# The Extraordinary Coach Can Make a Positive Impact

Achiavelli once taught that the subjects of a feared king are more loyal to him than those of a loved king. Such a notion may have applied to high school sports in the past as hefty, batty-eyed football coaches shouted their players into order with threats of arduous physical reproach or diminished playing time, striking fear in the hearts of their players and insisting they do likewise to opponents.

However, the success, leadership, and manner of a Francis Parker volleyball coach entirely refutes every aspect of this belief and has permanently changed my perception of the relationship between virtue and success, disciple and mentor.

As volleyball season rolled around my freshman year, coach John Herman approached me in a casual, offhand manner and asked me to consider playing the sport. My immediate response came as a questioning look, since I was unaware that volleyball was played interscholastically in high school. In fact, I had never taken volleyball seriously as a sport. However, I was caught completely off guard by his friendly demeanor and earnest prediction of my future potential, and was compelled to accept this offer.

What followed was a dramatic change in my high school experience. My first practice was not held in the gym, rather we gathered amongst the crossed rows of desks in a small, cramped classroom.

Coach Herman strode into the room in his mildly awkward yet dignified manner, which seized the attention of everyone in the room. He proceeded to give an hour-long talk on the importance and benefits of humility, fairness and morality, imparting life to this initially fanciful idealistic outlook, while alluding to past success: countless league banners, city titles and state championships.

His lecture was brimming with such phrases as "always thank the fans" and "becoming a noble person on a team far outweighs winning." He even told us about his family, experiences growing up, and a tearful anecdote about how one of his old high school players ignored a congratulating, frenzied press after winning an NCAA championship to walk over and greet him instead. I had previously considered it unthinkable for a coach, someone who maintains such supposedly superior, authoritarian status over his players, to humanize himself in such a fashion.

What most defines coach Herman's success, though, is the extraordinary respect that is generated in the eyes of his players. I sometimes find myself playing more vigorously because I can't bear to think of disappointing him, although he would probably just smile and tell me what he liked about the game.

I am proud to play for coach Herman because his success endures as a true story of the triumph of nobility, self motivated work and compassion – an omnipresent contradiction to what many refer to as "the real world" and the "harsh realities of life" in which the good guys never win. He has influenced me like no other teacher or coach before, and his ideals and story of success will continue to influence me for the rest of my life.



After two strategic planning processes, the face of the CIF has changed dramatically.

Initially charged with establishing the rules to govern high school athletics in California, the largest youth agency in the nation went to its constituents and asked the basic question: how can we better serve you.

The answer was loud and clear. Schools needed a coaching education program to train the more than 78,000 coaches in California's secondary schools.

The fact that nearly one-third of these coaches are off-campus coaches made education even more important, as did the high turnover rate of coaches in general.

In response, the CIF made coaching education a top priority and has since trained more coaches than any other state.

The CIF Coaching Education Program, which began six years ago, has been modified, adapted and designed to specifically meet California's needs and Education Code requirements. This nationally recognized program teaches coaches the importance of educational athletics and includes segments on coaching for character, health and nutrition, coaching philosophy, sport psychology, sport pedagogy, sport physiology and risk management.

While coaching education was the number one concern expressed by schools, other issues have also been addressed.

The CIF, with support and collaboration from the Josephson's Institute of Ethics, has developed and adopted the principles of Pursuing Victory With Honorsm (PVH).

To date, 1041 high schools have followed suit by adopting this characterbuilding program.

Included in the PVH package is a code

of conduct and expected behaviors for all involved in high school athletics.

This year the CIF launched the "missing link" in the PVH program with the initiation of the CIF Sports Parent Presentation.

The purpose of the CIF Sports Parent Presentation is to provide schools with the tools to guide parents on their role in the educational program.

The new program features a CIF speaker, a "Parents Guide to Successful Sport Experience" and a videotape on "What Kids Want Their Parents to Know 'About Sportsmanship."

"The only behavior spectators and parents see is the business model and they think that is appropriate behavior," said Roger Blake, CIF assistant executive director. "How can we expect them to behave and act appropriately if we haven't shown them the educational model?"

Paramount to coaching education and parent education is one important theme: the physical and mental health of student-athletes.

With the help of respected physicians and experts in the field, the CIF has developed a number of health and safety bulletins which have been distributed to schools and are available on the CIF's website.

These bulletins offer up-to-date information on a variety of topics including reducing head and neck injuries in football, eating for wrestling performance, athletic nutrition, prevention of heat illness, performance enhancing dietary supplements and many more.

Among other changes in the CIF has been the development of an officials' accreditation process and expansion of awards for sportsmanship and scholastic achievement.

"Perhaps the biggest change I have witnessed in CIF is an openness to discuss and address the tough issues," said Marie M. Ishida, CIF executive director and president of the organization during the first strategic planning process in 1992.

While the CIF of 2002 is much different than the organization formed in 1914 some charges remain the same.

The CIF continues to set and enforce the rules of the organization, a process that began as a way to level the playing field in 1914.

Prior to the CIF, restriction on age and students eligibility simply didn't exist.

"There were some real abuses regarding the age issue," said Ishida. "The 19year old rule stemmed from these early abuses, as a way to protect the high school athlete."

In 1914, the CIF conducted its first ever state championship in the sport of track and field.

State championships have expanded to include the sports of cross country, girls' volleyball, wrestling, basketball and track and field.

What further changes await the organization in the next decade? In the next century? Nobody knows for sure, but one thing is certain. The CIF will continue to meet the challenges head on.

"We will continue to serve our schools and do everything in our power to make the athletic experience a positive one for students," said Ishida. "That's what the CIF is all about."

# Felix Takes on the World

What happens when you accomplish your goal mid-way through the season? If you're Allyson Felix you adjust the goal and up the expectations. Throughout her high school track and field career at Los Angeles Baptist High School, Felix and those following her have continued to raise their expectations. How could you not?

Felix, who began running as a freshman in high school, has just kept getting better and better. Entering her senior year, her goal was to break Marion Jones' National High School record in the 200 meters. She accomplished that at the Mt. Sac Invitational running a sensational 22.51 in an unofficial meet.

Now she looks to take on the world. That is the World Championship team, the elite world of track and field. It not only seems possible, but probable for this hard-working athlete who is the premier sprinter in the nation.

Below is a question and answer format with this amazing individual.

( How did you get started in track and field? Both my dad and my brother were involved. My brother (Wes, a runner at USC) is two years older and watching him got me excited about the sport.

**(What do you love most about track and field?** Competing. I'm a competitor and thrive on the competition.

**(What's your training regime like?** I'm on the track five days a week and in the weight room three days a week. The weight training is really intense, but that's where I get a lot of my power. I run hills and intervals depending on where we are in the season. I really enjoy the weight



room and the hill work can sometimes be fun. It's just something different off the track.

