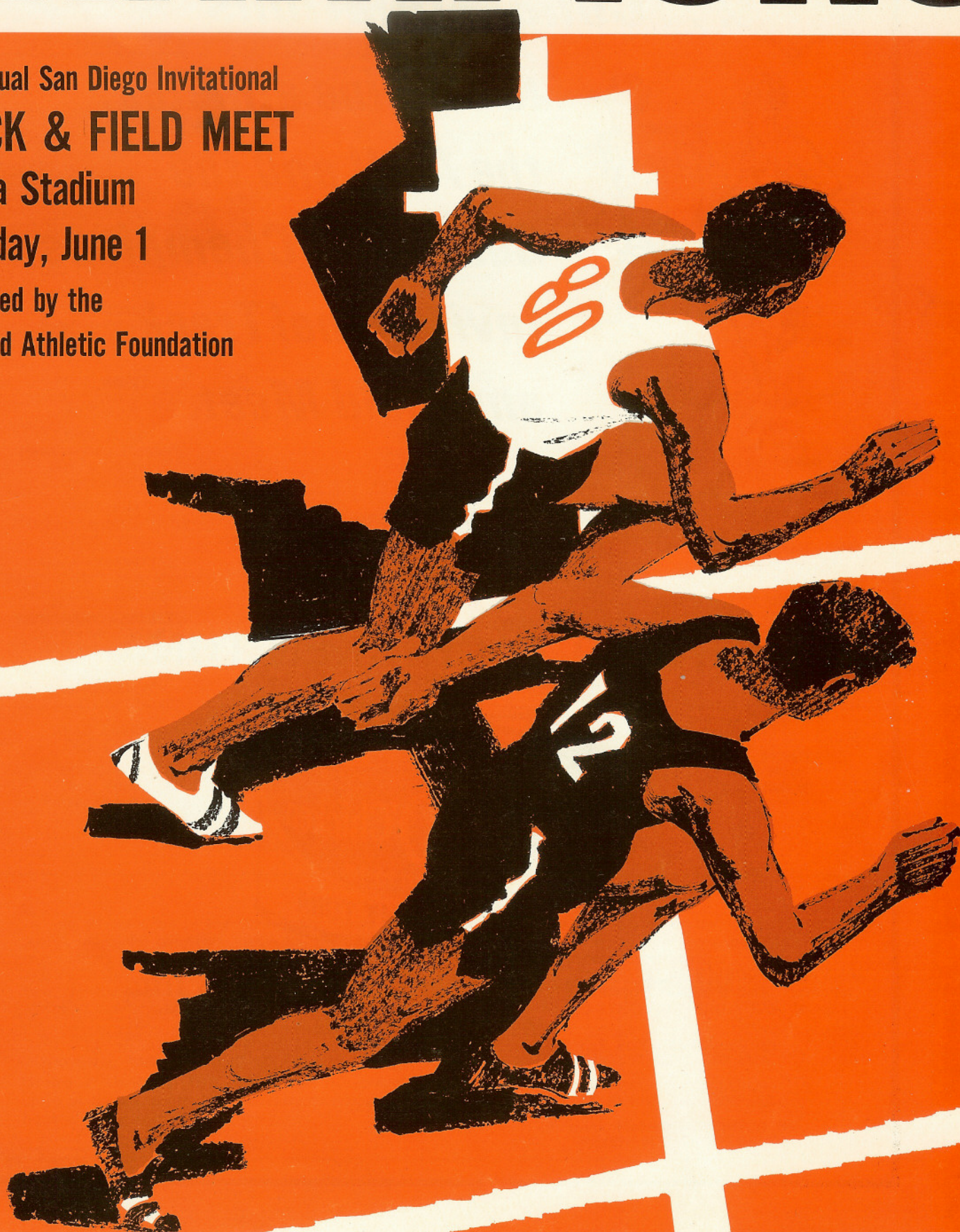

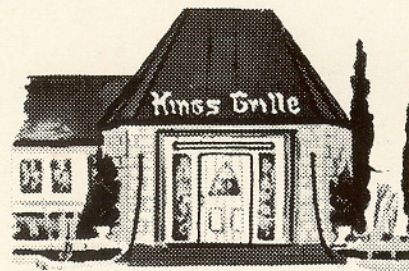

MEET FEATURES WORLD CHAMPIONS

FROM 100 YDS. TO 10,000 METERS

If you have any doubts you will be watching the best today, all you have to do is look at the record book.

