Not too much to report from the SC-Washington meet. The wind was a quite noticeable factor, hindering most events with the exception of the throws. Joe Antunovich upped his PR to 197-5 with a "good" discus wind, but everyone else in other events complained about the adverse conditions. There was no wind gauge at the meet and the direction of the wind was constantly changing so I can't make even a decent guess as to the legality of any marks. Henry Hines commented, "I'd start out with the wind at my back and when I got to the board, the wind from the tunnel hit me square in the face."

The pole vault suffered considerably as the best the four 16-footers in the field could do was 14-6; Cryder, Bryde, Cochran, and Pullard all cleared that height with the placings determined by fewere misses and attempts. Washington's Bryde, in particular, had his problems. Prior to competition, the wind blew one of the standards over and hit him on the head. A quick trip to the infirmiry took care of the injury - then his pole broke on his second try at 15-0 and he quit for the day.

As of right now, UCLA leads my ratings with SC, Oregon, and El Paso in a near dead-heat for second. BYU and Kansas are the next obvious choices and after that, the top ten is a bit uncertain. Nebraska, Cal, Oregon State, Texas, and Wisconsin look like the best bets, although Tennessee, Texas A&M and the other Pac-8 schools are still in it. Incidentally, could you send me copies of SWC sums? I'm getting absolutely nothing from that area. Thanks.
