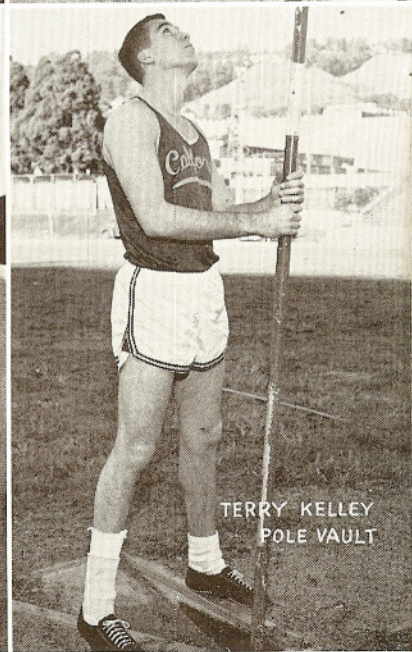

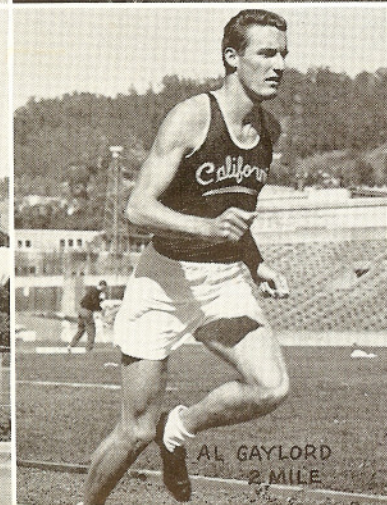

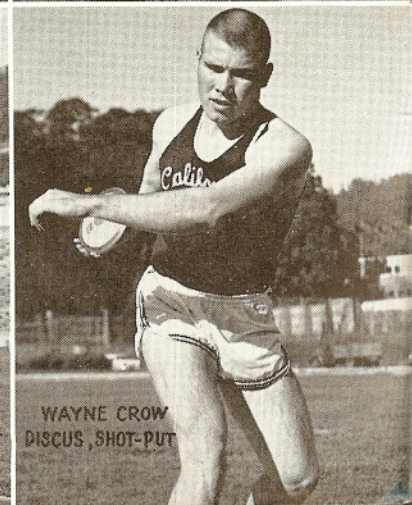

# Bear Youngsters Vs. Bruin Veterans

California will be countering with a host of fine sophomores and juniors against UCLA's tried and tested senior performers in an attempt today to end a four-meet Bruin win streak. The Bears have not beaten UCLA since 1954, and although Cal holds an 18-9 lead in this series that started in 1928, 12 of the Bear wins came in the first 12 years.

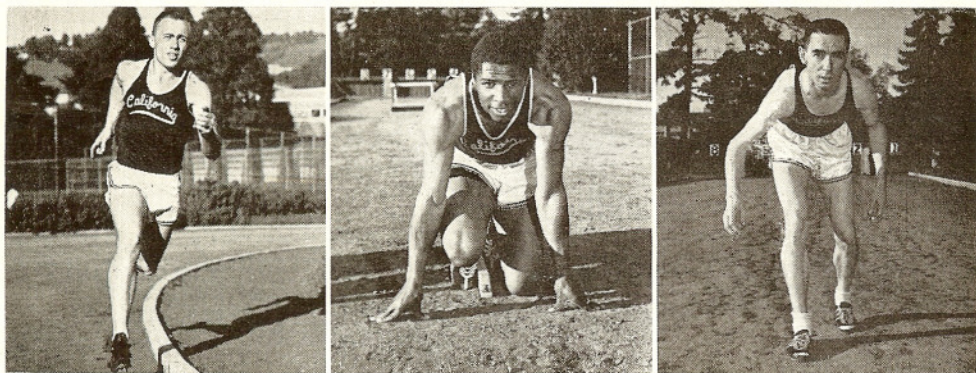
Coach Ducky Drake has such proven senior performers as: Kenny Thompson in the hurdles; Duane Milleman in the shot and discus; George Roubanis in the pole vault; Doug Julian, 440 and relay; John Seaman, 880, and Walt Torrence in the high jump.

Coach Brutus Hamilton and California fans are banking on such first-year stars as: Cebon Russ, hurdles and broad jump; Al Gaylord, two mile; Eurael Bell in the high jump; John Blaylock in the broad jump and Karl Uebel in the two mile.

The real power of the Bears however lies in a quintet of juniors. Jack Yerman in the 440 and relay; Jerry Siebert in the half and mile; Willie White in the sprints and low hurdles; Wayne Crow in the shot, discus and javelin and Terry Kelley in the pole vault, constitute the Bears' real power.

Outside of the javelin and broad jump the Bruins must be favored to win every field event, and unless California can break in for points in the pole vault, discus and high jump UCLA will make it five meets in a row.
