## WORLD RECORDS BEGIN

### NEW MARKS TO CHIZHOVA, PIGNI, POLLAK

Although the 1972 outdoor track and field season has just gotten under way, three world records have already been broken and another tied. First to crack a global mark was Italy's Paola Pigni who slashed some 14 seconds off Joyce Smith's 3000 meter mark with a scintillating 9:09.2 at Formia on May 11th. Eight days later, Russia's Nadezhda Chizhova improved her own world shot put record from 67'0 1/4 to 67'8 3/4 at Sochi, and the next day East Germany's Burglinde Pollak took the pentathlon record up to 4677. In the meantime, defending Olympic 800m champion, the USA's Madeline Manning Jackson surprised even herself by equalling the global 880y record in the rain at Philadelphia as she eased to a 2:02.0 clocking.

There have been other outstanding marks as well. Rumania's Argentina Menis has tossed the discus 210'9 while former world record holder Leisel Westermann, WG, has a throw of 203'5 in the discus. Rumania's Marion Becker threw the javelin 201'6 and there were two more fine discus throws by defending Olympic champion Lia Manoliu (196'10) and Russia's Faina Melnik, the 1971 world leader (199'0).

In the USA, Sherry Calvert with a toss of 192'0 in the javelin is the best of our field eventers while a comebacking Kathy Schmidt made the Olympic standard with a throw of 179'3. Our sprinters are running faster than ever and our middle distance and distance runners are rounding into shape as unsung Teri Anderson of the Topeka Cosmo Club leads the country with her 4:41.6 mile victory at the Drake Relays. To date we have qualified 27 athletes for the Olympics - 21 of them in the 100, 200 or 400!

### KING GAMES

Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, May 13:-Madeline Manning Jackson tossed her hat into the Olympic Games 800 meters with fervor today as she equalled the world record for 880 yards in the rain at 2:02.0s. Madeline, the defending Games 800m champ, was her old self as she ran the opposition into the ground over the final 200 meters. Not too far behind was Terry Crawford with her best race of the year in 2:05.1 with Canada's former Pan Am champion, Abby Hoffman, third.

There were upsets in the 100 and the 220. In the short sprint Rosie Allwood continued to impress as she sped through the rain in 10.6 to hit the tape a yard ahead of Orien Brown and favored Iris Davis. Mattline Render led the field for the first 40 yards, but faded to fourth. Pat Henderson edged Williamae Ferguson for the fifth spot.

In the 220, Esther Stroy, fresh from her speedy runs in Martinique, caught Mable Ferguson and Linda Reynolds midway through the turn and entered the straight with a solid lead only to see Mable take it back and win with a meet record of 23.5s. Kathie Lawson, the only athlete in the field who is not boasting of her early season marks, finished out of the money.

Sheila Ingram led the 440 around the first turn, increased her lead around the second turn and looked to be a winner, but Jarvis Scott flew past her to break the tape. Mable Ferguson finished a fading 6th although this race was less than half an hour after the 220.

Lacey O'Neal got another fantastic start in the 100m hurdles, but Mamie Rallins caught her at the 7th barrier and went on to win by two yards. Donna Schullenberg continues to improve and this time clocked 14.1 for third.

### CAL STATE HAYWARD NATIONAL COLLEGIATE CHAMP

Knoxville, Tennessee, May 12/13:-A world class performance in the javelin by Sherry Calvert highlighted a fine National Collegiate Championship meet in rainy Knoxville. Calvert had a mark of 192'0/58.52 for the best mark in the USA this year and one of the top performances in the world.

Last year's champions, Texas Women's University, and the 1971 runner-up, Cal State Hayward, exchanged places in 1972 as the Californians won easily, 76-43. Maren Seidler led the Jim Santos coached crew as she exploded to a 52:04 performance in winning the shot. Cis Schafer repeated her double of 1971 as she won the 440 and 880.

Pat Hawkins, Long Island University, scored a fine double with a fast 27.2 victory in the 200m hurdles and an upset win over Kathy Lawson in the 100 at 10.8. Lawson also lost the 220 to Linda Reynolds in a slow 24.7. Jamaican Audrey Reid won the high jump at 5'8 for another good performance.

This meet continues to grow and to improve. Forty eight schools took part in the 1972 competition which, unfortunately, was bothered by rain - as was the 1971 edition. But each year finds more and more interest thereby boosting America's future in women's track.

## REEL TALK

As you may know, I have been offered the position as coach for the Olympic team of the Republic of China. This opportunity is too good to turn down and I will be gone to Taiwan by the end of May. This means this issue will be the final one you will receive until the Pre-Olympic issue comes in August. I regret having to miss the USA National Championships, the Olympic trials, the USA-Canada dual meet and the other exciting action coming our way during the summer, but I feel it is more important to be in a position to cover the Olympic Games and since that opportunity has arisen, that is the way it will have to be. I believe most of you would make the same decision if you were in my position. I will return about September 25 and will get right to work on the Olympic issue - which issue will also include the big meets missed during the summer. As it takes about four weeks to prepare an issue, you can expect to have your September issue mailed about the middle of October - and the Post Office must be responsible from then on. I trust our report of the Games will be worth waiting for. We will do our best.

