## **1976 CALIFORNIA TRACK OUTLOOK**

Overall the Bears are expected to be very strong in the sprints and all distances through the three mile with many quality performers and a great deal of depth, However, Hunt remains somewhat cautious about his squad's outlook in the field events.

The Golden Bears will be led by such quality sprinters as Wesley Walker (9.4/20.9), Elmer Haynes (9.3/20.8), Paul Wallace (9.5/21.2) and Dana Brewer (9.5/21.5) in the 100 yards and 220 yard dashes.

Hunt considers Cal very strong in the 440 as the Bears are led by Olympic hopeful James Robinson who clocked at 46.7 in 1975. Supporting Robinson are such performers as Mike Grasha (47.3), Ronnie

Sanders (47.8) and hurdler McKinley Mosely could provide more depth, if necessary along with Walker.

The 880 will feature a host of potentially talented individuals and again Robinson holds the best time among returning performers with a 1:49.1 which ranks sixth best among all-time Cal runners. San Francisco's Cirilo Morgan ran a 1:49.6 last year which ranks him ninth on the all-time Cal list. Newcomer Dan Barry (1:51.1) and letterman John Bay (1:52.6), both juniors, are looking to close in on the 1:50 mark in 1976.

Hunt will have a large group of milers to choose from, also, but most heralded is Andy Clifford who missed his freshman year because of a knee operation. Clifford has a 4:06.7 time to his credit the best time in the mile among Cal performers in 1975. Senior performer Chuck Harris is expected to improve on his best time of 4:09.3.

There will be several alternatives Hunt can choose from in the two-mile, three-mile and 3,000 meters. Sophomores Andy Nelson, Gary Blume, and Brad Duffey are rated as the leading candidates to handle the long distance chores and it should figure as one of the Bears' top events.

Cal features some quality depth in the hurdles. McKinley Mosley and Carl Florant head the contingent. Both share the finest time ever clocked by a Cal hurdler in the highs with 13.8 in 1975. Mosley sat out 1975 with various minor injuries but should return at top form.

Hunt feels there is significant improvement from 1975 in the hurdling events. In the Intermediate Hurdles Cal returns Steve Fullerton, who ran a 52.4 for the sixth best time in Cal history. Also back is Rich Roesky who clocked a 52.6 for the seventh best time at Cal and Mosely who holds the eighth best crocking, a 52.8 in the IH. Whereas Hunt feels that all of these groups have improved and should be much stronger in 1976, Hunt is a little more apprehensive of his appraisal of the field events.

Hunt has added to his staff former University of Arizona high jumper John Wedel to handle all of the field events. Wedel brings with him to Cal very impressive credentials. In 1975 he guided the field events for University of Texas-El Paso, the NCAA Champions. UTEP won the track championship with a heavy point total from their field events.

The Bears lack depth in the field events although they do have several individuals that could make things interesting in 1976 and provide unexpected points.

Brent Mannon is considered as the main man in both the discus and shot put events for the field squad. Mannon has a  $57'1 \ 1/3''$  put to his credit which ranks him seventh best in Cal history.

Three areas among the field events that Hunt feels will be improved are the pole vault, high jump, and triple jump events. Each event has experience and respectable depth. Pole Vaulter Larry Hintz and Ryon Payton have each cleared the 16' barrier and should improve their respective heights. Hintz cleared 16'0" as a freshman in '75 for the fifth best vault in Cal history, while Payton has cleared 16'1½" prior to coming to Cal.



Basketball performer Kenny Thompson is looking to add to his consistent 6'8'' high jump best while Tom Murphy will be working on improving his 6'10½'' career best. Both are

seniors and Hunt feels that they should show signs of improvement.

Another area that looks good is the triple jump. A trio of individuals show signs of making the triple jump also an improved area. Merced's Mike Dobbins jumped 49'3", winning the state prep title last year. But newcomers will find the competition strong as returning juniors Mark Thorp has leaped 48'3", tenth best in the Cal record books and Van Fendyan's 48'0" ranks right up there.

