## Cupertino Cops CCS Track Title

Cupertino won its second straight team title and Millard Hampton of Silver Creek accounted for the only meet record with a 20.9 in 220 to feature the Central Coast Section Track Field Championships Friday night at San Jose City College.

A number of come-through efforts ignited Coach Norm Eliason's Pioneers in their romp to the championship with Mark Insley's win in the high jump and the mile relay's upset win in a remarkable 3:21.2 in the final two events capping the win. Mount Pleasant finished second with 21 and Los Altos third with 17.

Mark Mildbrandt, who anchored the mile relay group in a 49.2 split, also won the high hurdles in 14.4 and was second in the lows for the Pioneers who also had top efforts from Don Finley in the long jump (second) and relay, and Roy Schablaske in the shot put (third) with a toss of 57-7. Although Los Altos and the Santa Clara Valley League no longer dominate track and field in the CCS as of old, the SCVL still rates as a major power in the spike sport.

Led by Cupertino's 29 points for the team title, the SCVL totaled 67 points with five schools from the Fremont District (Cupertino 29, Lynbrook 12, Homestead 6, Fremont 1, and Monta Vista 1) getting 49 which was more than the next highest total, 45 by the South Peninsula. Since the SCVL and SPL are in Region II, its total of 112 was far ahead of the 86 by Region III.

The SCVI, will be sending 11 competitors and two relay teams to the State meet to eight for the SPL. The West Valley loop has qualified seven individuals for the next highest total.

Thirty-eight athletes, plus six relay units will be representing 28 CCS schools at Bakersfield with 27 athletes and five relay teams representing 17 schools coming from Santa Clara County.

# Hampton Best In CCS

As the fastest sprinter in Central Coast Section history and the reigning State champion in the 220, Millard Hampton of Silver Creek is understandably the Athleteof-the-Year and the headliner on the Mercury-News All-CCS Track & Field selections for 1974.

Hampton is the lone repeater on the squad and is also the lone doubler off his 9.5 and 20.9 bests in the sprints. Field event laurels went to Gary Bersano of Los Gatos, one of five juniors on the squad who placed third in the State meet and who had a best of 61-2 in the shot put.

Also gaining repeat laurels Coach-of-the-Year Norm Eliason of Cupertino who guided the Pioneers to a second successive CCS championship after finishing behind Los Altos in league (Santa Clara Valley) and Region II competition.

Two members of the Cupertino team made the selections in individual events, Mark Mildbrandt in the high hurdles and Mark Insley in the high jump, and Mildbrandt also anchored the Pioneers mile relay team which gained All-CCS rels. Members of that team in addition to Mildbrandt are Steve Lambson, Don Finley and Al Grayson.

Leigh also claimed two berths. Dave Hamilton in the 880 where he finished third in the State meet with a life best of 1:52.5, and miler Conrad Suhr who was in the State mile finals after qualifying with his all-time best of 4:13.5.

Juniors in addition to Bersano and Suhr include Dave Jakle of Los Altos, a State meet finalist in the low hurdles; Mitch Kingery of San Carlos, eighth place finisher with his 9:05 in the two-mile, and Nathan Johnson of Seaside. State finalist in the triple jump with a best of 48-2.

Selections were based on performances in major meets with emphasis on the CCS and State meet, as well as consistency, rather than a single great mark.
