

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CHIZHOVA 61'3 WORLD RECORD; TYUS 11.1s AS OLYMPIC YEAR BEGINS

The 1968 Outdoor Track and Field Season has barely begun, but already "Olympic Year Fever" has resulted in one world record being set, one world record being equalled and one American relay mark shattered.

Russia's Nadezhda Chizhova made her 1968 outdoor debut a record one by smashing Tamara Press' world shot put mark of 61' with a throw of 61'3/18.67 in a competition at Sochi, Russia, on April 28. Thus both of Tamara's weight records have disappeared from the books as Leisel Westermann cracked the discus record last year.

Wyomia Tyus, the defending Olympic Champion at 100 meters, started her season in a similar manner by equalling the world mark at 100 meters in an International meet in Mexico City on April 21, running the distance in 11.1s.

The Los Angeles Mercurettes have twice broken the American record for the 880 yard medley relay, finally lowering the mark to 1:41.9 at Arcadia, California, on April 20, with a team of Barbara Ferrell (220), Dee DeBusk (110), Pernetta Glenn (110) and Jarvis Scott (440).

Other important developments in the USA include the return to competition of 1956 Olympic discus champion Olga Connolly.

MEXICO INTERNATIONAL MEET

Mexico City, April 20/21:-Wyomia Tyus, the 1964 Olympic Games 100 meters champion, gave the world notice she will once again be the one to beat for the world title next October when she sped to a record-equalling 11.1 triumph over a good field at an International competition in Mexico City. Competition was held on one of the Olympic Games warmup tracks near the main stadium which, like the regular site, has a Tartan track. The time, which matched the official record of Kirszenstein, Klobukowska and Ferrell, will be presented for ratification to the International body.

Texas Southern's Dorothy Myles, who has never been noted for her consistency, was given the runner-up spot over Tennessee State's duo of Matteline Render and Marcella Daniel. The second and third places were awarded marks of 11.6 while Daniel had to be satisfied with 12.2 although pictures of the finish show the three girls in practically a dead heat.

Tyus came back to win the 200m in a speedy 23.3, a full second ahead of Pat Atkinson of Texas Southern.

Other outstanding performances included a world 1968 best

Pat VanWolvelaere's TRAVEL DIARY TO AUSTRALIA

WTFW asked indoor world record hurdler Pat VanWolvelaere to send us the "diary" of the recent trip she, Barbara Friedrich and Nancy Benson took to Australia. Here is her reply:

Monday, March 4:-We left San Francisco via Qantas Airline. We stopped in Honolulu and didn't hear our flight announced until the last call - so we missed our plane! But luckily a Pan-Am plane was leaving soon after on the same route, so we hopped aboard. During the night we stopped at the Fiji Islands, but it wasn't possible to see anything.

Wednesday, March 6:-Arrived in Sydney. Tuesday disappeared because we lost a day crossing the International Date Line. Our flight from Hawaii took us 18 hours - it's a long way to Australia. We were met by our hosts and sponsors, the W. D. & H. O. Willis Company representatives. We then flew up the east coast of Australia to Newcastle and then on to Adelaide. We were met by our hosts there and presented boquets of flowers.

Thursday, March 7:-We had a morning workout. (We worked out whenever our schedule could make it possible.) Later we had a television and radio interview. We also went shopping with Diane Burge, and had dinner with Betty Cuthbert who was the 1956 Olympic Champion in the 100 and 200 in 1956 and came back in 1964 to win the 400 meters. It was a real thrill.

Friday, March 8:-We were shown around Adelaide and aslo visited one of their schools. We watched some of the pentathlon competition that was going on during the two days before the meet proper was scheduled - this was their National Pentathlon Championships. We also romped on the beach. It was beautiful.

Saturday, March 9:-First day of competition. It was a real



nice rubberized asphalt track. Barbara won the javelin with a toss of 170'4/51.92. Nancy was second in the Junior 200m with 24.2 and also ran 11.7 in the 100m - both marks were personal bests. I hit the 7th hurdle and fell in the Junior 80mH and did not compete the next day.

Sunday, March 10:-Second day of competition and Nancy was our only competitor. She ran another 24.2 in the open 200m. It was a real thrill to watch such marvelous athletes as Di Burge, Jenny Lamy, Pam Kilborn, Maureen Caird and others. We were entertained at a banquet after the meet

and had real fun exchanging autographs and addresses.