What to do about times which everyone knows are not correct but which are certified by meet officials? A case in point is Bobbette Krug, La Jolla TC hurdler. Bobbette entered the 100y dash at the Phoenix Invitational and won her heat. The time given was 10.5s. Bobbette knows she can not run 100y in 10.5s. She placed sixth in the final and her time was 12.2s. Yet she is now credited with making the qualifying time for the Olympic Games 100 meters. Bobbette was embarrassed and actually enjoyed the joke. But other athletes are not always capable of seeing things in the right light - we can remember the case of an unnamed East coast sprinter who was credited with a phenomenal mark in a national championship heat - one achieved through a rolling start which would have made Armin Hary jealous. She, too, was far back in the final, but she believed the time given her by the officials and could never understand why she was not able to score that kind of a performance again. Eventually she became discouraged and quit. And the USA lost another potentially fine sprinter.

## AMERICAN RECORDS CORRECTIONS

Two errors were made in last month's listing of American Records. The pentathlon record is 4735 made by Pat Bank in 1970 and not 4731 by Marilyn King in 1971. Since the discus used by Olga Connolly in her 1972 throw of 177'5 was not impounded and checked, her performance goes down the drain and the record reverts to 176'10 thrown by Earlene Brown in 1960. Also Mavis Laing's 23.2 was made over meters and not yards so the 220y record reverts back to 23.4 by Edith McGuire, 1964.

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## OLYMPIC TRIALS INFORMATION from Nell Jackson

**OLYMPIC TRIALS:**-The trials for the track and field events for the Women's Olympic Team will be held in Frederick, Maryland, July 7 and 8, 1972. Entry forms may be secured by writing to the following address: Women's Olympic Trials, PO Box 286, Frederick, Maryland, 21701.

**STANDARDS:**-Athletes who meet the following standards will be eligible to enter the trials: 1) From the AAU Senior Nationals, Canton, Ohio; A-Semi-finalists in running events; B-Top 12 in field events; C-Top 12 in 1500 meters; 2) Those who have equalled or bettered the standards set by the IAAF within the designated time period (August 1, 1971 to August 13, 1972, in a sanctioned meet; 3) The committee reserves the right to accept entries that do not fit in the above categories. (For IAAF standards, see WTFW, March 1972).

**PENTATHLON:**-The Pentathlon Trials will be held in conjunction with the AAU Championships, June 24-25, 1972, Los Alamos, New Mexico. Qualifying standards for the Olympic Team is 4200 points based on the new scoring table. Standards for the trials are the same as the AAU standards, (2900 points (new table)). Information concerning the pentathlon trials may be obtained by writing to the following address: William Hassenzahl 2300 Trinity Drive, Los Alamos, New Mexico, 87544.

**IMPORTANT FOR COACHES AND ATHLETES:** All coaches who have girls who have equalled or bettered the qualifying standards for the Olympic Games between 1 August 1971 and 13 August 1972, should verify their performances in the following manner:

- 1) Fill out an AAU record form. Include the following information: a) Date of meet, b) Place (including city), c) Name of meet, d) Weather conditions - wind gauge reading, e) Track measurements, etc., f) Signature of meet director and/or referee, g) Signature of judges (timers or field event judges).
- 2) Forward a copy of the meet results with the form.
- 3) Performance must have been achieved in a sanctioned meet.
- 4) Return all forms and meet results to Nell C. Jackson, Chairman of the Women's Olympic T&F Committee, Freer Gym, University of Illinois, Urbana, Illinois, 61801.

It is very important that this information is gathered because, 1) It must be included on the official entry form for those girls who actually qualify for the US Olympic team, and 2) It qualified the athlete to enter the Olympic Trials.

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## KALEIDOSCOPE

Madeline Manning Jackson has announced she will go for a triple gold at Munich in the 400, 800 and 1600m relay....And speaking of Madeline, did you notice how she was introduced on tv by Jack Whitaker at the King Games? The entry list had abbreviated her to "Mad. Man. Jackson" - and that's the way it came over the air!

Argentina Menis, the Rumanian girl (23) who finished 4th in the discus at Helsinki in the European Championships is looming as a strong threat for the title in Munich. Argentina, an office worker who stands 5'7 and weighs 165 began discus throwing in 1964 and her progress has been unwavering since she began at age 16: 147'4 in 1965, 154'3 in 1966, 163'2 in 1967, 170'7 in 1968, 174'8 in 1969, 180'11 in 1970 and 200'5 last year. She has now moved to 4th place on the world all-time list with throws of 208'1 on April 1 and 208'9 on April 29....Meanwhile, Lia Manoliu, the 1968 Olympic champion from Rumania - threw 196'10 her lifetime best just three days before her 40th birthday and will undoubtedly be competing at Munich in her SIXTH Olympics....Another Rumanian, 22 year old Marion Becker has moved into 6th on the all time world list of javelin throwers with a toss of 201'6. Marion is not big - 5'5 1/2 and 119 pounds - and had a previous best of 189'0....

