

Confusion Reign in SPAL Track

Lilly, Hull, Marshall, White Share Honors

Outstanding performances by John Lilly and Bruce Hull of San Carlos, Ravenswood's Jim Marshall and Carlmont's Tom White were obscured under a cloudburst of confusion as Cubberley won the SPAL Track and Field Championship meet Friday night.

The final race at Terremere Feild ended about 10 o'clock but it was an hour later before the results and the final score were announced.

It may be days before the utter chaos that surrounded the 880-yard relay, which decided the championship, is cleared up.

Protests of official decisions, already several times revised, are pending but it is doubtful any further change in the relay results would remove the crown from Cubberley.

The Cougars, at the moment, have 59 points to 55 for defending champ Carlmont. Ravenswood is third with 46.

Lilly and Hull, both juniors at San Carlos, stood the crowd on its ear with great finishes in the 880 and mile, respectively.

Lilly fought off defending champ Dennis Milligan of Palo Alto in a tingling stretch battle in Northern California's fastest prep half mile race of the year. Both cracked the meet record, though Lilly's 1:55.6 was three-tenths off his NorCal seasonal best recorded last week.

Milligan was caught in 1:55.7, six-tenths of a second under the SPAL record.

Carlmont senior Ken Nichols finished a surprising third in 1:57.5, his first time under two minutes.

That duel was expected and Lilly's victory won him, by vote of the coaches, the meet's outstanding performer award.

Hull's performance in the mile was a surprise. With 220 yards to go he exploded around

favorite Martin McCann of Carlmont and Cubberley's Ron Bruno like he was shot from a cannon and all but turned the track to ashes as he roared home in 4:24.2 — best of the year in the SPAL.

A baseball reject, Hull has run less than a dozen mile races in his life and only a month ago was thrilled over improving to 4:36.

Marshall literally destroyed defending champ Bert Warden of Woodside in their sprint rematch. Determined to avenge Warden's double upset win over him in last Friday's District Meet, Marshall resembled a rocket moving into its second stage as he tied the meet record of 9.9 in the 100 and won the 220 in 22.3.

White of Carlmont, overcoming difficulty with his steps at lower heights, cracked the meet pole vault record by equaling his own Bay Area seasonal best of 14-1½.

One other meet record fell. Carlmont's Mike McCann, running gamely on an injured foot, toured two miles in 9:41.2 to snap by more than eight seconds the mark set by his twin, Martin, last year.

The confusing events at the end of the meet, boiled away from much of the byplay that accompanied them, followed this sequence:

1. With all results but the relay recorded, it was announced that Carlmont led Cubberley 55 to 52. Both had relay entries.

2. Carlmont and Cubberley jockeyed for third place during much of the relay, but the race ended amid a horde of spectators and athletes with four runners fighting for the final scoring places.

3. Carlmont coach Loren Lansberry raced to the press table and breathlessly announced that the Scots had been picked for fifth and thus won the meet by one point.

4. After a delay, head finish judge Ed Austermuehle presented the official result form to the announcer. Carlmont was unplaced and, he said, winner Ravenswood had been disqualified for handing off the baton out of the restricted passing zone. This moved Cubberley from fourth to third, throwing the final score into a 55-55 tie.

5. The disqualification was protested. Coaches and officials met in the middle of the field, then adjourned to a more remote area to consider the appeal.

6. In the meantime, it was discovered that an incorrect method had been used for breaking a tie for second place in the pole vault. The results were revised and Cubberley's Dave Laur moved from third to second, gaining two points for the Cougars.

