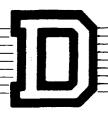

Dear Coach:

One of our main responsibilities as Dartmouth coaches is to introduce both the college and our programs to those extremely gifted student-athletes who seek and deserve the best in both teaching and coaching. Dartmouth has a long and prestigious history of extraordinary accomplishments in both areas and continues each year to attract thousands of applicants. It is our serious concern, in spite of this deserved popularity, that many extremely gifted people, completing their high school years, are not aware of Dartmouth College and what it offers. To this group of excellent student-athletes who may not normally think of applying to Dartmouth or who do not know of the college, this letter, through you, is directed.

Dartmouth, with an enrollment of 4000, is a multi-faceted academic complex exploring the new frontiers of the mind and society. It is located in the unspoiled town of Hanover, N.H. on the east bank of the Connecticut River. It is a teaching institution where the emphasis is on attracting the best possible student body to its distinguished faculty. On campus intellectual life fills the spectrum from the arts to engineering, from medicine to business administration. Dartmouth Medical School is the fourth oldest in the nation. Dartmouth is also the home of the Thayer School of Engineering, founded in 1871, the Amos Tuck School of Business, the first graduate school of business administration when it was founded in 1900, and the graduate programs of the Faculty of Arts and Sciences. Though Dartmouth does not offer athletic scholarships, no student, whatever their financial situation, ought to discount Dartmouth whose financial reserves provide a most generous financial aid program on the basis of need.

Dartmouth College, however, is not for every student. Indeed, it is attractive, generally, only to a special type; those who have an unusual motivation to excel and who have demonstrated, in high school, that they are the academic and extra-curricular leaders of their school. It takes considerable talent, discipline, and determination to excel in the rigorous academic and athletic environment of Dartmouth. Accordingly, let us be quite specific in describing the type of student we are looking for.

First, and above all, academic excellence must have been demonstrated or the student would have little chance of being accepted in this college where the admissions standards are formidable (but please inquire with regard to students academically disadvantaged by geographical, financial, or minority conditions). Though no rigid rules or numerical absolutes operate it is recognized that with the exception of disadvantaged students one should have a combined total on college boards near 1100 or above to be seriously considered, as well as a class rank in the top 10% of the class.

At this point in your outdoor season we had hoped that you would be so kind as to complete some of the cards regarding your outstanding junior class team members whom you think might be qualified <u>academic</u> and athletic candidates for Dartmouth College. It would be most helpful if you would include the student's best track and field statistics as well as their academic credentials.

The application deadline for Dartmouth College is January 1, 1988 therefore it is important that we receive your recommendations as soon as possible in order for us to contact those students with the appropriate information.

DARTMOUTH MEN CAP CINDERELLA CROSS COUNTRY SEASON

HANOVER, N.H. -- The Dartmouth men's cross country team, with a third Heptagonal Championship and the first IC4A Championship since 1943 already under its belt, capped off the 1986 season with a surprising second-place finish November 24 at the NCAA Championship in Tucson. Ariz.

The runner-up finish was the highest ever recorded by an Ivy League or Heptagonal school and was the top performance by a New England representative in the meet since Rhode Island won in 1941.

"I don't know if it can get any better than this," said Coach Vin Lananna. "It was truly a great performance by our kids. They ran even better than I could have dreamed."

Pre-race favorite Arkansas won the championship easily with 69 points while Dartmouth was next with 141 and Boston University third with 147. Oregon, Colorado, Arizona, Illinois, Florida, Texas and Northern Arizona rounded out the top 10.

The Green's top finisher was Bob Kempainen (Minnetonka, Minn.) who placed fourth. He was an All-America at last year's race with a 14th place finish.

Also scoring for Dartmouth were sophomore Mike Donaghu (Madras, Ore.), who took 23rd, along with classmate Tom Paskus (Terryville, Conn.), who was 29th. Sophomores Brian Lenihan (Avon, Conn.) and Mike Andrews (Babylon, N.Y.) closed out the Dartmouth scoring by placing 43rd and 49th, respectively.

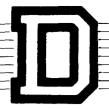
Senior captain Ron Snow (Concord, N.H.) and sophomore David Aman (Liverpool, N.Y.) also competed for the Big Green although they did not figure in the team scoring.

"We ran a bright, intelligent race from the gun," said Lananna. "It was business as usual for our guys. Sometimes when a big race is over there are things you wish you had done differently. But this time there was no 'would've, could've or should've.'"

Lananna said that his team, which trains and runs on the hilly Hanover Country Club, found the course at La Canada Golf Club to its liking, despite occasional patches of sand and two short stretches of macadam. "It played to our strengths," he said. "We were ready for the hills."

The Dartmouth coach was guardedly optimistic coming into the race and ecstatic afterward. He had hoped for a top-10 race and privately figured the squad could go even better than that. How much better, even he couldn't have predicted.

"For a team that doesn't offer scholarships to place second in the nation is unbelievable," Lananna said. "We had seven kids, seven good, hard workers out there. I feel very fortunate just to have been a part of it. I don't know what we could do for an encore."