The 1200 women competitors at Munich will not have to submit to any undignified procedure for the ascertainment of their sex. Medical experts will only have to examine one hair from each as the follicle has now been found to furnish absolute proof of the owner's sex....Exemption is to be granted to women competitors who have been tested at former championships and are able to produce a certificate issued by the Medical Commission of the IOC or by an international sport federation....There will be 126 nations invited to the Games. ....Paola Pigni's fantastic world record for the 3000m was set just 13 months after the birth of her daughter....Paola passed the 1500m in 4:42.2 and ran the last half of the race in 4:27.0....Murray State College defeated Memphis State in a dual meet, 69-49....In the May issue of New Mexico's fine publication "Junior Sports Review", Bohette Krug is picked on once again as she is listed as the "world record holder in the hurdles".....

Daniela Jaworska was voted Poland's top female athlete for 1971 over Irena Szewinska and Ewa Gryziecka...."Sports Today" has an article written by the founder of the American Society of Girl Watchers, Will Grimsley, who picked the Ten Most Glamorous Girls in Sports and except for his first place pick, I agree with him. Here's Grimsley's list: 1-Peggy Fleming (figure skating), 2-Chi Cheng (track), 3-Sharon Moran (golf), 4-Gabriel Seyfert (figure skating), 5-Tory Ann Fretz (tennis), 6-Robin Smith (jockey), 7-Vera Caslavskva (gymnastics), 8-Pat Palinkas (football), 9-Susan Chaffee (skiing), 10-Eva Lundquist (tennis)....Loretta Matejko, teenage high jumping marvel from the Wolverines, hopped on successive Saturday's 5'7 1/4, 5'7, 5'8 and 5'7....Dick and Pam Beyst are now proud parents.....

Young Effie Jordan is being coached by Rosie Bonds who was one of the best and a finalist at Tokyo in the hurdles.... Southern California Cheetahs' Becky Wolinbarger, just a few hours after winning her lifetime fastest race on May 20, walked into a glass door and was on the operating table for six hours. Let's all pray for a complete recovery....Discus and javelin marks at Munich will be measured through the use of electric eye mechanisms....New Zealand has selected its Olympic team members: Brenda Matthews 100 and 100mH, Penny Hunt 400 and Sue Haden 800....Sports International's Jane Burnett had a foot operation in Boston recently....Delaware Sports Club's Chris A'Harrah's 12 year old sister Gay, ran in a recreation meet and won the 50 (6.7), 100 (11.5), 220 (27.9), 440 (66.6), 880 (2:34.9), LJ (15'2) and HJ (4'8) - can anyone top that?...England's Janet Simpson will soon be the wife of Phillippe Clerc...."Athletics Weekly" says, "The most exciting results of the year have been those of the Kenyan girls during their recent Australian tour. ## SAN MARCOS INVITATIONAL

San Marcos, Texas, April 15:-The defending National Inter-collegiate champions, Texas Women's University, featured an awesome array of talented sprinters in winning the 11th annual Southwest Texas State University Invitational Track and Field Meet. TWU dominated the sprints and relays to amass 145½ points to runner-up Sam Houston State's 112½ and Florida St. University's 103.

Two DGWS college records were bettered by TWU as Judy Murphey turned in a 10.7 100 and their 880y relay team clocked 1:44.8. They also set a meet record in winning the 440 yard relay in 52.3.

Florida State's Laura Gibbons dominated the field events with first places in the javelin, high jump and discus while teammate Sharon Burgess got a new meet record in both the 880 (2:23.0) and 1500m runs (4:57.6). Another new meet mark was set by Diane Guttierrez, San Jacinto JC, in the shot with a throw of 43'2½.

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## WORLD RECORDS BEGIN

### NEW MARKS TO CHIZHOVA, PIGNI, POLLAK

Although the 1972 outdoor track and field season has just gotten under way, three world records have already been broken and another tied. First to crack a global mark was Italy's Paola Pigni who slashed some 14 seconds off Joyce Smith's 3000 meter mark with a scintillating 9:09.2 at Formia on May 11th. Eight days later, Russia's Nadezhda Chizhova improved her own world shot put record from 67'0 1/4 to 67'8 1/4 at Sochi, and the next day East Germany's Burglinde Pollak took the pentathlon record up to 4677. In the meantime, defending Olympic 800m champion, the USA's Madeline Manning Jackson surprised even herself by equalling the global 880y record in the rain at Philadelphia as she eased to a 2:02.0 clocking.

There have been other outstanding marks as well. Rumania's Argentina Menis has tossed the discus 210'9 while former world record holder Leisel Westermann, WG, has a throw of 203'5 in the discus. Rumania's Marion Becker threw the javelin 201'6 and there were two more fine discus throws by defending Olympic champion Lia Manoliu (196'10) and Russia's Faina Melnik, the 1971 world leader (199'0).

