

NATIONAL CHAMPIONSHIPS PREVIEW

TENNESSEE STATE FAVORED

Tennessee State should win the United States track and field championships. After dropping to only third in 1968, in spite of boasting Olympic champions and Olympic performers, and generally being considered as not as good a team as the 1968 crew, Coach Ed Temple's famed Tigerbelles still loom as the favorites in Dayton. Defending champions, the Crown Cities Track Club from California, do not have the power and the depth of 1968 and will be battling with the Millbrae Lions, Mayor Daley, the LA Mercurettes and the Atoms for runner-up honors.

Taken event by event, this looms as a strange Championships. In most events there are single individuals who are prohibitive favorites to easily win - Barbara Ferrell in both dashes, Kathy Hammond in the 440, Madeline Manning in the 880, Eleanor Montgomery in the high jump, Olga Connolly in the discus. Only in the hurdles where Mamie Rallins and Chi Cheng tangle, the mile which brings together a fine field - but this field is dominated by Doris Brown, the long jump where anyone could win, the shot put likewise and the javelin with defending champion Barbara Friedrich taking on Sherry Calvert does any real competition show itself.

A review of the events is listed below. Please note the Best Marks list for each event is a composite of the performances turned in to the new National statistician Neil Hofland, and those mailed to WTFW.

WORLD RECORDS

WESTERMANN - ROSENDAHL - GOMMERS BALZER - SUKNIEWICZ

Although this edition of WTFW is devoted almost entirely to the USA in anticipation of the 1969 AAU Championships on July 1-5, we must make note of several outstanding performances made in Europe since the last edition.

Heidi Rosendahl improved on her world pentathlon record with a score of 5023 in a meet against the Russians. Her individual marks were: 100mH, 13.6w-SP, 43'6-HJ, 5'5-LJ, 20'4½-200m, 24.8.

On June 14th at Leicester, England, Holland's Maria Gommers set a new world mile mark at 4:36.8. The 29 year old runner shaved two-tenths off Ann Wilson's record.

Liesel Westermann of West Germany added distance to the world discus record when she tossed the plate 205'8½ in a meet at Berlin on June 18. The old mark was 205'7 which she held.

Two European hurdlers zipped the 100m event in 13.3 to equal the all-time best. Karin Balzer, the 1964 Olympic 80m hurdles champion from East Germany, and one of Poland's famed "Miss Universe" hurdlers, Tereza Sukniewicz, were the record-equalers.

Georgia Johnson has not been heard from lately although she is credited with a doubtful 10.8 and Janis Brown has retired. All of which leaves the 100 to Ferrell with only a few youngsters as top challengers. Davis and young Willie Nichols of Bakersfield, along with inconsistent Gladys Jermison (PAL) and veteran Matteline Render could make it interesting for 75 yards, but with Bailes, Tyus, Chi, Netter out of it, Ferrell should be a cinch.







US TRACK & FIELD CLUBS RECORD CONTEST

Crown Cities Track Club is the winner of the "Who's Best in the US" Contest - the Number One US Track Club of All Time!! Boasting six Olympic Games athletes, (two of whom do not even hold Club records!), the CCTC easily won the contest with 13887 points. Second spot went to the Falcon Track Club of Seattle, Washington, with 13040 points. Millbrae Lions, with the addition of Jan Svendsen's 30.7 mark for the 200mH and 758 points, moved that Club into third spot with 12860 points. Close behind comes the Angels, another Washington team, followed by the once defunct but now revised Compton Track Club in fifth spot. Topeka Cosmos are sixth, Mayor Daley seventh, and with some review of addition the Delaware TC ends up in 8th spot with 12112 points instead of the 13072 erroneously given them last month. Rounding out the top ten are the Long Beach Comets and the Laurel TC, two more California teams. A dedicated statistician could sift through these marks for hours, coming up with many strange facts: for example - who holds the most records for the famous Tennessee State Tiger-belles? Wilma Rudolph? Wyomia Tyus? Madeline Manning? Nope - it's Patricia Monsanto who has the three weight event marks. Many athletes hold records for more than one Club - such as Martha Watson for LB Comets and TSU; Pat Winslow for CCTC and Millbrae; Manning and Montgomery for Cleveland and TSU, and on and on. Although the contest is now officially finished, if clubs will send in any new records - and please include the 100mH - we will keep the scores revised and print the standings every six months.

