Poly Spikers Lead All-City Qualifying

Four lightweight track records were broken and recently reinstated Ray Hearne of Washington got off the best broad jump in the city this year at Kezar yesterday as Poly led eight teams into today's Academic Athletic Association All-

City semifinals.

Eddie Moore of Poly ran the 330 in :38.1 and Washington's Ed Shipp sprinted the 150 in :15.5 for 120 exponent division marks, while Jim Tucker of Poly clocked a 3:24.1 1320 and Bob Uoods of Washington a:15.1 150 to account for the 130s' records. Bob Stokes of Washington tied the old 130s mark with a:13.9 in the 120 low hurdles.

Hearne, ineligible for most of the season, leaped 22-93/4 to upset Jesse Sirles of Poly, who did a 22-434. Lincoln's Don Briemle topped his own

Only two coaches won't predict the Parrot win, and one of them, Poly's Steve Ebert. is obviously struggling to cover his glee when he says: "I'm not predicting anything.
All I'll say is that I'm proud of the way my boys have come through."

The other dissenter is Jim Wyatt, whose Lincoln Mustangs stand the best chance of dethroning the defending champs. Wyatt, who lived and died with every qualifying race, isn't giving away any-thing, and with a small but tough crew led by sprinter Ed Tank (:09.8 and :21.9) the Links just could take away everything.

But on paper, it's Poly all the way. Ebert takes 22 qualifiers into the finals, nine more than runners-up Lincoln and Washington, and his power in the sprints and hurdles is frightening. Three of the six finalists in the 100, 220 and 180 low hurdles are from Poly.

Nor is depth the only ad-Competitors like vantage. Alex and Ellis Jenkins in the sprints, Andy Loobey and Bob Kane in the mile, that whole flock of hurdlers, and Jesse Sirles in the pole vaul and broad jump aren't in there just for place points.

Sirles will be in tough all the way. He already trails in the broad jump, where Washington's Ray Hearne leaped 22.934 in the trials, a mark that carried over into the finals. Sirles is now in second with 22-43/4.

In the pole vault, Jess who splintered a brand new fibreglass pole in the trials and has noly silght hopes of re-placing it for today's meet, is up against Tom Colton, with a best of 13-31/2.

Colton's mark, incidentally, is only one-fourth of an inch under the city record, a mark that ha stood since 1933 and is, with the 100 yard dash standard of :09.7, the oldest in the book. Both could go today, with Colton threatening the former and Tank, the windmill-like speedster who flies down the track with arms waving, mighty close to the latter.

Our pick? Who else but Poly, by 10 points over challenger Lincoln.
