



#### GEORGE YOUNG -- steeplechase

Sumehow, I wasn't quite up for this race, but I'll settle for the win. After all, that is the big object here today. I suppose the reason I didn't feel at my peak was that tough race last week in Sacramento and the traveling back and forth from Flagstaff, Ariz., where I trained this week. I'll be going to Athens, Greece, next Tuesday to compete in the All-Military meet. I was sick with a virus infection a month ago but it has completely cleared.

#### FRANK COVELLI -- Javelin

We all threw terribly today but well enough to qualify. I wasn't surprised at the qualifiers—the same as at the AAU meet. The reason we were so off form is that there were so many competitors and we had to wait so long between throws. But it will be the same at the Olympic Games. Lusis of Russia is the odds—on favorite but so was Pedersen of Norway in 1964. I figure Lusis should win it at about 280 feet. The other two medals should be wide open.

I had trouble warming up between flights. There was just too much time. I had one other good throw around 67 feet but it was foul.



#### RON WHITNEY -- 400m. Hurdles

I didn't know I was the winner until the finish. I leaned into the tape. Actually, I had trouble all the way around. Around the curve when I usually accelerate, I had to chop my stride and it really effected me.

I finally got going good in the stretch, but I was quite surprised at the fast time. Therefore, I know I can run faster, once I iron out the problems. I have done quite a bit of research on altitude training and I'm amazawawax convinced that in my event the problem is mostly mental. A person in good shape should be able to handle it.

#### GEOFF VANDERSTOCK-400m, hurdles

This was unquestionably my best race. I've been working for it all year so it's very gratifying that it came off as planned. I knew I would have to be ahead at least with two hurdles to go. Sure enough, Whitney caught me and there was nothing I could do about it. But I'll settle for second. The biggest factor in my improvement is that I straightened out my step problem.

#### WADE BELL-800 meters

I knew the pace was too fast right from the 220 mark. It usually is. But I knew I was the strongest runner so wasn't worried. I made my move just at the time I planned. I didn't like the start, on a curve. The rules say it should be from lanes and in stagger. The way it caused a lot of congestion and there could have been trouble. I ran my usual race, pretty even with the last quarter faster. I also don't like the idea that even though I won here, I didn't clinch a position on the team. I still have to prove it all over again at Tahoe. I understand that if I finish third there, or even a close fourth, I will probably make it. But what if I don't?

#### FELIX JOHNSON--800 meters

I was boxed on the last curve and decided to save my energy for the stretch. Now I think the way I finished maybe I could have won it by gambling. I felt strong at the finish. My fastest time is 45.8 from the blocks and 45.3 relay. I'm 6ft. 22 and am a serior, 21 years old.

#### JAY SILVESTER -- Discus

I threw worse than I felt. I warmed up with a 216-footer, which really surprises me in the Coliseum, but just couldn't approach it after we got going. Don't get me wrong. I was very satisfied to win even with a mediocre throw, but I know 205 ft. won't be too good in Mexico City. I had hoped to hit 210 today. I'll have to be at my best in Mexico City. Al Oerter is a very tough man to beat because he is so consistent. He is always right out there at 200 ft., even on bad throws. If I get a bad throw it goes 150 ft. I have beaten Al for two years now and I don't intend to let him beat me now. I have been over 216 ft. about six times now and I feel that I can hit that anytime I have about a 15 mph wind to throw into. But that's not likely in Mexico City because of the lack of density in the air. Al Oerter is still the man to beat although the Europeans such as Ludwig Danek are always tough. I have improved this year because of changes in my technique. Right now I plan to retire after the Olympics. I am 31, 6-2 and 245 lbs. I am in the insurance business in Logan, Utah.

#### AL OERTER -- Discus

This was my best throw of the year and, although I had hoped to be over 200 ft., I am fairly satisfied. This was my fifth competition of the year and I figure that I am coming around. It just takes longer to get in shape now. It may be of interest that I have never won an Olympic Trials meet. I am working for a good consistent base of 207. Last week I was almost afraid that I wouldn't make the top six. I feel better now. I'll be 32 at the time of the Games, but I don't intend to retire. I am 6-5 and 257. I should be 265 by October.

