1992 CIF / Reebok California High School State Meet

June 5 & 6, 1992. Cerritos.

The always super-exciting California State Track Meet, this year's the Seventy-Fourth. A crowd of 10,320 came to Saturday's Meet, with the scheduling of Finals' action a bit earlier than in the past seeming to work out fine. Southern Section Associate Commissioner Dean Crowley, Meet Manager Earl Engman, and staff deserve another hearty "thank you" from all participants, coaches, and those with an interest in the sport for another "job well-done." Marion Jones is always at her best for these meets, with some exciting team contests along the way, but you need to read on for that.

Qualifying for the Finals in this Meet on Friday is done with four heats in all running events except for the 1600 and 3200. The winner from each heat and the next five fastest times from all of the heats combined move on to the nine athlete finals. In the 1600 the first three from each of two heats and the next three fastest times beyond those places moved on to the Finals. The 3200 was a Saturday only, "one race," finals event. Nine athletes from field event qualifying are forwarded into Saturday's Finals.

Boys

100 Meters

This sprint event would be a great one. The state had a large group of talented athletes who seemed very close on paper. The Sac Joaquin section was particularly strong, with junior Anthony Volson (Merced) 10.47w-10.54 and soph Ali Evans (Vallejo) 10.59-10.43w, and 10.60w not get-

ting out of the Section Finals on to state. Riley Washington (Southwest, San Diego) was 4th in State in 1991, with a 10.55 from his '92 Section Finals. Amazing frosh duo from West Bakersfield, Marques Holliwell (10.62) and Bryan Howard (10.66), were for real, with Holliwell taking Volson and Washington in the Arcadia 100, with the duo all within .01 (and Washington sick the week of that meet). Shon Lewis (Wilcox, Santa Clara) was 10.64, Dione Tyler (Millikan, Long Beach) improving to 10.67 in his Section Finals, and Frank Madu (McAteer, San Francisco) 10.66 a tough veteran.

State Prelim action went pretty true to form, with soph Ali Evans winning heat 1 narrowly over Football star, Shon Lewis 10.61-10.63 (wind +1.44), with Sac Joaquin power continuing through the other heats. Anthony Volson took race 2 at 10.56 (+1.19 wind), with Brian Lewis winning Heat 4 at 10.59 (wind +1.32). Heat 3 was interesting, with Gentry Bradley, always thought of a much better 200m runner, racing down quick starting Riley Washington 10.51-10.55 (+1.66). Surprise of the Heats was Paul Turner (University City, San Diego), as his 10.64 brought him close to Lewis near the end of their race. Unfortunately, fine frosh Marques Holliwell (West Bakersfield) was the 10th time and non-finalist at 10.70, with a great Championship race assured with nine athletes with bests of between 10.51 and 10.69 in the Trials.

The Finals of the 100, as interestingly as these great match-ups sometimes go, was a total blow-out, with one very capable athlete putting it all together here and leaving a super group in his wake. The wind was +1.97 meters per second behind the athletes as they toed the line at 5:00 on Saturday evening. Soph Ali Evans was the

only one noticeably behind the group out of the blocks. At the twenty meter mark when athletes came to the upright position after their low acceleration from the blocks, Riley Washington was starting to already edge away from the field. With some varying rates of acceleration and deceleration among those in the event one expected someone to move on the flying San Diegan, but it just never happened. Washington pow-

ered into the tape a full two meters ahead of the fast-firishing Gentry Bradley, with even those very conservative hand-timers in the stands amazed at the times their stopwatches read, with all sure that they had watched something very impressive with Washington's margin of victory. The results were simply the best 100 meters ever run in a State Finals event, with Washington not marginally lowering Henry Thomas's 10.44 from the 1984 one-day State Meet, but reducing it massively, to 10.30, among the top fifteen prep times ever run, and the equal number

two Californian prep clocking ever with Quincy Watts' 10.30 at altitude from 1987 and just behind Henry Thomas's all-time best of 10.25 from 1985. It is hoped that the University of Nebraska-bound footballer will have time for track in College. The pack behind Washington was quick, with Bradley (10.46), and the Sac-Joaquin underclass duo of Volson (10.50) and Evans (10.52) finishing next.

200 Meters

The longer dash event would be another strong one, with Gentry Bradley (Pius X, Downey) taking over the national lead for a time with a 21.19 in the Southern Section Divisional affair. Anthony Volson (Merced) was 21.18w in the Section Meet and 21.33 wind legal earlier. With Mt. Pleasant (San Jose) having dropped the baton in the 4x100 in Section action (after a 41.15 earlier in the year), defending State 400m champion Richard Dupree (46.72 there) would be dangerous here (21.32w-21.56). State 400 leader Derek Sheppard (46.68) was solid at 21.24w, with Ali Evans (Vallejo) around again at 21.48 (21.37w), and Shon Lewis (Wilcox, Santa Clara) 21.58. Better known earlier in his career as a Long Jumper, Scott Hammond (Lincoln, San Diego) had improved to 21.42 (21.31w), with fellow San Diegoan Riley Washington (Southwest) 21.59 in winning that Section. There were a lot of fast people!

The fine sprinting of this weekend continued over 200 meters, but it was mixed in with a little tragedy. Anthony Volson continued to show the Sac Joaquin power, taking Heat 1 in 21.48 (wind +1.29), with Riley Washington, smarting from a Prelims 100 defeat by rival Gentry Bradley, blasting the entire event in Heat 2 to record the equal #4 clocking in the nation at 21.08. Richard Dupree (Mt. Pleasant, San Jose), who runs with a short, economical looking stride, appeared to be far from all-out in taking heat 3 at 21.33w (+2.29) after racing past early leader Brian Lewis off the turn. Heat 4 was where tragedy individually and team-wise struck. Soph Ali Evans could not hold in the blocks, and moved so obviously early off the line that the starters, who seemed very generous to athletes in marginal jump situations this weekend, really had no choice but to disqualify the young athlete favored to place high here and help the Vallejo team scoring. James Redd (Fontana) moved to a Heat 4 win Evans' absence in 21.50 (+1.74). Again, with everyone together and pushing all-out in the Finals the half-lap event would be another special one.