In the USA, Sherry Calvert with a toss of 192'0 in the javelin is the best of our field eventers while a comebacking Kathy Schmidt made the Olympic standard with a throw of 179'3. Our sprinters are running faster than ever and our middle distance and distance runners are rounding into shape as unsung Teri Anderson of the Topeka Cosmo Club leads the country with her 4:41.6 mile victory at the Drake Relays. To date we have qualified 27 athletes for the Olympics - 21 of them in the 100, 200 or 400!

### KING GAMES

Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, May 13:-Madeline Manning Jackson tossed her hat into the Olympic Games 800 meters with fervor today as she equalled the world record for 880 yards in the rain at 2:02.0s. Madeline, the defending Games 800m champ, was her old self as she ran the opposition into the ground over the final 200 meters. Not too far behind was Terry Crawford with her best race of the year in 2:05.1 with Canada's former Pan Am champion, Abby Hoffman, third.

There were upsets in the 100 and the 220. In the short sprint Rosie Allwood continued to impress as she sped through the rain in 10.6 to hit the tape a yard ahead of Orien Brown and favored Iris Davis. Mattline Render led the field for the first 40 yards, but faded to fourth. Pat Henderson edged Williamae Ferguson for the fifth spot.

In the 220, Esther Stroy, fresh from her speedy runs in Martinique, caught Mable Ferguson and Linda Reynolds midway through the turn and entered the straight with a solid lead only to see Mable take it back and win with a meet record of 23.5s. Kathie Lawson, the only athlete in the field who is not boasting of her early season marks, finished out of the money.

Sheila Ingram led the 440 around the first turn, increased her lead around the second turn and looked to be a winner, but Jarvis Scott flew past her to break the tape. Mable Ferguson finished a fading 6th although this race was less than half an hour after the 220.

Lacey O'Neal got another fantastic start in the 100m hurdles, but Mamie Rallins caught her at the 7th barrier and went on to win by two yards. Donna Schullenberg continues to improve and this time clocked 14.1 for third.

### CAL STATE HAYWARD NATIONAL COLLEGIATE CHAMP

Knoxville, Tennessee, May 12/13:-A world class performance in the javelin by Sherry Calvert highlighted a fine National Collegiate Championship meet in rainy Knoxville. Calvert had a mark of 192'0/58.52 for the best mark in the USA this year and one of the top performances in the world.

Last year's champions, Texas Women's University, and the 1971 runner-up, Cal State Hayward, exchanged places in 1972 as the Californians won easily, 76-43. Maren Seidler led the Jim Santos coached crew as she exploded to a 52:04 performance in winning the shot. Cis Schafer repeated her double of 1971 as she won the 440 and 880.

Pat Hawkins, Long Island University, scored a fine double with a fast 27.2 victory in the 200m hurdles and an upset win over Kathy Lawson in the 100 at 10.8. Lawson also lost the 220 to Linda Reynolds in a slow 24.7. Jamaican Audrey Reid won the high jump at 5'8 for another good performance.

This meet continues to grow and to improve. Forty eight schools took part in the 1972 competition which, unfortunately, was bothered by rain - as was the 1971 edition. But each year finds more and more interest thereby boosting America's future in women's track.

## REEL TALK

As you may know, I have been offered the position as coach for the Olympic team of the Republic of China. This opportunity is too good to turn down and I will be gone to Taiwan by the end of May. This means this issue will be the final one you will receive until the Pre-Olympic issue comes in August. I regret having to miss the USA National Championships, the Olympic trials, the USA-Canada dual meet and the other exciting action coming our way during the summer, but I feel it is more important to be in a position to cover the Olympic Games and since that opportunity has arisen, that is the way it will have to be. I believe most of you would make the same decision if you were in my position. I will return about September 25 and will get right to work on the Olympic issue - which issue will also include the big meets missed during the summer. As it takes about four weeks to prepare an issue, you can expect to have your September issue mailed about the middle of October - and the Post Office must be responsible from then on. I trust our report of the Games will be worth waiting for. We will do our best.

What to do about times which everyone knows are not correct but which are certified by meet officials? A case in point is Bobbette Krug, La Jolla TC hurdler. Bobbette entered the 100y dash at the Phoenix Invitational and won her heat. The time given was 10.5s. Bobbette knows she can not run 100y in 10.5s. She placed sixth in the final and her time was 12.2s. Yet she is now credited with making the qualifying time for the Olympic Games 100 meters. Bobbette was embarrassed and actually enjoyed the joke. But other athletes are not always capable of seeing things in the right light - we can remember the case of an unnamed East coast sprinter who was credited with a phenomenal mark in a national championship heat - one achieved through a rolling start which would have made Armin Hary jealous. She, too, was far back in the final, but she believed the time given her by the officials and could never understand why she was not able to score that kind of a performance again. Eventually she became discouraged and quit. And the USA lost another potentially fine sprinter.