#### DAVE PATRICK--1500 meters

I didn't mind the slow pace at all. It really doesn't make any difference to me, as long as I'm in a good position heading into the stretch. No, I'm really not sorry Jim Ryun wasn't in the race, as long as he recovers in time to make the team. I just can't see an Olympic Games without Ryun. I let up with about 10 yards to go and looked around. I'm sorry and won't do that again. I'm very tired from a long campaign and will take at least a couple of weeks off from hard training.

#### SAM BAIR -- 1500 meters

Since I'm a pretty good finisher, I was glad to have a slow pace.

I wasn't at all satisfied with my race in the NCAA, where I layed too

far back and finished fourth. Also, I was spiked in that race so stood

out of the AAU. So I was happy to run so well today.

#### MARTY LIQUORI--1500

I hadn't planned to go out in front but the pace was so slow I had no choice. I realized I can't finish with those other fellows, including the Oregon boys. I just can't relax when I'm in front.

Tracy Smith declined to run because he didd. Lake to knew he could run at the Tahoe trials anyway and the three who had trailed him in the AAU finished in the same order. The winner was little, hard-kicking Bill Clark of the Marines, followed by Van Nelson and Tom Laris. It would have been no surprise to anyone had not Gerry Lindgren been in the race.

Lindgren came up with Achilles tendon trouble after the NCAA and why he elected to run when dozens of others were successfully petitioning the way to Tahoe is known only to him. Perhaps he wanted to achieve the Olympic qualifying standard of 29 minutes. At any rate, he set off as if his left ankle and tendon were not well taped. His red shoes twinkled at the head of the pack for nearly four-miles as he crossed mile markers in 4:28, 9:09 and 13:57. Laris and Nelson were with him all the way and at 13½ laps a it became a six man race as Clark, Eammon O'Reilly and Jim Murphy closed a one-time 30 yard gap. Lindgren relinquished his lead to Laris at 15 laps, and O'Reilly was in front at four-miles in 18:51. Here Gerry surged, axxxxxxxx but, only for about 100 yards. Two-and-a-half circuits later the veteral Olympian suddenly was out of it. He quickly dropped back 10 yards behind fifth place and was noticeably limping. By five miles, where O'Reilly clocked 23:41, Lindgren was merely trotting and was being advised by concerned fans to drop out. At 5½ miles an official a made the same suggestion, which Lindgren gratefully accepted.

Murphy, meanwhile, was dropped with 600 meters remaining and at the go o'Reilly was six yards back. The pace quickened down the back straight and Laris led at six-miles in 28:22. Charlie Greene, who has one of the best finishing leans in the busines used his dip to nearly defeat Jim Hines, who has almost noforward inclination at all. Hines is an upright pull runner and at the finish he does little more than nod his head as he drives through. Greene thrusts both arms back, shoulder high, bends at the waist about 35 degrees forward of the vertical, and thrusts his head forward, not down. He gains about six vital inches on Hines. This time Charlie made up all but a fraction of an inch of the deficit. In fact, my reading of the Longine phototimer pic calls it a deadheat with the forward portion of Greene's neck even with Hines'chest. It wouldn't right to label it a bad call, however, as the photo is small, the differential slight, and it's a matter of openion as to where the neck ends and the non-counting head begins.

Chunky Mel Pender moved first, as usual, but Hines' strepickup propelled him into a narrow advantage by 20 meters. Greene, who beat Hines by about nine inches in the AAU, took longer to make his move and it wasn't until the 80 meter mark that he caught the fading Pender as

drew nearly even with Hines.

Bob Beamon passed his last three chances and could have passed his second and third as well. The skinny (6'2 3/4", 156 lbs.) New Yorker soared 26'8 3/4" on his initial effort and that was more than a foot better than he or anyone else could do the rest of the day.

Ralph Boston, who restrained a knee when he took more jumps than he thought he should in the AAU, was did not compete and the other two members of the big four did not threaten. The strong-looking Bell made his move as Winzenried led into the xmxm stretch. Los Angeles - To assistant coach Stan Wright, the U.S. Olympic track team's chances look good as gold at the Mexico City Olympics. Wright adds one big If.

