Mara and his fellow holdout, Lou Spadia, general manager of San Francisco.

Another target of the peace-minded NFL owners in these sessions was commissioner Pete Rozelle, who at one point was angrily accused by Vince Lombardi of Green Bay as being "negligent in your duty to the league in the Gogolak case."

It was the Giants' raid on the Buffalo AFL team's roster and their signing of ace field-goal kicker Pete Gogolak that triggered the AFL's threats of massive retaliation, including offers to the NFL's biggest stars. It was in their efforts to avert a go-broke war that the NFL owners arranged a hasty peace after failing to dissuade Mara from signing Gogolak and Rozelle from approving the contract.

The Giants and San Francisco were able to demand a high price for their consent to the merger because (1) their two votes were needed to meet the requirement of unanimous approval and (2)

NFL clubs being asked to share a home territory with AFL teams. Oakland of the AFL operates in the San Francisco area, and the New York Jets are home - town competition for the Giants.

The vote for a merger with the AFL was 13 to 2 among NFL owners for several days before they could persuade Mara and Spadia to capitulate. The eagerness of the majority of the NFL club owners to make peace at almost any price is seen in the breakdown of the 18 million dollar tribute from the AFL. After the Giants and 49ers get shares of 8 million dollars and approximately 6 million dollars, the other 13 clubs are taking individual shares of only \$307,-

Rozelle said at the time of the settlement that the Giants and San Francisco would be paid a higher proportion of the \$18 million dollars than the other clubs because of "territori-al encroachment." but this was far from indicating that those two teams would get 77% of the loot.