## AMERICAN RECORDS CORRECTIONS

Two errors were made in last month's listing of American Records. The pentathlon record is 4735 made by Pat Bank in 1970 and not 4731 by Marilyn King in 1971. Since the discus used by Olga Connolly in her 1972 throw of 177'5 was not impounded and checked, her performance goes down the drain and the record reverts to 176'10 thrown by Earlene Brown in 1960. Also Mavis Laing's 23.2 was made over meters and not yards so the 220y record reverts back to 23.4 by Edith McGuire, 1964.

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## OLYMPIC TRIALS INFORMATION from Nell Jackson

**OLYMPIC TRIALS:**-The trials for the track and field events for the Women's Olympic Team will be held in Frederick, Maryland, July 7 and 8, 1972. Entry forms may be secured by writing to the following address: Women's Olympic Trials, PO Box 286, Frederick, Maryland, 21701.

**STANDARDS:**-Athletes who meet the following standards will be eligible to enter the trials: 1) From the AAU Senior Nationals, Canton, Ohio; A-Semi-finalists in running events; B-Top 12 in field events; C-Top 12 in 1500 meters; 2) Those who have equalled or bettered the standards set by the IAAF within the designated time period (August 1, 1971 to August 13, 1972, in a sanctioned meet; 3) The committee reserves the right to accept entries that do not fit in the above categories. (For IAAF standards, see WTFW, March 1972).

**PENTATHLON:**-The Pentathlon Trials will be held in conjunction with the AAU Championships, June 24-25, 1972, Los Alamos, New Mexico. Qualifying standards for the Olympic Team is 4200 points based on the new scoring table. Standards for the trials are the same as the AAU standards, (2900 points (new table)). Information concerning the pentathlon trials may be obtained by writing to the following address: William Hassenzahl 2300 Trinity Drive, Los Alamos, New Mexico, 87544.

**IMPORTANT FOR COACHES AND ATHLETES:** All coaches who have girls who have equalled or bettered the qualifying standards for the Olympic Games between 1 August 1971 and 13 August 1972, should verify their performances in the following manner:

- 1) Fill out an AAU record form. Include the following information: a) Date of meet, b) Place (including city), c) Name of meet, d) Weather conditions - wind gauge reading, e) Track measurements, etc., f) Signature of meet director and/or referee, g) Signature of judges (timers or field event judges).
- 2) Forward a copy of the meet results with the form.
- 3) Performance must have been achieved in a sanctioned meet.
- 4) Return all forms and meet results to Nell C. Jackson, Chairman of the Women's Olympic T&F Committee, Freer Gym, University of Illinois, Urbana, Illinois, 61801.

It is very important that this information is gathered because, 1) It must be included on the official entry form for those girls who actually qualify for the US Olympic team, and 2) It qualified the athlete to enter the Olympic Trials.

The conditions for this event were not good as every contestant except Schmidt failed to improve their 1972 best indicating young Kathy is on the way back and a distinct threat to make the Olympic team.

Berto looked overweight and never was in contention.

In the field events, Josephine Dela Vina, Mayor Daley YF and the 1971 National AAU champion, flew out to compete against Olga Connolly, but Olga failed to show and Josephine won with an excellent throw of 178'10, her lifetime best. Jan Svendsen, LATIC, improved once again in the shot to 47'7 1/2 and could hit the magic 50 barrier very soon. The big surprise in the field events was the win by Connie Lynch in the long jump. Connie entered the meet with the 35th best mark in the state and qualified for the final with only 15'6. But she hopped 18'9 when it counted and broke Kay Bruce's state meet record.

America's "Pigtail Brigade" takes to the track circuit again June 4, in Montreal, Quebec, for a dual track and field meet with Canada. US women, who gained fame two months ago with a stunning upset indoors of the Soviet women, were selected on the basis of performances at the USA Indoor T&F Championships.

The US-Canada Women's T&F Meet will be sponsored by Tassaway, Inc., of Beverly Hills, California, makers of a new menstrual protection product, in conjunction with the AAU.

"Tassaway helps free women, especially active ones, from problems caused by their femininity. We hope our financial support will similarly help free women's athletic competition from some of its problems," states Tassaway president Robert P. Oreck.

He said his company will not only provide backing, but also intends to sponsor research into the effects of menstruation on women competitors.

"We are extremely pleased that Tassaway has recognized the benefits of women's track by sponsoring this dual meet with Canada", said AAU Executive Director Ollan Cassell. "Our hope is for a continuing relationship that will foster the growth of women's athletics in this country."

The "Pigtail" appellation was given the US girls because of their youth and habit of tying their hair in what has now become an almost universal style in women's track and field.

Among those competing will be 16 year old Debbie Heald of La Mirada, California, who ran the fastest mile ever by an American woman; 16 year old Wendy Koenig, victor over the Russians in the 880; and 29 year old (but pigtailed) Doris Brown, who holds the American outdoor record for the mile and two mile.

The international dual meet, which will be one of the two or three major events for US women preparatory to the Olympic

Games, will be run at metric distances. Three girls from each country will be in each of the 12 events (100, 200, 400, 800, 1500, 100mH, HJ, LJ, SP, DT, JT and pentathlon.

Ron Sorkness of Seattle, Washington, coach of the Angels Track Club, has been selected as head coach of the American team.

