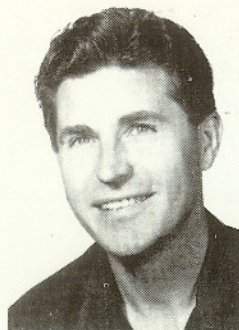

NCAA INDOOR STANDARDS

Qualifying standards for the 1985 Division I Indoor Track & Field Championships have been announced by the NCAA. The meet will be held March 8/9 at the Carrier Dome in Syracuse, New York.

There is no limit to the size of the fields for 1985. If you meet the standard, you qualify. Marks must be made during the current season in indoor competition and no later than the Sunday prior to the meet.

Fully automatic times or manual times may be used for qualification purposes, with four exceptions. Manual times may not be used to qualify for the 60y, 55m, 60yH or 55mH.

Qualifying standards in oval events may not be met on banked tracks of more than 220y.

The ever changing face of who's coaching where is still evident. Bob Shoudt, who was head coach at Villanova for three years, moved over to Illinois this year. Now he has had to quit for 'family health difficulties'. Taking over at Illinois for the rest of the year, at least, is former Villanova hurdler/800 runner Patty Bradley.....The 1985 NAIA Championships will be at Hillsdale College, Hillsdale, Michigan on May 23-25.....Most cross country coaches aim for a 90 second split between their first and fifth scorers. How about Cal Poly/San Luis Obispo, the scourge of Division II. At their own Invitational, they not only tallied a perfect score of 15, but had a 22 second spread between 1 and 5, a 46 spread between 1 and 7 and only 74 seconds between 1 and 10.

We have been updating our 'Lists' and recently been working on the All Time US Outdoor Top 50. Always sad to remove names of those who were so outstanding in their day. Taken off the Top 50 List in the 100 was Edith McGuire, Marilyn White and Martha Watson; Lorna Forde has been axed from the 400; Francie Kraker, Nancy Shafer and Jarvis Scott are no longer with us in the 800; Lisa Welch, Ceci Hopp and Robin Campbell are gone from the 1500 list; Cyndy Poor and Julie Shea are out of the mile list; Carol Cook, Peg Neppel, Suzanne Girard and Missy Kane have been erased from the 3000 list; Julie Brown is gone from the 5k; Mitzi McMillan says adieu from the 100m hurdle list; Dora Lee Roberts is gone from the long jump; Suzie Norton, Susan Armstrong and Donna Dietrich leave the javelin list and Roxanne Keating and Debbie Deutsch bid farewell from the heptathlon ranks.

The USA sent four runners to the World 10k Road Race in Spain on November 11. Of the four, only one was in the top 50 for that distance in 1984 - Joan Nesbit. The other three didn't even make the 1984 list - Michele Bush, Gail Kingma and Jeanne Lasee-Johnson. Have a nice trip, ladies.....

Don't know what all the fuss was about by those backing Mary Decker in the Olympic 3k when they stated Zola Budd was 'running in the outside half of lane one'. I always taught my distance runners to run in the outside half of lane one when they had moved into the lead, making it impossible for trailing runners to pass on the inside and to cover more territory if they wished to pass on the outside.....Wish the media would stop calling volleyball teams 'spikers'. Thanks again to the sterling effort of Joan Stratton, we present the up-to-date standings of All-Around Throwing. Main list covers the combined efforts in the shot, discus and javelin. Things to note - everyone on the list either comes from the USA or attended school here. That indicates the foreign countries don't think much of having their shot/discus people fool around with the javelin. In this list, Ms. Stratton gives you the distance in each event, the year the mark was made, the total number of feet the three performances add up to and finally the points each athlete has earned via the IAAF Scoring tables. A second list in the shot/discus rankings and the third list covers the weight efforts of heptathletes. (Our opinion is Ms. Stratton missed on the figures for Debbie Clark in this section). 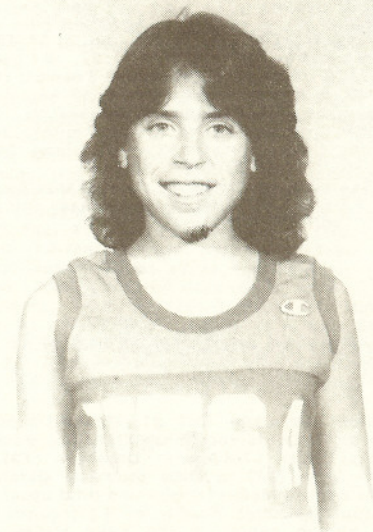

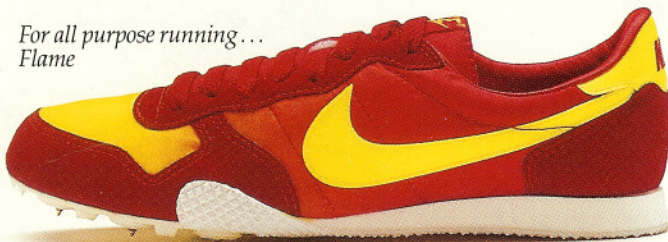
