Kimball sets new distance double mark in state meet

Rich Kimball of DeLaSalle (Concord) recorded the fastest distance double in high school history and Muir of Pasadena captured the boys' team title in the 56th annual state high school track meet before 11,000 fans Saturday night at memorial Stadium.

Berkeley came away with the girls' championship, scoring 13 points, and the girls shattered the National Division for Girls and Women's Sports record book with seven new marks in the 11 events.

Muir tallied 23 points to win its third state championship, taking honors in 1934 and 1967. The Pasadena crew of Walter Opp dethroned Wilson of San Francisco, which finished second with 14 points.

Kimball set the only new boys' state meet record when he outkicked Laguna Beach sophonore Eric Hulst in the last 220 yards to time 8:46.5. It was the fourth fastest time ever run by an United States prep. Hulst became the greatest sophomore runner ever with his 8:50.5 clocking, which was also under the old state meet record of 8:52.3 by Curtis Beck of Santa Monica in 1972.

Kimball then came back to take the mile, the first time a California prep has accomplished this feat. The race truned into the most exciting of the night with Andy Clifford of Sunny Hills running at Kimball's side for the last 350 yards. Kimball outleaned Clifford at the tape in 4:06.6. His mile and two'mile times broke by four-tenths the double Kimball accomplished rarlier in the year, 4:02.6 and 8:51.0.

Best placings for Bakersfield entrants in the meet was third, accomplished by Joel Andrews of West in the 100 and Bakersfield's mile-relay team. South was fourth in the mile relay after las Lomas was disqualified while Andrews took a fifth place in the 440.

Muir wrapped up the team title with a near state record in the mile relay, timing 3:13.8, a 1974 national best. Castlemont holds the state mark of 3:13.2.

Bakersfield was just edged by Long Beach Poly, 3:16.8 to 3:16.9. The Drillers had run 3:15.8 in Friday trials. Splits for the Drillers were Kervin Bennett (49.9), John Jansen (49.8), Raymond Fite (49.1) and John Greasham (48.1). South, timing 3:18.1, recorded the following splits. Ardes Gardner (49.7), Chuck Ray (50.4), Harlan Hunter (49.7) and Vinson Cotton (48.3).

The 100, run against a slight wind, went to Crawford of San Diego junior Elijah Jefferson for the second aight year in a slow 9.8. Andrews was just edged by Mike Simmons of Carson, both timing 9.9.

In the 440, Andrews dropped behind in the first 220 and then turned on a strong stretch run for a 48.5, off the 48.0 he ran in Friday's heats. Rod Conners of Cordova (Sacramento) took first-place honors with a 47.7.

Willie Banks of Oceanside won his second straingt state triple jump title with a 50-7 mark, only two inches off the state meet record he set in Friday's trials. Marvin Blackwell of East was a non-scoring sixth at 46-10¹/₂.

In addition to its mile-relay win, Muir earned first places in both hurdle events from Fred Shaw. He stepped off the highs in 13.7, just off the state meet record of 13.8, then came back to take the lows in 18.8.

Cupertino guns for state

SAN JOSE — With surprise team champion Cupertino High pointing the way, a plethora of Midpeninsula track and field athletes found the road to Bakersfield in Friday night's Central Cost Section championships at San Jose City College.

The Pioneers scored 29 points in winning a rare back-to-back CCS crown, outdistancing Mt. Pleasant (21) and Los Altos (17) in the process.

Cupertino's title-winning performance highlighted an excellent combined Santa Clara Valley-South Peninsula Athletic League effort.

The two loops, which comprise Region II in the CCS, proved the class of the section by winning half the events in grabbing off 23 of the available 48 berths for the State Meet next weekend.

The SCVAL took 15 of the slots on

the strength of five first places with the SPAL producing three gold medalists among its eight state qualifiers.

Included among the SCVAL-SPAL highlights were sweeps (1-2-3) in the 440, low hurdles and two-mile, one-two finishes in the long and high jump and a one-three placing in the high hurdles.

Mark Mildbrandt spearheaded Cupertino's charge to the team crown. The consistent senior won the high hurdles in 14.4, anchored the mile relay team to a 3:21.2 victory — five seconds under the school record — and placed second to Los Altos' Dave Jakle in the low hurdles.

Another Mark, Insley, produced a third Pioneer victory with a 6-6 leap in the high jump while Don Finley picked up a second place in the log jump behind Woodside's Phil Robinson who leaped a lifetime best 23-2½.

Finley also ran the second leg on the mile relay.

Cupertino's biggest victory, which wasn't a win at all, was Roy Schablaske's third place shot put of 57-7.

"When he came through that really turned the meet around for us," said coach Norm Eliason.

Los Altos, one of the pre-meet favorites, fared poorly in the weights which severely hurt its chances. Rick Rossi did place fourth at 56-10 — more

than two feet off his best — but Brent Long did not place in the shot nor Kurt Vonagas in the discus.

