Fremont Does It 'Southern Style'

The Southern League

reigns again. Fremont High, which edged Manual Arts to win league championship, lid the Toilers again outdid Saturday to take the City track and field title before 4.000 fans at East LA Stadium.

The Pathfinders piled up 52 points to 46 for Manual Arts. Carson was third with 36 and Gardena

fourth with 34.

A perennial power in City track and field, the Southern League produced 14 consecutive champions from 1956 through 1969. But Western League schools University (1970) and Hamilton (1971) won the last two meets.

Manual Arts and Gardena had been picked to bat-tle for the title and Man-ual came through just about as expected. But Fremont did better.

The key performers for Fremont were pole vaulter Hubert Black, who won at 14-6; miler Darrell Chappell, who clocked 4:22.1 to take first place, and sprinter Charles Nash, who picked up 12 key points with a second in the 100 and a fourth in the 220 the 220.

Chappell actually fin-shed second in the mile as Wilson's Jose Amaya was a runaway winner in 4:12.1. Amaya, who did not compete in last week's semifinals because of a mixup, was allowed to run as an "exhibition" performer.

However, his time will be accepted as a City record, breaking the mark of

4:12.6 set by Cleveland's Brent Tubb last year.

Amaya was required to start behind Chappell in lane 1-A and not allowed to pass anyone until after the first lap. But it made no difference as he immediately moved into the lead and breezed to the record.

Chappell, who ran a surprising 4:20.3 in last week's semis, did not let Amaya's sizzling pace affect his strategy. He was next to last starting the final lap but made his move around the first turn and "won" convincingly. won" convincingly

Shot Put Mark

Amaya's time was one of 2 varsity records broken. other was by Narbonne's Dave Gerasimchuk, who threw the shot 64-838 to shatter the mark of 63-21/2 set by Palisades' Steve Marcus in 1965.

Individually speaking, the meet turned out better speaking. than expected as many athletes came through with career bests.

They included El Camino Real high jumper Ken Thompson, a winner at 6-8 and Manual Arts' half mi-ler Albert Seeney, who was victorious in 1:52.4.

The only double winner was Carson's Wesley Walker, a star pass catcher on the Colts' City cham-

pion football team. Walker won the 100 in 9.9 and then came back to

odge Sylmar's Bob Craw-ford in the 220 in 21.8.

Gardena's Claude
Brown, who had been expected to double in the 440 and 880, passed up the half mile to concentrate on the quarter. Brown took the lead at the outset and never was threatened in clocking 48.3.

were 3 records There broken in the Class B division and one in Class (One of the B records to fall was the oldest in the book, the high jump mark of 6-23/4 set by Leroy Steward of Jefferson in 1936 and equalled by Gary Fleming of Manual Arts in 1967. Richard Howard of Locke and Tim Simcik of Kennedy each cleared 6-4 with Howard winning on fewer misses.

The top four finishers in each varsity event, excluding those athletes who are their seventh semester, will compete next Friday and Saturday in the State championships in Oroville.