In Jimmy Hines, Charlie Greene, Tommie Smith, Jim Ryun and Ron Clarke, The Champions meet has brought together the men who own every record from 100 yards to 10,000 meters. **Editor's Note: Because of illness, Jim Ryun will not be able to compete.**

Hines and Greene are co-holders of the world record of 9.1 in the 100-yard dash and likewise share in the record of 10 flat for 100 meters.

Smith holds records of 20 flat in the 220 and 44.8 in the 440, while Ryun claims standards of 1:44.9 in the 880 and 3:51.1 in the mile.

The rest belong to Clarke, the non-stop Australian who owns a half-dozen distance marks. Today he will be out to break his record of 8:19.8 in the two mile.

In the hurdles, likewise, The Champions meet is presenting the best. That man, of course, is Earl McCullough who is co-holder of the world record of 13.2 in the 110-meter high hurdles.

The confrontations of Hines, Greene and Smith in the sprints always promise outstanding clockings, not to mention a little controversy.

Hines, before last year's Coliseum-Compton Invitational, flatly predicted he would beat Smith in the 220 and then backed up his boast by holding off the fast-finishing San Jose State flash in a stirring drive to the wire.

Smith later made Hines pay for his audacity by soundly thrashing the Texas Southern flyer in the National AAU 220.

In the same meet, however, Hines gained some revenge of his own in the 100. Greene, the brash Nebraskan, had handed him his only defeat at the distance in the Drake Relays and Hines reversed the decision with a photo-finish victory in the AAU.

Greene didn't buy it, however. He claimed Jimmy got a rolling start and even argued with the judges' decision, claiming the photos didn't establish Hines as the clear winner.

"Did Hines really get off to a good start?" someone asked Greene.

"Are you kidding?" shot back Charlie. "Man, he was out of sight. He was running in another world."

More controversy followed in the USA-British Commonwealth meet at the Los Angeles Coliseum. Hines was tossed out of the 100 for two false starts. Greene, making sure he wouldn't follow the same route, got left in his blocks as USC's Lennox Miller, representing

Jamaica, shot out to an early lead and maintained it for a clear-cut victory.

All three will be trying to gain that precious advantage at the start today, so keep a close watch. The race could be decided in the first 10 yards.

Speaking of starts, another man who bears watching is McCullough in the high hurdles. The man they call The Pearl literally explodes from the blocks, and coaches continue to be amazed by his fantastic reactions.

One of those is USC football coach John McKay who, after watching Earl in wind sprints last fall, said, "He's got to be the fastest man in the world at 40 yards. At that distance I'd put my money on him against anybody, including Bob Hayes."

Among the Pearl's victims in those wind sprints was another Trojan griddy with pretty good speed, O. J. Simpson.

"In one race," said teammate Mike Hull, "I'd swear that Earl had six or seven yards on O. J. at 20 yards."

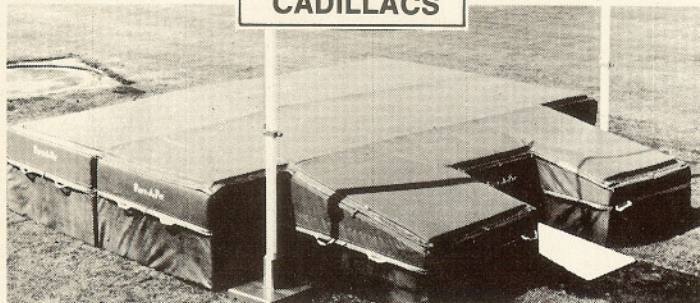

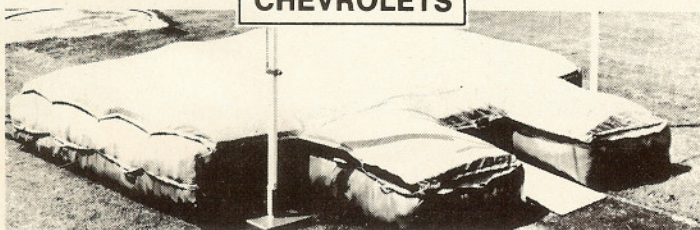

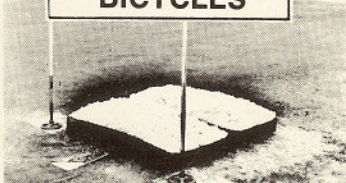

HONORARY REFEREES



DR. JOHN L. BOYER DR. FRED W. KASCH

Drs. Fred W. Kasch and John L. Boyer share the spotlight today as honorary referees because of their extensive work and research toward physical fitness of Americans.

