Three Schools Share State Track Title on Windy Day

BERKELEY—Hamilton High dropped the baton in the 440 relay and failed to finish in the mile relay. San Fernando's Kevin Williams, the defending champion in the 100, was disqualified for two false starts.

So for the second time in the history of the California State high school track and field championships, three schools tied for the team title.

Hamilton, San Fernando and Kennedy of Barstow each finished with 12 points to share the team title.

The 58th annual meet before a crowd of 17,000 at California's Ed-

wards Stadium produced two national marks in the girls' division and three State records.

But the athletes were obviously hampered severely by a chill wind that buffeted the runners almost the entire day and a slow track.

For example, Billy Mullins' winning time in the 100 was 10.0, the first time the champion has not broken 10 seconds since 1955 (Ken Dennis of Centennial).

Mullins was running into a 71/2 m.p.h. wind while in the high hurd-

les, Lloyd Jones of Ganesha was going against a wind of 11 m.p.h. Jones' winning time of 14.5 was the slowest since 1952, when Selma's Ancel Robinson ran 14.5.

Mission's Willis 2nd in state meet

Bill Mullins (Hamilton High-Los Angeles) destroyed Mission's Tegail Willis' bid to snap a San Francisco 55-year losing streak in the 100 yard dash when he captured the century crown yesterday at the 58th annual California Track and Field meet at Edwards Stadium in Berkeley.

The 6-2, 185 pound senior was clocked in 10 flat running into a 7.5 mph wind, while Willis grabbed second with a 10.1. Mullins, the defending state champion in the 220, came back an hour later to win the furlong in 21.6, defeating Dupree Branch (Kennedy of Barstow), who was installed as the pre-meet favorite. In the struggle for the team title, there was a three-way tie for first with San Fernando, Kennedy-Barstow and Hamilton sharing the laurels with 12 points. This marked the first time in the history of the meet that there was a tie for the championship and none of the coholders of the title had won a previous state track crown.

Hamilton could have won the championship outright if the Yankees had not been disqualified in appeared the 6-5, 200-pound Mission the 440 relay when they dropped the baton while in first place. In the last event of the meet, Hamilton failed to finish the mile relay when Mullins pulled up with an injured leg. At that point the Yankees were battling for the lead with Pasadena and Banning (LA).

Also San Fernando's bid for sole possession of the team title dissolved when defending 100-yard dash titlist Kevin Williams was disqualified for two false starts in the century.

After four false starts the race got off and Willis quickly grabbed the lead. For the next 75 yards it

star would win the event easily. But Mullins, who had been complaining about a sore leg for the last two days, moved past Willis in the stretch, then outleaned him at the

Willis appeared to have a breakdown in the last 25 yards-a tendency he has been trying to correct over the last five races. This marked the first time Willis has been defeated in the century in over a month.

"I should have won the race," said a disgusted Willis. "I had it. Everything was going well for me. Even those false starts didn't bother me at all. My start was good; I was moving out like I wanted to: and I was just about ready to really turn on the speed.

Then all of a sudden, I lost my rhythm, started stumbling and the next thing I knew Mullins was next to me then moved past me. The thing that makes me angry is I know I can beat him."

Willis said one thing that hurt his chances of matching Eddie Sudden's 1920 victory for Lick Wilmerding in the 100 at the state meet, was his shoes. A spike on his left shoe had broken at the post.

"I'm not making excuses," he said, "I got beat and that's a fact. But something made me stumble near the tape. I could feel my shoe twisting. When I took them off I could see the spike just dangling at the post. If I had known the shoes were that bad off, I'd gotten a new pair before this meet. But I didn't, so I lost. Maybe the shoe had nothing to do with it, maybe it did. That's something I'll never know."

Willis hopes he'll have a chance to avenge his loss to Mullins in two weeks at the Golden West Invitational at Hughes Stadium in Sacramento.



Bob has been a promising runner since arriving at DeAnza High as a 9th grader in February 1973. He obviously loves to run. He loves the entire track atmosphere, he is also very intelligent and playful, and he has a non-stop sense of humor.

He was little as a 9th grader, about 5-4 and 110 pounds, so his early running successes—confined to dual meets—seemed heightened. "Look at that little kid run. Watch little McMeans," became familiar phrases around DeAnza.

It was as a junior that Bob started to fulfill his promise. Larger, 5-8 and 125 pounds, he seemed to have more confidence. A letter that preceded his arrival to school that year said, "I know you're the coach, and that's the way it should be; but I've been writing Jeff Galloway (one of America's better runners and a former Olympian) and I have some ideas about training. Remember that my goal is to run the mile at the State Meet."

