the discus. SCOTT WELLS of Yakima, WA, whose 15.1 in the heats was very promising, just couldn't get untracked in the final and was never a factor in the race.

180 Low Hurdles - 15 year-old ROURKE LOWE of Portland, an outstanding hurdler who owns the 2nd best all-time 330IH mark in the country, won this event in impeccable style.

MIKE HOLLOWAY was once again the runner-up, challenging Lowe to the wire. SCOTT WELLS, once again had a great start tying Lowe's meet record in the heats, but once more didn't have it in the final, finishing last.

Mile Race Walk - DANIEL MARTINEZ, of the Diablo Valley TC (CA), was able to maintain legal heel contact throughout the race, winning the event in an outstanding 7:35 (he was the '72 Champ and '74 runner-up). The race was marred by many disqualifications. The most dramatic Dq was the one metted out to KEVIN BUTLER of the Scioto TC, OH, the 1973 & '74 Race Walking champion and the favorite this year. He received his "out" after one lap, while already in the lead by five yards. Also Dqed were TRACY TEEGARDEN (Blue Angels TC, CA) in the last 10 yards while making a desperate attempt to catch Martinez, and ERIC ZUCKER (Reseda, CA) in the last stretch, while battling eventual 3rd placer MIKE SLATES.

<u>High Jump</u> - MARK RADFORD of the Albina Roadrunners of Portland was up for this meet, taking the title in a personal best and upsetting favorite JIM BJORNSSON of Sacramento, CA, who had come in highly recommended at $6-7\frac{1}{2}$.

Long Jump - TERRY SCOTT, North Beach TC's (WA) sole entry, chose a good time to improve his personal best, as he pulled out a 22-6 victory over RAY PRENTISS of Seattle. 15 year-old GREG HANSEN, a veteran in Age group competition, reached the 21-0 level for the first time, squeeking into third by $\frac{1}{4}$ of an inch over MIKE HUBBARD of Wyoming.
