LILLIAN BOARD -HER FIGHT AGAINST CANCER

The sports world was shocked when it was announced early in November that Lillian Board, England's greatest runner, was suffering from cancer and is now in a special hospital in Germany. It is, of course, impossible to add anything to the multitude of wishes for a recovery which she has already received and of course she must be aware that all of us in the sport - from all nations - are praying for her and pulling for her. She says she will be back running - and who is there who can dispute her word?

Lillian Board literally "shot" into world prominence at the USA-Commonwealth meet in Los Angeles in 1967 when as a young 18 year old unknown she won the competition with a fantastic finishing run in 52.8 for the fastest 400 of her life up to then. In winning she upset world 440y record-holder Judy Pollock of Australia along with the favored Charlette Cooke, young string-bean Kathy Hammond and Jamaican veteran Una Morris.

From that day on Lillian was watched like a hawk by the prognosticators and correspondents getting the world reading public ready for the Olympic Games and by the time the Games rolled around Lillian was almost as big a favorite to win her 400 as was Vera Nikolic to win the 800. Board lost the Olympic final to France's Colette Besson in world record equalling time - and her ability to smile, congratulate the winner, absorb the writings of the press and still come back to whip

Last year's Annual Edition had 48 pages and 71 photos and the 1971 issue will match that in content and news.

"Track and Field News", which bills itself as the "bible" of the sport - but is actually only the bible for men's T&F, came out with their new format for their October issue, and the magazine is much improved in looks and content. I know a lot of work went into the switching to the new style and in setting up the material used. One of the articles covered the East German system of athletics (track and field) and the article carried a table showing which nation is the tops in the world "per capita" - based on the 1969 World Ranking and the most recent population figures, divide the ranking score (figured 10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1) by the population and that is your country's ranking per capita. Of course East Germany won the men's competition scoring 138 points for their 17.1 million people, an average of 8.1 points per million. The East Germans were followed by Trinidad, Jamaica, Australia, Finland, Sweden, Hungary, Bulgaria, Great Britain, USA (1.6 points per million) and 17 more nations.

We have now done the same thing with the women athletes and list the results below. Remember, these are from the World Rankings of 1969 - and also remember, a small country has the advantage in that it needs to produce only one or two athletes of world class to score high. But these "contests"

are always interesting.

The chart includes, in order of columns, number of points in the 1969 World Ranking (10-9-8-7-6-5-4-3-2-1); population in millions; and points scored per million population (Column A divided by B):

We are indebted to Mr. Dan Ferris, our AAU representative at the International Calendar Meeting in Paris recently, who sent us a copy of the news release he found in the "News of the World" which we herewith print:

"Lillian Board has begun the race of her life - to beat the inoperable cancer that has sapped her strength but failed to dent her great courage. And today, for the first time, the full story of what has been happening to the Golden Girl of British athletics can be told.

"It is a story of tragedy and pathos. But it is also a

story of inspiration and human endeavor.

"Until last Friday, Lillian had no idea she had cancer. Her mother and father kept their terrible secret as they watched her gradually becoming a shadow of her former self.

"Lillian might never have known. But on Tuesday night, as she lay resting, Mr. and Mrs. Board sat watching TV at their home.

"It was a program about an unorthodox Bavarian clinic which claims a cancer "success rate" many times that of conventional medicine. "To have any chance of a cure, the patient MUST know the full facts", insisted the doctor being interviewed. The dilemma was a heartbreaking one. Should they tell their daughter, or keep the dreaded news from her?

"For two days Mr. and Mrs. Board agonised over the decision. On Friday they gently told their daughter the whole truth. And set in motion a chain of swiftly moving events.

"Less than 24 hours after learning she had the disease, Lillian walked into the Ringberg Clinic run by 63 year old Dr. Josef Issels at Rottach-Egern.

"Lillian - who will be 22 in December - was soon examined and placed in a second floor room with a balcony and a picturesque view of Lake Tegernsee.

"Last night Lillian's father said: 'If pluck has anything to do with it, she'll make it. She said to me, 'Daddy, I don't want you to worry. I'm going to win through. I don't care how long it takes or what I have to do. I just won't be beaten'."

"Athletics Weekly" stated: "Lillian Board's zest and charm off the track, quite as much as her stirring deeds in the stadium, have made her one of the best loved of all British sports stars. For any 21 year old girl to be struck with cancer is terrible; for a girl who has dazzled the nation with her marvellous running and won everyone's affection and respect through her infectious enthusiasm and modest demeanour,

it is shocking beyond words."

So now we hear the last call for the "Lillian Board vs the Cancer Cells" - this is one race we're all pulling for a win by the human. Once again, Lillian, you're behind at the start just as you were in Los Angeles on that June day, but we're counting on you to come from behind and win once more!