Monday, March 11:-Left early in the morning for Sydney and met
the touring USA men's team there. The Australian team also
traveled with us from meet to meet. We had newspaper interviews when we arrived in Brisbane for our next competition.
Our motel provided us with a beautiful view of the city.
Barbara bought a boomerang and spent her workout time in the
Park throwing it.

Tuesday, March 12:-We had a morning workout and more interviews. Then we all went to Lone Pine Koala Sanctuary in Brisbane, and there we were able to feed and pet the kangaroos and to hold the Koala bears. They were so cute and cuddly we didn't want to let them go!

Wednesday, March 13:-A competition day. This was a night meet and was held on a grass track which was almost round. A really different feeling. Barbara had a fabulous throw of 186'0/56.69 and Nancy placed third in the 200m behind Burge and Lamy with a 24.4s. I was third in the 80mH with an 11.0 behind Kilborn and Caird. The US men did real fine. Di Burge was named the outstanding female athlete with her world record equalling 7.2 for 60m.

Thursday, March 14:-We went for a trip to the Gold Coast which has miles of beautiful beaches. Played in the surf for a while, then went to Surfer's Paradise where we saw a water ski show. After that we went to a reserve where they feed thousands of colorful, wild birds. The birds were everywhere and would even land on your head!

Friday, March 15:-Left for Melbourne where there had been a

drought for the past few weeks.

Saturday, March 16:-Had a workout today and one yesterday.

The rest of the time was just a lazy day with nothing to do. It felt good to do nothing!

Sunday, March 17:-Competed today on a volcanic-ash and cinder track. Would you believe we ran in the middle of the day with the temperature at 100°? That track was sure hot! Bar-

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bara won again with 179'3/54.64. Nancy placed fourth in the 200m and I believe her time was 24.2 - again. I was fourth in the hurdles with a 10.9s. Pam Kilborn was named female athlete of the meet for her Australian record-equalling time of 10.4w. At the banquet after the meet, the Victorian Women's Association presented Miss Bellew and us girls a gift of a kangaroo skin each. They're just beautiful!

Monday, March 18:-Left for Adelaide for the last meet. Had another day free.

Tuesday, March 19:-It was an evening meet on that good track again. Nancy ran a beautiful 400m and won in 55.2, another personal best. She won the award as the outstanding female athlete of the meet and Tracy Smith, US distance runner, won the male award. Barbara was second in the javelin with a throw of 166'6/50.75. She had slightly injured herself throwing at Brisbane. I was third in the 80mH in 10.8 behind Kilborn and Caird. In each of the last three meets we also ran in a lot of "mixed-up" relays; once a 4x100m with two men and two women on a team, and twice with legs of 100-100-200. It was a lot of fun.

Wednesday, March 20:-Left for Sydney. Miss Bellew and Barbara watched the Women's National Softball Championships while Nancy and I went shopping and had dinner with 1960-1964 Olympian Helen Frith and her parents.

Thursday, March 21:-Nancy and I went shopping in downtown Sydney. Barbara toured Sydney with Margaret Parker and Mary Thomas, javelin throwers. Left for the States at five o'clock - now to make up for that lost day! The sponsors of our trip, the Willis Company, made it possible for us to have an extra 24 hours in Australia and it was greatly appreciated.

Margie also had jumps of 17'5% and 17'11 during the day. In addition, she won the shot put with a 30'8" effort in the 52°, rainy weathered meet.

Hanford, California, March 20:-Although most of the "big" names were missing this year, Hanford Lions Club staged its Seventh Annual Hanford Invitational with good weather and many competitors.

The newly formed San Diego Lancerettes nosed out the Millbrae Lions for the Women's title 45-43 in a Division that saw few good marks. 



Walnut, California, April 27/28: The Mt. San Antonio Relays, one of the few big Relay carnivals which includes events for women, held three events including a pentathlon for the distaff athletes, but not without trials, mixups and foul-ups.

The foulups were brought about when the Meet Management requested the District Chairman to handle the women's competition - and then the Chairman relegated the task to still another individual - net result of which was switching of events and failure to notify participants they were invited to compete. The only notice reaching team coaches of participating athletes did not reach them until the night before the meet was scheduled. In addition, the time schedule for the pentathlon was adjusted - and kept secret from all but one performer. Even the Meet Director did not know of the change until three minutes before its scheduled start and after all the athletes (except one - who was still in bed), were warmed up, ready to run.