( What's your goal for this season? To break Marin Jones's high school record. Now I've adjusted my goal and I hope to make the World Championship team.

 $\langle$  How do you feel when people compare you to Marion Jones? There are definitely similarities and I can see how people might compare us. At the same time, I'm trying to just be myself and I'm definitely different as well. The comparisons are a compliment. I look up to her. She's amazing.

 What makes you stand out from other runners? The ability to hold my speed for a long time. I'm a pretty powerful runner, which shows a lot at the end of my race.

# < Do you compete in any other sports? Any added pressure from coaches, media, yourself?

In 9th grade I played basketball, but

since then I focused on track and field. I hadn't run before the 9<sup>th</sup> grade and just started doing it for fun. I didn't feel any added pressure at all.

### **(Who are your role model(s)?**

My parents and my brother. I look up to my family and admire how they live their lives.

**(Who is your biggest fan?** Same people. My parents really support me and come to all my meets and balance that with attending my brothers meets as well. They've sacrificed a lot to come to my meets overseas. I couldn't ask for better support.

# Goals after graduating from high school?

To go try to make the World Championship team and, if I make that, to do well over there.

### (Who do you look toward for inspiration (other than parents and family)?

Angela Williams (formerly of Chino High School and USC). The way she carries herself, the way she handles pressure and the media demands are inspiring. I try to strive for the same.

**{ How would you describe yourself?** 

I'm quiet and a little shy in the beginning. But I'm also a very happy person and fun to be around.

# Favorite Classes at school and why?

My favorite class would be English because I enjoy to read and write.

### What has been your biggest obstacle either in track and field or in life?

My biggest obstacle in track would be starting track at a late age. I still have so much to learn and so much to experience but I am also very excited for what awaits me.

Arkie was born in Ohio and moved to California at around the age of 10. He attended all Long Beach schools, including Long Beach Poly, Long Beach City College, and Long Beach State. Arkie coached at LBCC (with Ron Allice, now the Head Track Coach at USC) and in the Torrance school district. # Talent, Plus Desire Gives Mack the Competitive Edge



Thomas Mack accomplished something last year that few have ever done. In winning individual state titles in both the 110-meter high hurdles and the 300-meter intermediate hurdles, Mack joined only two others who have managed the rare double in the same season: Don Ward of St. Mary's Berkeley High School (in 1980) and Steve Kerho of Mission Viejo High (1982).

"It felt unbelievable, although it didn't seem real until a couple of weeks later. It felt like a movie," Mack, who ran a 14.34 in the 110meter high hurdles and 37.45 in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles, said about the state championship feat.

The Berkeley-bound senior has lofty goals, but his aspirations certainly seem to be within reach. His number one goal this season is to make the Junior National Team, but first he wants to repeat as a double champion. Last season, he led Bakersfield High School to the team title as well and the Drillers figure to once again be in the running for that elite position.

The added pressure to repeat both individually and as a team has been there, but Mack blocks that out and just tries to do his best every day. In fact, the biggest thing he had to overcome this year was a mid-season bout with bronchitis. Although that slowed him down, Mack feels he is back on target.



Always a talented athlete, Mack started as a 400-meter runner in junior high and had no aspirations to compete in the hurdles. But his high school coach put him out there and the rest is history. Now his heroes are hurdlers, specifically Felix Sanchez who runs for the Dominican Republic and ran at USC. Photos of Sanchez are plastered about his room and serve as reminders of the hard work it takes to succeed in the sport.

What separates Mack from other standout athletes is his desire to continue to improve. That attitude could lead him to even greater accomplishments in the future both in track and field and whatever else he decides to do.

"My biggest obstacle would have to be my start in the box," Mack said. "I start with my left leg back and take small steps to get in the right position for the hurdles. I have to learn to start differently out of the blocks so that the left foot is in the front. That way, I can take seven steps to the hurdles instead of eight."


Mack is currently working on the little things, all the minute details that can make all the difference in a sport where a tenth of a second can mean the difference between first place and second.

In the meantime he heeds the advice of his mother. "She always told me to do my best and that it doesn't matter what I do as long as I'm doing my best."

Mack's best has been difficult for other hurdlers to match and has raised the bar for the event entering the 2003 meet.

# 2003 CIF State Track and Field Honor Coaches

Honor Coaches are selected by the Track and Field Coaches Alliance and are honored for their contributions to the sport.



**Mike Dailey** Fairfield H.S.

Presently, Dailey is department head for boys' physical education and the athletic director at Fairfield High. His coaching career includes serving as an assistant track coach and head soccer coach from 1973-88. From 1989 to 2000 he was the head cross country coach at Fairfield as his teams won four MEL championships. Since 1989 he has been the head track coach. His boys' teams have compiled a 102-6 dual meet record and have won three Sac-Joaquin Section titles.



**Rico Abordo** Kelseyville H.S.

During the meet of champions each spring, most eyes fall on the big schools in the North Coast Section. Abordo's charges make sure that the small schools get some notice as well. Between them, Kelseyville's boys and girls teams have won five North Coach Section Class A titles and 13 Coastal Mountain Conference championships since 1990, and three individuals have qualified for the state meet. "If you take pride in yourself and practice for perfection, then you will be pleased with your performance," Abordo said.



**Linda Doniak** Central Valley H.S.

Doniak, who will be retiring after 23 years of coaching, began her career at Central Valley High in 1980, where she assisted the distance runners. In 1981, she took over as the head coach for the distance runners. Doniak has many highlights and in 1996 was recognized as the Girls' Cross Country Coach of the Year in California. Several of her distance runners are coaching at high school and colleges and one young man is preparing for the Olympic trials.



**Tony Rodriguez** Tulare Western H.S.

An alumni of Tulare Western, where he graduated in 1987, Rodriguez returned 10 years later as the head track and field coach. During that time his teams have won seven out of eight EYL boys titles. Rodriguez actually started his coaching career in 1986 at Atwater High. He was the head track coach at Hilmar High and an assistant coach at Livingston as well. An athlete himself, Rodriguez qualified for the state meet in the 400 meters in 1984. He ran for two years at Cal State Stanislaus. In addition to track and field, Rodriguez coaches football at Tulare Western.




**Todd Hamer** Los Molinos H.S.

An alum of Los Molinos, Hamer was a three-sport standout there setting a handful of school records in track and field. His career as a track athlete was cut short when a diving accident left him paralyzed from the chest down in 1987. After graduating from college, he returned as an assistant coach at Los Molinos in 1995 and became the head track and field coach in 1997. In addition, Hamer is also a USA Track and Field certified official.



