

Falcons, As Expected, Take MPL Track Title

Lawrence High School today reigns as the first Peachtree League's (PFL) track champion, an accomplishment which would surprise no one who the Falcons, coached by Coach Hughes, to capture their title again.

As they had defended their in March and through the repetition of a few days that were the Falcons maintained their records easily in yesterday's MPL championship meet in Macon.

Coachman, however, remained loyal with his first place to seven 44 points in the victory obtained while Burlington, last year's champion, had captured honors with 20 points. The rest of the field added for less.

When it returned the school (coach) of the Falcons, the league championship was also repeated for last season, when Lawrence had the MPL, even but not the league title through their superior. The addition, the

Burlington, however, wasn't all that confident when the season came again. Steve Thompson, the Falcons' first field event performer, had a scratch from the long jump with a sprained ankle, an injury which the coach wanted to prevent his team from being off in the gold medal.

But, Thompson came through

with a 104 vault to finish second behind Burlington's talented Terry Webb, and the only other story throughout the day may have to have the crowd lost of the intense effort looked like the assembly point for the first time in history.

Smith, who also captured

Jefferson Scores Upset vs. Warriors

For the first time since league play started there could be a tie for first place in the now-congested North Peninsula League baseball race.

John Giannini and Smoky Morton singled to start the rally and, after a steal opened first, Smith was walked intentionally. But loser Rick Hagstrom hit Neville Wall, one of the three he was to plunk, to drive in the first run before Ed Dominguez singled in the second and third tallies.

The other meet record was set by San Mateo's Tom Paton, who led a 1-2-3 Bearcat assault in the triple jump with Dennis Haysbert and Duane Pinson.

Paton, a senior whom Coach Don Dooley calls, "the hardest working kid we've got on our team" leaped 43-1 1/4 to shatter the year-old meet standard by 16 inches. Haysbert, who has traded victories with his chum throughout the year, leaped 42-7 3/4 while Pinson also exceeded the old meet mark with a 42-1 3/4 jump.

The finest of Burlingame's four first place was a 4:21.4 mile by Dave Montoya, although he was hardly satisfied with his effort.

Montoya, who has run 4:18.5 this season despite various allergies to pollen, went out on the pace all alone and finished the same way, with no one to push him. Dave lost a worthy adversary in John Sheehan, the Aragon miler who finished fourth despite a sore foot.

"I wanted to break Eugenio Amaya's record, (4:19.1)," Montoya said. "My ultimate is to break 4:10, but if I'm going to do it, I'm going to have to get working. I want to work through the regionals next week and go for the sectional meet. That's where the competition is going to be. I wanted this one pretty bad today though, it's the first MPL medal I've won since my freshman year."

The Panthers also got a 50.9 quarter-mile victory from Carl Krupke, a 9:41.2 triumph in the two mile from Steve Brown, and a 49-4 1/4 first from Mark Scoggins in the shot put.

Other first places in the varsity division went to San Mateo's Dale Curry, Hillsdale's Dan Clark and Mills' Bill Kahn. Curry took the discus with a throw of 165-3, Clark won the long jump with a 21-6 1/4 leap and Kahn was best of the high jumpers at six feet even, with fewer misses than Burlingame's Ray Rotolo.

Aragon narrowly beat out San Mateo in the Frosh-Soph competition, scoring 91 points to 85 for the Bearcats. In the Junior Varsity, Crestmoor was an easy winner with 64 points.

Both non-varsity meets would seem to bode well for the MPL's track future. In the 10 running finals held yesterday, Frosh-Soph athletes set new meet standards in nine of them. The JV's were nearly as productive, with seven new meet records.

Bommarito, of course, would probably qualify as Athlete of the Meet if anyone had chosen to award such honor. Besides his aforementioned sprint and discus work, he also anchored the Falcons' 440 relay win with an awesome burst of speed.

He will run that relay in the Region I meet next week at San Mateo High School but will probably change to a mile relay leg for the Central Coast Section competition.

"I used to gripe to the coach whenever he'd ask me to run the quarter," Bommarito said as the meet was drawing to a close. "But I like it this year. I guess I'm a lot stronger."

Much the same as the '71 Falcons.