Jakle's 19.7 around a turn in the lows was the Knights' only win, but Doug Hill ran well in taking thirds in both the 100 and 220 and anchored their 440 relay team to another third.

Silver Creek's Millard Hampton won both sprints easily, as expected, in 9.7 and 20.9, the latter time equaling his national best.

Muir Wins State Track Crown; Kimball Runs 4:06.6 and 8:46.5

BAKERSFIELD—It was a night to remember for Muir High and especially Fred Shaw.

And, even as Rich Kimball of De La Salle High in Concord was turning in a superlative mile-two-mile double in the 56th annual California State high school championships, Muir and Shaw were just as much in the spotlight.

Shaw, using "fright" as his motivation, won the high hurdles in 13.7 seconds and the lows in 18.9 before a crowd of 11,000 Saturday night at Bakersfield College.

And then he turned in a 47.7 third leg as the Mustangs capped the evening with a national best 3:13.8 clocking in the mile relay.

The mile relay was just the frosting as Muir had already clinched its third State title. Muir finished with 23 points to 14 for defending champion San Francisco Wilson.





Muir High School of Pasadena won the team championship behind hurdler-sprinter Fred Shaw, who captured the high hurdles in 13.7, low hurdles in 18.9, then ran a 47.7 third leg on his team's winning mile relay which had a national best clocking of 3:13.8.

Stealing the thunder from the local area were Patsy Cervantes of Corcoran, who finished second in the mile run in 5:08.9 behind a record-setting pace, and Alice Trumbly of Coalinga, third in the 880 in 2:13.7.

Both Miss Cervantes and Miss Trumbly set valley records during the Central Section championship track meet May 25 in Clovis.

The first girls' state champions were held in conjunction with the boys' meet, producing seven national girls' records, including a 5:02.2 mile by Jill Caldwell of Westminster. Berkeley took the girls' team title.

Scott Fairley Hits State Track Mark

Scott Fairley took aim on the state track and field pole vault finals Friday night in Bakersfield, fired and hit his mark.

Fairley, a vaulter on the Las Plumas High School track and field team who qualified for the state meet on May 24 in Oroville with a 13 foot, 8¼ inch vault, easily cleared 13-9 on his first attempt Friday night to move into the state finals on Saturday night with 13 other vaulters.

He vaulted 13-6 on Saturday night, according to his coach at Las Plumas, Norm Mac Kenzie, but his pole followed him through and he didn't make the mark on his second attempt.

The winner of the event cleared 15-6. "That's quite a field," said Mac Kenzie, "with some fine vaulters."

The only other track and field man to qualify from LP for the state meet was Fairley's nextdoor neighbor, a runner named Toni Ruggle, who went two years in a row. equalled the all-time best in the event with 9.4.

She stands almost as if preparing to start a race, left leg about two feet behind the right, staring intently at the bar. Before starting her run to the pit, she moves the left leg forward several inches and rocks back and forth.

The whole time, Suzy clutches a red rabbit's foot. "I wouldn't think of jumping without it," she commented Saturday between jumps. She raises rabbits and "I have a lot of faith in my rabbit's foot."

Williams made the long jump finals easily with a 23-9 ½ leap but was upstaged by Washington's Larry Johnson, who had a wind-aided 24-2 ¼. Roosevelt's Ron Malone failed to qualify, reaching 20-4 ½.

Simmons had the fastest time in the 220, 21.1, and Millard Hampton of San Jose's Silver Creek ran 21.2. The valley was shut out with Walker timing 22.1 and Ardes Gardner of South clocking 22.7. 

In the two-mile, Kimball and Hulst made it a private party almost immediately. Kimball was the leader for five laps, turning the first mile in 4:21.9. But Hulst, who had hung about 15 yards behind, made his move on the sixth lap and took a slim lead in 6:37.6.

They were dead even with 440 yards to go when Kimball sprinted out to a 20-yard lead around the first curve. He maintained that edge the rest of the way in breaking the record of 8:52.3 set by Santa Monica's Curtis Beck in 1972.

Kimball's time equals the fourth best in prep his-

Kimball's time equals the fourth best in prep history (the national record is 8:41.0 by Craig Virgin of Lebanon, Ill. in 1973) and he becomes the third fortest individual

Kimball Wins Twice

BAKERSFIELD-Even the most casual fan knew something special had happened. There was De La Salle's Rich Kimball circling the Bakers-field Community College track, receiving a standing ovation from 11,000 fans.

Kimball, shin splints and all, last night clocked the fastest ever mile, two-mile double at the 56th annual State Meet, won by Muir of Pasadena with 23 points. Defending champion Wilson of San Francisco was second with 14.