At this point Hunt sees the long jump as an open event with several performers having the ability to do the job. Farhad Newab, a transfer from Syracuse, is one of three 24' plus jumpers but Hunt feels that they all remain an unknown entity. Both Dobbins and Thorp have cleared 24' while freshman Mark Stepphan has leaped 22'6".

Both the triple jump and long jump are relatively open to several people according to Hunt. Several newcomers and some young returning lettermen offer promise of things to come but as yet Hunt hasn't had a chance to see them in competition and offers no predictions as to the strength of these events.

### ERV HUNT HEAD TRACK COACH UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA

Entering his fourth season as head track coach at the University of California, Erv Hunt is only the sixth man to hold this title in 75 years of Gold Bear track and field history.

Hunt has accomplished many things in his short, three-year span as head coach including an impressive 20-9 dual meet record and three consecutive victories over Oregon State. The fact that Cal team had only beaten OSU once prior to Hunt's three year streak says much for the man.

At the time of his appointment by former track coach and current Athletic Director Dave Maggard, Hunt was the youngest (24), track coach ever to be appointed as head coach in any sport at the University of California, Hunt is now 28.



Born and raised in Fresno, California, Hunt enjoyed both an outstanding prep and collegiate career in his hometown community. A three sport athlete at Edison H.S., he was a standout football player as a defensive back and wide receiver; played guard on the basketball team and was an excellent hurdler.

Hunt's accomplishments were many in all three of these sports but to briefly

highlight his prep and collegiate career, he ran a lifetime best 13.9 in the 120 high hurdles, finishing second in the high school state track meet. He also finished fourth in the Intermediate Hurdles with a 37.7 time. Hunt also "toyed" with several field events, most notably his 49'4" triple jump.

As a football performer, he was drafted in the sixth round by the Green Bay Packers in 1970. He also saw some action as a defensive back before having his career cut short by a back injury. While attending Fresno State and playing under Darrell Rogers, Hunt earned Little All-America honors as the Bulldogs won two conference titles.

Following his brief professional football career, Hunt returned to the Fresno area and taught elementary school for a brief time, later teaching at Clovis High School.

In 1972, Cal's head track coach Dave Maggard hired Hunt to handle the runners,

Hunt also has been awarded the Fellowship of Christian Athlete "Scholar-Athlete of the Year" award.

## JOHN WEDEL ASSISTANT TRACK COACH FIELD EVENTS

John Wedel joins the California track and field coaching staff this year with the field events assignment, something that he has done very successfully in the past.

Wedel joins the Cal staff after tutoring the University of Texas - El Paso field events performers. UTEP won two consecutive NCAA Track and Field Indoor Championships and the 1975 Outdoor title during Wedel's tenure. In 1975, he handled the field events when UTEP won the Indoor title, with the field events accounting for 30 of 38 winning points. Last year UTEP moved outdoors to win the NCAA title and again the field events paved the way, contributing 38 of the team winning 55 points.



Wedel was born and raised in the Los Angeles area. He attended Lynwood H.S. where he graduated in 1965. Developed into a fine jumper his sophomore year at Compton JC where he had a leap of 6'8".

His junior year he moved on to the University of Arizona where he high jumped 7'0", which marked him as the second man in that school's rich track

history to ever clear the seven foot barrier.

Upon his graduation he entered the national CPA firm of Coopers and Lybrand in Los Angeles. After a three year stint in the world of accounting, Wedel was offered an opportunity to join Dr. Jack Rose at Long Beach State.

It was his association with another one of Rose's assistants, Ted Banks, that led to the El Paso move, because in 1973, Banks was appointed the head track coach at UTEP and he encouraged Wedel to come along.

Wedel participated for the Pacific Coast Track Club in 1969 at the AAU meet in Florida. In 1969 he ranked as the 13th top high jumper in the United States.