A surprisingly short time (only 30 minutes) after the 100 many of the same group lined up for what would be a great 200. After the 200 qualifying the night previous and his effort over 100 meters, all eyes were on Riley Washington in Lane 5, with his reaction to the gun interestingly the slowest in

the field. Gentry Bradley has always been a bit better at the 200 than the 100, with his efforts around the turn when he is all-out really a neat piece of work to watch. With 3.05 meters per second of wind behind the group, over the allowable for record purposes, the

6-0 175 pound Bradley had a full two meters on the field as he blazed into the straightaway from the wide confines of Lane 6. Washington raced a spirited last 100, eating up most of the lead, but Bradley was the winner by a half a meter in a fine 20.97w-21.02w. Bradley will be a fine college sprinter.

400 Meters

A big early-season showdown had Derek Sheppard (Lincoln, San Francis-

co) take Mt. Pleasant's Richard Dupree 46.68-46.72. Milton Hughes (Stagg, Stockton) had conquered Shepard at Mt. SAC in 47.08, but dropped this event to concentrate against a super 800 meter field this weekend. James Redd (Fontana)

steadily improved over the season, racing 47.29 in the Section State Qualifier. Tough Chrystin Wuthrich (Wilson, Long Beach) 47.70, Jimmy Johnson (Mission San Jose, Fremont) 47.87, and the strong St. Mary's (Berkeley) duo of Jesse Wilson (47.81) and Damien Sullivan (47.97) were under 48.0. Future great in the field is soph Andre Desaussure (Royal, Simi Valley) who showed aggressive style in a 48.37 Southern Section run.

A trio definitely emerged ahead of the pack during qualifying. James Redd (Fontana) accelerated past early Heat 1 leader, impressive junior Jimmie Johnson (Mission San Jose, Fremont), down the stretch in a 47.99 win. Richard Dupree raced as controlled a 47.68 as ever has been seen in taking Heat 2 over Edward Turner (Morningside, Inglewood) 48.00 in Heat 2, with Dupree's piston-like short and controlled stride seeming to put no limits on his eventual potential. Richard can be world-class if he sticks with the sport. Heat 3 was taken by Derek Sheppard (despite what other spellings you may have seen Shepard is the correct spelling), with the Bay area star racing 47.92 from the farthest outside Lane 8, not seeing anyone else the entire event. With team and individual honor on the line in the Finals, Redd, Dupree and Sheppard appeared capable of well under 47.0.

Interestingly, Richard Dupree was not present at the starting line for the 400 finals, with rumors of motel shenanigans Friday evening requiring Coach Steve Nelson to scratch his star from Saturday's meet. With the air kind of let out of the event, Derek Sheppard took things out, and was the early leader through 100 meters. Jack Beloney, talented junior from Oak Grove in the Central Coast Section, really charged the backstretch, leading through the 200 meter point at 22.7. Shepard was a meter back there, but really went to work the third 100 meters around the south turn. Charging through the 300 at 34.6, Shepard had a four meter lead at that point, with James Redd able to take a meter off of that down the final stretch, with the San Franciscan emerging the winner 46.95-47.25. Shepard probably ran under 47.0 as many times as any state one lapper in recent years.

800 Meters

The event of the Meet was the Boys 800 Meters. Bryan Woodward (Poly, Long Beach) had raced 1:50.76 to win

at Arcadia, with Milton Hughes (Stagg, Stockton) SAT'ing that weekend, but coming back with a 1:51.06 at Mt. SAC the next weekend. Brian Wilkinson (Merced) had raced 4:11.17 to win the 1600 at Arcadia against all the State's best, and had a 1:51.19 800 best in trading wins all spring long with Hughes. Mike Katri (Fortuna), State Division IV Cross Country Champion, had dallied in the 1600 early in the season, but came back to the two lap event and was down to 1:51.22 in the North Coast. Each of the above runners offers interesting contrasts. Woodward is a large and very powerful runner. Bryan ran Cross Country this Fall, and had relayed as fast as 47.0 this spring, but his ace card was overall strength. Hughes is a tall, loping running who had run 47.08 in the Open 400m event, and seems to float weightless over the ground. Wilkinson is an average-sized junior with a great blend of speed and endurance, with great potential shown since his ninth grade year when he ran 1:57.5 for 800 meters. Katri offers a good blend of cross country runners endurance and above average speed. There was back-up to the above group with thirteen entered in the State Meet with bests of under 1:54.0! Event novices Adam Herndon (Bishop O'Dowd, Oakland) 1:52.65 and John Lockard (Logan, Union City) had raced 1:53.03 behind North Coaster Katri, with Alfonso Mitchell (Monterey) the event darkhorse off a 1:53.01 best and comfortable Central Coast wins.