In spite of the difficulties, two of the three events turned out to be top notch. Lois Drinkwater, imported at the last minute and notified only 48 hours before the competition, nipped Jarvis Scott in an exciting 440 in the good time of 54.6s. Scoti led through a 25.5 first furlong, and still had an apparently safe lead after turning for home, but she tired and Drinkwater came on, and the combination produced the tight win for the Arizonian. Scott was also clocked in 54.6 and nearly all of the field turned in personal bests.

Pat Winslow had no trouble winning the pentathlon with a total of 4585 points. Her best marks came in the shot and high jump with 44'8%/13.63 and 5'5/1.65. Marilyn King was second and Dianne Spangler, with her lifetime best at 4175, was third. Two good athletes from Phoenix, Jan Glotzer and Nancy Benson, also took part, but they must grow them weak in Phoenix for their combined efforts in the shot just edged Winslows SP mark.

The 100 was no contest for Barbara Ferrell when Vilma Charlton, running for the first time since her muscle pull, did it again at 80 yards and fell flat on her face. Ferrell went on to win in excellent time of 11.3. her second-best ever, and Dee DeBusk also turned in her lifetime best in second spot with an 11.6 performance. Pernetta Glenn edged Janet Macfarlane for third, both girls clocked in 12.0 which does nothing for their egos.

AGE GROUP TRACK by Calvin Brown

RHONDA ALBERS, 13, San Leandro Track Club from Castro Valley in northern California has been doing some impressive things on the track and on the field. Last year as a 12 year old, Rhonda long jumped 17'5% for a California State record in the 12/13 Division. She is 5'6 and weighs 123 pounds and was born August 1, 1954. Also while only 12 years old Rhonda ran 6.3 (50), 11.7 (100) and 4'8 (HJ). This season, 1968, she has long jumped 17'11% for a pending National record in the 12/13 Division, run 6.2 (50) and 7.4 (60), put the 6# shot for fun over 30 feet from a standing position. Rhonda will probably try the pentathlon sometime this season. Rhonda is very active in school, which is most important, where she is a straight "A" student, plays the violin and was elected student body President this past year. Rhonda Albers is a very charming and very personable young lady.

CAROL BURKLAND, 11, Hutchinson Track Club, La Mirada, California, is another fine athlete under the leadership of Roy Swett. Carol runs anything from 50 yards through 440 yards. Her best distance is probably the 440 where she has steadily improved this season from 66.4 down to 63.8 for a National Record in the 10/11 Division. She has also improved her 220 time from a good 28.1 to a better 27.8s. Carol's bests in other events include: 6.5 (50), 9.5 (75) and 12.4 (100). Carol will be 12 on September 12, 1968, so she has the full season remaining in the 10/11 Division.

JUDY REBEJIAN, 12, running out of Arizona, has been with the Valley of the Sun Track Club (VOSTC), but soon will be with one of the new Clubs in the District as the VOSTC is splitting up to provide competition and more personalized instruction. At present, Judy is competing unattached, but while with the VOSTC she long jumped to a new National Record at the time of 17'10. This is a US best for age 12, bettering Rhonda Albers mark of 17'5%. Like most long jumpers, Judy is also a fine sprinter.

BECKY BRUCE, 12, Lakewood Spartans from Lakewood, California, set a National Record in the 10/11 440 last year with a mark of 64.5s. Now 12 years old, Becky has run several distances this season and run them well. Her best distance is the mile or half mile, but her coaches have wisely tried her in other events to increase her speed as well as giving her a chance to have some fun by letting her long jump. Becky has been a little inconsistent this season, maybe because we expect too much from her. When she runs well, it's hard to beat Becky; but she is always in the top group and close even when beaten. Her best marks this season are: 12.9 (100), 28.3 (220), 61.3 (440), 2:26.9 (880), 5:27.2 (Mile) - and, oh yes, 13'4% (LJ). I expect big things from Becky....Remember her name!

DIANE BYINGTON, 11, Rialto Road Runners, from the Southern Pacific Association. Diane is National cross country champion at the % mile distance, a title she won at Albuquerque in 4:18.4 - second place finisher was timed at 4:31.4! The difference shows her superiority over her rivals. Diane has begun the 1968 outdoor season later than most girls in the SPA. The season here started for Age Groupers on 21 January and Diane did not run her first race until 31 March - however, her debut was a sizzler at Arroyo High School in El Monte where she set a new District record in the mile at 5:32.4. This is also the best US mark for an 11 year old. Next she competed at Bakersfield on 6 April where she ran her first ever 220 and 440, and turned in a 66.0 one lap effort. Then Diane tried her hand (and feet) at the half mile distance. Her competition was very keep as Ruth Kleinsasser had already



This should prove most interesting because Diane has had an unbeaten year both in cross. country and outdoor track. Diane is an "A" student - and she hates to lose!