He has helped mold such NCAA title or record holders as Hans Hogulund, shot put; Larry Jesse, Indoor Pole Valuter winner-18'0": Peter Farmer, Indoor 35 lb. & Hammer champion; Greg Joy, 1975 Indoor NCAA champion and record holder in the high jump; and Arnold Grimes NCAA Indoor Triple Jump champion -55'4".

#### AL RAGAN ASSISTANT TRACK COACH SPECIAL ASSINMENTS



Al Ragan has been breaking in California track coaches for over 49 years. In on capacity or another this extremely likeable and brilliant coach has been associated with the University of California since 1928. Every Cal coach has been aided by Ragan, going back to the Bears' first coach, Walter Christie, through the Brutus Hamilton era, Dave Maggard's stint and now Erv Hunt.

Once a great Bear hurdler, Ragan assumed the coaching duties himself for three years during World War II and his 1943 team defeated USC and went on to win the NCAA meet.

#### EDDIE HART ASSISTANT TRACK COACH SPRINTERS

Eddie Hart lends his world record expertise to the Cal track coaching staff for the fourth season at his alma mater.



Prior to his graduation from Cal, Hart won the NCAA 100 yard dash and was a double collegiate All-American in 1971.

Hart, now 26, equalled the world record for the 100 meters (9.9) in the 1972 American Olympic trials, and in Munich he anchored the U.S. 400 meter relay team to a Gold medal and equalling the world record of 38.2.

He will continue to assist Hunt by working with the Cal sprinters and the 440 relay team.

Currently Hart is teaching at the College of Alameda in the Physical Education department.

### BRIAN MAXWELL ASSISTANT TRACK COACH DISTANCE RUNNERS

Serving Erv Hunt in 1976 as a graduate assistant is Brian Maxwell. Last season Maxwell performed in Cal's long distance events, particularly the two mile and three mile events.



Born in London, England, he attended Victoria Park H.S. in Toronto, Canada. As a Canadian prep, Maxwell was the Canadian junior 5,000 meters champion and later ran the fourth fastest Canadian national 10,000 meters time (28:58,4). While at Cal, he established the fifth fastest two and three mile times as well as the school's fourth fastest 3,000 meters.

As a collegian, Maxwell earned a 3.5 GPA in architecture. He is also a potential Canadian Olympic Marathon performer for the 1976 Olympic Games, ranking as one of Canada's top three Marathon Runners.

Attended San Matco H.S. where he recorded personal best of 14'7". Should help the Golden Bears in overall depth in the pole vault.

### 440/880 SENIOR 46.7/1:48.0

World class 880 man. In 1974 while a sophomore at Laney JC clocked a lifetime best 1:48.0 which was the second best in the United States that season, the third fastest time by anyone in college and that time also established a JC national record. Expected to challenge for a spot on the U.S. Olympic team in 1976. In 1975 he recorded the sixth best Cal 440 time with a 46.7 as well as a sixth best 880 with a 1:49.1. Also anchored

the record setting 1975 mile relay team which clocked a 3:05.4. Robinson won the Pac-8 Championship in 1975 with his 1:49.1 880 time. Enjoyed a brilliant JC career while at Laney where he won JC 880 title two years. He also captured a second in the USA vs. USSR meet. Prepped at McClymonds H.S. Also lettered in cross country in both H.S. and JC. Majoring in Physicial Education at Cal.

Also ran the third leg of the

record setting Cal mile relay team (3:05.4 in 1975). Member of the Cal's Co-Pac-8 Championship football team. Has started as wide receiver for the past two seasons. Last year emerged as the premiere deep threat in the country. Led the nation in average gain per catch with 23.3 yards per snag. Gained over 800 yards receiving and scored nine touchdowns. This meet will be recognized as an Olympic trial qualifying meet and will, of course, determine the Pac-8 Champions for 1976.

## **UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA EDWARDS STADIUM**

Finished in 1932, and at the time the only "pure track" stadium in the world, Edwards Stadium has been the site of seven National Collegiate Championship Meets, one National AAU Championship Meet, All-American Invitational in 1966, and the 1932 IC4A Meet, the only time this meet had been held away from the East.