"I think we'll have the greatest team in the history of the U.S. if we get through our problem with the boy-cott," he said. Wright, the former track coach at Texas Southern, referred to the proposed Negro boycott of the Olympics and he got another example Sunday of how heatdealings are on that

During the final day of the Olympic Trials at Memorial Coliseum, Wright was subjected to a verbal attack by Mrs. Tommie Smith, wife of the world 200 and 400-meter record helder. ord holder.

Smith was given the eighth (outside) lane in Sunday's 200meter finals after winning his heat in the fastest time of the prelims. The lanes were drawn from a hat but Mrs. Smith charged her husband was given the worst lane because he is identified with the Negro boycott.

She was sitting in a section in the stands with Harry Edwards, the San Jose State teacher who is the major spokesman for the boycott. After the 200 finals, in which Smith beat Jim Hines by a yard in an excellent 20.2, supporters of the boycott held up a sign which read "Why Run In Mexico City And Crawl At Home."

"The lanes for the 200 were

drawn from a hat," said Wright. "They were drawn by lot and the luck of the draw." Wright was chairman of the seedings committee for the Trials.

Hines was one of three Hines was one of three Houston Striders who won events. He took the 100-meters Saturday, Randy Matson won the shot put and Bob Beamon won the long jump.

Sunday, Felix Johnson of Prairie View was second in the 800-meters in 1:46.5, a

career record and the fastest ever run by a Texan. George Hunt of the Houston Striders was eighth in 1:48.6 but probably will be given a chance to make the Olympic team dur-ing the high altitude training camp at South Lake Tahoe in September.

## Olympic atminuses Squad Up In Air

Just about everything that concerns the week-end's socalled but misnamed Final Olympic track and field trials today was up in the air.

today was up in the air.

Up in the air until announcement expected today from Harry Edwards is the result of a vote taken on the Olympic boycott movement by Negro athetes Friday night at Pomona.

It turned out to be just an Olympic development meet from which just about any athlete who can breathe next September will be taken up in the air to South Lake Tahoe's 7377-foot elevation for high altitude training and a final showdown among about a dozen athletes in each event.

No matter what happened

No matter what happened here, just about anybody can still make the Olympic team.

"I can't say what we decided but the vote was one-sided," Edwards said at the Coliseum Sunday where he sat among 25,464 spectators watching a majority of America's best track athletes in their first scramble toward making the team for Mexico City.

This remark by Edwards suggests he has a boycott in his pocket, but it is not

thought that all the black athletes will support the ban. Those most likely to do so would be Tommie Smith and John Carlos of the San Jose-Santa Clara beehive.

The Olympic Committee has made sure there will be plenty of replacements for those who boycott as well as those who in September prove themselves unable to perform up to their usual credentials when competing at an altitude very similar to that of Mexico City.

Earl McCullouch hit the eighth hurdle while far out in front and nearly fell to the track. He finished seventh, beating only one man. But he will be given another chance at Tahoe unless he signs with the Detroit Lions for pro football.

Gerry Lindgren didn't run in the 5,000 meters on Saturday. Sunday he set pace early in the 10,000 but dropped back steadily until he was nearly lapped. Gerry dropped out of the race with two laps to go and said later he had injured an Achilles tendon in the NCAA meet but hadn't told anyone about the injury.

The story of Gerry Lindgren is from Zeus four years ago to Achilles in 1968. In 1964 he won that famous 10,000 meters vs. the Russians while still a high-school box

school boy.
Lindgren, however, will have his chance at Tahoe. Who will


THREE-TIME gold medal winner Al Oerter, in only his fifth competitive appearance this season, was pleased with his 197-10 for second place.

In Sunday's trials, Smith tied his own Los Angeles Colliseum record of 20.2 in winning over Jim Hines of the Houston Striders. Starting in lane eight, supposedly a poor position, Tommie started fast and held the lead all the way. Hines was timed in 10.3 in second place.

Another Smith, Ronnie Ray, Tommie's successor as San Jose State's fastest human, took third place in 20.4, the fastest time of his career. John Carlos, former Detroit sprinter now running for the Santa Clara Valley Youth Village, finished fourth and assured himself of continuing training at high altitude in September. His time was 20.6.