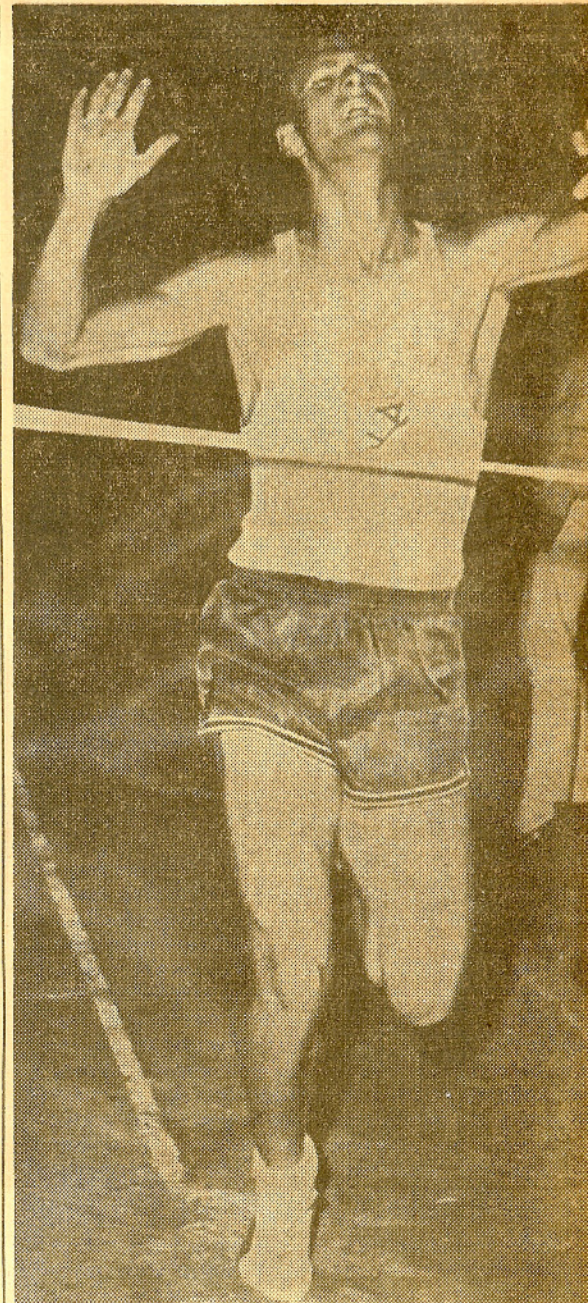
7. Officials held up Ravenswood's disqualification in the relay, but overruled the order of finish and boosted Carlmont from seventh (no points) to fourth (two points).

Were it not for the pole vault revision, that would have given Carlmont its fourth straight SPAL meet championship.

8. Palo Alto placed fourth in the original results, protested its displacement in favor of Carlmont.

9. Head judges and the meet referee, Bob Cavender, huddled in an office in the Sequoia High gym and at about 11:30, an hour and a half after the relay ended, announced that Carlmont finished fifth, not fourth, but passed out of the zone at the same time as Ravenswood and also was disqualified. Palo Alto regained fourth place.

10. Still later, about 1 a.m., Ravenswood coach Buddy Miller telephoned the Tribune to quote a section in the track rulebook which indicated the passing zones were improperly marked.

Miller said he would appeal the disqualification today. If successful, Carlmont may also be reinstated. This would change the score again, but Cubberley would still win, 55-54. Ravenswood would tie Carlmont for second place.

HIGHLIGHTS: When the relay started, Carlmont needed only to score one point (fifth place) in the event to win the meet, unless Cubberley recorded an astounding upset of favorites Ravenswood and Woodside.

With the error in the pole vault results, discovered well after completion of the relay, it became imperative that Carlmont finish ahead of Cubberley in the final event in order to defend its title. No future revisions in the relay results will bring this about.

When, if ever, the dust finally settles, it may be discovered that junior Steve McLanegan was the hero for Cubberley. He ran some 15 seconds faster than he ever had before to beat out Carlmont's Bill Bradfield for second place in the two mile and gain what proved to be the deciding points.

Carlmont will try to recoup by winning the dual meet championship on Tuesday when the final six events of its dual meet with Cubberley are held at Carlmont.

A rainstorm cut off the meet on April 20 with Carlmont leading 44-28 after eight events. Both teams have completed the rest of their dual meet seasons with unbeaten records.

There were omens of a bad night Friday right from the start. The last flight of high hurdles never were put on the track and it took a meeting to decide whether to rerun the event (they didn't).

Spectators and athletes swarmed over the infield and harassed officials, especially at the pole vault and the finish line. Police attempts at controlling the crowd were futile, as no provisions had been made to identify people who belonged on the field.

