RICE INVITATIONAL Marks Unseasonably Great

Dallas, March 8 /from J. Fred Duckett/-You wouldn't have guessed it was early in March, the way prime-season marks flew at the Rice Invitational.

Take Texas A&M vaulter Randy Hall, for instance. He previewed his NCAA indoor win with his first-ever 18-footer, an 18-1/2 clearance that makes him =6th on the all-time collegiate list.

"I felt like at least a 17-6 today, but not an 18-footer," said Hall. "I knew it would come, but I didn't want to get impatient. I didn't want to peak out too early."

Take Hall's teammate, Leslie Kerr, the No. 9 1-lapper in the country last year. He snipped 0.06 off his PR with a world-leading 45.45. Kerr closed the day with a 45.0 relay leg, and he needed all of that to run down Zeke Jefferson of Baylor and pull the Aggies to a 3:05.34 to 3:05.92

Take Baylor's Todd Harbour, who won a 1:47.42 (PR)/3:43.89 double inside an hour. "I was surprised I did so well in the 800," he revealed after his second victory.

Take Houston's Carl Lewis, the prep long jump record holder, who didn't even contest his bread and butter event.

Instead, he ran only the 4 x 100 relay, stunning everyone by taking the baton 3m behind Curtis Dickey and actually exploding by the Texas A&M star in the last 20m to win by a couple of strides, 39.54 to 39.60.

"I was tight," explained Dickey, who has been spending most of his time recently flying around the country taking physical exams with pro football teams. "It gets very tiring," he concluded.

FLORIDA RELAYS Bad News/Good News Wind

Gainesville, Fl., March 29-30-Strong winds buffeted the Florida Relays and, while Earl Bell benefitted from the breezes, they also helped nullify some fine vaulting.

Asked if he thought the bar would have stayed on anyway, Bell replied, "Yeah, I think so. But then I would think so, wouldn't !?"

The standards had to be readjusted for Bell's WR attempts; his first pair weren't close but his final effort saw him just nick the crosspiece off the pegs.

"I made the mistake of not making my first attempt a good one," Bell said. "It was a World Record and I let it get to me."

All the jumps produced fine efforts as Larry Myricks (26-81/4) and Robert Cannon (55-3%) received illegal aid from the wind.

In the javelin, '77 national champ Bruce Kennedy popped a PR 271-3 in the rain-delayed event, upping his best from the 269-8 he reached earlier in March.

Tempe, Az., April 5 /from Greg Harney /- Throwing efforts stood out at the 1st Sun Angel Classic and, even though men's giants such as Jesse Stuart (66-10%), Ken Stadel (219-11) and Duncan Atwood (272-11) produced fine efforts, Lorna Griffin stood tallest.

Griffin didn't even win the discus-Collegiate Record setter Meg Ritchie took care of that with her 200-6 spin-but she boosted her own American Record to 192-1, tacking 11" onto the mark she reached last year.

Ritchie never trailed, while it took Griffin 4 rounds to warm to the occasion-a fact the national record holder noted with some dismay.

"I was really crappy in warmups," she said. "I had 2 fouls out of the sector. A lot of stuff I had been working on-like relaxing and not tensing up-just went out the window."

Stuart paced 3 putters beyond 66 feet, hitting 66-10% for the 2nd-longest outdoor throw of his career. Bishop Dolegiewicz hit 66-6 and Al Feuerbach 66-1%.

"Not exactly heart-warming," said Feuerbach, "but I guess 66 feet isn't bad for any of us for this time of year."

In other notable performances, NCAA 400 champion Kasheef Hassan won his specialty in 45.94 and commented later. "I'm in decent shape, but not really good. I haven't pushed myself in training yet. Right now I'm getting by on natural speed."

Randy Williams popped 26-8 on his second long jump and then withstood a final-round leap of 26-7% by Charlton Ehizuelen. That's Williams' longest legal outdoor leap since the 26-94 he jumped in 1973 as a college sophomore.