**Floyd Hurndon** William Overfelt H.S.

"In Floyd's roles as teacher leader and as coach, he is a student motivator, student advocate and demanding instructor," said Tim McDonough, principal at Overfelt. "His reputation includes high performance expectations and high ethical standards." The head track and field and cross country coach at Overfelt for 26 years, Hurndon began coaching at Kennedy High. He is a respected member of the CIF State Track and Field Advisory Committee.



Stephen Davis Cordova H.S.

A veteran of 29 seasons of coaching, Davis began in 1974 with the Utopian Athletic Club of Dayton, Ohio. Other coaching stints include Dayton Roth High, United States Air Force and finally Cordova, where he began as an assistant in 1995. His 1991 girls' team placed third in the state meet. He has coached numerous Junior Olympic qualifiers including one National Champion and his boys' team won back-to-back Sierra Valley Conference team championships in 2002 and 2003.

Hank Lawson Lynbrook H.S.

Hank Lawson has been the head cross country and track and field coach at Lynbrook High School since 1994 Prior to that, he served in the same capacity at Gunn High. He has fielded successful teams on a yearly basis. Recently, he initiated a web site, with the help of a web team, at Lynbrook. The site has received 76,000 hits per season and is also used by coaches and athletes all over northern California.

# Mack Paces Bakersfield to Crown; Howard Plays Leading Role for Riverside North

Thomas Mack wasn't about to be denied. The junior took individual championships in the 110-meter hurdles (14.34) and the 300-meter hurdles (37.45) to lead Bakersfield High to a team title in a close race over Long Beach Poly (32-30).

Blake Mackey was another big contributer for the Bakersfield Drillers as he took an individual title in the 400 meters (47.93).

Long Beach Poly scored 20 points by winning both relays. Trabuco Hills finished third behind the running of Matt Bruno, an individual champion in the 100 meters (10.55) and 200 meters (20.82).

On the girls' side the team race went down to the wire as Riverside North edged Long Beach Poly 57-53. James Logan was third with 24 points and Long Beach Wilson finished fourth with 22 points.

Chaunte Howard had a fantastic meet for North winning an individual title in the high jump (5-11) and placing second in both the triple jump (40-04.25) and the long jump (19-05). North had two other individual titlists in Lena Bettis, who won in the long jump (19-08.25) and Ashlee Brown, a 300-meter hurdle champ.

Los Angeles Baptist phenom Allyson Felix was a double champion winning the 100 meters (11.55) and the 200 meters (22.83).

Long Beach Poly had a plethora of scorers and, like the boys' team, took titles in both relays. Shalonda Solomon was second, behind Felix, in both the 100 meters and 200 meters and Tunisia Johnson was third in the 300 meter hurdles for Poly.

Talia Stewart led James Logan with an individual title in the 100 meter hurdles and Chelsea Johnson helped Atascadero by winning the pole vault with a mark of 13-3, just five inches short of the national mark.



# EPHEDRINE

# WHAT IS EPHEDRINE?

Ephedrine-containing products (Ma huang, Chinese Ephedra and Sida Cordifolia) are marketed to improve athletic performance and enhance weight loss.

Ephedrine is a powerful <u>central nervous system stimulant</u> and decongestant, which is effective for relieving bronchial asthma, but banned by the International Olympic Committee (IOC) and National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA).

Ephedrine is structurally similar to the amphetamines and increases heart rate and blood pressure.

# **ADVERSE EFFECTS OF EPHEDRINE**

Serious Adverse Effects: Heart attack, Stroke, Seizures, Psychosis and Death. Also, signs and side effects that may lead to the more serious adverse effects listed above, dizziness, headache, gastrointestinal distress, irregular heartbeat and heart palpitations.

# **COMBINING EPHEDRINE AND CAFFEINE**

Combinations of ephedrine and caffeine have side effects substantially greater than those from the consumption of either compound alone. The herbs guarana, mate and kola nut contain caffeine.

# FACTS YOU NEED TO KNOW

- Some athletes consume herbal products (tablets, capsules, drinks, bulk herbs and herbal teas) for their reputed "performance-enhancing," "weight loss," or "medicinal" qualities.
- ➢ In April 1996 the FDA issued a warning not to buy products containing ephedra/ephedrine/Ma huang. The FDA has complied a list of over 400 adverse events, including heart attack, stroke, tremors, insomnia and 15 reported deaths associated with this substance.
- Herbal products can go to market with no testing for efficacy or safety, thus skipping the years-long process that drugs must undergo. FDA approval is not required for package or marketing claims, so herbal manufacturers can put unsupported health claims on their labels.
- > The belief that natural equals safe is a common and dangerous misconception, as evidenced by the adverse side-effects associated with ephedrine-containing products.
- Athletes may incorrectly assume that herbal products are safe and without side effects because these products are marketed as "natural" or "herbal" and can be purchased without a prescription.



# Model Coaches Selected for 2002-03

Fourteen coaches statewide have been selected as the 2002-2003 CIF Model Coach Award winners. The CIF Model Coach Award program, in its second year, is designed to recognize coaches who have served as positive role models in their schools and communities and who have exhibited the traits apparent in the principles of Pursuing Victory With Honorsm.

Winners, nominated through their CIF Section office, will be awarded a plaque and honored in conjunction with the CIF State Track and Field Championships on Saturday, June 7 at Cerritos College.

A model coach demonstrates and teaches the six core ethical values: trustworthiness, respect, responsibility, fairness, caring, and good citizenship (the "Six Pillars of Charactersm"). The CIF believes that the highest potential of sports is achieved when teacher-coaches consciously Teach, Enforce, Advocate and Model (T.E.A.M.) these values and are committed to the ideal of Pursuing Victory with Honorsm.



### Ed Buller, Oak Grove H.S.

The boys' athletic director at Oak Grove since 1994. Buller served as the head football coach from 1982-89 and from 1994 to the present. He has been acknowledged as the CIF Central Coast Section (CCS)

Coach of the Year on three occasions (1986, 1997, and 1999) and his teams have won three CCS Football Championships. In 1997, he served as the head coach for the California/Texas All-Star Game won by California 31-6.

"As stellar as his record is on the football field, Eddie's ability to command the respect of his players and fellow coaches, along with his desire to help develop young men who are good citizens, far outweighs all his accomplishments," said Richard J. Frias, director Oak Grove High School. "Coach Eddie Buller is a credit to the fraternity of coaches and to the field of education in general."



### Paul Cornwell, Beyer H.S.

A veteran of 28 seasons as a high school baseball coach, Cornwell has received numerous Coach of the Year honors. His teams have 14 playoff appearances, three sub-section titles and three second

place finishes in the CIF Sac-Joaquin Section. Cornwell, who once coached the North/South

State All-Star Game, has an impressive 463-304 record as a baseball coach. He has also served as an assistant football coach.