Unfortunately, the ninth SPAL meet will be remembered more for the few things that went terribly wrong than for the many fine performances by the athletes.

(Continued from Page 15) due to an injury, might have fared better also.

As expected, Burlingame depth won out in both the B's and C's with superior depth.

The Panthers took only two firsts in the B's and four in the C's, but managed the twin killings on sheer strength of numbers.

One record was broken yesterday (although another was broken in the field finals on Tuesday) in the C's.

Mills' Bob Garcia toured the 1300 in 3:22.8 to erase the previous mark of 3:27.9 set by Garcia himself in 1964.

Capuchino's Jim Kaufman, who scored 18 of the Mustangs 48 points, came within .1 of a second of breaking Burlingame's Mike Jacobs' mark of 1:24.0 set in 1963.

Next Saturday at Lehigh High School in San Jose, the top three performers in each event duel in the NCS Division II meet.

A week from Saturday, the NCS Finals will be held in Santa Rosa to determine the Northern California team which represents this section of the state in the State Meet in Bakersfield.

The Scots' downfall in their bid for a fourth successive SPAL title was the 800 relay, the last event on the varsity program and one which Carlmont entered holding a 55-52 lead over Cubberley.

When Ravenswood sprinted to victory in the event and Cubberley finished one place ahead of the Scots in third, Carlmont seemingly had clinched the competition by a single point.

That's when the arguments, which went on for nearly an hour, began.

Ravenswood was summarily disqualified for an illegal baton pass, which created more furor among the participants, and then Carlmont lost its fourth place status on an appeal from Palo Alto.

Thus it all ended with Cubberley scoring 59 points to 55 for the Scots, although Ravenswood may still protest the judgment that disqualified it from the relay.

For all practical purposes, Cubberley is the champ, and will likely remain so.

Ravenswood finished in third place with 46 points and San Carlos, whose John Lilly was voted Outstanding Athlete of the meet, took fourth with 36.

Lilly's victory in the 800 was one of the highlight races of the evening.

He held off the gutsy challenge of Palo Alto's Dennis Milligan en route to a 1:55.6 clocking that set a new meet standard, even though the time was three-tenths of a second over his previous best set one week earlier in the Sequoia District meet.

Other meet records were set by Carlmont's Mike McCann and Tom White, in the varsity competition.

McCann, jogging through the two mile with a fluid, easy pace, broke the old meet mark set by his twin brother Martin, last year. He was clocked in 9:41.2 to knock more than eight full seconds off his sibling's record.

White scaled 14-1 1/2 in the pole vault for a new lifetime best mark and one which broke the old meet record by a half-inch.

While Carlmont performed heroically on the track, Cubberley made up for it and more in the field events. The Cougars scored 35 of their total points in field event competition.

Other outstanding varsity efforts were turned in by Ravenswood's Jim Marshall, who won both sprints and anchored the Trojans' abortive relay performance, and by Bruce Hull of San Carlos, who out-kicked Martin McCann and Ron Bruno of Cubberley for a 4:24.2 clocking in the mile.

In the lightweight divisions, chaos also prevailed.

The Class B meet had yet to be decided when last night's activities ended. The pole vault, which would have begun around 11:30 p.m., was intelligently postponed till this morning. San Carlos held a slim one-point lead in the B competition going into the vault.

Menlo-Atherton, coached by the former Hillisdale mentor, Plato Yanick, contributed the record setters in the B division.

Dan McGraw, the diminutive halfback of football fame, dashed to a superlative 14.8 clocking for the 150 after winning the 75 in 7.8 and Randy Demeter exceeded everyone's expectations with a 6-0 mark in the high jump that equalled the meet record and surpassed the winning varsity height.

Sequoia won the Class C meet handily, scoring 70 points to 42 for runner-up Woodside, whose Neil Platts set a meet record of 37.7 for the 330.

In addition to the verbal flap created by judges' rulings, the meet was plagued from start to finish by a crowded infield that resembled Coney Island in July and interfered with everyone's observation of the competition, including the judges and timers.