This stadium is named after Col. George C. Edwards, as is the field adjoining it to the east.

In 1957 the oval itself was dedicated in the name of Walter Christie, California's first track coach, 1900-32, and in the early sixties "the friends of California track," raised funds to build the Walter Christie bench which stands just outside the running track on the west side of the infield.

With funds that remained after the bench was built, the electric clock that stands atop the scoreboard to the North was purchased.

The track in the 22,000 seat stadium was completely redone in 1965 and is a composite of Fresno clay and cinders and is reddish in color.

Ten world records, 16 American records and at least 18 collegiate records have been set in this stadium.

## **NEW TRACK SURFACE IN 1977**

Historical Edwards Stadium, one of the finest track stadiums in the country, will get a new look for the 1977 season. Soon to be installed is a new all-weather track constructed of a synthetic surface. Weather conditions will no longer be a factor at Édwards Stadium and the new surface admittedly will help improve some of the great times that have been set in the 35-year old track stadium. This new surface is currently being bidded on by various installers and should be in sometime this summer. So in 1977, Edwards will take on a new look!

The University of California's athletic department fields nearly 25 varsity, junior varsity, and freshmen teams in 16 sports to place it as one of the largest and most comprehensive athletic programs in the nation.

Excellence, diversity, creativity and size are the hallmarks of the University of California at Berkeley.

## UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA BASEBALL OUTLOOK



Outfielder Alton Caesar hit .322 last year

Anticipating one of the finest baseball teams in memory, head coach Jackie Jensen's University of California baseball team returns 15 members of last years' 22-24 record finish.

However, where last year's team was young and inexperienced (only one member had any previous varsity experience) this year's club appears to be solid in all phases of fundamental baseball. It also has the given talent and now experience to make them a solid contender.

The Golden Bears finished

as the second among Pac-8 schools in team hitting with a solid .293 average. That department should improve, incredible as it may seem, as Cal returns six of the eight .300 plus hitters from last year's team.

Pitching is also solid for the Bears and as is always the case in baseball, it will have to be if the team is to be considered as a contender. While only three members of last years' pitching staff returns, two of them were the "aces" of last year's staff.

What should make this group stronger, besides the experience, is the newcomers from the JC ranks. Two of which are considered challengers for a starting rotation role.

However, Jensen finds himself in an enviable position with four contenders for the three starting spots. Currently he is carrying eight pitchers which is considered "plenty".

Jensen says of the 1976 Cal baseball team, "On paper, we are a very good baseball team. We now have the experience that we lacked last year. We have speed, power, and pitching. We plan to run quite a bit more than we did last year."

The speed and quickness Jensen hopes to put to a notable advantage for the Bears. "We hope that we can put our speed to use and take advantages of any mistakes that our opponents may make."

The Bears will score their share of runs with the hitters. Starting a batting order that features five .300 hitters from last year, the Bears can figure on being strong throught the batting order.

Last year, the Bears out homered their opponents 28-18 and Cal hitters drove in 225 RBIs whole pounding out 454 hits.

The third year Cal coach notes that, "We'll make runs, we have several players who are all capable and very strong power-wise."

Jensen does have his share of concern about the Bears defensively. If there is a weak area it may be in the defensive department. However, Jensen is quick to point out that his term "weak" is really an unfair comparison to the unusually strong hitting and pitching department. "We may be just average defensively," adds Jensen. "Our double play combination is not where I'd like it to be just now but defense is one of the things that the coaching staff plans to stress during practice."

However, the Bears are particularly strong in several areas of play namely, catcher and the outfield. The infield is experienced and should improve with practice and game experience. These areas have depth and quality.

Breaking down the various department of the 1976 California baseball squad, the team sizes up in this manner:

## PITCHING

Jensen does not consider this to be an over powering group, yet they are good because they know how to pitch. They will move the ball around on the hitters. Returning from last year's club is the top ERA man, Jeff Gleed, who finished with a 5-3 record and 2.56 ERA. Gleed finished seventh among the entire Pac-8 in ERA while pitching 77 1/3 innings. Joining him is Larry Kowalishen, a submarine style righthander who led last year's staff in strikeouts with 63 tying him for second among Pac-8 hurlers, Kowalishen worked the most innings of any Bear hurler last year as he appeared in 78 innings, while recording a 5-4 mark.