"Perhaps the greatest testimony to the effectiveness of a coach is the reaction of former players," said Jim Pfaff, associate superintendent for the Modesto City Schools. "Coach Cornwell's alumni are loyal. Not only do they constantly come to visit and watch games, but many of them have served as assistant coaches or pursued coaching careers. These athletes learned a lesson from Paul Cornwell - athletic competition is more than the outcome of a game, it is about the emotional, physical and ethical development of student-athletes."




### Andy Falk, Calabasas H S.

Her students are disciplined both on the field and in the classroom. They know what is expected and they respond in kind."



# Steve Minor, Madison H.S.

The CIF San Diego Section Coach of the Year in football in 1981, Minor's coaching career spans more than 30 years. He has coached high school football for 32 years and girls' softball for 31. During that

time, he has one CIF San Diego Section football title and three in softball.

"Although there is no way to pinpoint the exact moment when I decided on a career, I was undoubtedly influenced by Steve," said Robert Lovato, athletic director at Madison High and a former player under Minor at Clairemont High School. "I saw the positive way he worked with his players, the respect he earned from their families, his coaches and officials and I knew that I wanted to be just like Steve Minor. His players trust his judgment and he is the perfect role model for these young men and women."



### Patrick Mulligan, Wallenberg H.S.

Mulligan is a varsity basketball coach at Wallenberg High School in the CIF San Francisco Section. He has taught social studies there and currently teaches physical education. In addition to coaching basketball, he has guided the golf team and conducts summer youth basketball camps.

# Greatest Girls' Field In History on Display at State Meet

National Record Assaults Headline 85th Annual Championships

Mix together the fastest female teenager in global history with the fastest collection of female prep relay talent in American history, and you have the makings for a thrilling weekend of sprint action. Add in legitimate national record bids in the girls high jump, pole vault and discus and you have yourself situated to witness the finest girls meet in history. Tack on the finest collection of male distance talent assembled in Golden State confines in the last two decades and what do you have? The 85<sup>th</sup> Annual CIF-State Track High School Track and Field Championships.

From start to finish, these extraordinary student-athletes are ready to chase their dreams, glad to excite you and entertain hardcore and neophyte track and field fans alike every step of the way. So sit back and relax, throw on some sun-screen, enjoy chips and a nice cool beverage and get ready for what many experts perceive to be the finest state meet in the land.

Here's our detailed preview of this weekend's can't-wait-to-get-started action:

The very best race of the girls' meet should be the one that is over before you even know it: the 100-meter dash! Allyson Felix looks to take down Angela Williams' national record and Shalonda Solomon looks to take down Allyson Felix. The national standard is 11.11 legal, with Felix scorching a wind-aided 11.12 last month and Solomon at 11.25w, the closest margin between the two all season. Pray for wind-legal conditions and a brisk gust at their back, and we could see history. Barring problems, this should go down as the fastest 1-2 finish anyway. Nearly lost in all this hoopla is possibly the fastest 1-2 FRESHMEN same-race punch in national history, with Long Beach Poly's Shana Woods (11.62w) and Louisville's Elizabeth Olear (11.63w) not backing down from anybody here.

The fastest 200-meter runner IN THE WORLD this year remains Allyson Felix, who stunned the global experts with a 22.11 clocking at altitude that smashed the World Juniors record, just weeks after destroying Marion Jones' national outdoor prep 200 mark at the Mt. SAC Relays. Don't look for Felix to touch that 22.11 here (tack on roughly .26 seconds to that altitude-affected mark to equate to sea-level timing), but Marion Jones' 22.71 state meet record should be in jeopardy. Shalonda Solomon does not like to lose and doesn't plan on it here either, aiming to welcome that Felix Mystique with a warm smile... and a fierce getaway from the blocks. Olear and Co. Are back for this one as well.

Jasmine Lee, who beat Allyson Felix indoors over 200 meters this past winter, is the favorite in the 400-meter dash, but Sheldon's Deonna Lawrence ripped a head-turning 53.47 last week,

meaning this one could get interesting. Several other top athletes have gone by the wayside here in recent weeks, some a result of shrewd coaching tactical moves and others because of the sheer wearand-tear caused by the event. In an event where the strongest survive, look for Lee to come out breathing fire and Lawrence looking to extinguish those flames.

The relay races will rock the place at Cerritos College, for sure. From the meet-opening 4x100 clash, to the wind-down-the-state-meet-and-scorethe-champions 4x400 affair, look for Long Beach Poly to possibly chase down two national records. Poly has also set national outdoor relay records in the 4x400 (Penn Relays) and sprint medley (Arcadia Invitational) this spring, and apparently set a third here two weeks ago ... But the automatic timing system had Long Beach Poly clocked sooooo fast (44.50, well under the 44.70 national record), that no one believed it could be accurate, so they declared it a timing error and recorded it as 'no time.' Maybe it was a record. With crisp exchanges, the state and national record of 44.70 by St. Bernard (SS) will be under assault again, with Long Beach Wilson right in the mix as well. America's two finest tradition's lock up to open the meet for you! By race's end, this should be the fastest 1-2 finish in history. The only remaining questions: Who will win and does the national record go down?

Get on your feet, let out a yell and watch as electricity fills the air during the fastest 4x400 race in history. Look for Long beach Poly and Long Beach to erase a two-month-old national record, with only the final victor and the new record time to be determined. Poly has 52-point anchor wiz Shalonda Solomon closing the show, with Wilson's Ashley Freeman aiming to put a national audience into a frenzy as well. For anyone else who brings anything else close to their A-game to the line, look for a slew of school records to come crumbling down.

MacKenzie Hill looks to score a sweep in the girls' hurdle races, but it appears she has quite a tall order to fill in getting across those barriers first. Senior Ashlee Brown of national hurdling factory JW North (Riverside-SS) and back-from-the-ashes flyer Ashlee Lodree of El Cerrito can flight at national-class pace, as one of California's stronger events should go a long way into rewriting the season countrywide lists before all is said and done. Look for Brown to get out solid from the start, with all contenders aiming to hold on for a rocketing finish.

In the long hurdles, Hill is the favorite, sliding into that role after a monstrous 41.72 win at the Southern Section Masters Meet. Brown and teammate Lili Calhoun are her biggest challengers, with North no doubt needing major points here if they are to seal up one of those team plaques. Two underclassmen to keep an eye on are Dana Hills (SS) sophomore Genelle Ives, the best Orange County hurdler in ages), and frosh studette Shana Woods (43.26) of Long Beach Poly.

