Northern California trackmen, paced by hurdler Jerry Wilson of Fresno Roosevelt and quartermiler Larance Jones of Lemoore, highlighted yesterday's trials in the 51st California High School track meet before 5000 fans at UCLA's new track stadium

Wilson, who had bests this year of 13.8 in the 120 high hurdles and 18.7 in the lows, skimmed to 13.7 and 18.5 times in winning both of his hurdle heats.

His 13.7 mark equalled the State Meet record set by Jerry Proctor of Pasadena Muir in 1967. Wilson's 18.5 was better than the listed mark of 18.7, but officials said that record was achieved around one turn. Wilson ran his on a straightaway where the record is 18.2.

Jones sprinted to the fastest 440 time, 47.8, which equaled his season best. He came back in the 180 low hurdles and won his heat in

Jones wasn't through, however. He anchored Lemoore's mile relay team to third place (qualifying for the finals) with a superlative 46.2

Not counting the two-mile, in which no trials were held, San Francisco got three individuals into the finals.
