Smith holds the world record for 220 yards at 20 seconds flat. Hurdler Earl McCullouch and

sprinter Charlie Greene scored easy victories but were well off their world record times.

McCullouch, of the University of Southern California, won the 120 high hurdles in 13.6, four tenths slower than the world mark. Ron Copeland of the Southern Collfornia Student Southern California Striders upset Willie Davenport to finish second at 13.8. Davenport was timed in 13.9.

Greene, University of Nebraska gradute student, sped to a 9.3 victory in the century, defeating arch rival Hines by about two feet. Hines also was timed in 9.3, with the U.S. Army's Mel Pender third in 9.5.