Evans broke fast out of the starting blocks to win the 400 meter final. His time was onetenth of a second off his best. Evans did not seem to be bothered by a strained tendon in his left ankle as he ran a strong race.

Evans said he was very happy with lane six today, but that there was much comment about the fact that Tommie Smith and John Carlos drew the worst lanes for the 200 meter final.

Hilmer Lodge, chairman of the U.S. Olympic Track and Field Committee, said a committee of six, headed by Negro coach Stan Wright, did the seedings by drawing bullets out of a hat.

"It was just the luck of the

draw that Smith and Carlos were in lanes eight and one," he said.

Edwards earlier was asked about a decision by the Olympic committee to take from 6 to 10 athletes in each event to Lake Tahoe, for high altitude training, a decision which is regarded by some as a means of combatting the proposed boycott.

He replied, "If you have to go down that far to get a white cat, maybe they're going to run a boy's camp at Lake Tahoe."

als for the United States in a period of three Olympic Games. Oerter's throw was



### In 55-13/4 Triple Jump

Veteran Art Walker smashed his own American record with a 55-13/4 leap in the triple jump yesterday, but otherwise it was the have-nots that made the news in a somewhat dreary Olympic Track and Field Trials at the Coliseum.

Two of America's greatest stars, little Gerry Lindgren and lithe Earl McCullouch, fell by the wayside as two days of competition, that decided very little were completed.

little, were completed.

Lindgren, suffering from a painfully, if not seriously, injured Achilles tendon, made a game fight of it in the 10,-2 game right of it in the 10,-000 meter run after scratch-ing from Saturday's 5000. He led for most of the first five miles, although never by more than a few yards over Van Nelson, Tom Laris and Eamon O'Reilly.

But at that point the pain became too much. He quickly fell back to sixth, trailing the leaders by nearly half a lap, and after running five and a half miles of the sixmile-plus race, he stepped off the track.

the track. the track.

For McCullouch, it was a bad day all around. In the semifinal of the 110-meter high hurdles, where the Pearl shares the world record of 13.2, he got his usual lightning start but Tom White came fast at the wire to nip him in 13.8.

In the final McCullouch again was out very fast, but

again was out very fast, but he ticked the eighth hurdle with his foot, hit the final two barriers full and barely managed to finish seventh, in 14.2. Erv Hall won in a rela-

tively slow 13.6. By most standards, this would have been an excellent meet; but what it should have been, and should have meant, it was not.

Olympic Committee chair-man Hilmer Lodge announced early yesterday that the winner in each event would make the United States Olympic team,

viding he could demonstrate his competitive excellence' during final trials at Lake Tahoe September 9-17.

Since Lodge would not

speculate on what would constitute a "demonstration of competitive excellence," the obvious conclusion was that this meet meant little except a good payday for the Olympic fund—and even that wasn't as good as hoped, with crowds of 23,156 and 25,654 the two days.

Many of the athletes obviously were not "up" psychologically, and many were irritated that their wins or strong showing here meant nothing.

"I don't like the idea that even though I won here, I didn't clinch a position on the team," 800-meter champion Wade Bell said. "I still have to prove it all over again at Tahoe. I understand that if I finish third there, or even a close fourth, I will probably make it. But what if I don't?"

Aside from the high hurdles and perhaps the 10,000 meters, there were no upsets. In the 10,000 meters, Tracy Smith scratched after his 5000-meter victory Saturday and, after Lindgren dropped out, it became anybody's race. Marine Bill Damer, outsprinted a bunched group of leaders in the final 150 yards to win in 29:11.0, a personal lifetime best, although well below Smith's winning time in the AAU meet last week, 28:47.0.

Walker and Tommie Smith provided the top marks of the day. Walker, one of the nation's most consistent veteran trackmen, got his best jump on his next-to-last effort to break his own American mark of 54-11, set here in 1966, and move into fourth on the all-time world list.