That junior year he doubled two wins in league: the mile in 4:24 and the two-mile in 9:54. The next week, driving from last on the last lap (and driving me crazy), he took the Division mile in 4:23. At the Section meet he eased up in the last 110 and finished third in 4:20.

Bob had qualified for State. His ambition had materialized.

That next Friday at Balboa Stadium in San Diego Bob found himself in the first of two heats. His time in the Section ranked him 23rd. out of 27. He ran 4:16.8, 5th in his heat, but as it turned out, the fastest qualifying 5th which put him into the final with eight other milers. He had beaten 4:08 and 4:11 milers in the heat. He was one of two juniors in the final. Saturday he ran 8th in 4:18.1. It was the first time he had run hard competitively two days in a row. Bob said, "We'll have to remember that next year. I would like to run the West Coast Relays Friday night and come back to the Castro Valley Invitational on Saturday so I'll be ready for State."

This past track season may have been somewhat frustrating for Bob. It really shouldn't have been as it was capped by his second State Meet mile final and an improvement from 8th to 5th. But he really didn't run the time he was capable of and he had a couple of bad races this year.

Bob is a run from behind type and the State Meet final was a slow, tactical race on a slow track on a very windy day. His workouts indicated he was at least 6 seconds faster than last year when he ran 4:16. His best this year, winning the Meet of Champions mile the week previous to State, was 4:15. At the State Meet trials, when he finished 3rd in his heat in 4:16, he could have easily gone 4:12. I actually thought 4:08 to 4:10 was well within his scope.

But he is not about to stop running: University of Washington, Oregon State, San Mateo College or Contra Costa College will probably have him next

year. 4:05 should be an optimal goal for next season. The 5,000 in 1980 is a real possibility.

As for Bob's training? Bob says it best. "I have maintained a constant improvement in my times every year since I began competing. I attribute this to consistency. I'm not into high mileage yet. I'll work up to it eventually. Last season as a junior I averaged 30-35 miles a week from September to June. This season my average weekly mileage was around 40-50 miles. The longest week being 52 miles and the shortest 30 miles.

"I also maintain that the consistency of my program is responsible for my being injury-free. believe a program of this type is necessary if continual progress over a number of years is to be expected. Next year's mileage will probably be around 50-60 but I don't worry about these details. I just do what feels right although we do have a basic plan.

We begin the year with larger intervals, say 4 or 5 interval miles in 5:00 with a mile jog. As the year progresses the distances of the intervals shrinks, and are run at faster speeds.

"I very much enjoy competition. I have a Ron Clarke compulsion to compete to test myself. I enjoy racing so much that I usually run two or three races in our dual meets and I compete in road races and all comers meets in the off season."

HIGH SCHOOL STATE MEET

Billy Mullins won the 100 and 220 but his favored Los Angeles Hamilton team settled for a three-way tie with Barstow Kennedy and San Fernando for the Championship at the 58th. California High School Track & Field Meet.

Hamilton got off on the wrong foot as they dropped the baton in the 440 relay at the Berkeley based meet. Later in the day the Yankees' mile relay team failed to finish as anchor man Mullins, who was in ninth when he took the stick, pulled up lame.

San Fernando also suffered a major set back and could have possibly walked away with the team crown had defending the champion Kevin Williams not been minated with two false starts.

Mullins, who's winning times were not impressive due to a strong cold headwind at Edwards Stadium, accounted for an twelve of Hamiltons points. Norris ones was the big man for Kennedy as he picked up thirds in both sprints and anchored the winning 440 relay to have a hand in all of their points. For San Fernando Charles White saved the day by winning the 330 low hurdles

The other two records were broken by the girls. Marquite Belk of Silver Creek in San Jose ran 55.2 in the 440 to break the mark of 55.3 shared by Washington's Jodi Anderson and Terra Linda's Veronica Venezia. Anderson placed fifth this year.

Sophomore Kim Grosswiler of Upland did 5-10 in the high jump to shatter the record of 5-8 shared by Pam Blackburn of Cubberley and Kim Maddox of Los Angeles. Candy Ross of Berkeley also broke the mark by clearing 5-9, while Blackburn equaled her old record in third place.

Two other records were bettered but were disallowed because of excessive wind. Jodi Anderson leaped 20-01/4 in the long jump to win the event for the third straight year, while Fremont's Greg Caldwell won the triple jump with a windy 51-81/2.