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## CLUB NEWS

### COMMUNITY TC by Barbara Smoah

The Columbus Community Track Club returned home victorious from the Second Annual AFL-CIO-AAU track meet held in Detroit, Michigan. The team was victorious in every sense of the word with 53 trophies in the proof. Forty three members of the team participated in this competition. They were supported by more than 20 parents and friends who traveled to Detroit to watch.

The girls proved their abilities with both individual and team achievements by winning 13 individual and 40 relay trophies.

Attending the meet but unable to compete because of injury was Olympic 800m champion Madeline Manning Jackson.

All in all, the girls of the Columbus Community TC did an outstanding and commendable job of representing their team and the entire community of Columbus, Ohio. The meet was attended by most of the track clubs in Ohio, Michigan and Penn.

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### LASSEN CINDERELLAS by Bob Wall

The Lassen Cinderellas track activities have been somewhat limited in the past couple of months due to the cold and snowy winter of the Sierra Nevada. Our workouts have been primarily gym running at even pace and some work over two hurdles.

During January, however, our top hurdler Yvonne Richardson (California State 200mH champ), ran 8.4 to qualify for the Athens Indoor 60yH. In the meet she ran 8.2 to place 4th. Yvonne did this only with workouts indoors and over one hurdle.

Our early season performances worthy of note are Brenda Blackham's 119'3 discus toss in a high school meet and a shot mark of 36'1. Brenda is 17. Dale Phillips (20) ran 42:20 to win her division of the Fremont 10000m road race. Pam Allen (13) turned in a 5:22.2 mile at Orinda in her first run of the year.

After seeing the results of the trials for the international cross country team and the results of the meet in Europe, I am curious why a girl runner of 12 or 13 isn't eligible to qualify for this meet. I noticed a couple of 13 year olds swimming or ice skating in the Olympic Games. In fact, Marjorie Gestring won the Olympic diving championship at age 13. Why, then, cannot a girl of 13 run in the cross country meet? I believe, and we think some others in LA might agree, that Long Beach's Mary Decker might have made this year's team. At least she should have had the chance.

I would also like to use WTFW to air two other things that have bothered me in recent months. First, in long distance road races, we have had a bad experience twice this year with awards. Dale Phillips (20) was required to run in the open division - which is all right as there were different divisions for 9/Under, 10/11, 12/13 and 14/17. However, everyone received awards except open division runners. This happened at Placerville and at Concord. It is very disappointing to the athlete and certainly is inconsistent. Little wonder we have such difficulty getting our women to stay with the sport long enough to gain the proficiency of the "older" European athletes.

Secondly, why is the longest race for 10/11 girls only 880 yards? These girls run 1¼ miles over hill and dale during cross country season so why not a mile on the track during the spring? I would welcome the feelings of other coaches.

One other item: We are going to attempt to run a girl on our high school interscholastic cross country team next fall. This may result in an eligibility problem and civil liberties question. Any WTFW reader with knowledge of cases in this realm or with news clippings of court cases, please send them to me. It may help us to have a chance at succeeding next fall.

In the club's second year of competition, we are well on our way to achieving our primary goal - a small fun club with quality performers. We have a total of sixteen girls. Eight are in the 14-16 age group. All are either first or second year runners.

Bonita Brown is consistently around 11.4 in the 100 and 25.7 in the 220. Cindy Murphy runs a good 62 second 440 and 26 second 220. While these times are not good enough for national recognition, for second year runners we consider this good development. The other six girls are not far behind. Except for Barbara Ellis, a developing 880 runner, they all prefer the sprints. Workouts are three times a week leaving the girls time for other activities or to work out on their own.

Our eight age groupers have as much fun as the older girls. We try to keep the pressure as low as possible. Of the eight, two are nationally ranked. As a nine year old Ann Regan was second in the nation in the 440 with a 68.5 and Christine Smallwood at eleven was second in the nation in the 220 with 27.2. This year at age ten Ann has run 12.3/27.9/63.0 for the 100/220/440. Christine at 12 has 11.6 and 26.4.

We feel that with continued parent participation and by maintaining a relaxed attitude we may develop a few champions and keep the girls interested a long time.

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### VOSTC by Sue Humphrey

Our 9/Under team placed second at the Mickey's Missiles Invitational and our open team, the "Cactus Wrens" won the team trophy in the women's division. Dawn Freeman ran the fastest 660 ever by an Arizona girl with a 1:51.4. Tracy Llewelyn won the mile walk. The following week, the 9/Under team won the Scottsdale Track Classic title and the Cactus Wrens placed second.

# FOREIGN NEWS

## AUSTRALIAN NEWS from Mike Hurst

Australian hurdler Pam Kilborn Ryan has asked permission to tour Europe for seven weeks before the Olympic team leaves for Munich.

If permission is granted, she will leave on June 10 to compete in Scandinavia, Germany, Italy, Great Britain and Switzerland.

Mrs. Ryan said she wants to get training on Tartan tracks of which there are none in Australia.

"I've got no hope in Munich unless I do," the Commonwealth champion and record holder said recently.

