Serna Sets Record in CIF Mile

Loara's Ralph Serna stepped away for a record-setting win but three missteps were costly for Edison's Tom Lloy in the CIF Masters Meet Friday night.

A crowd of 7,367 at Cerritos College watched as Serna took command on the final lap and went on to win the mile in 4:08.3, breaking the CIF mark of 4:08.4 set by Lompoc's Terry Williams in 1973.

But Lloy, the two-time 4-A champion in the 880 and the winner of the event in this meet last year, wound up with nothing after apparently scoring an impressive victory in

Lloy, who sprinted the final 275 yards to hold off Larry Hayden of Sunny Hills, was disqualified for stepping on the line in his lane for three consecutive steps.

The mile was the highlight of the evening in the boys' competition as Serna came through against a strong field that saw the ninth-place finisher being clocked in 4:17.7.

Eric Hulst of Laguna Beach tried to take charge of the race, but first Jim Arriola of Gahr and then Serna refused to let Hulst pull away.

Hulst held a slim lead over Serna going into the final lap but Serna, who won the mile and two mile in last week's 4-A meet, took charge on the first turn with about 330 yards to go and pulled out to a 10-yard advan-

tage. Serna finished comfortably ahead with Huntington Beach's Robert Angel charging from far back to finish second in 4:09.7 just as he did in last week's 4-A competition.

Hulst faded to third in 4:10.2 and Arriola, who along with Hulst is a junior, took fourth in 4:11.0.

But Hulst bounced back impressively in the two mile, winning in a season best 8:51.8 as Serna took second in 8:55.0.

Hulst took the lead on the second lap with Serna and Brian Hunsaker of Corona del Mar close behind. It stayed that way until about 660 to go when Hulst moved powerfully and took a 10-yard lead on Serna with Hunsaker 20 behind.

Hulst maintained his edge the rest of the way. His time was the second best in the nation to junior Rudy Chapa of Hammond, Ind., who has run 8:51.0.

Other top boys' performances were by Pasadena's Ricky Jackson, who repeated his 4-A sprint double, winning the 100 in 9.8 and the 220 in 21.6 as Kennedy of Barstow junior Norris Jones was second in both races; Ken Conner of Estancia, who came through with a personal best of 6-10 in the high jump and Dave Kurrasch of Newport Harbor, who took the shot as expected with a mark of 65-101/2.


In the girls competition, four records were set including a pair by Centennial sprinter Leida Hunter, and RoyaL took the team title with 38 points to 33 for Muir.

Hunter clocked 11.2 in the 100 to break the record of 11.4 and 25.4 in the 220 to shatter the mark of 25.8. The other record breakers were Royal high jumper Julie Landl with a leap of 5-5 and the Royal 880 medley relay team, which was clocked in

Royal's victory in the latter event wrapped up the team title as Muir, which finished second, had to wind up at least two spots ahead of Royal to take the championship.

Top five finishers in both the boys' and girls' meets qualify for next weekend's State competition at San Diego . . . Kay Il-lertson of Valencia, the two-time defending champion in the girls shot put, was unable to compete because of a broken foot . . The pole vault, won by Aviation junior Brian Hintnaus at 15-0, was somewhat of a disappointment. Three of the four 16-footers, Brian Goodman of Agoura and Ti... Vahlstrom and Keith Schimmel of Villa Park, cleared only 14-8 but did qualify for the State meet, while Notre Dame's Brian Worden, with a best of 16-0, passed until the bar was at 14-8 and then missed three times. South Torrance's John Felando, the winner of the 3-A title last week at 15-1, missed three times at 13-6 . . . The Kennedy of Barstow team that won the 440 relay in a southern section equalling best 42.0, is made up of two sophomores, Gaylen Kelly and Larry Jones and two juniors, Norris Jones and Donnie Hill . . . Although Kurrasch did not equal his record-setting performance of last week when he threw 68-5, the shot put was outstanding overall with Dave Laut of Santa Clara (65-2), Brad Slinkard of St. Paul (64-101/4 and Mark Madison of LB Poly (63-21/2) all setting personal bests . . . Marcus Jennings of Ontario looked very good in winning the long jump at 24-33/4 . . . Serna's splits in the mile were 61.1, 64.3, a swift 61.9 and 61.0