Two boys successfully defended their State Crowns and two failed. Mullins repeated in the 220, making him the only boys double winner in 1976. Eric Hulst of Laguna Beach won his second straight two mile with an 8:57.4, off his best of 8:44.6.

Besides defending 100 champ Kevin Williams, who was eliminated for two false starts, long jumper Paul Wilson placed second to Larry Doubley's)Manual Arts) wind aided 25-3¾ to give up his title.

The meet was not without it's disappointments. State 120 high hurdle leader, Tom Bobertz of Serramonte (Daly City) who had earlier clocked 13.8 failed to make it to the finals. And, 4:02 miler Thom Hunt who had been ill with a strep throat could only manage seventh in 4:22. Keith Taylor of Piedmont Hills in San Jose was disqualified after running the fastest heat time of 47.9 in the quarter mile. Judges said he ran out of his lane.

The athletes felt many marks were sub par due to the chill wind that buffeted them most of the meet. For example, Billy Mullins' win in the 100 was 10.0, the first time the champion has not broken 10 seconds since 1955 (Ken Dennis of Centennial). Mullins was running into a 71/2 mile per hour wind while in the high hurdles, Lloyd Jones of Ganesha was bucking a breeze of 11 MPH. Jones winning time of 14.5 was the slowest since 1952, when Selma's Ancel Robinson ran 14.5. Another indication of how the wind hampered the runners was that mile winner Jim Arriola's time was only 4:14.6, slowest since Bruce Bess ran 4:14.8 in 1961. Next year's meet will be held at UCLA's Drake Stadium.

Steve Montgomery of Lassen High in Susanville set the only boys' meet record with a shot put of 68 feet to break the mark of 67-31/4 set by Jim Neidhart of Newport Harbor in 1973. Steve also finished second in the discus to Fresno's Scott Endler.

Films improve fifth place finish

Newell gets third in state finals

Chula Vista track coach Harry Taylor was so upset at the way the final placings in the 100-yard dash were determined at last Saturday's state track finals that he protested the race.

As a result, Spartan Standout Hildria Newell is now regarded as the third best century sprinter in the state.

When the jury of appeals reviewed the race of the 100 Saturday night, it was evident the judges at the finish line had made a severe error. Instead of finishing fifth as the judges had claimed, it was discernible that Newell had actually taken third in the race.

"WE'RE APPEALING the race," Taylor had said after the

race Saturday afternoon when it was announced Newell finished in fifth place. "It was clearcut from where we_(himself and other San Diego coaches) stood that he took third. This wouldn't be the first mistake the judges have made because they made several mistakes on races yesterday (in the prelims)."

Newell, after breaking out of the starting blocks in his customary slow fashion, had caught up with the leaders with 30 yards to go and was just a couple steps behind them when they crossed the finish line. Running into an eight-mile-perhour wind, Newell was timed in 10.1, just a zick behind the 10.0 clocked by Billy Mullins of Los Angeles Hamilton.

"Of course I'm delighted with

the decision," Taylor said. "I knew once they saw the film there would be no question about it."

NEWELL WAS the first Metro League athlete to place in the state finals since Tony Barrows of Mar Vista captured fifth in the pole vault in 1974.

"Hildria is the best sprinter we've ever had." Taylor said. "He wins both sprints in the league finals, is a double winner in the county meet, and now takes third in the 100 in the state meet."

Newell also became the second track athlete from Chula Vista High School to place in the state finals.

MOREOVER, the improvements of Newell's

finish cost Kennedy high school of Barstow a tri-championship for the state title with Los Angeles Hamilton and San Fernando.

Kennedy's sprinter, who was originally given third, was dropped to fourth in the shuffle and thus the school lost a point and the crown.

Tim Danielson, the holder of the second fastest prep mile ever in the nation was the first to accomplish the feat, winning the state mile in both 1965 and 1966.

Danielson earned national acclaim for himself on June 11, 1966 when he ran a 3:59.4 mile in Balboa Stadium. Only Jim Ryun has logged a faster mark. Marty Liquori ranks third behind Danielson.

3rd place in 100 protested

BERKELEY — Chula Vista High track coach Harry Taylor lodged a protest on behalf of Spartan sprinter Hildria Newell yesterday afternoon when Newell, an apparent third place finisher in the 100, was awarded fifth place by the judges.

Carlmont runner wins state half mile

Pam Blackburn of Cubberley was so relaxed she couldn't get up for the finals in the state high school track and field championships.

Wyatt Bishop of Carlmont simply couldn't believe he was up.