The Merced crew took one look at the schedule with Wilkinson's 800-1600 double and wanted no part of it. We all remember Coley Candaele staggering in at the finish of the State Finals 800 a couple of years back after winning the 1600. All the above mentioned favored trio were heat winners on Friday. Woodward had to put out the least, with the Long Beach Poly star getting out in front and keeping it slow through a 56.4 opening 400 (1:26.0 600m), then holding the pack back over the final 150 meters during a 1:56.58 Heat 1 win. Woodward's slow pacing set up his win, but no one in that heat moved onto the Finals. Heat 2 had Mike Katri following very impressive Monterey junior Alfonso Mitchell through a 54.7 400 before moving by down the backstretch and maintaining a five meter margin through the tape in a 1:53.70 win. Milton Hughes was his usual awesome self

in Heat 3, bounding out through 26.0-54.7-1:21.8 half lap splits, having a 20 meter lead through the 600, then seeming to jog in to his 1:52.85 heat winning time. Talented Duarte junior, Nathan Woods, battled with soph Vondre Armour (Bakersfield) through the 600 in Heat 4, with Woods winning at 1:53.33 and Adam Herndon (O'Dowd, Oakland) next at 1:53.95. It took 1:54.47 after Woodward's automatic winning 1:56 was taken out to make the nine person final. This one would be worthy of all of our attention in Saturday's finals.

The Finals in this event let no one down. It was a classic race. It was fast, but there was an element of tactics with so many good competitors involved. Bryan Woodward was the leader as the event cut for the pole after going around the first turn in lanes. Junior Nathan Woods adopted a familiar position off the Long Beach Poly star's shoulder as they came through the 200 at 25.3. Armour moved to third off Woods' shoulder as they

Wilkinson under uncrowded conditions. Hughes had no place to go down the backstretch. Past the 600 mark at 1:21.2 Katri had a couple meter lead. Just past that point Hughes motored around those ahead of him and went in chase. During a furious homestretch sprint Katri maintained a one meter margin into the tape, with the cross-country star emerging victorious over the 47.0 400 meter runner Hughes, 1:49.56-1:49.64. Woodward was third at 1:50.22. We should hear from that first trio in a big way during their college careers. Rumors had Katri at Humboldt State or Oregon, Hughes at Arkansas, and Woodward at Georgetown, all great choices.

headed into the homestretch, with Milton Hughes running on the pole, comfortably loping behind the leading trio. The 400 went by at 53.0. As the race headed into the backstretch it was Mike Katri who made the first decisive move of the event, charging by and into the lead. No one seemed really ready to respond, with Hughes' position in the event at that point a negative factor. The Stockton star has never really had to run in one of these events where he had to deal with a talented pack, rather dominating local fields off a quick start or racing against local rival Brian

1600 Meters

The four lap event was another great one! Brian Wilkinson (Merced) had shocked with a 4:12 in winning at Fresno in early April, then blazed 59.2 for the final 400 in a big 4:11.17 Arcadia win. Daniel Das Neves (Helix, La Mesa), the Brazilian over-age junior (this will be his last season of eligibility) was 4:08.63 and 3:48.73 for 1500 meters. Wilkinson comes from more of a half-milers perspective (1:51.19 best), with Das Neves a Kinney National Finalist in Cross-Country. The race here would be a classic, with Das Neves needing to push the pace, something he was not able to do sufficiently at Mt. SAC over 1500 meters, where he finished 5th in 3:55.45, with Angel Martinez (San Gabriel) winning at 3:50.47.

There were many others with talent! Jeff Wilson (Newbury Park) let it out in the Southern Section State Qualifier, racing 60.0 for the final 400 in a 4:09.75. The Southern Section was strong again, with T.J. Reyes (Lakeview) 4:10.29, last year's State runner-up Todd Tressler (San Marcos, Santa Barbara) 4:10.70, Goss Lindsey (Peninsula, Rolling Hills Estates) 4:11.58, and Ryan Wilson (Agoura) 4:12.44. Brian Keim (San Pasqual, Escondido) 4:13.80 was good from San Diego.

The 1600 meter heats were pretty tough, as advertised. Daniel Das Neves showed surprising staying power in Heat 1, maintaining the lead through 3:16.6 at the 1200 mark, then keeping ahead of sub-1:54 800m runners Brian Wilkinson, Todd Tressler, and Goss Lindsey during the final 150 meter sprint to win at 4:16.07. The mentioned foursome were the qualifiers out of the first Heat. TJ Reyes pushed heat two after a 66.5 opening 400, racing the second lap in 63.6, with Jeff Wilson taking over at 3:13.7 for the 1200. Jeff kept ahead of surprising Foothill (Bakersfield) junior Terry Hickey, Reyes, Ryan Wilson, and Brian Keim to win that race at 4:15.92, with five qualifiers from that event. Great race coming up in the Finals!

Boy, there were a lot of great races in this Meet, with this one fulfilling most everyone's expectations. Interest seemed to center around how the tough distance runner, Das Neves, could hold up to the finishes of Wilkin-son, Lindsey, and Tressler, all of whom were sub-1:54 800m runners, and Jeff Wilson, who had intensity to finish with anyone. The talented group started the event casually, with the pacing duties handed to Terry Hickey, with the pack 63.7 through the 400. Things continued to dwindle during a 32.9 third 200 (4:23 1600m pace), with Jeff Wilson taking over the lead at the 800 at 2:08.9 (4th 200 32.3), and upping the ante. Wilson accelerated to 31.4 for the fifth half lap (1000 meters 2:40.3), with all but Brian Keim still part of the pack. During a big last lap sprint the Brazilian edged ahead, and surprisingly accelerated once again better than anyone in the field over the final 150 meters, winning by ten meters over Lindsey at 4:09.54. Daniel was under 58.0 for the final 400, with a 2:00.0 last two laps! Hopefully the charge of Luis de Oliveira, famous a few years back for his guidance of Mary Decker and Joaquim Cruz, will grace a local college with his talents for the next four years. His two consecutive state meet wins in real pressure cooker situations show the class and preparation of the fine Helix star. **Finals:**