As the founders and leaders of San Diego State's Adult Fitness Program and Exercise Physiology Laboratory, they have combined to develop techniques which keep Americans in better physical condition.

They have received world recognition for their accomplishments, which include a published book titled, "Adult Fitness — Principles and Practices."

Dr. Kasch is unable to attend today's meet because he is presenting research information on physical fitness at an international meeting in Germany.

"The prevention of coronary heart disease was our No. 1 goal in undertaking these physical fitness programs," Dr. Boyer said.

"Studies have shown that exercise of the cardiovascular type are a real value in prevention of heart disease.

"Running and physical fitness exercises are the easiest, simplest and least expensive way to get the proper kind of cardiovascular exercise and improve heart conditions," Dr. Boyer said.

"Running gives a man continual rhythmic endurance work, which is the best exercise for your heart," he said.

Dr. Boyer also was quick to point out that participation in sports does not necessarily develop fitness.

"We tested an outstanding athlete at San Diego State (a track and football performer) and found that a man 50 years of age who had been following our prescribed running and exercise program was actually more physically fit. Age is no deterrent to fitness," Dr. Boyer said.

In their book, the doctors point up the need for physical fitness because our way of life today tends to omit a method of releasing the pressures of daily work.

"Exercise two to five times a week is not only good for physical fitness, but a release for tensions and frustrations," Dr. Boyer said.

"Overcoming years of sedentary living and substituting habits of regular physical activity is the No. 1 problem," he said.

"But the results of better feeling, longer life span and a general 'brighter outlook on life' make the effort worthwhile," Dr. Boyer said.

THE BREITBARD ATHLETIC FOUNDATION

It is not boasting to say that few cities in the United States have a sports association to rival San Diego's own Breitbard Athletic Foundation.

Now in its 22nd year, the Foundation's major purpose during these years has been to encourage participation by youngsters in athletics and physical education throughout San Diego City and County.

It has achieved this worthwhile goal by simply recognizing the achievements of its own San Diego athletes. Since 1946, without fail, its volunteer board of governors, under Bob Breitbard's leadership, has met each month to decide who shall be the recipients of its monthly awards.

But awards are not the whole story. In 1949 the Foundation began an annual Prep Football Classic that has produced thousands of dollars for the San Diego Children's Dental Health Center.

Nine years later, in 1958, the Foundation added another activity, a free-lending sports film library. Its films are viewed by over 50,000 persons yearly.

Then, after two years of assiduous labor, the Foundation opened the San Diego Hall of Champions in 1961 to honor San Diego County's outstanding athletic stars. Nearly 800,000 visitors have seen this sports museum, certainly one of the nation's very finest.

Since then the Foundation has started and sponsored its annual Prep Basketball and Baseball Classics plus this annual track meet that you will view today. All of these events have added interest to the sports scene here in San Diego.

Another annual event on the Breitbard calendar is the yearly "Banquet of Champions" at which time the monthly stars, both professional and amateur, are honored, and the year's top San Diego athletes are recognized.

The present board, containing a number of those from the original group that Bob Breitbard gathered together 22 years ago, is composed of these sports and civic-minded men: Anderson Borthwick, Ken Bojens, Breitbard, Lyle Bond, Leo Calland, Al Couppee, Don Clarkson, Cletus Gardner, Lute Mason, Bob McInerney, Jack Murphy, Norrie West, Percy Robbins, Ed Scott, Judge Joe Shell, Lisle Shoemaker, Darrell Smith and O. MEET DIRECTOR

The "Champions Meet" keeps its theme of "world class competitors" right on down the line through the selection of San Diego native Ralph Smith as meet director.

His success as meet director of last year's Third Annual Invitational Track Meet, which produced three world records, made his selection for a repeat performance the easiest and most obvious decision.

He has been in the "world record class" since 1926 when, at the age of 19, he vaulted 13-5¾ to claim a National High School and American record in that event.

His other athletic endeavors, including the county welterweight boxing championship in 1927, have been a sound foundation for his entrance into recreation work as a career.

After several years as recreation supervisor for Convair, Smith assumed his present post in 1946 as San Diego's municipal athletic supervisor.

Testimony to his diligence came recently with his selection for the "Merit Award," highest honor emblematic of outstanding leadership and extraordinary services benefiting sports programs in the Southern California municipal athletic recreation system.

In addition to his regular duties, Smith is boxing commissioner for the local Pacific Southwest Association of the A.A.U. and annually serves as matchmaker for the Golden Gloves and Navy Championships.

A life member of the national A.A.U., Smith, at one time or another, has been president of virtually every amateur sporting organization in San Diego County.