"It's a different action than that on cinders. I'm a bouncy hurdler, because I need more power to lift off cinders. On tartan this would be wrong and wasteful."

Mrs. Ryan said that before the Edinburgh Commonwealth Games she ran at Koblenz on cinders and beat West German star Heide Rosendahl by 1½ yards. But four or five days later they clashed again, this time on tartan and Rosendahl beat her by the same margin.

Mrs. Ryan's application to the AAU has been passed on to the Australian Olympic Federation for approval. Kerry O'Brien is the only other Australian Olympian seeking to compete overseas before Munich.

Raelene Boyle is due to come to Sydney in late May....The Australian Olympic Federation, in an unprecedented move, has allocated \$25,000 for preparation of the Olympic sports teams.

Olympic hurdles champion Maureen Caird found a job just after returning from the Australian Championships. Just in time, too, because she had four car crashes in the fortnight after her return. Her job? Maureen works for the Bob Smith Motors - a crash repair shop and she gets her red sports car repaired for zip.

Since Mrs. Ryan's request for overseas competition, several of the other women have had similar thoughts. The National hurdles champion Penny Gillies of Sydney said she had not given any thought to seeking pre-Olympic Games competition, but now she will confer with her coach, former Olympian June Ferguson, (who also formerly coached Maureen Caird).

Apparently Raelene Boyle has no plans to travel overseas before the Games. Miss Caird would like to and had hoped to visit California, but as usual finances will prevent her.

Adidas should be well served in the Munich Olympic Village, especially if the rumor is true that Puma have no shop there. Australian Olympic and world record breakers Betty Cuthbert and Ron Clarke will work for the shoe company inside the village and there should be plenty of coaching advice exchanged with these two veteran Olympians.

Sydney girl Lyn Tillett, (pentathlon and long jump) and Alison Ross-Edwards (400 and 1600m relay) have not yet begun any speed work in their Olympic preparation. Tillett had lost some of her jumping form, but recently bettered 20 feet twice in training and clocked 14.7 for the hurdles during a rainy day training session at Hensley Athletic Field, Sydney.

## MARY PETERS GB PENTATHLON RECORD

Mary Peters, who will be 33 when the Olympic pentathlon championships are decided in Munich, set a new Commonwealth pentathlon mark and moved to #6 on the all-time list as she scored 4630 points (new scale) at the Crystal Palace in London, May 6/7. Peters' performances were 13.7w, 50'6", 5'9", 19'9" and 24.5. Her high jump and long jump were both personal bests while her 200 was her second best ever. Both the second and third place finishers, Ruth Martin-Jones and Ann Wilson, made the Olympic qualifying standard with scores of 4294 and 4271. The top seven all time pentathlon performances are:

The smaller countries were doing their thing too with Hiroko Yamashita of Japan bettering the national record in the long jump three times, finally up to 20'9" while countrywoman Mihiko Yama moved the high jump record to 5'10.

## LATE EUROPEAN NEWS - ZEHRT 51.9

Erfurt, GDR, May 21:-In one of their first outdoor appearances of the Olympic season, the powerful East German crew indicated to the world they will be ready for the Munich Games as they turned in some fantastic performances. Although Erfurt is known in track circles as the "Zurich" of eastern Europe, one can not discount these fine performances. Sprinter Renate Stecher won both dashes in 11.2 and 22.6, Monika Zehrt upset European champion Helga Seidler as she stopped the clocks in 51.9 for the 400 with Seidler at 52.5 and Kassing 53.7 - and that GDR 4x400 team will be tough! Annelie Ehrhardt zipped the hurdles in 13.2 edging Krumpholtz (13.3). But speed wasn't the only impressive thing about the GDR athletes. The field eventers came through with such stirring marks as 6'2" in the high jump by Rita Schmidt, 63'9 by the defending Olympic shot put champion Margaret Gummel as her teammates Friedel (62'0) and Adam (61'4") weren't too bad either. Ruth Fuchs got into the act with a toss of 201'8 in the javelin.

Other late European performances included a speedy 400m contest in Ergebnisse, West Germany, which saw Christel Frese win in 52.2 over Rita Wilden (52.3), Erika Weinstein (52.9) and Inge Bodding (53.7) - and that GFR 4x400 team won't be too bad either!

Elsewhere, Heide Schuller nipped Heidi Rosendahl 13.2 to 13.3 in the hurdles; Poland's Krystyana Nadolna set a national record of 189'5 in the discus; Sara Ligetkuti of Hungary won a special 1500 in 4:20.6 over Rita Ridley (GB) 4:20.7, Bernie Boxem (Holland) 4:20.8 and Holland's Anneke vd Stell, 4:21.2; Lia Manoliu, Rumania, upped her lifetime discus best to 203'7. Things are popping in Europe and everything will break loose at Munich in September.