REPORT FROM NEW ZEALAND

With the New Zealand season drawing to a close, there appears to be few candidates for Olympic selection after several athletes failed to impress in their specialties.

Absent for most of last season through injuries, Penny Howarth came on this year to set a new NZ record in the 220 with 23.8 and also better the Olympic standard in the 440 yards cutting her best from 57.3 to 55.2 to win the NZ Championship. She also had a wind-assisted 23.5 for the shorter distance earlier in the season. She has a trip to Australia with the NZ University team in which to further cut her times against stronger opposition.

The only other possible candidate on present performancea is Mrs. Sylvia Potts who in consecutive runs twice clocked 2:06.2 for 880 yards to better the Olympic standard after being beaten in a slow NZ Championship race by Lynn Fisher while

Barbara Poulsen impressed with a New Zealand Championship win with 4453 points in the pentathlon despite shocking conditions, being unable to see the next hurdle in front of her in the 80mH because the rain was so heavy. However, her best marks - 11.3-46'61/2-4'10-19'31/4-25.1 - total almost 4700 points so she will have a special attempt to qualify in the next few weeks.

Brenda Matthews, Margaret Snow and Diane Charteris all looked possibles at the start of the season but have failed to make the grade. Matthews, after clocking 10.8 two years ago at 16 years of age over the 80mH, has a best time this season of only 11.0 plus a couple of wind-assisted 10.7 100y and a windy 220 time of 23.8s. Snow, after taking four titles at last year's NZ Championships, failed to win any this year. Her best 1968 performance is a windy 20'4 long jump. Charteris, after reaching 51'5% in the shot last year while only 19 years of age, chose to concentrate on the discus this year and reached 169'3 - but not good enough for selection. Her shot has dropped to the 46-47 foot range and she lost this title to pentathlete Poulsen. Glennys Stewart valiantly tried to cut down her times in the 880 in clashes with Potts late in the season, and managed 2:06.5 to better the Olympic standard. She also set a NZ record of 4:52.5 for the mile.

Other than the above named athletes, there has been once again very little depth in any events with most top women athletes having little competition. Most women athletes on the track, as had been the situation for some time, are girls, with few over 20 putting on their spikes. Only Mrs. Potts of the above named are over 20!

South Africa Report from Gert Le Roux

Eugene Brasler, 28 year old holder of the South African 80 meters hurdles record and seven times SA hurdles champion, improved on the National pentathlon record on two consecutive weekends. At the Southern Transvaal Championships on the 29-30 of March at Benoni (1st day) and Johanenesburg (2nd day), she totalled 4336 points with marks of 11.5-30'2%-4'11%-19'0-25.1s. A week later at the South African Championships in Johannesburg, she scored 4456 points in the rain. Her marks included 11.2-34'8/zpb-5'1/zpb-18'0/2-25.2s.

At the South African Junior Championships (under age 18), in Bloemfontein, April 5-6, the driving rain during both days made it very difficult for the athletes. However, Thea Kitshoff won the 800m in impressive fashion in 2:12.3 while Suzette Pretorius ran the hurdles in 11.3s. Denise van Wyk clocked 11.4s in a heat of the hurdles. Rina Nel, a young left-hander, put the shot 45'10.

The surprise of the meeting was the defeat of Pauline Craven in the 100m final. She was beaten by Susan Viljoen (15) in 12.1s, Craven also clocking 12.1s. Pauline injured her foot on the first day and did not run in the final of the 200 meters. In the heats, she had clocked times of 11.9 and 24.4. Viljoen won the 200 final in 24.5 while Craven annexed the long jump with 19'6.

Part IV is a series of four excellent articles including "Queens of Track & Field" by Andrew Huxtable, "Saga of Babe Didrikson" by Maxwell Stiles, and two articles by Pozzoli himself, "Where Have All the Medals Gone?" and "Mauermayer - German Nonpareil". Part V is the photograph section - although the pictures are scattered throughout the magazine. Mr. Pozzoli has quite an eye for the female figure, so you can count on good, enjoyable pictures.

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LAKESIDE, CALIFORNIA

Millbrae Weight Training from Harmon Brown, M.D.

