His single-handed performance equalled that of the second-place schools, Pasadena and Santa Ana, which tied with 15 digits apiece. Chaffey Union took fourth place with 11 points, trailed by Huntington Park, Polytechnic, San Diego and Jefferson.

Glendale led with a Southern California and a world's record tumbling before the Dynamiters, but the most astonishing time of the day was hung up in the high hurdler when "Jeddy" Welsh, Pasadena high hurdler, established a new world's mark of 15s, flat.

The records made by the Dynssmiters were in the 220 and relay, Wykoff gave the fans a real thrill when he uncorked a wild burst of speed to best Slocum, his own teamsate, and Harvey Bear of Santa Ans, in the record time of 21 2-5s. The new mark replaces that made in the trials when Slocum ran in 21 3-5s.

RELAY RECORD GOES

Glendale's relay team made up of Mainland, a sophomore, and Zaun, Wykoff and Slocum, all juniors, set a new world record of 1m. 29 3-5s. to replace that set by Hollywood last year in the State meet. Hollywood's record was 1m. 29.9s.
Chronologically the boys did their stuff as follows:

Slocum and Wykoff certainly have the competitive spirit that makes champions. Facing a group of sprinters who have made records equaling their own, they finished one, two in time equaling the record of 9.8s. which they hold jointly. It was a hot race, wykoff was out of his holes in a jiffy and Slocum wasted little, both of them getting out in front before the fifty-yard mark was passed. Rucker of Santa Monica ran a sweet race to finish third with Frank Lombardi of L. A. High fourth. It was a wow of a finish and the first four across ran under 10s.

Bert Richey's habit of hitting hurdles cost him the race and a record which would have been under 15s.