Long Beach Wilson, a school known more for its sprint and hurdling prowess over the years, has been carving quite an impressive niche at the 800meter race distance in recent annals, with 2003 state leader Ashley Freeman (2:08.49, #4 in the U.S) being the latest star here. Freeman, who loves to match strength with her peers before downright overpowering them to victory, should get her biggest challenge from La Costa Canyon's Kelly McCann, a 2:10.45 sophomore talent ready for the national stage (she's listed 11th in America this week). This race will be a dandy, within many in the running for trips to the awards podium! Long Beach Poly's Shantae McKinney, Silver Creek's Cherie McPherson and Los Gatos frosh phenom Christine Jones are other notable picks to place.

The 1600-meter run should be quite interesting, with a well-rested Alison Costello of Esperanza (SS) getting a fairly good look as the dangerous statemeet title darkhorse, with College Park's Lindsay Allen (NCS) and Saratoga's Alicia Follmar (CCS) then deciding to kick it into high gear for their section finals, making Costello's task all-the-more difficult. Now the trio appears ready to battle with San Jose Valley Christian's Amanda Thornberry (although we are hearing she is fighting injuries) for the prized spot. Although not boasting a slew of super-fast times this spring, it appears the Golden State is once again primed to take its place on the national stage this weekend. Dani Schuster of Torrey Pines (SD) and Claire Rethemeier of San Pasqual (SD) are two other excellent picks to win the crown here.

The girls' 3200 could be quite a treat. Look for big-race ace Ruth Graham (Gunn-CCS, and coming on very well lately) and Laguna Creek star Rachel Bryan (nice to see her back after a long layoff) to renew their national-class battles, with headlining names like the aforementioned Rethemeier, Sacred Heart Cathedral's Michelle Gallagher, Presentation's Melissa Grelli and Rancho Cotate's Phyllis Blanchard among those on the front line. Some people snickered in mid-season that the Golden State appeared a bit down in this distance this year. Well, snicker no more - these ladies have come to run fast for that title, with a long parade at sub-10:45 expected.

The high jump apron will be center stage for much of the afternoon, thanks to Costa Mesa's (SS) Sharon Day, With household name Any Acuff holding the all-time national outdoor performance best of 6-4 and Clovis Latrese Johnson having the top all-time mark for a Californian (6-2.75), Day's nation-leading best of 6-2 this spring will have scribes reaching for the all-time lists. Although Day is the heavy favorite, it should do nothing to overshadow what has to be the best freshmen crop of flyers in state history. National-class talents Desirae Gonder of Stockdale (CE) and Mindi Wiley of Sonoma Valley rank 2-3 in the state, respectively, with Gonder's 5-10.5 clearance ranking as the best ever for a freshman in Golden State annals. Wiley, at 5-10 frosh, is right there, too. Another super talent here is junior Allie Miller of Los Altos (CCS), a 5-9.25 jumper who also recently won a national multi-events title.

Just when it appeared it might be Kira Costa versus the pole vault record books this weekend, along came ANOTHER Atascadero vaulter to make it intriguing. Costa, who vaulted to a national indoor record 13-4.5 this past winter, is the state outdoor leader after her recent 13-3 clearance at the Central Section Finals, but Monica Pacas of Atascadero (home to 2002 California vault champ Chelsea Johnson, now at UCLA) skied 13-0 to win the Southern Section Masters Meet recently, setting the stage for a nice showdown. Orange County checks in with two of its all-time best aerialists, with Marina senior Cara Walker and Mater Dei junior Elizabeth Woepse each clearing 12-4 in their sectional state qualifier. Kirsten Lofton of Aptos, who gained a touch of fame when her league finalswinning mark was HIGHER than that of her male counterpart, in another superb entry here.

Billie-Jo Grant came into the season in search of the national record. She comes to Cerritos in search of a state title. How sweet it would be if she could achieve both. The Arroyo Grande spinning phenom already boasts the nation-leading mark in the disc (183-6) and recently broke new ground in the shot put, so she arrives here in good spirits, with Southland rival Kate Hutchinson (San Clemente) and Bakersfield Centennial's Melissa Faubus out at 175-footplus and 160-feet-plus, respectively. The throwers compete outside the main stadium, but it is sure worth your time to make the trip to the adjacent field to see these fine national-class ladies in action.

The shot put scene has taken clearer form in recent weeks thanks to the fine efforts from Laguna Creek (SJS) senior Jessica Pressley, who 50foot-plus launches have tabbed her as the title favorite. Pressley's best effort came in her last outing, a 50-11.5-inch tape-measure lob that moved her into fifth-place on the all-time state performers list. Pressley will surely be kept honest here, with Arroyo Grande's (SS) tandem of Billie-Jo Grant (a lifetime-best 48-11.5 last week) and Megan Howard (48-7) on the radar screen. Another one to watch is junior Melissa Faubus of Bakersfield Centennial (CE) who popped a two-foot lifetime improvement (47-6.5) in her last meet.

Brittany Daniels (Merrill West-SJS) arrives to Cerritos as the #2 sophomore triple jumper in U.S history. To win the state title, however, she'll have to beat the national sophomore recordholder. Michelle Sanford of Woodbridge (SS, and yes, daughter of legendary sprinter James Sanford of USC fame) bounded a stunning lifetime-best 43-4.5 two years ago, but injuries have prevented her from reaching that rarefied air ever since. Still, the USCbound Sanford popped a huge seasonal best two weeks ago (41-6.75) to close in on state leader Daniels (42-0 legal, 42-7 wind-aided). Now these two clash for the first time this season, with San Diego area's Sparkle Anderson (Serra) and Mt. Pleasant teammates Galina Becker (CCS) and Jade Myles also in the mix.

Daniels will also have quite a battle on her hands in the long jump, where multi-events talent Gayle Hunter and Skyline (Oakland) senior Renee Williams will be lurking in those same sand pits. Hunter's wind-aided 20-6.75 effort at the mid-season Mt. Carmel Invitational is just a shade farther than Williams' 20-6.5 effort last month, with the sophomore Daniels checking in at 19-7, the exact same lifetime best mark as for frosh phenoms DeAna Carson of Vista Del Lago (SS) and Shana Woods of Long Beach Poly (SS).

### **BOYS EVENTS**

The boys events offer up intriguing storylines as well, marked by unprecedented levels of depth and highly anticipated showdowns in the distance races. The field assembled for the 3200-meter run showcases the depth, with a stunning 15 runners courting lifetime-best sub-9:09.99 credentials, the best lineup in at least a decade. Two former state champions are featured here, with 2001 title-winner and former World Cross Country Juniors qualifier Yong-Sung Leal (Arroyo, NCS) returning to high-level action after a injury maladies and 2002 state victor Kyle Alcorn (Buchanan, CE) joining him among those in the fold. Add in Southern California talents Manuel Ruiz (Monroe, LA) and Mohamed Trafeh (Duarte, SS), who both join Leal in loving to employ front-running tactics at a frenetic pace, and the expected 4:24 split times through 1600 should carry a large finishing throng under 9:00 here. Southern Section multi-lap wunderkind Phillip Reid (Rio Mesa) has had as impressive a distance season as any in recent years, nearly running the table against statewide and national competition this spring. Keep an eye on sophomores Yosef Ghebray (Logan, NCS) and Mark Matusak (Loyola, SS), the nation's two finest underclassmen at this distance. A huge mistake would be to overlook highly decorated and University of Wisconsinbound senior Tim Nelson (Liberty Christian, NO), a veteran achiever against elite competition on the national stage. His degree of championship experience is unmatched.

