# LOWELL BREEZES TO ANOTHER TITLE, BUT MATSON DAY'S STAR

## Cards Take Prep Track

Lowell's seventh track and field victory in eight years, and its third successive title isn't news. Rather, it was the sterling performances of easy-gliding Ollie Matson, the George Washington comet, that created the interest in yesterday's 22nd annual Academic Athletic Association meet in Kezar Stadium.

Before a sparse audience, the mercurial one outfooted his field to snatch the 100-yard dash in :9.8, come back to establish a 220-yard standard of :21.4, and realize his best pole vault effort of the year, scanning the crossbar at 11 feet 3 inches. By far, it was the greatest individual performance since Claude McWilliams' halcyon days in the early '30's.

Of secondary importance, was Lowell's domination over eight other schools, superiority that has become a monotony for most, but pleasing for Coach Elmer Harris, dean of S. F. high school track and field.

The Cardinals weren't extended to rack up 61 points. Closest came the Matson-paced Washingtons with 41½, while Commerce placed third, nailing 36½, with Lincoln fourth, manufacturing 21½.

### FURLONG BEST FEAT

Matson's greatest feat, however, wasn't his fastest century ever, but the 220 that erased the :21.7 reeled off by Galileo's Harry Williams in 1926. Ollie had little competition in this event. Lowell's Jim Plessas and Commerce's Tim McGregor were scratched from the event, giving Matson an easy time to defeat Lowell's Marvin Hoffman and Commerce's George Kelly. The Washington star crossed the tape fully eight strides ahead of Hoffman. In the century, Lowell's Frank Talbot gave Matson a tussle for 60 yards. Here, the Negro lad turned on the steam to finish two yards the better, registering the fastest heat since Wilbur Bartlett (Commerce) managed to consistently run near 10 flat in the late '30's.

In the pole vault, Matson received a stiff bid from Lowell's Johnson. Both cleared 11 feet. Then on his last attempt, Matson scaled the new level to grab an additional five points for first place.


The All-City griddy wasn't the lone record breaker. Teammate Dick Hare, the elongated broad jumper, leaped 23 feet 5 inches, surpassing the 16-year-old mark of 23 feet 1½ inches made by McWilliams in 1931. Then Loren Baker smashed his 180-yard low hurdle time of :21.1 made earlier in the week. The Lowell ace covered the distance in :20.5.

### WON EASED UP

Baker whipped Hare by two yards, but loafed in the 120 highs, accounting for his mediocre time of :15.4, two tenths removed from Merrill Peacock's mark. As it was, Baker won eased up, 10 yards better than Commerce's Charles Johnson.

Perhaps the easiest victory of all came in the opening mile event. Ellwyn Stribling set his own pace from the start, gradually pulled away, and on the anchor lap had a 50 yard gap on his adversaries. At the finish, the Commerce runner put on a strong kick to win in the excellent time of 4:39.3. Lowell's Bob Hoffman saved second place, 75 yards in arrears.

Stribling couldn't repeat in the half. His chum Lambert Rax was the pre-meet favorite. Instead, it was the St. Ignatius tradition that came through. Jim Kearney won by six yards to give the Hilltoppers their fourth consecutive victory in this event. The previous two 880's were annexed by Phil Hughes. Kearney's time was 2:04.6.



set the 220 standard of 21.7 seconds in 1926.

His teammate, Dick Hare, chalked up a new broad jump mark of 23 feet 5 inches, easily eclipsing the seventeen year old record of 23 feet 1 $\frac{5}{8}$  inches set by the terrific Claude McWilliams of Commerce. Matson and Hare will certainly be strong factors in the coming State meet, for which all of yesterday's winners qualified.

The meet-winning Hayes Street Indians accounted for a pair of shattered records themselves. Their team of Frank Talbot, Loren Baker, Roger Brooks, Beebo Hughes, Jim Plessas and Marv Hoffman sprinted the three quarters mile relay in 2:18.2, six-tenths of a second better than Poly did in 1934.

## BAKER HELPS.

Lowell's other record was of a less spectacular nature, coming as it did in a revised event, the 180 yard low hurdles. But the fellow who did it with a :20.5 effort was Loren Baker, who, in addition to turning the tide in the relay, also annexed the high sticks in :15.4 to place second only to Matson in the point getting department.

Records were broken in the lightweight 120 yard low hurdle races, also revised this year, by Bud Peterson in the 120 pound class at :14.8 and by Arnold Colman in the 130 pound class at :14.1. Both represented Lowell.

Lowell also won the 130's division by registering 38 points to 35 for Balboa and 28 for Washington. Mission took 120's division laurels with 26 $\frac{1}{2}$  points to 23 $\frac{1}{2}$  for Lowell and 17 $\frac{1}{2}$  for Washington.

There was never any doubt as to Lowell's supremacy in the unlimited class. In fact, the meet went pretty much according to expectations, with the biggest upset being Jim Kearney's victory over Commerce's entry of Lambert Rax and Ellwyn Stribling in the half mile.

Kearney extended St. Ignatius' reign in this event to four straight years.

Commerce took third behind Lowell and Washington with 36 $\frac{1}{2}$  points. Lincoln had 21 $\frac{1}{2}$ , Balboa 13, St. Ignatius 7 $\frac{1}{2}$ , Mission 5, Galileo 4 and Poly 2.

Three of the six entrants withdrew in the unlimited 220.

## LOWELL'S WINNERS

Other than the hurdles and relay, Lowell's lone man in first place throughout the day in the cinder events, turned out to be Jim Plessas. Displaying a fast finish to overtake pace maker McGregor, Plessas steamed across the tape in :51.8. His winning margin, six yards.

In the field events, Lowell had a winner in discus tosser Dick Cook, and shot putter, Morrie Feldman. Cook heaved the plater 122'6". Feldman the iron ball, 49'2".

Climaxing the day's events, Lowell's relay team overshadowed Poly's three quarter mile record of 2:18.8 made in 1934, clipping off six tenths. The relay squad consisted of Frank Talbott, Roger Brooks, Beebo Hughes, Jim Plessas, Marv Hoffman, and Loren Baker.

Lowell's 130 pounders copped the 130 pound division, edging out Balboa, 38 to 35. Cardinal Arnold Colman equaled his 120 yard low hurdle mark of :14.1 to highlight the division events.

Another Lowellite hurdler, 120 pound Bud Petersen equaled his own :14.8 in the lows. However, Mission grabbed three more points than Lowell to spoil the complete Lowell afternoon.