1970 - THE YEAR OF THE HURDLER (From 'Der Leichtathlet')

The East German publication "Der Leichtathlet" calls 1970 the "Year of the Hurdler" - since the inception of the 100m hurdles event after the 1968 Olympic Games, the year 1970 had to arrive before the athletes began to really run this event. Of the top 30 performers of all time, only five recorded their best mark in 1969. In the article by Ernst Elert, the races run in 13.0 or better are listed - and the 17 races have been run by only six athletes - and three of those have recorded 13 flat or better only once. Which makes the other three quite prolific with 14 performances between them. Take away the Rumanian Valeria Bufanu who has only two marks 13 or under and you have East Germany's Karin Balzer and Poland's Teresa Sukniewicz with the remaining 12 best all time performances. Each of these two outstanding hurdlers boasts 6 of the extra fine marks, but Sukniewicz has run 12.8 or better on four occasions. Yet she has never beaten Balzer. And so the argument continues with each athlete having her backers. Here is the list as printed in "Der Leichtathlete":

TRAINING & COMPETITIVE TIPS

40 performances - 14 athletes

EATING: -Much more important than what to eat is WHEN to eat....A "between meal" snack could be an apple, orange or glass of milk - cokes, candy and malts are not snacks....The most important meal every day is breakfast....A good breakfast enables the body to start the day with enough sugar in the blood to carry the body through until the next meal....Missing breakfast or eating an improper one puts you "behind" the entire day.

PHYSICAL WORK AND TRAINING:-Speed is a basic quality which is never lost by adding stamina....For an athlete to develop endurance he must push himself past the point at which he first becomes fatigued....Training is a matter of self-discipline.....No sensible person ever began by racing his engine.....There is no short cut to physical fitness....No set of muscles will improve or develop unless a need for that develop-

ment is put on the muscle....The athlete must work harder next week than he does this week if he expects to improve his physical condition...The amount of work required to maintain peak condition is directly proportional to the distance of the race....Condition is a state where one can perform maximum work with minimum effort...Conditioning for running is primarily a matter of building resistance to the many effects of fatigue. This is done by gradually increasing, as muscle efficiency improves, the amount of work that is done.

SLEEP AND REST:-Lack of sleep reduces working power....Most track athletes need 8-10 hours of sleep per night....The athlete should get two hours of sleep before midnight....Inadequate sleep contributes to mental and physical dullness in normal man more than any other single factor....Sleep lost is never fully regained.

REVOLUTION IN TOP TEN AVERAGES by Jan Popper

(The Top Ten Averages system, although not the only way to evaluate ones achievements, shows perhaps better than any other statistical listing the true quality of the athletes quantity - the results are arrived at by taking the average of the athletes ten best performances. The first ever list of Top Ten Averages appeared in WTFW Yearbook for 1969 and the new list - this time 15 names deep - will appear in the forthcoming 1971 yearbook. JP)

Never before have there been as many changes of leaders as in 1970 where in half of the standard international events the stars of 1970 bettered the numerical average of the best individual competition marks of all time to date. New leaders include Chi Cheng in both sprints as she overcame Wyomia Tyus (100m) and Irena Szewinska (200m), Paola Pigni who zipped past Maria Gommers (1500/mile), Teresa Sukniewicz over Karin Balzer (100mH), Heide Rosendahl past Tatyana Shchelkano (LJ) and Danuta Jaworska over Elvira Ozolina (JT). In addition, two other leaders (Chizhova in the shot and Westermann in the discus) improved their 1969 status.

Here then are the three best performers of all time in all standard events after the 1970 season. Active athletes for 19 70 written in capital letters. (The new list, 15 deep, will appear in the 1971 WTFW Yearbook.)

SYKORA AUSTRIA'S BEST by Erich Kampfer

Maria Sykora, younger sister of former world record-holder in the pentathlon Liese Prokop, was named Austria's outstanding athlete for 1970. Maria set new national standards in the 400m (52.8) and 800m (2:01.9) in addition to bettering her own personal records for 100m (11.8), 100mH (13.6) and pentathlon (4831). She is still undecided whether to run the 800 or the 400 in next summer's European Championships. She is the defending indoor 800m champion. It is impossible to double in these two events at the Helsinki competition since they are both scheduled for the same day.

Three other Austrian records were set in 1970. Brigitte Ortner equalled the 100m time of 11.6, Helga Kapfer sped the 200m in 23.8 and European indoor high jump champion Ilona Gusenbauer had a leap of 6'0% outdoors. Two other good marks were turned in by Hannah Kleinpeter who jumped 20'5 in the long jump and veteran Eva Janko tossed the javelin 188'7.

Sykora's fantastic finish to the 1970 season came after a desultory beginning to the year when she was floundering with slow marks in all her events. But in early August she began to reach her peak and had her two fine performances of 52.8 and 2:01.9 at the World Student Games in Torino.