The boys 1600-meter run promises to be another great one, with Rio Mesa's Reid looking to cap an unbeaten season at this distance, although fellow Southern Section speed whiz Brandon Babiracki (41.8 for the last 300m in one standout showing already this year) is a prime challenger. Reid won their first "match race" last weekend, with Babiracki's late flurry extinguished by Reid's own homestretch surge in the closing stages. An excellent emerging talent here is Jacob Evans (Aptos, CCS), an 800-meter specialist electing to 'move up' in distance in tackling the miler types. Evans stunned many in the state by toppling rival Alex Dunn (San Lorenzo Valley, CCS) last weekend in a seasonal-best 4:11.09 performance. Interesting darkhorse picks here would be Loyola's aforementioned Matusak and teammate David Torrence. Matusak, despite being hampered by a strep throat condition in recent outings, boasts sensational 4:11 and 9:04 personal bests in the distance races - stunning for a sophomore - and Torrence has been stapled right on his shoulder in almost every race this season.

The 'distance sprint' (800 meters) should be equally entertaining, with defending state champion Michael Haddan (Woodbridge, SS - 1:51.02 in 2002) having to play the role of mild underdog as lanky and imposing senior standout Duane Solomon of Cabrillo (SS) won a match race between the two last weekend, with Solomon rolling through in a lifetime-best and state-leading 1:50.99 the week before. The Southern Section surprisingly dominates the state lists in this event, with Long Beach Poly's Eddie Giles startling many over the final 100 meters to win the Division I crown two weeks back, with Rosemead's Mario Cobian and also having the strength to hammer out a 4:14 for four laps in mid-season. Darkhorses litter the field here, with Enterprise's Kenny Frank (NO) coming on huge at this time of year last spring, San Clemente's (SS) fast-improving junior Matt Stollenwerk, and fellow junior Bryan Rodie of Royal (SS), who has survived through 'the rounds' in recent weeks despite nursing a fractured ankle, also being highly dangerous qualifiers. The two-lap types not only love lactic acid, the endear themselves to all sorts of pain.

Sprint action on the boys' side should yield many new names and faces, with the seasonal state-bests lists undergoing massive realignment in recent weeks. Part of the reason is the unfortunate injury to Long Beach Poly star Derrick Jones (state-leading 10.44), opening the floodgates for his onetime pursuers now eyeing the prospects of being champion. Northern California gets the slight nod here, with Foothill of Pleasanton's DJ Smith and Skyline's Kenny O'Neal being tabbed by the sprint gods in recent weeks. O'Neal beat Smith head-on earlier in the season, but Smith boasts a legal 10.49 to his credit and holds an intrinsically superior mark into the wind as well. Look for possible 10.20s for Smith and O'Neal if they find ideal conditions this weekend. Three great challengers for that top spot include Stockton Edison's Chris Henry, Yosemite's Fred Worstein (CE) and Dominguez's Lionel Larry (SS). Henry punched out a 10.51 in his last outing, with Worstein stunning the crowd in a last-to-first hard-closing 10.57 performance at the Central Section Finals and Larry sweeping the Southern Section dash crowns. All-world football talent Reggie Bush (Helix, SD) and Los Alamitos' Brian Woods (SS) are others in a blow-your-doorsoff-with-depth 100m dash field.

The 200-meter dash has Dominguez's Lionel Larry as the statistical frontrunner after a superb 20.87 clocking his last time out, with the diminutive speed demon only gaining more and more confidence each time out. Foothill of Pleasanton's DJ Smith has also made considerable improvement here in recent weeks, with Helix's Deun White (SD) posting a stellar state-qualifying mark despite running in wind-hampering conditions. North Salinas, the school which yielded eventual world-class sprint twins the Harrison Brothers, has another huge dash talent in Ronnie Drummer, who might be a year away from claiming the title but could surprise here. Pinole Valley's Wopamo Osaisai (NCS) and Southern Section late developer Dane Endly (Laguna Hills) are other big stars now in the mix for medals.

Make sure to keep your program handy during the 400m trials and finals, as no other event in the state has undergone as much 'interchange' in recent days. Carson's (LA) Brandon Myles posted the state-leading time last week at his section finals, only to have University City's DeSean Cunnningham (SD) regain the label after a stunning 47.19 clocking last weekend. As it is, nine athletes posted sub-48.00 efforts in their last race before heading here, a massive shakeup to an event which admittedly generated little excitement early on this spring! UCLA-bound mega-athlete Joe Cowan of St. John Bosco (SS), a sensational wide receiver in football to complement fine hurdling/dashing skills, is another key entrant, with finish-with-aflourish senior Tony Ramirez of Royal (SS) and sprint power pack Mike Pratt of Woodland Hills Taft (LA) also helping fill out the fields quite admirably.

Hurdle racing should the exciting once more, with Bakersfield's Thomas Mack leading the swarm of power men over the barriers in fast times this spring! Mack appears set for sub-14.00 territory after a 14.09 effort under calm but very warm conditions at the Central Section Finals, with Logan's Kevin Craddock one-upping that (a 14.06 flyer!) In North Coast Section postseason wars. Craddock, a national age-group phenom during his short career, set the national age-15 42-inch high hurdles record earlier this year. Jason Bolden-Anderson (St. Mary's, NCS) has been the one to keep Craddock honest for much of the season, while the Southland duo of Dominguez's Craig Woods (SS) and Bryon Barmer (Helix, SD) have set the standard on that end of the state. With some of the top entrants here also landing duty over the intermediate hurdles and relays, looks for these workhorses to play leading roles in the battle for team plaques.

As is the case virtually every spring, no event is characterized more so by massive late-season time improvements than the long hurdles, with Berkeley's Stephan Brooks (NCS) temporarily seizing the top run on the statewide best marks ladder after an outof-nowhere 37.42 title win up north. Craig Woods of Dominguez (SS) could play a vital role in his squad's overall title chances with some big points here, a distinct possibility after his Southern Section Masters Meet win here last week. Kevin Craddock, the nation's finest sophomore hurdler and a collector of age-group records these days (see above), has shaved two seconds of his lifetime-best marks at this distance over the last month, positioning himself at a chance for state event titles. Bakersfield's Thomas Mack, who has arrived here after a gritty season of hurdling/relays duty, aims to dig down defend the title he claimed here a year ago. Oakdale's Ryan Caris (SJS) and Trabuco Hills' Bryan Payne (SS) are two fine darkhorse qualifiers.