Expected to support this group are newcomers Jim Arkison and Ron Walton. Both pitchers are transfers from Citrus Junior College in Azusa, California. Arkison, a southpaw, will add a missing dimension to the pitching staff in 1976, a left handed starter. Arkinson in 93 innings worked recorded a 6-1 mark while striking out 42 and recording a 3.16 ERA. Arkison, however, will be strongly challenged for the other starting spot by Walton.

While earning a 12-3 record at Citrus, Walton struck out 68 in 116 innings pitched and walked only 33, and was named the Citrus College Player of the Year.

Supporting this foursome in the bullpen will be several leading candidates such as sophomore Joe Williams, returning letterman Tony Van Coops and JC transfers Kevin Brink and Mark Boehle.

#### HITTING

Definitely Cal's strongest department and one of the strongest in the CIBA. Led by the 1975 Cal co-MVP's Tim Hickerson led the Bears in hitting with a .392 clip and Dennis Barfield with a .331 average.

Joining them in the exclusive .300 club is catcher Tito Rael who batted .330; third baseman Danny Ahern, .342; first baseman, Kevin Kearney, .300 and outfielder Alton Caesar, .322. Add to this group outfielder Bill Piona's .285 average and Marshall Johnson's .257 and Cal's hitters' set the lineup for Jensen.

Tito Rael, not only hit .330 but also led the team in home runs with eight and drove in 26 runs. Kevin Kearney hit for an even .300 and led the team with 31 RBI's. Barfield picked up 54 hits, tops for a Bear in 1975. In fact, six different Cal Hitters drove in 20 or more runs last season. Barfield had 20, Hickerson had 21 to his record, Ahern knocked in 25, Rael 26, Bill Piona had 27 and graduate Cary Riddell had 22. Johnson also led the Bears in stolen bases in 1975 with 12.

The Golden Bears showed that they can hit in 1975 and every indication is that they will pick up where they left off, since the nucleus of talent returns.

#### FIELDING

Considered, overall as very sound. The outfield is very swift with Johnson, Hickerson, Caesar and Piona all possessing great speed and fine arms. They all return from last year and should improve on what was a good year. Having worked together as a unit should prove advantageous. Depth is there with three spots being challenged for by four quality performers. Definetly one of the Cal's stronger areas.

The infield returns also intact, and appears set. Very little room for newcomers because of all the returners hitting ability. Bob Silverman, up from the junior varsity is expected to handle third base forcing Danny Ahern to see less action in 1976. Both have the proven stick. Murray Wilson will handle the shortstop duties once again. Despite not hitting for the average, his fielding is more than adequate and Jensen can afford to keep him in the lineup with the abundance of hitters, he employes. Barfield is a potential All-America at second base, according to Jensen. He does everything well and carries a big bat. Defensively, he can make all the playes and has very good range. First base has two very talented performers splitting a lot of action in the early exhibition season between the incumbent Kevin Kearney and Tim Kenworthy. Both are seniors and Kearney should get the nod again in '76 with Kenworthy proving as an excellent back-up.

### CATCHING

Despite the injury to veteran Tito Rael, newcomer Len Patterson is expected to take over the receiving duties in 1976. Rael, when he recovers from his broken thumb will see the majority of his duty as a designated hitter. Nelson Sagisi will be the main defensive backup to Patterson. Overall, Cal has a great deal of versatility at this spot. Patterson is a complete receiver with a fine stick. Rael needs to be in the lineup because of his bat and the DH provides that opportunity and finally, Sagisi is a fine defensive performer that can spell Patterson when needed.