El Modena, California, June 14: Three highly competitive women's events spiced the Orange County Invitational here today. For the third consecutive TV race, Chi Cheng edged Barbara Ferrell in the 100y dash. Drawing a very poor, soft lane, Chi was very slow at the start and spent the entire race playing "catch-up". At 99 yards, it was still Ferrell, but a fantastic, well-timed lunge by the Chinese ace won the race in good time of 10.6 for this very slow track. The win was costly, however, as Chi fell, slid along the steel-slag track and suffered, in addition to dozens of bad cuts over her body, a slight shoulder separation which will probably keep her out of competition until the National Championships. Young Willie Mae Nichols, who has had some good times but no important wins, was a good third in 10.7, handing a loss to such speedsters as Pam Green and Dee DeBusk. Willie Mae, who still isn't sure there are three commands at the start, has a bright future once she gets the fundamentals of the sport straightened out.

Another youngster, Jackie Thompson of Mickey's Missiles, who has had an in-and-out season complete with good and bad marks and performances, turned it on for the TV cameras to score an upset win in the 440 over some fine athletes. 14 year old Mable Ferguson took over the lead from pace-setting Jarvis Scott with about 100 yards to go, but Thompson, running in an outside lane, began to make her move and swept past the field to win in 56.2.

Cheryl Toussaint of the Atoms edged Marie Stearns to win the 880, but the big news of the race was 14 year old Debbie Norris' new world best at 2:12.9 for third place. It was strictly a three-woman race from the start with Toussaint leading all the way followed by Stearns and Norris. On the last turn Norris made her bid and moved past Stearns, taking dead aim at the leader, but it was not to be as Stearns, who is noted for her driving finishes, crept back into second at the tape. Toussaint and Stearns are not exactly members of the older generation and their combined ages totals somewhere around the 33 year mark - which makes the US future in this event look pretty good!

LETTER FROM JIM RICH

I have just finished your May 1969 edition and felt that I should broaden your base of information on the running of the Hanford Invitational. I happened to be the starter in this day long marathon. This was my fourth year working at this invitational and this past one was the worst in four years. I can see why George Brown quit as meet director. I would place most of the blame on the sponsors. Some members, who promised to work, never showed or were late. The general pre-meet organization left something to be desired. Take the 100m hurdles for example. As you should know, the course was not even laid out. (I believe you actually had to come on the field and prepare the course.) A meet of this size can not be planned and carried out one day before. I believe that a sponsor should not attempt this type of job if it only plans to give its name.

Now a few words in my own defense. During the spring I was the starter for 15 to 20 meets encompassing several towns in the valley. The only two meets that were behind schedule were the ones held in Hanford. I can not argue a 12 minute delay (by stop watch), but I can assure you it was not because of my instructions. Several times we were delayed because of a mixup in qualifiers or the finish personnel were not ready. I had a dinner engagement that evening and was probably the most anxious person in the place to get home. However, I can not agree with you more on your pet peeve. I get so tired of giving the same instructions every race and I am sure the athletes feel the same way. I may experiment next year by giving no instructions. I am glad to know someone else shares my opinion.

US REPORT

CROWN CITIES CALIFORNIA CHAMPS

Bakersfield, California, June 16:-Crown Cities Track Club, competing without their top scorer Chi Cheng, successfully defended their California State title with a hard fought 88-86 victory over the stubborn Millbrae Lions amidst much confusion brought about by as poor a starting job as these eyes have seen in many a moon. All year long we have been blaming the Bakersfield Saints for causing meet delays through their constant and evident deliberate attempt to "beat the gun" - but we owe them an apology for now we know the reason why the Bakersfield athletes are "gun-guessers". The reason is quite simple - their starter apparently does not understand that there are THREE commands used when starting a race - the second of which is "set". After the first heat of the afternoon trials, the starter had the entire entry list in a tizzee for in this initial start of the day he actually fired the gun before three of the runners had gotten on their marks. He didn't fool the Bakersfield runner in the heat however as she and two others had completed 40 yards of the 50y heat before the recall was fired. Meanwhile, back at the start, the other runners in the heat were sitting dumbfounded on their blocks or had made an effort to get into the race.