He has not won them all, and has had some problems with eligibility, and if you talk to Coach Michelle Buccichio a love for full-court basketball the day of track meets. Anyway, it seemed to be coming together near the end of his senior year, as he pulled away from a very good pack to win the Southern Section qualifier at 8:56.99 with a 4:24.8 final 1600 and 2:06 final 800. Daniel Das Neves (Helix, La Mesa) was 9:10.87 and 8:20.59 (3000m) during the season, with the 1600 heats on Friday and tough 1600 Final on Saturday prior to the race here Saturday evening. The Southern Section's Margarito Casillas (Hoover, Glendale) 9:05.79 and Fernando Mendoza (Channel Islands, Oxnard) 9:08.78 were the only other ones who seemed talented enough to stay with Angel for a while, with tall Cruz Gallegos (Centennial, Corona), strong in Cross Country, shocking with improvement late in the season that had him run 4:14.70 and 9:11.74 for the two distance events. Jorge Rivera (Delano) was 9:17.67 at the end of a Central Section double, with junior Nazario Romero (San Pasqual, Escondido) 9:15.51, and Jason Balkman (Lynbrook, San Jose) a future great off his 9:22.15 as a frosh athlete.

Angel Martinez was interested in a fast time here, but had never run the event yet this season with a fast first 1600. Fine Delano junior Jorge Rivera led the pack through the first lap in a quick 63.3, with Martinez taking the lead through the 800 at 2:12.2. Angel and tall Cruz Gallegos rolled through 3:18.4 and 4:25.1 lap posts, with the duo having a thirty meter lead over the pack at the end of four circuits. Rolling through laps of 69.1-70.0 and 70.9 Martinez finally shook Gallegos to lead by 40 meters at the gun. Showing real spirit while racing all by himself over the final lap, local distance fans had their last look at the special San Gabrielian, as he raced 61.4 for that last 400 and an 8:56.34 win. Angel ran

8:56 as a soph, and with a decision to concentrate on 1500-mile events for the rest of the summer, ending his

Relative unknown Anthony Brockington (Stagg, Stockton) followed Redmond in the Sac Joaquin Finals at 14.38w. Drue Powell (Reseda) won the L.A. City at 14.50 (into the wind) with Terry Fulton (Mt. Pleasant, San Jose) 14.46 running for Championship team points.

In Heat races Demond Smith looked very solid in #1, racing 14.32 (+1.53 wind), with Charlie Davidson blasting a 14.00w (+2.63) in the second qualifier. Marcus Stokes, from a tiny private school, Thacher of Ojai, was more surprising in Heat 3, using +2.22 meters per second of wind to blast 14.07w. Chris Redmond (Vallejo) was a steady final Heat winner with a 14.11 (+1.87). Vallejo would be in the thick of the team contest on Saturday night, with Smith and Davidson consistent, fierce competitors.

Chris Redmond (Vallejo), sixth in last year's State Meet, took over the state lead with a 37.44 Sac Joaquin win, with Demond Smith (Hawthorne), runner-up last year in this meet, 37.49 in Southern Section action. Greg Muniz (Woodbridge, Irvine) was 37.72 in Section action, with Keith Moten (Loyola, L.A.) 37.75, and soph Ken Haslip (Muir, Pasadena) the event's future with a smooth step pattern at 37.83. Rashid Gayle (Roseville) had a number of good races with a 37.94 from the Sac Joaquin Section.

Chris Redmond's patience was tried in Heat 1, where Marcus Stokes (Thacher, Ojai) went out very hard, and held on to qualify in second at 38.46, with the Vallejo favorite showing a steady and controlled step pattern that had him run 38.02 for the win. Demond Smith, coming on so very gradually during the entire outdoor season, looked so ready this weekend, with an impressive 37.97 Heat 2 win. Greg Muniz continued his super season, edging in ahead of Rashid Gayle 37.69-37.75 in Heat 3. Muir soph Ken Haslip settled down to run a good last five hurdles and win Heat 4 at 38.78, with favored Keith Moten smashing the seventh hurdle and slowing to a non-qualifying time in second.

In the Finals, those across the middle of the track, Smith (lane 4), Muniz (5), Gayle (6), and Redmond (7) were equal through three flights. As the race charged around the turn, Redmond started to sail over the barriers slightly ahead of the others, having a two meter lead as the final 100 meters

400 Meter Relay

Mt. Pleasant blasted 41.15 in mid-Spring, bolstered by Rob Rice's continued improvement and everyone becoming healthy. Unfortunately, they could not get the stick around during a Section qualifying race, and they were out of the picture here and the dq cost them dearly in the team struggle. With everyone healthy Coach Steve Nelson's crew was untouchable by this year's State crop.

Vallejo had the fastest Section Finals time (41.50), with surprising Bishop Amat (La Puente) 41.60 to take a good Southern Section group. Bakersfield has flat out gotten more out of its team members than perhaps any California prep team in history, racing their 41.61 Section Finals win without a sprinter who could consistently run under 11.0 for 100 meters on the flat. One can understand how so

many Texas teams are able to run at 41.0 or better when you see the talent they have and what Bakersfield did with its team this year. West Bakersfield, led by frosh stars Marques Holliswell and Bryan Howard raced 41.71 with visual hand-offs in their Section Meet. Highlands (North Highlands-Sac Joaquin Section) was 41.46 earlier in the year, with Merced appreciating some points here from its 41.95 group in the team struggle.