"I am very pleased with the progress of my throwing squad so far, though they have had few competitive opportunities - we are aiming for the long pull through the summer. The "older" girls (15 and up), work with weights three days per week, and will only taper off to two sessions for the more important meets in June and August.

I work with the various members of the eight girl squad at different sites on different days of the week as they are scattered about the Bay area, but manage to see each of them two or three days a week. In the off-season we are at our headquarters in Millbrae on Saturday for a 2-3 hour session of conditioning, running and fundamentals. To prove their speed, they (the weight team) ran a 440y relay yesterday in 54.7 with a team of Nay, Alexander, Capilla and Langford.

Janis Nay, the captain, is our veteran performer having been a finalist in every National Championship since 1963, (either the girl's or women's division). At 5'6 and 155 pounds she is probably the best shot putter, pound for pound, in the US. She has begun to realize the importance of strength development since Carmelita Capilla joined our group, and can now bench press 130 pounds and does squats at 4 sets and 6 reps with 170 pounds.

Carmelita is tremendously strong but has terrible technique which is well-ingrained through several years as Hawaii State Champion. She can bench press 170 pounds, and do squats with at least 225 pounds, (she could probably use more weight but we ran out of weights). Her form is gradually improving, and now she has put 47'4 in practice when relaxed and concentrating.

Janet Svendson is still the all-around type, but has put a little more emphasis on the shot put this year. She has just begun to be serious about weight training.

Linda Langford has to be the best all-around thrower in the Girl's Division this year, though she is primarily a discus thrower. She has put 41'3 (8#) and 40'10 (4k), thrown the discus 139'4 and the javelin 137'8. She is only 16 and began weights only this fall.

Barbara Pickel, at 15, is a potentially great javelin thrower and excellent all-around athlete - HJ 5'0½, 440 61.1, 220 25.8s. She threw the spear 153'8 on March 30 at Oakland, but an ankle sprain has set her back a couple of weeks.

Carol Haskin is the number 5 shot putter at 38'4. Carol is 18 and is in only her second season of track and is just now beginning to acquire the proper technique and leg strength.

Janet Alexander was 6th ranked in the Age Group 6# shot put last year, and is in that painful transition stage of having outgrown her coordination for the present, but I hope she will catch up in the next year or two.

Tracey Lucas was the Age Group runner-up in the discus throw in 1967, and threw 105'll yesterday. She, too, has been temporarily slowed by an ankle sprain, but is starting to catch on. She has the size and rhythm to eventually match Langford when she gets the strength and maturity.

The esprit and eagerness of this group makes them a joy to work with, and the support of the parents is tops. I wish more parents would realize that weight throwing doesn't automatically convert one into a Tamara Press. If a girl happens to be tall and large framed, there is no magic which will transform her into a five foot ballerina, and track, especially throwing, is ideal for this type of girl. It is well to remember that muscle builds curves, and fat is what bulges!

The US is really beginning to come on as a world track power except for the throws and jumps, and I can only attribute this to two features - lack of technical knowledge on the part of too many coaches, and failure to utilize weight training properly. For example, Eleanor Montgomery has never used weights - just think what she could do with the added strength she could develop with some overload."

Penn Relays from Archie Owens

Franklin Field, Philadely , Pennsylvania, April 26/27:-The women's events at the 1960 Penn Relays seemed doomed before they ever began, but despite several mishaps and the usual "breezy" weather, the athletes did well. The fans were disappointed at not seeing National Champion Tennessee State who withdrew in favor of competing at the Drake Relays.

The Mayor Daley Youth Foundation team was almost blanked out en masse in an auto accident while driving to Philadelphia, and Willye White sustained some minor injuries which prevented her from competing.

The 440 yard relay was won by MDYF in a "slow" 48.0 in a race which was marred by some of the worst baton work seen in many years. Each team, with the exception of the Chicago crew, fumbled the stic at least once, and the Atoms TC got themselves disqualified for a passing zone infraction which moved Delaware TFC into second in 49.0s. The Ohio TC finished third in 50.0s. The MDYF team was Kathy Jones, Hazel Hughes, Toi McCoy and Mamie Rallins.

Beth Hudson of the Ohio Track Club led the pack of runners through a slow and uninspired 440 winning in 58.6. Barbara Pillows (MDYF) was second in 58.8 and Shelley Marshall (Atoms TC) third in 59.1s.

