## PASADENA HIGH WINS SACRAMENTO MEET.

FIVE RECORDS ARE SMASHED; SOUTH CLEANS UP BRILLIANTLY.

SACRAMENTO, April 27.—By breaking five California interscholastic federation track and field records during the afternoon California high school athletes today demonstrated the physical fitness of the younger generation despite the inroads of war conditions. The records were broken during the annual meet of the federation held at the State fair grounds in this city. Pasadena High School romped away with the meet easily, scoring 25 points to 16 for San Bernardino and 12 for Manual Arts High School of Los Angeles. Bakersfield scored 11 points. Fresno 10, Ukiah and Berkeley 9 each, the remainder being scattered among nearly a score of institutions. Sacramento High School, third last year, scored a lone point yesterday and Coalinga, which won the meet in 1917, had to be content with 2 points. Schiller of Los Angeles today holds the federation record in the 440-yard run at 49 2-5s., following his easy victory over a large field yesterday. He won by six yards from his nearest opponent, Hil-

He won by six yards from his nearests opponent, Hildredth of Stockton, and his victory came so easily that the crowd was astonished when the remarkable time was announced. Next to Soloman's 48 1-5, this is the fastest time ever accredited to a California high school boy. Brick Muller, the sensational San Diego High School jumper, showed that he has a great future by clearing the bar at 5ft., 11 3-4in., in the high jump from a poor take off. This eclipsed the former record for the federation by more than two inches, but is still two inches behind the State interscholastic record.

The thrilling race of the day resulted in a new federation record for the 120-yard high hurdles, when Rice of Compton showed Raney of Santa Ana the way to the tape after an exciting contest. The time in this event was 16s. flat. Dennon of Bakersfield, established a new record for the javelin by heaving the projectile 164ft., 3in. Paddock of Pasadena showed a clean pair of heels to his rivals in both the century and furlong events. The Pasadena boy finished both his races strong, and negotiated the furlong event in the fast time of 22.2, which was fast going against a slight wind and on a clay track. Cook of San Bernardino and

Cook of San Bernardino and Henrixson of Chino took second in the 100 and 220, respectively.

The other Pasadena first place came in the half mile, which Saunders won from Young of Bakersfield by a scant margin. Young came from behind and nearly nipped Saunders in the final dash for the tape.

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Pearce of Berkeley made a strong finish and took third place in the final fifty yards. Pearce later came back and won the mile event in the creditable time of 4m, 44m, 2-5s.

Athletes from the southern part

Athletes from the southern part of the State again took the greater portion of the points, making 83 to 28 for the central section, 25 for the bay section and 9 for the northern section. Fresno made the best showing from the central portion of the State, Ukiah and Berkeley tied from the bay regions, while Robinson's five points in the shot put gave Sutter City the lead among Northern California schools.