Blackburn placed third in the girls' high jump while Bishop won the boys' 880 in the 58th annual California Interscholastic Federation meet Saturday at Berkeley's Edwards Stadium.

"I was standing up on that thing (the victory stand) and I still didn't think it was me," said Bishop after his 1:54.4 half mile, slowest winning time in a CIF meet in 18 years.

Bishop, though he narrowly edged four runners in a blanket finish, threw up his hands at the tape as if positive he had won.

Actually, the gesture was born more from reflex than out of confidence.

"My coach (Loren Lansberry) always told me even if it's very close to raise your hands symbolically at the finish."

Bishop's victory is the first by a boy from the South Peninsula Athletic League since Ron Larrieu of Palo Alto won the mile in 1956.

Blackburn, gunning for her second high jump crown in three years, said "I was totally relaxed and maybe that's what was wrong.

"Yesterday (Friday) I was more intense because I had to make the top nine. And today ... it just wasn't the same."

The 17-year-old Blackburn, participating in her third state meet as was Bishop, cleared 5-8 on her second attempt but then missed three times at 5-9 to bow out of the competition.

Sophomore Kari Grosswiller of Upland, Southern Section, won the event at 5-10, breaking Blackburn's meet record 5-8 in the process.

"I had a few things that weren't right on," said Pam. "I could have had 5-10 today if I pulled everything together. But it just didn't feel right."

In addition to Bishop and Blackburn, the Midpeninsula had one other top five finisher in Lynbrook's Kris Costello who placed second in the girls' 80 low hurdles in 10.8.

Costello also ran in the 220 final and finished seventh in 26.2 after a check of Friday's films showed her third in her trial heat, not a non-qualifying sixth as originally announced.

The only other boy competing in the finals was Carlmont's Bob Love who placed 15th in 9:26.7 in the two-mile. Los Altos' Perrin Brew was ninth and last in the long jump at 17-24 while teammate Vicki Bray ran 10th and last in the mile in 5:16.7 in the girls' division.

Only one meet record fell in the boys' division as Steve Montgomery of Lassen, Susanville uncorked a 68-0 throw in the shot put. Greg Caldwell of Fremont, Los Angeles surpassed the triple jump standard of 50-9 with a 51-8½ record leap that was disallowed due to excessive wind.

Marquita Belk of Silver Creek, San Jose, the Central Coast Section's only champion other than Bishop, set a second meet record in the girls' division by winning the 440 in 55.2.

Additionally, two girls' marks were established in new events.

CCS boys garnered one second place, three thirds and four fourths in addition to Bishop's first.

Del Mar's Tod Lovejoy was second in the pole vault (14-10) while teammate Blake Fernside tied for third in that event, also at 14-10. Other thirds went to Lick's Pete Moreno in the triple jump (wind-aided 51-11/4) and Piedmont Hills' sprint relay (42.0).

Finishing fourth were Glenn Cannon of Mt. Pleasant in both sprints (10.1 and 22.0) and on the Cardinals' 440 relay (42.1), and Silver Creek's Andre Phillips in the 330 low hurdles (37.3).

CCS girls had seven finishers among the top five including Belk, Costello and Blackburn.

Billy Mullins of Hamilton, Los Angeles was the only double-winner in the boys' division, capturing the 100 in 10.0 and the 220 where he was the defending champ in 21.6.

Hamilton, Kennedy of Barstow and San Fernando shared the boys' team title with 12 points, the first tie in history.

Hamilton blew its chance at claiming the crown outright when it dropped the baton in the sprint relay, and did not finish in the mile relay when Mullins walked off the track with his team far behind in last place.

Berkeley took the girls' team championship for the second time in three years with 20 points. Fremont of Los Angeles was second with 13.

BERKELEY—Hamilton High dropped the baton in the 440 relay and failed to finish in the mile relay. San Fernando's Kevin Williams, the defending champion in the 100, was disqualified for two false starts.

So for the second time in the history of the California State high school track and field championships, three schools tied for the team title.

Hamilton, San Fernando and Kennedy of Barstow each finished with 12 points to share the team title.

The 58th annual meet before a crowd of 17,000 at California's Ed-

wards Stadium produced two national marks in the girls' division and three State records.

But the athletes were obviously hampered severely by a chill wind that buffeted the runners almost the entire day and a slow track.

For example, Billy Mullins' winning time in the 100 was 10.0, the first time the champion has not broken 10 seconds since 1955 (Ken Dennis of Centennial).

Mullins was running into a 7½ m.p.h. wind while in the high hurd-