One gained a sense for where the power in the sport was going in this event, with the Sac Joaquin section taking three of the four heats with their three entrants. San Geronio (San Bernardino) was one of the few good Southern Section teams to hold together over the end of the season, winning Heat 1 in 42.28. Anthony Volson blasted a 9.6 flying 100 meter start anchor in Heat 2 for Merced, with Southern Section 100m champion Dione Tyler (Milikan) pulling a hamstring while his team was in contention with 50 meters to go, and Bakersfield running out of magic this weekend, never getting off the second exchange. In Heat three Highlands survived a lead-off runner doing some real acrobatics to get back into his lane before a violation was called after veering across the lane line 80 meters into his leg, with Brian Lewis looking solid on the anchor in a 42.12 win. Vallejo, with Ali Evnas blasting the back-stretch in 10.0 into a very solid wind, and Chris Redmond 10.0 on the anchor, took Heat 4 at 41.78 for the day's only time under 42.0. Vallejo's vet 1600m relay team was strong, and with Evans in the sprints and Redmond solid in the hurdles, the Apaches looked tough as a team.

The finals was an interesting race, with this first running event during Saturday's Finals action also a very pressure packed one for participants. The time was the slowest for any big meet of the year, but it was a good race. After a basically even first leg, Ali Evans flew the backstretch for Vallejo in 10.1 against the wind to move his team into the lead. Hawthorne was second at that point. Morningside was running a steady team race, with anchor runner Edward Turner moving into the lead during a smooth third exchange. Down the stretch it was Highlands junior Brian Lewis who flew by teams, almost, but not quite, collaring Morningside's Turner at the tape 42.04-42.06. Vallejo was third in

St. Mary's (Berkeley, bolstered by fine open competitors, Jesse Wilson (47.81) and Damien Sullivan (47.97), had been as low as 3:13.19 in their League Finals! Long Beach Poly defeated defending State Champion Morningside (Inglewood) 3:14.52 in Section State Qualifying action off by Bryan Woodward's 47.0 anchor, then were disqualified as their lead-off runner ran too many steps on the line. Foothill (Santa Ana) steadily improved to 3:15.10. Sac Joaquin teams were Vallejo 3:14.92 and Valley (Sacramento) 3:15.4. Dorsey (L.A.) was an easy L.A. City winner with the bodies to roll much faster than their 3:18.86 win there. The real key here may be Mt. Pleasant (San Jose) 3:18.32, with tremendously talented Richard Dupree (46.72 and defending State Open 400 meters) probably able to pull at least 10 meters on any anchor runner in the field.

The end of a State Prelims evening can be kind of interesting. Many teams and individuals who have been used to having their way in local action have had one or a few bad breaks along the way and by this time of night you can often throw the form sheets out the window. Vallejo closed with a big-time anchor of 47.3 in Heat 1 top place a qualifying second to Valencia (Placentia) 3:17.85-3:18.08. Foothill (Santa Ana) was 49.7-48.7 (Ethan Taub)-50.6 and 47.9 (Aaron Taub) in a 3:16.49 Heat 2 win, with Bakersfield next at 3:16.92 and 3:15.4 team Valley of Sacramento

way back. St. Mary's (Berkeley) threw out the big challenge in Heat 3, winning by 50 meters while blasting a 3:12.83 off of 47.8-48.5-48.3 and 48.3 splits. Defending State Champions Morning-side looked solid in Heat 4, with Edward Turner racing 46.9 on leg 2 for the 3:16.65 winners.

One has so much fun at the State Championships, with the Meet rolling along fairly quickly. It is surprising to look up after what seems like no more than a dozen events total and it is all about to end with the 1600m relay. It seems too short, but this usually provides an exciting close to the meet and season. It had been crash and burn time for a few teams, as usual, with a surprising Bakersfield team, off Jeff Buckley's high weight placings and maybe something here, a possible winner. Remember, the Drillers had a 41.61 400m relay team not finish in their heat, so it had been by no means a perfect weekend for them either. Anyway, the fireworks started early here. Mike Kennedy of the L.A. Times and Track & Field News usually forgets his stopwatch, so we try to assign him easy tasks when it comes to relay splitting when he does show up ready to go. St. Mary's kind of seemed like a sure thing with little chance of Mr. Kennedy blowing the splits. A 48.3 opener and 49.4 second leg put St. Mary's out in front at the second exchange, but the heavily favored team shockingly dropped the baton at that point! Defending Champions, Morning-side, off efforts of 49.6 from Levest-er Williams and 47.9 from Travion Harris took the lead at that point, with the St. Mary's third runner totalling 53.9 with the five seconds spent chasing the baton added on. Jesse Swayze was 50.6 on the third leg for Morning-side, with Foothill (Santa Ana), off 50.8 legs from Nate Kuchera, 49.6 from Tad Heath, and 48.4 from Ethan Taub closing down. Edward Turner showed consummate confidence during a 47.3 anchor to take the 'Side to a repeat title in the event at 3:15.37, with Aaron Taub anchoring Foothill at 47.9 in their 3:16.81 runner-up effort. Meanwhile, Bakersfield had worked its way up through the field, with soph Vondre Armour anchoring strongly in their 3:16.84 third place effort to very surprisingly take the team title with 24 points.

High Jump

The State had two 7-footers from the North, surprisingly consistent Todd Kelly 7-0 1/4, a junior at Big Valley (Beber), and Kevin Williams (Yuba City) 7-0. Camarillo sophomore pogostick Jeremy Fischer had jumped 6-11 1/2, with Brian Davidson (California, San Ramon) winning the Sunkist indoor way back in February at 6-11. Griffin Childers (Woodland) was 6-10 1/4, with Eli Gladden (San Lorenzo Valley, Felton) improving to 6-10 in the Central Coast Finals. Alarick Greenberry (Cabrillo, Lompoc) is consistent with a 6-10 best, with Lavelle Beloney (Del Mar, San Jose) 6-10 also. 1991 State placer, at fifth, Calvin Haynes (Corcoran--a transfer from Tulare Western) had a 6-9 1/2 best this year.