Smith, starting for some reason in lane eight despite winning his semifinal heat, came off the turn and into the long straightaway in the unaccustomed role of leader. He held his small margin against Jim Hines to win the 200 meters in 20.2, just twotenths off his own world record and tying the Coliseum mark.

Hines was second in 20.3 and Ronnie Ray Smith of San Jose, beginning to make his mark as a coming sprint great, third in 20.4.

## Earl, Lindgren Mishaps Justify Need for Two Trials

BY SHAV GLICK

The crashing of Earl McCullouch into a hurdle and the tender Achilles heel of Gerry Lindgren were more than enough to justify having two Olympic trials, the U.S. coaching staff pointed out Sunday.

McCullouch appeared to be flying over the hurdles at a world record clip when he suddenly threw what looked like a flying block at the final hurdle. Barely able to maintain his balance, The Pearl stumbled across in seventh place at 14.2.

Erv Hall, who had been four yards behind McCullouch, won in 13.6.

"If this had been a final trial in the old-fashioned sense, leaving Earl off the team would have been similar to 1948 when Harrison Dillard hit one in the

final trials," explained Stan Wright, one of head coach Payton Jordan's assistant Olympic mentors.

"No other country uses such an archaic system as we once did. We finally decided to do it right," continued the Western Illinois coach. "Our objective is to get the best men to Mexico City and to do it we must be flexible."

Asked if it was fair to charge the public \$6 a ticket to watch a pseudofinal trial, Wright snapped, "That's not the problem of the coaching staff, that's another department."

McCullouch, who said he tipped the seventh and eighth hurdles, which led to disaster at No. 10, continued to hedge on the answer to his dilemma: The Olympics or a Detroit Lions pro football contract.

"I have to think it over a few more days," he said. "I should know this week. It's up to them (the Olympic committee) if I'll go to Lake Tahoe."

Little Lindgren, who limped 5½ miles before dropping out in the 10,000 meters (6 miles, 370 yards), was grateful for the seeding committee which immediately placed his name alongside the top place-winners for inclusion in the South Lake Tahoe section of the final trials. Sept. 9-17.

Lee Evans, who last week alluded to the possibility of a dark plot against the pro-boycotters when he was asked to run in the eighth lane in the AAU meet, said he was "happy to be in Lane 6 today," but he still couldn't let the lane issue die.

"There was something fishy about the 200, putting Tommie (Smith) out in 8 and John Carlos in 1. Those are the two guys who support the boycott, and those are the two hated lanes."

Smith, and his wife, former hurdler Denice Paschal, carried the same torch.

"They say they draw them arbitrarily, but I don't know," said Tommie-Jet after his front-running 20.2 victory.

"Tell 'em like it is, Tommie," egged on Denice.

"Ask them why they don't let the athletes draw the lanes out of a hat. Tell 'em Tommie, tell 'on."

When an observer mentioned to Smith that the eighth lane was the most beneficial because of its wide arc, particularly for a long-limbed runner like himself, Smith said, "It just psyches me out."

Carlos, who finished fourth in the 200 in Lane

1, pouted: "Man, Lane One. I think I'll quit track and play football."

The hint of such a collusion brought an adamant retort from Wright, chairman of the seeding committee which assigned the lanes.

"There is no question that it was an honest draw," said Wright. "The rules say the lanes should be drawn by lot and we don't need any policeman or athletes standing over us when we draw."

Wright then explained how the lane assignments were made.

"We have numbered bullets which we put into a hat—it was mine, incidentally, for the 200 meters — and they are drawn out one at a time as the name of each finalist comes up. Five members of the Olympic committee —Brice Durbin, Bob Giegengack, Ben Lewis,

Hoover Wright and myself—do the drawing.

"And we certainly won't be intimidated by any of this talk I've been hearing," added Wright, a Negro.

The identical method of drawing for lanes will be used in the Olympics.

Another rule, seldom used but which is rigidly followed in the Olympics, cropped up in Sunday's meet. It was penalizing a jumper a "miss" for not making an attempt in two minutes.

Dick Fosbury, who often rocks back and forth from one foot to another for as long as four minutes before taking off in the high jump, was so penalized.

"It was the first time I've ever been called on that," said Fosbury, who won at 7-1. "But if that's the way it is in the Olympics, I'm glad I found about it here."

