HANG UP TOGS.

Henry King of Washington proved the individual star with a double sprint victory. Henry dashed through the 50 in 6.1 and followed up with an 11.1 century.

Washington wound up in second place, 12 points back with 25. Mt. View had 11; Live Oak 10; Los Gatos 7; Fremont 4; Santa Clara 3, and Campbell 2.

The meet ended prep competition for the year and coaches and athletes alike put away their equipment until the call to arms for football in the fall.

Johnny Lee Wins Three Firsts As Los Gatos Loses

Two Gilroy high school track stars joined forces to score 26½ of their team's 37 point total that edged Los Gatos out of a ninth consecutive Santa Clara Valley Athletic league title yesterday, afternoon on the Los Gatos cinder-path.

Coming up to the varsity relay, Los Gatos held a slim 2½ point margin over the Gilroy cinder-men, 34½ to 32, making the outcome of the baton passing the decisive event for the championship.

The "Cats" took an early lead, picked up more on the exchange and appeared to be the team to beat until the last 220-yard stretch when Johnny Lee breezed out in front to cross the finish a yard ahead with Los Gatos in second place.

By virtue of their win, Gilroy's total was raised to 37 while for second place Los Gatos would be given 3 more digits for a total of 37½.

"CATS" DISQUALIFIED.

However, at this time, "Tiny" Hartranft, San Jose State coach and judge on one turn, disqualified the "Cats" for taking a yard lead over the restraining line on the first exchange of the baton.

The disqualification resulted in the loss of three points and much more, the loss of their first varsity meet since 1931.

Lee, N.C.S. hurdling champion, paced the Gilroy victory with three first places, two new records and a lap on the winning relay team.

Showing a smooth stride and winning as he pleased, Lee spurted in the last fifty yards of the 220-yard low barrier event to cross the tape about seven yards ahead of the field in 26.6 seconds.

Johnny then went out to up the Valley league broad-jump mark a half-inch to 21 feet 2½ inches. The old record was held by Martinez of Mt. View and set in 1937.

PHILLIPS TIES.

Dave Phillips, Los Gatos high jump winner, came in for a share of the glory in the hop-step-jump as he and Lee tied at 42 feet 1 inch to crack the old standard rung by Phillips last year at 40 feet 9 inches.

Herman Heilman, well-built Gilroy blond, was his team's other hero, capturing first in both the 400 and 800-yard runs.

Herman coasted to victory in the 440, just trotting across the finish line as he conserved his energies for the half-mile and his part in the winning relay.

Boxed in the early part of the longer race, Herman made his bid on the last turn coming into the home stretch and then proceeded to put 20 yards between the field and himself as he broke the tape in 2:07.5 minutes.

Phillips failed in a try for six feet and an unofficial record in the high jump following his victory in that event with a leap of 5 feet 8 inches.

DAVIS WINS.

Harold Davis, sensation of last year's valley championships, won handily in the 100 and 220-yard dashes, taking the former event in 9.9 seconds and the latter in 22.6.

Davis is scheduled to defend his junior P. A. sprint titles this afternoon at Spartan field and it was obvious that he was not exerting himself in winning yesterday.

Norman Ahm helped Washington to a third place in the meet as he collected a first and a new record in the shotput with a heave of 47 feet 7 inches. The old mark was established by Marshall of Mountain View in 1931 at 46 feet 10¼ inches, and was next to the oldest record on the book.

Washington collected a 30½-point total, Santa Clara 25, Campbell and Live Oak 10, Fremont 5 and Mountain View 2.

Bino Chiado and Elwin Moore were to the Gilroy 130-pounders what Heilman and Lee proved to the unlimiteds as each galloped to double victories. Bino captured the 100 and 220 in comparatively slow times of 10.4 and 23.1, but good enough to top the field in easy fashion.

Moore showed plenty of kick in the stretch to take both the 440 and 880. His times for the events were 55.1 and 2:10 minutes.

GILROY LANDSLIDE.

It was a Gilroy landslide in the team scoring as Coach Paul Thompson's lads rang up 515.6 digits to Mountain View's second place total of 35½. Washington ended in third with 14, Campbell and Santa Clara tied with 12½, Los Gatos chalked up 12, Fremont had 4, while Live Oak managed a fourth place for one.

Weldon Pine paced a snappy Washington contingent to a 28.28 tie with Mt. View for first in the 120's as he raced to wins in the 50 and 100. Pine covered the latter distance in 10.7 seconds after traversing the shorter span in 5.9.

Gilroy came in for a third with 21 points; Fremont was fourth.

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