It took a fine 6-7 to make the field of ten finals, with 7-footer Kevin Williams (Yuba City) the only significant casualty, going only 6-2 in the qualifying competition. Ten were allowed into the Finals, under Section 4 Article 4 of the High School rules, which states that if there is a tie, which there was here on clearances, misses, and attempts between Eli Gladden and Jeff Nadeau at 6-7, and there is room available in the Finals competition, both should move on instead of being involved in a jump-off.

On Saturday everyone entered the competition at 6-4, with all over on their first attempt except for soph Jeremy Fischer, who cleared on his second attempt. Jeff Nadeau, Eli Gladden, Tony Carruthers, and Del Mitchell cleared 6-6 on their second trial, with Brian Davidson, never really having put it together outdoors after a 6-11 indoor effort at Sunkist, taking three attempts to get over that 6-6 barrier.

The rest of the field, Alarick Greenberry, Todd Kelly, Calvin Haynes, Griffin Childers, and Fischer, all cleared on their first trial. With the bar at 6-8 only Gladden could not clear in three attempts, with Davidson and favorite Kelly requiring three trials to be successful. Everyone else sailed over on their first attempt, with Greenberry, 91 fifth placer Haynes, and Childers totally clean records to that point with no misses. 



California had a very special group of lady dashers in 1992, headlined by "all-world" Marion Jones. As the season came to a close one had to give the junior at Thousand Oaks, Jones, at least a good chance at the Olympic team. Her prep races were typically over in the 100 meters in the first stride or two, as Marion displayed a new, lightning quick start this season. The 200 was fun until she ran out of people outside of her on the stagger, and, oh yeah, there were 4x400 legs where she often had five or six athletes spread out ahead of her to chase down. There had to be very little tension to her open prep sprint races. Can you imagine Marion actually thinking that she might have a close race at this level? This is not said to demean her competition, but to state a reality. Still, with this lack of nervous tension to her efforts Jones still managed to race a National Junior Record 200 meters, 22.67 (legal aiding wind +1.75 mps), in Sectional Prelim action on May 15th, with an 11.22w 100 there and 11.38 legal best going into the State Meet. One senses that there will be some better times when she gets into competition with those who challenge

There was a fine group of prep sprinters to go along with Marion. Long Beach Poly had the finest duo of frosh sprinters ever at one U.S. high school in Andrea Anderson (11.77) and Aminah Haddad (11.81), with the duo picking right up from the junior high level where Anderson was the nation's best at her age-level and Haddad was not far behind. Haddad ran the fastest 100 meters ever by an American thirteen year old this season, interestingly some two full tenths quicker than our star, Marion, did at the same age level. National Scholastic Indoor 55m fourth placer Lesa Parker (Bishop O'Dowd, Oakland) was 11.89 (11.86w) and a second at Arcadia against the above mentioned crew. Angela Sullivan (Serra, San Diego) showed great potential in 1991 and seemed to be rounding into shape late this year with a 12.04 best, with Tanisha Johns (Burbank, Sacramento) an 11.84w in her Section Finals Meet. Bisa Grant (Bishop O'Dowd, Oakland) was 12.03 (11.88w) with the Morningside duo of Sanoma Nickson (11.95w) and Tai-Ne Gibson (11.95) hoping to place and stir up the scoring in the Long Beach Poly-Bishop O'Dowd-Morningside contest. There were a lot of good people in this event!

They came to cook right off the bat in qualifying, with Jones blazing away from the field in Heat 1 after the second stride and blasting to a ten meter victory at 11.24 (+1.50 mps wind). To local fans Marion's efforts still amaze, with only two preps in U.S. history ever having run faster than Jones did today. Tai-Ne Gibson upped the Morningside team ante in Heat 2, blasting 11.78 with a strong final 70 meters with teammate Sanoma Nickson running 11.96 for second. Frosh Andrea Anderson (Poly, Long Beach) was frightening in Heat 3, spotting one of the nation's best, Lesa Parker (Bishop O'Dowd) a meter and a half at the start, then blowing by over the final 70 meters to win by that same margin at 11.71w (+3.30 mps). The other half of the Poly frosh team, Aminah Haddad rode a good breeze (+3.12 mps) in Heat 4 to an 11.79w three meter win that had last year's third placer, Angela Sullivan, not make the final at 12.06. It took 12.01 to be among the top nine who would run on Saturday, with the top group of preps that would be gathered this year anywhere in the nation toeing the line in Satur-

day's Finals.

Marion Jones is a classy, showy act, with the 10,000+ spectators gathered here each the year the largest crowd she has had to play to thus far in her career. Having set the current National Federation Record of 11.17 in this Meet last year, she did not let the fans down this year. Part of the difference in Marion this year is a rocket start that separates the powerful sixteen

year old from the rest of the field in the first five meters. Against a super group she was gone once again early, with continued acceleration that seemed as good as at any time this year to those who had seen her run more than a few times. The readings on hand-held stopwatches were in the outer stratosphere, so all awaited the official clocking. Marion's six meter win officially clocked at out at 11.14, lowering her prep best by .03 and leaving the all-time prep best of 11.13 by Chandra Cheeseborough for the Olympic Trials. Interestingly, the old record came when Chandra was second at the 1976 Olympic Trials. Those in Marion's wake ran super. Thirteen year old Aminah Haddad lowered her National age-best to 11.73 in second, with teammate Andrea Anderson next at 11.79. Tai-Ne Gibson was fourth at 11.83, with Lesa Parker fifth at 11.89 in as deep a prep race as you will ever find.