Who will win those crazy sprint relays? With dropped batons and botched exchange-zone steps already eliminating two of the state's top three relay teams, it'll be a nerve-racking time on the stands for coaches and supporters alike. Long Beach Poly, which has already seen much of its team-title hopes torpedoed by a costly injury in recent weeks, aims to salvage a great deal of pride here, looking to a hopefully healthy Derrick Jones to catapult the Jackrabbits first across that line.

It gets awfully competitive from there, with seven fine baton-toting teams crunched within a quartersecond time gap. Every step and every reach of the baton gets magnified here, with Brandon Myles (Carson), Thomas Mack (Bakersfield), Lionel Larry (Dominguez), Brian Woods (Los Alamitos), DeSean Cunningham (University City), Chris Henry (Edison, Stockton) and Anton Jamir (Cypress) among the fine dash talents aiming to carry their teams onto the awards podium.

The long relay (4x400) has all of a sudden garnered more attention in recent weeks, with injuries helping level te playing field somewhat in making the meet-ending event a sure mad dash to the finish line. Long Beach Poly, which rolled to a stunning 3:11.22 clocking at the Penn Relays in April, is done licking its wounds and aims to close out the meet with a flourish as top teams from Dominguez, Santa Margarita and Helix enter the celebrated fourlap race. Dominguez had Lionel Larry split a 46.2 anchor last weekend, which was needed since UCLAbound Jeff Jacobs was busy slamming down a 46.8 carry for Santa Margarita in keeping the battle close. Helix has a group(with Deun White and Reggie Bush) that supposedly has an aggregate time of 3:08 when combining the lifetime open and relay best of its four members, but the crew has yet to cash in on those credentials thus far. With DeSean Cunningham running anchor for University City, can a 45-point split be unleashed? Time(s) will tell.

The vertical jumping events will play out in the customarily tense fashion, with steel nerves and laser-like focus needed to thwart off those no-height demons that could play a role in those Top 10 team standings. Defending state champion Cole Herron leads the high jump field, with the lanky and brilliant senior already hitting the seven-foot range for the second consecutive year. He is not alone in those exploits, however, with Bakersfield Garces' Zach Ryan (CE) and Eastside Christian's T.J. Fakehinde (SS) also reaching that magical barrier. Fakehinde actually went 7-2 and change last summer at the Caribbean National Championships to boast the leading lifetiem best mark in this field. While most jumpers have struggled to meet their top marks in recent weeks, senior Matt Carter of El Modena (SS) is fresh off a lifetime-best 6-10 effort, tabbing him as a logical upset pick.

The pole vault is another one of those wideopen affairs, where strategy (which height to come in at? When to pass?) Will play into some of the

sportsmanship games here. The favorite could be Billy Matthies of Rancho Bernardo, not so much because he has the state-leading mark of 16-1 this spring, but because the school has a penchant for producing high-end vaulters each year. Matthies is joined by teammate Zack Miller, while Lovola of Los Angeles (SS) is represented by its own fine aerial tandem of Don Appanaitis and Matt Contreras, who have interchanged their order in recent weeks. One of the great vaulters of the future could be on display here, with Granite Bay (SJS) frosh Ryan Shuler setting an state all-time 9thgrade record with his 15-6 clearance earlier this season, taking down the longstanding mark of former prep/collegiate wiz and current UCLA vault coach Anthony Curran.

Has a freshman ever won the state-meet in this event? The answer is no, but Curran won it as a junior and again as a senior.

Big horizontal jumps are being unleashed down south these days, with near 25-foot and near 50foot efforts unfurled in recent days. Rudy Burgess of Desert (on Edwards Air Force Base) popped a herculean 49-9.5 wind-legal mark last week to win the Southern Section Masters Meet, with Fresno Hoover's Kevin Robinson uncorking a 49-1.25 win at the Central Section Finals the week before. Derrell Hutsona of La Mesa Helix (SD) stole the show in the statewide long jump wars with his 24-8.75 job at his section's prelims. The San Diego area actually stakes claim to the Golden State's two best long jumpers this year, with Morse's Demetrius Westbrooks also out to 24-6 territory this spring.

Los Gatos ace Nik Kay regained top billing on the throws scene in dramatic fashion last week, with the nation's top discus thrower heading into this season having picked just the right time to unleash A PAIR of statewide-leading efforts in the throws events heading into the showdown at Cerritos. Kay first launched four efforts over 200 feet at the Central Coast Section Finals last weeks - including a state-best 204-10 - before returning to launch a 62-11 bomb in securing the state lead in the shot put. The competition appears mighty fierce in the shot put, however, with Enterprise's David Nichols (NO), Mission Bay's Jared Bray (SD), and Fresno Edison's Jason Rooters all boasting heaves in the 61-foot-plus range this spring. In the discus competition, spinners Chris White of Garces Memorial (CE), Kyle Davis-Hammerquist of Claremont (SS) and Robert Jennings of Westmont are others high up on the state lists at the championship phase of the season.

### **TEAM TITLES**

Long Beach Poly is favored to win the girls crown, courting amazing depth in the sprints. That said, even one minor slip-up opens the door for both J.W. North of Riverside and Long Beach Wilson to move in and snare the championship plaque. Look for these three sensational programs to finish within 15 points of each other.

On the boys' side, Dominguez is the latest team to seize the top spot in the rankings (following pre-season pick Helix and mid-season selection Long Beach Poly), with the favored Dons now relying heavily on dasher Lionel Larry, hurdler Chris Woods and their relay units. Bakersfield (relays/ hurdles), Long Beach Poly (relays) and Helix (sprints/relays/jumps) remain within striking distance.

He works with Bay Area refugees (adult and youth) as an English as a Second Language (ESL)/life skills tutor and is an eighth grade drug/alcohol youth counselor. Fischer is a National Merit Commended Scholar, a Golden State Scholar, and the pending Valedictorian for the class of 2003 at Campolindo. He scored 1470 on the SAT and has an overall grade point average of 4.31.

**McColl** has competed in water polo, swimming and volleyball at Capistrano Valley High School. In addition, she competes in club volleyball, water polo and swimming. A U.S. Water Polo Junior Olympics All-American, McColl was her team Most Valuable Player as a junior and currently serves as team captain.

She co-founded the Capistrano Valley High School Yellow Ribbon Club, which promotes prevention and awareness of adolescent suicide. In addition, McColl has worked with the Mission Integrale/Floresta project in Oaxaca, Mexico and has volunteered for Special Education dances and Special Olympics.

