Chambers, a native of Jamaica, broke the Briggs Cage record in the triple jump with a leap of 48 feet, 9 inches and captured the long jump at 23-9, a Northeastern record that broke the oldest mark on the school's record books—a 23-7 performance by Sal Mazzocca in 1947.

Another standout for Northeastern was Mark Lech, the long-striding junior from Palmer, Mass., who caught Harvard's Gary Schmidt with a 1:12.8 performance in the 600, then anchored the winning two-mile relay in 7:52.2, another Briggs Cage record.