### Trials Lack Drama, Because They All Get Another Chance

It is called the Olympic trials, but the drama is lacking.

There was no moment of truth Saturday such as a duel for third place making the difference between a round-trip ticket to Mexico City or a one-way ticket home.

There will be no poignant memories of this Coliseum trials.

Moments like the high school stripling, Jim Ryun, running down the

veteran Jim Grelle in 1964 for the third spot on the 1.500 meters team.

Or the dramatic announcement by Dick Nash in 1952, "Art Barnard, you have made the Olympic team," as high hurdle favorite Craig Dixon stood hunched in disbelief over the ninth hurdle after suffering his only spill of the year.

There were no third place duels this year, nor even any sixth place duels.

#### 'True Trials'

Hilmer Lodge, chairman of the U.S. Olympic track and field committee, revealed Saturday that from six to 10 men in each event will be invited to South Lake Tahoe for high altitude training and another trial meet at Echo Summit. Thus, the true "Final Olympic trials" will be held there under identical Olympic Games conditions, Sept. 9-17.

"Even the winner here will not necessarily go to Mexico City," Lodge stated. "The Olympic Committee will meet Sunday night and determine the number of athletes in each event to invite to the training camp and final trials. No one will be definitely selected for the trip to Mexico City until they perform at high altitude"

The only truly eliminated competitor Saturday was Andrew Hopkins, a freshman at Stephen F. Austin, who finished third in a face-off in the 100 meters for 9th, 10th and 11th positions. Jerry Bright of Oakland won, with Larry Questad of the Striders second and each was invited to the Tahoe camp, along with all eight finalists.

#### No Worries

It was the type of a day where the happiest athlete appeared to be Ralph Boston, the venerable long jumper, waving to the crowd and wearing his widest smile, topped by a huge straw sombrero.

Boston, you see, wasn't even competing. He, along with 14 other athletes such as Jim Ryun, Richmond Flowers, Neal Steinhauer, Preston Davis and Willie Davenport have been seeded straight to South Lake Tahoe without having to undergo the rigors of Los Angeles' "final" trials.

One, little Gerry Lindgren, did not even have to claim injury to be seeded past the 5,000 meters Saturday, an item which did not escape the winner,

Tracy Smith.

"I was surprised Lindgren was allowed to pass up the 5,000 and I understand he will still have a chance to double up," complained the former Arcadia High two-miler who is now an Army private. "More power to him if he can do it, but I don't think it's fair for me to have to run the two races."

Smith and Lindgren presumably will meet to-day in the 10,000.

Two of Saturday's winners, sprinter Jim Hines and long jumper Bob Beamon, predicted out-of-thisworld performances in Mexico City's over-7,000 foot altitude.

"It'll take a 9.8 and may-

be even a 9.7 to win the 100 meters," said Hines.
"And it will be between me and Charlie."

Hines nipped Greene, the ex-Nebraskan, in 10.3 against an 8.5 mile per hour wind. Jim, charged with a "jump" for an attempted rolling start, said he was off to one of his worst starts of the year, accounting for the slow winning time.

Hines, Greene and Ronnie Ray Smith, who finished third a fraction ahead of Mel Pender, all were timed in 9.9 a week ago at Sacramento.

Beamon, who long jumped 26-834, said that mark wouldn't even win a bronze medal at Mexico City.

#### Overweight Shots

"It will take at least 28 feet to win," said the lanky New Yorker, who will "go home and rest for six weeks before coming back to Lake Tahoe."

Randy Matson, although nearly three feet off his best of the year, dominated the shot put as expected, but he might have done better had not the Olympic Committee produced some over-weight shots.

"Two of the shots were 6 ounces overweight and naturally no one would use them," said big Randy. "As a consequence, there were 16 men trying to use the same two shots and it created a good deal of confusion which ruined everyone's concentration. No one threw well today."

The furnishing of shots by the Olympic Committee was done because the same procedure is used at the Games them-

There were a number of scratches Saturday, but Terry Thompson, Oregon State's half-miler, certainly had the best excuse. Thompson is a commercial fisherman and the salmon were running.