With both Willye White and Tyus out of the century, the luster of the race was gone, but the competition was better. Included in the race were Jamaican Olympian Carmen Smith (Atoms TC), Kathryn Jones (MDYF) the Junior National indoor and outdoor sprint champion, Mamie Rallins (MDYF), defending Penn Relays champion Barbara Sowden (Delaware TFC), Ann Coleman (Philadelphia Hawks), Linda Reynolds (Atoms) and Pat Hawkins (Atoms). Rallins and Jones were out fast with Smith making a race of it at the finish. Jones was the winner in 11.2, Rallins second and Smith third, both in 11.3s. Coleman (whom the announcer identified as "Tyus") finished in fourth spot.

In a special exhibition, Barbara Friedrich tossed the javelin 170'3, and in a special 440 yard relay, the Atoms team of Linda Cordy, Gwen Ford, Cheryl Toussaint and Pat Harris won over the Philadelphia La Mott TC, the Amber Olympic Club, Central Jersey and the Philadelphia Hawks. Times were 49.3, 50.6, 51.3, 51.6 and 53.5s.

Michigan AAU Indoor Championships from Mike Taylor

Hungarian Indoor Season from Gabriel Szabo



The first sensation came on February 18th when 19 year old Magdolna Csabi-Komka cleared 1.66/5'5 3/8 for a new Hungarian indoor record.

Judit Bognar competed in two international meets at Moscow on the 17/18 of Febr. and at Belgrad on the 25th. Bognar responded at Moscow with a new Hungarian indoor record in the shot with a put of 16.81/55'134 and then improved in Belgrade to 16.98/55'8½.

On the 29th of February at Budapest Bognar improved once again to 17.11/56'11%. On March 7th, Bognar had still another fine effort with a throw of 16.77/55'0%. After finishing the season, Bognar said, "I should like to improve to 17.30-17.60/56'9-57'9 and be in the first six at Mexico City".

Chicago, Illinois, April 5/6: An all powerful Mayor Daley Youth Foundation Track Team from Chicagoland swept the Girl's and Open Divisions of the 1968 Junior Indoor Championships held here in the "Windy City".

Victory was far from easy for Coach Joe Robichaux and his team in either division. In the Girl's competition the first day, Chicago was able to edge out Bruce Shelly and his team of six girls from Canton, Ohio, by winning the final 880 yard relay. Chicago's Katherine Jones slipped by favored Rhonda Fleming of the St. Louis Blues, in a very unpopular and debatable judges decision, to gain the victory for the home team. Fleming came back for an easy win in the 220.

The Open Division on the final day proved to be another battle between Chicago and Canton with Chicago once again wining the final relay event to edge out Canton 27-23. Fleming wasted little time in scoring an big win in the 60y dash with

a scintilating 6.6s.

Detroit's Carolyn Coleman won the 220y dash in 25.4 after first place finisher, Joyce Tinker of Florida, was disqualified for running out of her lane. Coleman blazed a 24.7 in her preliminary heat to make the finals. Another disqualification, this time the Ohio Track Club's medley relay team, moved the MDYF quartette into first.

Luigi Mengoni, Italy

(Luigi is a brand new father. His son, Roberto, was born in Bucharest, Rumania, the home of his wife, Elena. While visiting Bucharest, Luigi was able to talk with some of their top athletes. The following is his report.)

I spoke with Iolanda Balas who is now quite stout in comparison with her slim figure of the past, and there is no hope that she can make a comeback. She confirmed to me she still has much trouble with the achilles tendon and wants to have an operation, but the doctors can offer no guarantee it will be good enough to enable her to once again jump. So at age 32 she has now preferred to retire. She will now work as a teacher of physical education and will help her husband, Ion Soeter. Iolanda believes 1.85 will be good enough to win the Olympics and feels Rita Schmidt will win at Mexico although she wants to see how she jumps outdoors. She said Rita's technique is simply wonderful.

I spoke also with Viorica Viscopoleanu who hopes for a medal in the long jump and rates Becker and Kirszenstein as her chief opponents. Iorland thinks Viorica can win either the gold or silver medal in Mexico because of her great consistency of good marks. Viorica believes the winner in Mexico will probably be forced to jump between 6.60/6.70 (about 21'8 to 22'0). Viorica likes to jump from the Tartan

I saw Mihaela Penes, (the Olympic javelin champion), but was unable to speak with her because my "Translator" (Elena) was not with me at the time. Mihaela was on her way to the gymnasium for her circuit training. She is so great! About 100kg she seems (220#). The Rumanians believe she is a good hope even though her adaptability to the Tartan runway is not so good - as the Pre-Olympics showed.