## HELGA SEIDLER, EUROPEAN 400m CHAMPION By Volker Kluge



Runners who have specialized in the quarter-mile are usually expected to be slender, very tall and long-legged. Helga Seidler from the GDR, European 400m champion, however, while slender, is anything but tall with a height of only 5'5". Delicately built rather than robust in appearance she does not appear to be out for this strenuous event. But as her coach Hans Hirt told us, "Helga is a typical 400m runner. There's more to it than just height and weight. Although not tall, she has long legs. But there is something that counts more than a sportsman's physique. A runner needs strength of character to master this event. To discover this quality in her you'll have to know her for a prolonged period of time. As for me, I'm impressed with her indomitable will."

Asked whether it takes courage to tackle the 400m, Helga Seidler answers, "Yes, you must have the nerve to go the pace right from the beginning so as to produce a good time. It is not without reason that the 400m race is classed with the sprint events. It's just like any other short-distance race, that is you have to go at full speed from start to finish. As a beginner one must get accustomed to the idea that one's strength will ebb away near the 300m mark ten times in succession. But at the eleventh time it will be different, or perhaps at the twelfth time or even later. I must admit I

### ISRAELIS OFF TO GOOD START from Abraham Green

At an evening track meet held at the Wingate Sports Center on Friday, April 21, our women athletes showed in general, an improvement on their last performances.

Again it was our Esther Shachamorov, just turned 20 years, that clocked 24.0 for the 200m and 13.4 in the 100mH. (No wind). Both marks were just 0.1 outside our national records which Esther already holds.

Aviva Balas (25) bettered her national record for 600m in 1:31.6. The old mark which she set last year was 1:32.2.

Shot putter Mira Bulba (20) achieved 12.92/42'4", not too far from our national record of 13.04/42'9" which has stood since 1960.

Thirteen year old Torà Fink ran the 100m in 12.7 and the 200 in 26.2s. Hanna Shezifi (29) ran her first race of the year outdoors and turned in a 2:56.4 (distance unknown). Other results included: IJ, Zlozenko Ruth (14) 5.36/17'7"; JT, Marianna Mendelson (17) 38.80/127'3"; HJ, Orith Abramovits (15) 1.55/5'1".

Earlier this season, the TUS Leverkusen Club from West Germany visited Israel and took part in competition. The Highlight was Esther Shachamorov's victory over Annelie Wilden and Heide Rosendahl in the 100m flat. Shachamorov turned the distance in 11.9 into a lmp's headwind with Wilden in 12.0 and Rosendahl in 12.1. Shachamorov also won the 100m hurdles in 13.7s. Other results of the April 1 meeting at Kfar Blum included Aviva Balas in the 800 at 2:07.8 and Liesel Westermann winning the shot with a toss of 52'11".

took part in 400m races for five years without any success. I was on the point of losing courage. If I hadn't improved in the sixth year, I might have given up altogether. Suddenly, at the GDR championships in Erfurt, it was all plain sailing. I set a new national record with a time of 52.8s. Before that, my personal best had stood at 54.3s, and I had said to myself: Try it for the last time in 1970." She tried and...she succeeded.

"Isn't the 400m too severe a test for women?" Here is what Helga Seidler replied: "I don't feel this distance is more exhausting than any other race. But it seems to me that the difficulties involved are of a very special nature. Most runners - including myself some years ago - are afraid to tackle this event. Whenever they are invited to take part in such a race their heart begins to sink. And then there are many prejudices inherited from the past. Many held that this was a distance reserved for runners who had attained a certain age and gathered a good deal of experience. But this is not true. Marilyn Neufville, Chi Cheng and many other runners, myself included, should prove the contrary. Personally, I believe that women's sport has only just begun to unfold its potentialities."

After the 1968 Olympics, the 400m French gold medallist Colette Besson said: "To my mind, the 400m is made up of 300 meters plus 100 meters." Helga Seidler stood ready to explain this a bit further: "Anybody who has some training can manage 300 meters. She won't have too much difficulty to get there. But in the eyes of 400m runners, this is where the race really begins, where the chaff is sifted from the wheat. This is where you have to show whether you are a fighter. You want to run faster and faster, but in fact you're beginning to go slower and slower. Your legs are as if of lead. It's not the others you have to defeat, but your own weakness. Needless to say, it takes some flair to master this event successfully. If you go too fast at the beginning, you'll be at the end of your rope before you reach the tape."

1971, the year of the European Championships, had not begun too favorably for the 22 year old pattern weaver from Karl Marx Stadt. An injury kept her from training and it was anyone's guess whether she would be able to enter the continental championships. But this was also the time she married, the man of her choice being even more sport-minded than herself. Although he is playing in what is only a small village soccer team, he has the moral qualities of a great sportsman. As Helga Seidler remarked: "In that spring I noticed how important it was to have somebody to talk to, somebody sympathetic to my problems. As to myself, I'd never expected to win the title after all that. But my husband left not stone unturned to set me on my feet again. So I clenched my teeth and gradually gathered strength."

What are the characteristic features of a 400m runner? Helga Seidler was unable to answer that question. Her coach felt it was essential not to flinch from difficulties, or in a word to be a fighter. And to this Helga added: "I'm ambitious, and not only in sports..."