200 Meters

Marion Jones can really stretch it out here, with the TO star always at her best before the big crowd that shows up for Saturday's State Finals. Anything is possible! Again, a solid crew backed Marion up. Lesa Parker (Bishop O'Dowd) was second at Arcadia, running 24.17, with the Long Beach Poly frosh duo of Aminah Haddad (24.04w-24.16) and Andrea Anderson (24.11) showing their class late in the season against good Southern Section competition. Morningside's Santishia Arnold (24.13w-24.49) and Tai-Ne Gibson (24.47) are talented veterans, fourth and fifth, respectively, in last year's Meet here, with the placings here involving O'Dowd, Poly, and Morningside again such an important part of the team struggle. Tanisha Johns (Burbank, Sacto) (24.45w-24.76), Texas transfer Maigha Strickland (Merced) (24.50w-24.75), and again, talented Angela Sullivan (Serra, San Diego) (24.56) provide great back-up to the talented front-runners.

In the 200 qualifying Marion Jones continued to juice things up during the weekend with a 22.71 (wind +1.72) in Heat #1 the second fastest prep run ever (behind her 22.67 National Record). Frosh Andrea Anderson was the Heat 2 winner at 24.36w (+2.09), with teammate Aminah Haddad taking

Heat 3 at 24.10w (+2.36). In Heat 4, Lesa Parker edged by early leader Santishia Arnold 24.32-24.43 down the stretch with a legal +1.05 mps wind behind them. Almost everyone in the finals race was an important part of the team struggle. Tiki Jackson (Bakersfield) ended up as the unfortunate tenth time, and a non-qualifier at a quick 24.82!

The State Meet schedule is too tight. I wonder how many meets during the championship qualifying schedule include medal award presentation ceremonies over the public address system on the main field? Exactly thirty minutes after the 100, which included time for Marion Jones to sign her National Record forms and wait that event's turn on the victory stand, the six from the 100 finals who were also in the 200 had to go directly to the blocks for the start of that second event. There was no time for correct warm-down or re-warm up, a very dangerous situation with this group of athletes who are all Division I scholarship quality athletes. Marion Jones looked less snappy around the turn than she had in her recent 200's, possibly from the above described situation. Racing through the 100 meter starting line at 11.7 the Thousand Oaks junior cruised to an 11 meter triumph at 23.83. Aminah Haddad was second again, with her 23.97 interestingly faster than Marion had run at age 13, with a 24.05 best at the same age for the current star. Lesa Parker split up the Long Beach Poly frosh duo here, with a 24.08 for third, with Andrea Anderson fourth at 24.15.

400 Meters

This developed into a fine event near the end of the season. 1991 Champion Janice Nichols, with a 54.62 seasonal best, ran in the Section Finals with a taped thigh and cruised a 56.79, but let it out and looked good in a 24.56 200 there. Here, Janice would have another match-up with 1991 runner-up Allison Dring (Mt. Carmel, San Diego). Dring had her aches and pains during the season, with 56.34 open and 55.1 relay efforts in Section Finals action. But there were others. Arcadia's eleventh grader, Asha Jayasinghe, took up the event the last month of the season, and after steady improvement surprised Tammara McLin (Eisenhower, Rialto) 55.63-55.66 in the Southern Section 4A Finals. McLin returned the favor in the State Qualifier, racing 55.24. Jaronda White (Morningside, Inglewood) improved to 55.73 in Southern Section action, with frosh Sylvia Pieslak (Menlo-Atherton, Atherton) 55.99 continuing to improve after a fine age-group career. Malika Freeman was 56.03 for the much-improved Skyline of Oakland program, with Rene Walker (Dorsey, L.A.) 56.07, Latasha Gilliam (Pittsburg), who moved to North Carolina and then back, 56.08, and yet another O'Dowd athlete, Maya Greene 56.20.

The first Heat had a tough cast, with 1991 4th placer Tammara McLin moving strongly over the third 100 meters in edging past '91 runner up Allison Dring, with frosh Sylvia Pieslak also moving past last year's second placer near the end, with the trio recording 55.37-56.26-56.55 qualifying marks. Maya Greene took the second heat out hard, with Janice Nichols moving the second turn hard, then cruising in with an impressive 55.72 win. Soph Latasha Gilliam edged away from Asha Jayasinghe down the home-stretch of the third prelim race to win 55.71-55.91. Rene Walker was the final Heat winner at 56.62 over Malika Freeman (56.76).

In the finals, last year's Champion, Janice Nichols, and runner-up, Allison Dring, were out quickest for the first 100. It was soph Latasha Gilliam who had the lead through the 200 at 25.8,

with Nichols next at 25.9. Janice went to work on the south turn over the third 100 meters, coming into the straightaway with a two meter lead over Tammara McLin at 39.6. During a strong homestretch run Nichols charged strongly to a four meter win, 54.46-55.06 over the surprising Gilliam.

1600 Meter Relay

Long Beach Poly was not done in this event like the 400, where their baton "boo-boo" had halted their season back at the League meet. Morningside (Inglewood) had traveled to the Texas Relays in early April and was narrowly defeated by Madison of Dallas 3:44.38-3:45.86. Morningside was doing it in 1992 without 400m star La-Shawn Stringer. With the Morningside crew beat up from the Texas Relays weekend and travel and all, Long Beach Poly had won at Arcadia in 3:49.52. The duo met at the Southern Section Qualifying Meet, with Poly frosh Andrea Anderson racing a 54.3 anchor to run Morningside down 3:47.42-3:47.68. Bishop O'Dowd, 3:49.92 at Arcadia, has a great group of athletes, with a 3:47.29 in the Section Finals that assured them a spot in the thick of the battle. Logan (Union City) 3:50.15 was second behind O'Dowd in the North Coast.