In Yugoslavia I heard there are some problems with Vera Nikolic. She is tired from the terrific amount of "overtraining" she has received and for the restrictions set by her trainer (coach). However, her bad defeat in the Balkan Cross Country Championships may not mean so much. In any case, she remains the best hope for the Yugoslavians who are quite anxious. They hope that her pride will overcome all the difficulties.

ISRAEL REPORT from Green Abraham

Ramat-Gan, Israel:

April 20, 1968

"Our track and field season is in full swing and our women and girl athletes are doing well. Already many of our National records have been bettered. On April 27 at the Olympic Trials held at the Weingard Institute, Esther Schachamuron, (just turned 16), bettered the record in the 80m hurdles with an 11.1s clocking, (following wind 0.8). The former record was 11.6s set by Abigail Andra. Schachamuron also bettered two junior records; 100m in 12.2 and 200m in 25.3s. Veteran Hanna Cherifi ran the 800m in 2:10.8m just three-tenths of a second off her Asian record.

Leorit Daniel (18) bettered the existing record in the discus with 43.18/141'8. The former record was 43.09/141'4

held by Olga Vinderberg since 1960.

Lemadar Modai long jumped 5.78/18'11%. Her National record is 5.90/19'4%. Both Lamdani Michal and Hanna Samouvch have cleared 1.55/5'l in the high jump.

A group of five women athletes are scheuled to participate in the International Track and Field Meet to be held in Bergamo, Italy, on June 23rd.

"I read in Aprils' WTFW that the National Pentathlon Championships will also serve as the Olympic Trials, and I'd like to ask why? The same thing happened last year in the Pan American Games trials so that the top six performers, (unlike those of all other events), not only did not get the trip to Missouri CR the experience of competition. Most important is the experience of participation in the pentathlon. I live in San Mateo and I would be willing to pay my way to Los Angeles so I could take part in three pentathlons a year instead of only the two in our section of the AAU. The lack of enough pentathlon competitions in the United States is ridiculous. No wonder the US has produced only one GOOD pentathlon performer. Athletes are also restricted to only three events per meet which limits the competitive possibilities for pentathlon performers anxious to work on their five events.

The pentathlon takes YEARS to perfect because there is never enough time to spend on each event, but the maturing of a good pentathlete could be hastened if we had more opportunities to compete - or at least the opportunity to take part in more than just three events per meet"

The new Fleet Feet Track Club of Midland, Michigan, is coached by former Californian Glen Shaw, the Age Group Chairman.....The First Annual Tri-State Invitational Track Championships will be held on May 11 at Hazel Park, Michigan.....
The Canadian Olympic Association will send 10 female athletes to the Olympic Games provided they meet the standards.....In 1973, Canada will host the Pacific Games - the First PG will be held in Tokyo next year.....In the Junior AAU Indoor Meet much confusion reigned over the regulations imposed on the runners in the relays where teams starting in lanes 2-3-4 were forced to hand off ONLY in those lanes, thus forcing all teams except that in lane 1 to run farther than the required distance of the relay.....

He reports most of the requests for the "Eastern" paper came from the West!.....There's a rumor Charlette Cooke has retired.... Metro AAU Olympic Development Meet from Archie Owens

Victory Field, New York City, April 28:-Less than 24 hours after competing in the Penn Relays, athletes from the Metropolitan AAU returned to New York for more track and field, and in some cases the results were better than at Penn.

The Atoms' Carmen Smith won the 100 in 11.2 on the sandy Victory track. Second spot went to Kathy Korwin of the Long Island Mercurettes with Michele McMillan of the Atoms third, both clocked in 11.3s.

Brenda Merritt, another of Fred Johnson's "Atomic Pile", prevailed in the 220 over NJ Metro ace Gail Fitzgerald with 26.2 to 26.3s Fitzgerald came back to win the 440 on the sandy, beach-like running surface in 58.4. Marian Bastian (NYPAL) was second in 59.2s.

Bastian annexed the half mile with a 2:19.8 triumph over the Atoms' Shelly Marshall (2:24.3). Marshall and Cheryl Toussaint ran off with the 1500 meters with marks of 5:00.6 and 5:05.7 - with Coach Fred Thompson pleading with them to slow down since neither had been training for that distance.

Carmen Smith came back to waltz away with the 80m hurdles in a slow 12.0 - but a convincing victory over second place Pat Hawkins who could only churn 13.1s.