And that was just the first race! What the recall starter was doing is still a mystery. Of course, there wasn't much need for a recall starter when it was practically impossible to jump the gun.

The scoring race was the prime interest of the meet as competition was lacking in most events and a gusty, swirling wind ruined most of the marks. With Chi Cheng out of the competition, it was no contest for Barbara Ferrell in the two dashes which she won in 10.9 into a 4.8mph wind and 24.2 into a 2.9 wind. Dino Lowery scored a mild upset in beating Cis Schafer in the 880, giving the CCTC the two points needed to win the meet. Francie Larrieu looked strong winning the mile in 4:58.6 - her first trip under the five minute mark. Best competitive races were the two hurdles. Diane Spangler and Cherrie Sherrard tangled in the first flight of the 100mH with Spangler holding on to win in 14.3 with the veteran performer also clocked in 14.3 - but the flight was wind-aided. Pat Donnelly, guest competitor from Arizona, won the second flight - which was not wind-aided - in 14.6 and would have had a much better time had she not hit the last three hurdles. Deborah Payne, running her second flight of 200m hurdles, scored a strong win over Spangler in 28.1s. Franzetta Parham, Laurel TC, was a double winner in the high and long jumps.

Willie Mae Nichols, displaying one of the world's worst starting techniques, won all three sprints in the girl's division in 6.0, 11.2 and 24.7 - all against the wind. Kathy Hammond limited her activities to the 440 and won easily in the fine time of 54.7, a full second ahead of Jackie Thompson. Mable Ferguson, who earlier this year was credited with a 55 flat race, could do no better than 57.4 for third.

Jayne Frederick, in spite of being left at the start - thanks again to the starter - still won the 50y hurdles in a good 6.7, but was relegated to third in the high jump as she cleared only 5'2. Mickey's Missiles won the team title.

Lakewood's Sandy Goldsberry was the shining light in the 12/13 division winning the 50y hurdles in a come-from-behind effort (she, too, was caught by the starter) and winning her pet event, the high jump, at 5'1 1/4. Sandy had three trials at a new national record of 5'4. Pam Swalley, San Jose Cindergals, scored an upset win with a wire-to-wire triumph in the 880 in 2:21.5. Favored Debbie Heald, running with evident painful legs, stayed far off the pace for the first 660 but came on like Gangbusters in the final furlong for a good 2:23.2 and second place.

AGE GROUP TRACK by Calvin Brown

Track season is now over for most thirteen and under aged girls. It has been a good and productive year, especially in the field events where the United States is usually weak.

Some of the graduates of the Age Group program are doing very well as fourteen year olds. For example:

14 YEAR OLDS:

1. Iva Wright, at 5'6½ and 185 pounds has done well in the shot and great in the discus. Her shot marks are (8#) 39'11 and (4k) 37'9½. Her discus mark of 135'4 is a "US Best for 14". Iva will compete at Dayton where she'll meet great opposition and hopefully she will achieve a new personal best.
2. Jackie Thompson is having a great year. She has run the quarter in 55.6 and 55.7 and has a best in the 220 of 24.5s. Her 220 time betters Michelle McMillan's former age 14 US best of 24.6s. Kathy Hammond has turned 18 and that leaves the girl's national championship wide open in the 440 and 220.
3. Debbie Norris is running with great skill and courage. You might have seen her on TV in the Orange County Invitational. Debbie has bettered Linda Iddings age 14 record down to 2:13.6, then to 2:12.9 at Orange. She has made steady improvement all season. Having several plateau's, then continuing to improve from there. Debbie, at 13, set a National record of 2:17.6 which is also the US age 13 best.
4. Mable Ferguson has been up and down this season. But when she's "up", she's tough! With bests of 55.0 and 25.1 she'll be tough if she's up, at Dayton.

