Norton May Be World's Fastest

FRESNO, May 11. - How much speed is there in Ray Norton's powerful underpin-

That was topic No. 1 today during the postmortems attending the 32nd annual Fresno Relays which, for the first time in memory of the historians failed to produce a single major record.

For want of a world or American recordbreaking performance, the filberts declared for Norton, voted the meet's outstanding athlete for his :09.4 win in the 100.

A whizzing 110 yard anchor lap that brought San Jose State from behind for victory in the 440 relay and an unofficial:19.8 seconds 220 in the 880 relay where the Spartans finished third behind Occidental and Fresno State.

All of this and a 100 elimination heat which the 6-2, 180 pound Oaklander breezed in :09.5 came within a matter of two and a half hours.

That's a lot of sprinting in that time for one man, and observers got to wondering what's going to happen when Ray pools his power and conconcentrates on one event.

He'll get the opportunity Friday night at the Los Angeles Coliseum. He takes on Dave Sime and Bobby Morrow in the first of a series which will establish rightful ownership of the "world's fastest human" claim.

This was the fifth time in 10 races this season the undefeated Norton has clipped :09.4 or better. Those who saw the action here last night are strongly inclined to take a ticket on him right now.

Norton's 100 was one of only four open class performances at Fresno which surpassed anything done at four wind. previous major relay carnivals

The others were on the field. Charlie Dumas' 6-9 in the high jump, Parry O'Brien's 61-31/2 in the shot and the 151/4 accomplished by George Roubanis and Ron Morris in the pole vault were the others.

Plainly, this was not the West Coast Relays' "year," although there were some great efforts lost in the welter of an overloaded entry field.

Hardly anybody noticed that two men, O'Brien and Bill Neider, threw the shot beyond 60 feet. Parry did 61-3½, Neider 60-1¼. Not many people have seen that happen.

Nevertheless, we can't recall another time when two hands sufficed to record the count of records made at Fresno.

Only three open division relays records, among a minimum of 14 assorted standards, were broken or tied - by O'Brien in the shot, Rink Babka (186-0) in the discus and Occidental's two mile relay team (7:29.9). Incidentally, last year's record total was 37.

On the national level the boys had to settle for a United States junior college javelin tossing record of 214-9 by Bob Scordone of L. A. Valley, a book equaling 1:25.6 half mile relay by San Diego JC, and a 7:37 two mile by Oxy's freshmen which bettered Nebraska's 7:38.8.

Of course, one of the best of all was that spectacular 25-91/4 broad jump by Willie Jackson. a freshman from Los Angeles Harbor. Considering that the world's record is only 26-81/4 that's a tremendous effort. No full grown collegian or club competitor has done as well in the world this season, a though Ernie Shelby of Kansa is listed as having done 26-31/2 with the aid of a strong tail

Neither Don Bowden nor Coach Brutus Hamilton could offer any explanation why the Cal mile star should have had the troubles he did. Don ran that, for him, was a mediocre 11.1 anchor lap for the Bear stance medley relay team.

"It was just a tough night for anybody going farther than a half mile," said Hamilton. "I don't know if it was because the track was somewhat soft and the weather was on the cool side, but all the milers were worn to a frazzle."

He pointed out that two other milers of renown, Oklahoma's Gail Hodgson and Stanford's Norm Lloyd, struggled

mightily to run 4:12 and 4:14, respectively.

Bowden said he worked much harder for his 4:11.7 and was far more weary afterward than he was following the 4:03.5 Big Meet mile.

By the way, Don will not accept the mile challenge at the L. A. Coliseum Relays where Merv Lincoln and Herb Elliott, the Australians, are scheduled to start their American tour.

Present plans are for Bowden to run with the two mile relay team only at L. A. In fact, Hamilton doubts Bowden will run another mile until the NCAA at Berkeley early in June.

Cal's hero of the meet was Sophomore Jack Yerman from Woodland, who ran two powerful 400s-a cracking:47 flat leadoff 440 in the distance medley and a sizzling :46.4 anchor in the mile relay. These,

in the main, enabled the Bears to win two team race events for the first time since the war years and share honors in that field with Oxy, much to the dismay of USC's

Troy, which took away the team trophy for the 13th straight year with 5234 points to Oxy's 491/2, amazingly failed to win one of the big five relays. That provided the "havenots" with some salve.