Some of the State's top girls teams are so deep that they can afford to interchange their team members and qualify for the State Finals with less than the number one squad they can put on the track. Long Beach Poly was second in Heat 1 here at 3:53.09 with some of the first string watching, with Allison Dring pulling Mt. Carmel into a qualifying position (3:53.44) with a 54.8 anchor behind Muir's 3:53.00 in that same race. Bishop O'Dowd

seemed to beholding something in reserve in its 3:51.72 Heat 2 win. Erin Blunt (56.2) and Christina Stark (56.8) raced strong middle legs for the runner-up San Pasqual squad (3:53.07). James Logan was 3:53.58 to win Heat 3 off four consistent legs (between 57.6 and 59.0). Morningside took the final qualifying race at 3:50.31, with Jaronda White 56.6 on leg 2 and Santishia Arnold anchoring in 56.7.

The Finals here would be a great race, with Long Beach Poly and Morningside going at it once again, with a great group from Bishop O'Dowd along to make it interesting. Maya Green brought O'Dowd in with a lead at the exchange at 58.4, with Poly 58.5 from Aminah Haddad and Morningside back a bit off Tai-Ne Gibson's 59.2. Jaronda White moved Morningside into the lead with a quick 55.3 second leg, with Jo-Launa Gifford (Poly) 56.5 and Miesha Marzell (O'Dowd) 57.1. James Logan, the North Coast Section power, was right in the thick of the race, with four teams within ten meters at the last exchange. Felicia Williams gave Morningside a slight lead with a 56.7 third leg, with Channel Anderson 56.5 for Poly and Bisa Grant 56.7 for O'Dowd. Andrea Anderson (LB Poly) is one amazing frosh athlete, showing poise and confidence while measuring Morningside veteran Santishia Arnold for 300 meters of the anchor leg. As she had the week previous in the Section qualifier, the Poly frosh made her move as the race headed into the final stretch, edging up and by Arnold to break the tape a 3:45.91 winner during her 54.5 leg. Arnold was 55.1 (Morningside 3:46.30), with Aisha Sims 55.5 (O'Dowd 3:47.84). James Logan was fourth in 3:49.05 in a spectacular race. There are only a couple of teams in the entire nation with entire teams at the level of the first four squads in this race. Allison Dring was 56.1 on the anchor of fifth place Mt. Carmel's 3:53.57, with Erin Blunt 56.2 for San Pasqual's 3:54.31 sixth place crew.

Aisha Sims (Bishop O'Dowd, Oakland) was the obligatory event threat from her school with 5-8 at the North Coast.

Qualifying in the Girls High Jump was not too eventful, with 5-4 on one's first attempt necessary to move on to the ten girl final. 5-8 competitor Aisha Sims was unable to clear 5-4 on this date, but O'Dowd teammate Jamilla Churchill was a qualifier at 5-4 to continue the weekend in which there seemed the presence of the Oakland private school in almost every event.

The finals here would have a bit of a surprise twist. Through 5-4 in the event only Reisheshea Candidate fell by the wayside, with Jamilla Churchill, Darci Morrison, Tracey Lawyer, and Tanya Lazar-Lea all tying for sixth after making 5-4 on their first attempt and going no higher. Kristy Kierulff and Julie Jenkins were over 5-6 on their first attempt, with Danielle Boswell over 5-6 on her second jump. (Mission Viejo), 19-6 in mid-April. Sheena Ferguson (Washington, San Francisco) was best out of the Section meets at 19-2, with a 19-5 seasonal best. Nicole Haynes (Bishop Montgomery, Torrance) was third in 1991 with an 18-3 1/2 92 best, with Jessica Renton (Downey, Modesto) 5th last year and 18-2 1/2w/18-1 this year. Another fine all-arounder, Cheeza Figueroa (Quartz Hill), was the Southern Section Meet winner at 18-9 3/4.

The wind assisted a number of athletes to very fine performances in Friday's qualifying. It took 18-2 3/4w to make the Finals. Christine Burton (Helix, La Mesa) got the show going with a wind-aided 18-9 1/4 in the first round of flight two, with a big 19-0 1/4w third effort in qualifying. She held the lead until Nicole Haynes rode a big 4.5 meter per second gust to a 19-3 1/4w qualifier during her flight. The final group of four really busted loose, with Heather Sterlin 19-9w on her only fair (and final) jump of the Prelims, with Cheeza Ferguson a big 19-4 1/2w mark, Kam Warner a 19-3 1/2w opener, and Sheena Ferguson two scratches and a 20-3 3/4w final effort to lead Friday's action. Strangely enough, there were only a total of four fair jumps out of the twelve taken by the talented last flight of four, usually an indicator that heavy winds are raising havoc with step patterns.

This turned out to be a heck of a competition! Sheena Ferguson had hurt herself in Friday's qualifying, and was only 15-5 1/4 and two fouls in Saturday's early jumping. Kam Warner led through the first round at 19-5 1/4 (+2.0), with Nicole Haynes improving to 19-6 1/2w (+3.5) during the second round, and Heather Sterlin throwing out a challenge to all with a big 19-8 1/2 (+1.5) during that series of jumps. Sterlin suffered a serious back injury two years back and had been about a year off of wearing a back brace for a number of months, with the talented all-around star a fine jumper, hurdler, and long sprinter. Warner and Haynes continued out over 19 feet, with Warner 19-5 1/4, 19-3 1/2w, 19-7 1/4, 19-7 3/4w, and 19-2 1/4w, with Haynes 19-2 3/4 and 19-5w on her fourth and fifth jumps. Warner put it all together on her final effort with 1.5 meters per second of wind behind her, a 20-6 1/4 national leader and nearly ten inch margin of victory in the competition.