12/13 YEAR OLDS:

In the 12/13 Division this year we have made our largest gains in the field events. We have several athletes who have done well and it gives me great pleasure to report some of them to you:

1. Debbie Rivera at 12 is probably the greatest potential at this stage of her development the US has ever had. Before turning 12 this year Debbie threw the baseball 228'1, the 6# shot 33'0 and the discus 92'8. At age 12 she continues to improve and has done 263'10, 41'6½ and 95'8½. This is her first year of track and field. Her discus marks are both US age best records at 11 and 12 years.
2. Debbie Langevain is 13 and a teammate of Debbie Rivera. They have traded wins in different events during the 1969 season. Debbie Langevain is strongest in the discus where she has been over 100 feet twice. Her second best distance is 100'1, but I am not sure of her best mark. Then comes the baseball throw where she has done 256'1 and the shot at 38'7½.
3. Two-event girl Debbie Brown, 14 as of 21 June, has put the shot 39'2½. She took up the discus late in the season but already has done 95'8½. She has size and a good attitude which helps for future improvement.
4. Yvonne Uhalde, from a great throwing family, has a best of 94'9½ and 255'1.
5. Ruth Tucker has bests of 93'3 and 37'10½.
6. Denise Sherrill has bests of 93'4½ and 227'10.
7. Debbie Sartori, another Debbie, has thrown the discus 91'3½ and the baseball 233'9.

5. Creola Miller at 12 has personal bests of 11.5 and 26.4s.
6. Pat Cape became the California State champion on a day with bad conditions with a good 60 flat 44.0.
7. Cheryl Benesh at 12 has done 60.8 and 2:27.5s.
8. Michelle Timpke at 12 has run the half in 2:23.7s.

9. Bobbie Randolph has jumped 4'11½ and 17'2.
10. Darla Crowell at 12 has jumped 17'4.

10/11 YEAR OLDS:

Joyce Wolak has run the quarter in 63.7. Her other sprint bests include 6.9, 12.4 and 27.6s.

9/UNDER DIVISION:

1. A young lady by the name of Springhorn of Millbrae Lions TC has run 6.8 to tie the NR, plus a good 13.4 in the 100.
2. Marietta Brown has improved upon her NR in the 440 with 67.4 and also has taken the NR in the 220 with 29.5s.
3. Lori Jackson has tied the NR in the long jump at 13'6½ and has run 13.4 in the 100 in spite of having a very short season.

100m Hurdles/200m Hurdles: -2'9" barriers and distance enlargements between hurdles should have been in favor of the tall specialist according to many experts. Yet Pam Kilborn is still at the top although she is only 5'3". Other mini-hurdlers such as Maureen Caird are performing well, too. Technique is still, after all, a definite component of a perfect hurdler....IAAF recognized Kilborn's 13.4 made last year as the inaugurating world record, but Kilborn lowered it to 13.3 at the Aussie championships this spring, (or their autumn, if you prefer!). A clash among the Aussie duo, Taiwan ace Chi Cheng and the Soviets (with newcomer Svetlana Nesteryenko on the top), at the US-USSR-Commonwealth meet could produce the first sub-13.0 clocking....In Europe Karin Balzer appears reluctant to leave her throne....For 200m hurdles, Chi Cheng is the first to approach that 26.0 second time forseen by Kilborn's coach, Schubert, who says there should be a differential of 200m/200h of 2.0 seconds or less.

High Jump: -A consistent number of high jump specialists are improving their standards by the use of the "Fosbury Flop". After Canadian Debbie Brill, who claims she developed a personal style not related to Fosbury's way, which she calls the "Brill Bend", another youngster, Beatrix Rechner from Switzerland, born on June 6, 1951, bettered the National record set 28 years ago by Ilsebill Pfenning of 1.66/5'5", (it was a world record at the time), clearing 1.74/5'8" and then 1.77/5'9". The four best Swiss high jumpers, (after Rechner comes Graber and Zingg 1.70/5'7 and Antenen 1.65/5'5), are all Fosbury Floppers as are many of the French specialists...Olympic champion Miloslava Rezkova had a quiet season's opening: at her first appearance she cleared only 1.60/5'3 in Sweden in mid-May....Most consistent performer is Austrian Ilona Gusenbauer, who after the birth of her first child last year, seems to improve every competition. She is still

unbeaten and leads the world....Last year's ace, Rita Schmidt of East Germany, opened the season with a fine 1.79/5'10" but then lost to countrywoman Schulze by 2 inches.