Joan Whitehead, NY Striders, won the shot with a toss of 41'7%. Denise Gordon (NYS) was second at 39'6. Whitehead also won the discus at 127'5, Wood was second at 120'l and Joan Gordon third with 116'3. Cynthia Anderson won the javelin at 127'6 with Wood second at 124'5.

Staten Island's Frances Bush won the high jump at 5'2 with Pat Clark (PAL) second at 5'0. Gail Tolvanen beat Carol Thomson by a foot in the long jump, 17'2 to 16'2, and the Atoms TC won the 440y relay in 49.9s.



Here's a great study in contrasts taken by Steve Murdoc at the start of a relay heat at the National Indoor Championships. On the left is Irene Obera, now 32 years of age, and on the right is Darleen Green of the VOSTC, just 14 and eligible for the Nationals for the first time. Trene has been one of the US top sprinters for many, many years, and holds the US Age Record for both the 100 and 220 in numerous Age Divisions. Her first races this year will set US records for the 32 Year Olds. Green didn't catch her in this race, but 18 years from now we shall compare her marks made in 1986 with those made by Obera in 1968.

CHRIS THOMPSON by Katrina Graham

Australia's junior javelin record holder, Chris Thompson, began her athletic career as a hurdler and a walker. Her potential remained untapped until a breif visit to her Sydney Club by senior javelin champion Anna Bocson. Following this, the small, sturdily built 13 year old progressed rapidly - from 119' to 150' two years later as a 15 year old, and to 165' at 16 years. Now at 17 she holds the National Junior record at 165 feet.

Chris has benefited over the last two years from keen competition with Margaret Parker - Commonwealth javelin titleholder - breaking the junior record six times between them during this period.



Born on the 15th of June, 1950, Chris is only 5'4 and 120 pounds. However, she compensates for her lack of height with her strength which she obtains from weight training three nights a week in the off-season, and once each week during the athletic season. The other nights are spent in sprint work - 100m and 200m repetition runs - and technique workouts. Her other event is the shot put (approximately 35'), used to increase her strength. She is well guided through her work by coach Tom Mullins, who is an athlete himself, rating 3rd in the hammer throw in Australia.

Chris is a dedicated athlete having spent a great deal of her time in training at the expense of her schoolwork. She has now taken temporary employment in order to finance a trip overseas, possibly to the United States or Europe to gain improved technique and competition which are not readily available here in Australia.

At the time of the Commonwealth team announcement, she felt well rewarded for her efforts and sacrifices, and although her throws in Los Angeles were well below her best, she feels that she has gained a great deal of experience.

Her present aim is to reach the qualifying mark for Mexico, 173', and to gain as much competition as possible. She also looks to the future after she finishes her competition, for the opportunity to "put something back" into the sport, and through coaching to help athletes to gain the satisfaction which she has enjoyed.

MANJIT WALIA by Ramu Sharma

Born in Kapurthala in Punjab, on December 25, 1946, Manjit Walia, the current Indian record-holder for the 80 meter hurdles, was introduced to athletics in 1962. She began as a high jumper but could not make headway in this event. Her coach, Mr. Joginder Singh, (not to be confused with Joginder Singh Saini), saw her great potential as a sprinter and soon had her interested in this field.

Manjit, a determined and dedicated athlete, made great progress and in the Inter-University Meet at Jaipur in December of 1964 broke the 80m hurdles record with an effort of 12.2s to eclipse the old mark by 0.2s. Mary Leela Rao, forme:internationalist, had set the record in 1958.

After this she came into the limelight and was soon in the forefront of Punjab women's athletics and at the Asian Games selection trials at Patiala in November 1966, she set a new National mark covering the 80m hurdles in 11.2s, a performance which is equal to that of the first athlete in the Asian Games at Bangkok.

Hurdles, however, was not the only event where this fine athlete did well. In the Inter-University meet in late December last year, she clocked 25.5 for the 200m, and in February this year returned a timing of 12.2 for the 100m. This, incidentally is 0.1s better than the time returned by the winning athlete at the Asian Games.

She has so far represented India three times, the last time being at the Asian Games in Bangkok. There she got the bronze medal in the hurdles with a time of 11.4, the same as the time of the silver medalist.

Manjit, now a final year student at the Government Sports College for Women, Kurukshetra in the Punjab State, reveals to the surprise of no one that athletics is her main love and she intends to keep up with it as long as it is possible in any capacity.