### **EVANS DIAMOND**

Evans Diamond, the home of the Bears, is a part of Edwards Field, dedicated in memory of Col. George C. Edwards in 1933. The diamond itself is officially named after Clint Evans, head coach of the Bears for 25 years from 1930 to 1954. Seating capacity is 3000.

The park's playing field dimensions are 338 down the left field line, 322 down the right field line, and 385 to dead center. Right field is enclosed by the high track stadium wall, over which few balls have ever been hit, while the left-field temporary fence curves out to about 365 in straightaway left.

## CALIFORNIA BASEBALL COACHES

#### JACKIE JENSEN, Head Coach

One of the all-time great athletes ever to perform for the University of California, Jackie Jensen, enters his third season as head coach of the Golden Bears baseball club.

His appointment by athletic director Dave Maggard in the summer of 1973 followed the retirement of George Wolfman and made Jensen only the eighth baseball coach ever at Cal.

Prior to his Bay Area return, Jensen had served as baseball coach at the University of Nevada and later as an administrator at that institution.

He brought with him to Cal a vast knowledge of baseball both as a player and student of the game as well as a legendary image that still lives in the Berkeley campus.

As an athlete, Jensen lettered in two sports baseball and football for the Golden Bears from 1947 through 1949. He earned All-America honors in football while participating in two Rose Bowls during his



collegiate football career. His football records were numerous but the most notable, his seasonal rushing mark of 1,080 in 1948 was not surpassed until this season when running back Chuck Munice broke most all the existing Cal rushing marks. Unquestionably, his football career record, impressive as they are, would rank higher, had he not chosen to opted for a professional baseball contract following his junior year.

He passed up his senior year for a contract with the Oakland Oaks. While only playing two years of college baseball (his freshman and junior years) Jensen saw outfield and relief pitching duties, posting a 0.95 ERA in the league season as Cal won the CIBA and went on to win the first-ever NCAA tourney. He did not play his sophomore year but returned as a junior in 1949, again splitting his time between the outfield and pitching. He hit .326 including a then record eight home runs and signed with the Oaks at the seasons conclusion.

Jensen then went on to a fabulous professional career that was highlighted by being named as the American League's MVP in 1958, as he hit .281 with 31 doubles, 35 homers, and a league leading 122 RBIs, while with the Boxton Red Sox. In seven seasons with the Red Sox, Jensen drove in over 100 runs five years and recorded 97 in yet another. Six times he hit over 20 home runs and posted his highest batting average in 1956 when he hit .315. Again in 1959, he led the league in RBIs with 112. His first year with the Red Sox, 1954, Jensen led the league in stolen bases with 22 and throughout his illustrious professional career was always regarded to have one of the finest throwing arms in baseball.

His hitting skills have been passed on through his coaching, as he has molded several of his student-athletes into fine hitters. Eight Cal regulars last year hit for .300 or better.

#### BOB MILANO, Assistant Coach



Versatile is an appropriate word to describe Bob Milano but not a "Jack of All Trades" because that would infer that Milano is a Master of none. Anyone that works with Milano knows that he is a master of any project he undertakes.

Besides serving as assistant to Jensen with the varsity baseball team, Milano also serves as assistant athletic director for the University of California. He also serves as an academic supervisor, oversees eligibility, awards, scheduling problems, travel arrangements for the football team, besides squeezing in the baseball tutoring.

Milano like Jensen is a former Cal baseball standout. He, too returned to his alma mater in the summer of 1973. Milano starred as a catcher in 1960 and 1961. He was the Bears leading hitter in his junior year with a .293 average and won All-Conference honors as the Bears tied for the league title with a 30-14 record. His senior year he co-captained the Bears and hit .357

Prior to returning to Cal, Milano recorded a highly successful stint at Burlingame H.S. from 1966-73, finishing with three MPL titles and only once did his teams finish with a sub .500 season. Four times he was chosen MPL Coach of the Year, 1967-1968-1972 and 1973.

Only 36, Milano and his wife Carol have four children Bobby, Paula, Laura, and Audrey. The Milanos' make their home in Castro Valley.