Kimball personally led his team to third, scoring all 12 points, while Kennedy of Richmond was fourth with 10. Berkeley High won the firstever girls' meet with 13 points, with La Jolla second at

Kimball won the two-mile with an 8:46.5 and turned in a brilliant final 220 yards to win the mile at 4:06.7. Last year's track Athlete of the Year, Craig Virgin, tried the double and won the two-mile at 8:42.6 and finished second in the mile at 4:12.2.

After winning the two-mile, Kimball admitted he wasn't sure of the mile.

"I wanted to run the twomile-definitely. It was the first time I've ever been able to run it without having to run the mile first," he said.
"My coach and I talked for

the entire time about the mile. I think I'd have run it, even if he had said no." Kimball gained the lead at the end of the third lap and turned in a 56.8 final 440 split to hold off Andy Clifford of Sunny Bills-Follerton.

Oakland's highest finisher* was triple jumper Don Jackson with a second-place 47-

"I'm out of shape," com-plained the Wildcat. "I've been in the hospital with appendicitis and will have it taken out next week. I feel almost bad about this. Don Bryson (who finished out of the running in the long jump) taught me to triple jump.'

Kennedy's strength was shown early when the team of Charles Johnson, Robert Gaines, Archie Barnes and Paul Jackson started the boys running events with a 41.4 first-place time in the 440

"Handoffs were the key," said sprinter Jackson, who came back to claim fourth in the 100. "We tried to make them almost out of the lane so we could get more speed. We thought all along we could win it. (Kennedy had the fourth best qualifying time, a 41.8)."

Monte Vista's Mark Wilson, pending national high jump record holder at 7-1%, had to settle for second place with a 6-10 jump. Wilson's Charles Hatch won the event with a 7-0 and then missed three tries at

Harry Ells Dedy Cooper. one of the favorites in the 120 highs and the 440, had to settle for seconds in both events. He lost the 120 highs to Muir's Fred Shaw, who also forced Las Lomas' Rich Graybehl into second in the

Cooper clocked a 13.8 to

Shaw's 13.7. "I hit the last hurdle," explained Cooper. "I thought I had him until that point." Cooper's 440 time was 48.2, while Graybehl was 18.9 in the lows.

Oakland was well represent-ed in the first girls' State Meet when Fremont's Yvonne Boone won the first-ever event - the 80 hurdles. 'I'm shocked,'' exclaimed Miss Boone. "I didn't think I had a chance."

Berkeley's 440 relay team of Sharon White, Annette Robinson, Marie Nickson and Terry Knight set a national prep mark with a 47.5. The pas record of 47.8 was set in 196 by Lebanon, Ore.

Pleasant Hill junior Kathy Costello broke her own pending national record of 2:13.3 as she ran away from the field in the 880 with a time of 2:10.4.

Berkeley's team title came down to the final event, with Marie Nickson running the 440 anchor on the winning 880 medley relay team. Robinson, White and Shirley Parker joined Nickson as the Jackets again set a national mark: Their time was 1:46.4.

Prep 2-Mile Mark

Rich Kimball of Concord's De La Salle high school set a State prep record of 8:46.5 with a two-mile victory Saturday night in the California Track and Field championships in Bakersfield, after winning the mile in 4:06.6.

Muir High of Pasadena won the team title with 23 points, with defending champion Wilson of San Francisco second with 13, De La Salle third with 12, and John F. Kennedy (Richmond) tied for fourth with 10.

Wilson's Charles Hatch won the high jump at 7-0; the Warriors' 440 relay team, which had won the state title two years in a row, finished third behind Kennedy and Gardena.

Muir's Fred Shaw won the high hufdles in 13.7, followed by Dedy Cooper of Ells (Richmond) in 13.8 and Wilson's Mike Kirtman, 14.0. Kirtman also contributed to Wilson's overall second place by taking fourth at 19.3 in the low hurdles, won by Shaw in 18.9.

Hatch's victory was especially impressive, since he had to outleap Mark Wilson from Monte Vista of Danville. Wilson, who set the national interscholastic record of 7-134 in the West Coast Relays, was second to Hatch at Bakersfield at 6-10.

Kimball, who had complained of leg problems earlier in the week, ran three tough races in two days. He was required to run a mile heat Friday night, and Saturday he received a good battle in the mile before edging Andy Clifford of Sunny Hills, Fullerton.

Not long thereafter, he overtook Laguna Beach's Eric Hulst on the gun lap for the victory which erased Curtis Beck's two-mile record of 8:52.3.

Wilson had been cofavored in the meet along with Muir of Pasadena. Hatch's victory helped the cause, but the third place in the 440 relay and Michael Farmer's failure to place in the 100 hurt the Warriors. Farmer didn't qualify in the 220-

The Wilson relay team had the fastest time of 41.2 in Friday's qualifying but clocked 41.6 in the finals, behind the 41.4 by Kennedy and 41.5 by Gardena.

Berkeley won the title in the first girls' state championships, scoring 13 points to 12 for La Jolla and Washington of Los Angeles. Jodi Anderson of LA Washington set a national girls record of 19-7 in the long jump.