A National Merit Scholar Commandant and a Golden State Scholar in algebra, biology, English and written composition, McColl has a 4.6 grade point average and a 1490 score on the SAT.



BARRY FISCHER, STUDENT ESSAY: G.U.T.S – GROWTH AND UNITY THROUGH SPORTS

As a ferocious stampede of over two hundred predatory Cougars, Broncos, Bulldog, Lions, Tigers, and Wolves dash through a pleasant public park, a bystander is repulsed by this fierce jungle behavior that seems devoid of honor, civility, or fairness. In fact, this tenacious pack of high school cross country runners, proudly sporting uniforms with the aforementioned team mascots, is driven by an exceptional kind of respect, which sets a noble standard for all athletes. The philosophies of individual preparation, team training, and interscholastic competition are based on powerful respect and trust that generate a positive, rewarding athletic environment for all.

Sometimes, critical students object to my school cross country program's policy of an open roster - allowing anyone, regardless of ability or past performance, to join the team. Many argue that not limiting team membership impairs the excellence of the organization, as inexperienced, less talented runners undermine and eclipse the progress and success of more capable athletes. However, as captain of my team, comprising nearly 200 athletes of varied athletic backgrounds, I came to appreciate, respect, and encourage the earnest efforts of my novice colleagues. Their intense desire to improve was continuously fueled by their staunch dedication in training. As team captain, I emphasized the support and inspiration inherent in our cross country program. As the season progressed, I was gratified to see the beginning runners' growth in self-confidence as they discovered the value of hard work, trust, and responsibility in a competitive team environment.

The courageous pursuit of opportunity, the tremendous effort, and the progress that my team demonstrated during my high school athletic career is parallel to the life and outlook of a fellow runner, the immortal Olympian Jesse

Owens. Owens' athletic career was frequently jeopardized by outsiders' attempts to bar him from running, discriminating against him on the grounds that, regardless of his admirable "desire, determination, discipline, and self-sacrifice," his racial background rendered him unworthy of competition. In a similar sense, beginning athletes on my team, possessing those same extraordinary qualities of work ethic, could have been denied participation in cross country for their initial lack of skills. However, my team's policy, of admitting anybody who steadfastly applies himself/herself to improvement and excellence, invites all athletes to realize their full personal potential. Owens contended that with intense commitment and a "great deal of love, fairness, and respect for your fellow man," (attributes of my high school cross country program) "how can you lose?"

Remaining resolute in my dedication to supreme sportsmanship, and motivating others to approach athletics with corresponding commitment, I have found that the most meaningful promise in sports is the opportunity to play; we must boldly use that opportunity to set and achieve ambitious goals, to develop a profound confidence and trust in self, and to establish utmost respect for the fellow athlete – a respect that, in victory or defeat, fosters personal growth and universal understanding that make sports such a brilliant unifying force in our lives.

### MERIDITH McCOLL STUDENT ESSAY: The Best of Luck

My grandpa is my hero. He once told me "you create your own luck." You can't change what happens around you, nor should you try to. Controlling other people or things is not the way to success. Instead, he explained to me that when you work hard and give everything you have, good things will come. The more effort, work, and heart you put into your goals, the more luck will help you along the way. Or is it "luck?"

The first time I tried out for a National Water polo team – the 18U Youth Team – I didn't even pass the first cut. After what I had believed to be a strong tryout, I was devastated when the names were read and mine was not among them. He had heard I was practicing with the older age group, and he was in need of a goalie. I joined the team and went to Montreal to play in tournament against Canada and Australia.

John Wooden, a basketball coach and inspiration to many, once said, "Things turn out the best for those who make the best of the way things turn out." Though he and my grandpa used different words, their meanings are the same. When you give all your effort and persist no matter what the external circumstances, good things come. Some people call that luck or good fortune, but it isn't left to fate alone.

# Watts Heads Gold-Medal Coaching Staff at Taft

There hasn't been much second guessing by the Woodland Hills High track and field team of the Toreadors coaching staff.

Head coach Quincy Watts was the 1992 Olympic champion in the 400 meters. Sprints coach Maurice Greene is the 2000 Olympic 100 champion. Distances coach Johnny Gray is the American record holder in the 800 and a bronze medalist in the 1996 Olympics.

The three are in their first season of coaching at the L.A. City Section school located in the San Fernando Valley.


Watts graduated from Taft in 1988 where he was the won the state champion as a senior. At USC, Watts set a collegiate record 44.00 to win the 1992 NCAA title and went on to win gold medals in the 400 and the 4 x 400 relay in the 1992 Olympics in Barcelona.

His winning time of 43.50 in Barcelona still stands as the Olympic record and third fastest of all-time. Watts, 32, retired in 2000 after a back injury suffered in an automobile accident.

"I am definitely retired," Watts said with a smile. "I have no inkling to compete. The only inkling I have now is to coach. I don't pay attention to marks and what I have done. I am really most proud of the fact that I was able to go to the Olympics and win. That's the highest pinnacle in our sport. I am happy with all my records but I don't get upset if they are there or not."

Watts served as an assistant at Harvard-Westlake in North Hollywood last season and had no intentions of being a head coach. Watts, though, answered the call to lend a hand to his alma mater this spring. Watts sought the help longtime friends Greene and Gray.

"I am just learning period about being a head coach," Watts said. "You have to familiarize yourself with all the events. The 400 training I have from my own experience. The other events I am learning those events as well. The only expectations I put on my kids is to train hard, compete hard and go out there and do your best. If they do that, they will achieve their own expectations."

There was plenty of fanfare the first day Greene arrived at practice. These days, the three-time defending world 100 champion is simply known as "Coach Greene."

"Everyone was really happy to see me but we got over that really quickly," Greene said. "They asked me all the questions. We got that out of the way and now we are just working."

Greene has found the Taft athletes receptive to his teachings. Greene added that his personal coach John Smith goes through more aggravation dealing with him than Greene does with his high school athletes.

"You never know what these kids are going to turn out to be," Greene said. "I see the kids improving and giving their all. To see that they are happy with their performances gives me a great joy."


The feeling is mutual among Taft athletes.

"It is a blessing to have a coaching staff with such great people," senior quarter miler Paul Pratt said. "A lot of times when a coach says something, it goes in one ear and out the other. Everything they said I know is going to make me better. It's totally different from anything I've learned in my whole track career."


Watts has tried to instill more than just track and field to his athletes but also values in life. It's a principle he learned while training under Jim Bush at USC and Mel Hein and Tom Stevenson at Taft.


Watts suspended four of his top sprinters on his girls team for a West Valley League meet against Birmingham to determine the league title after they cheered against one another in a meet after a disagreement on who should run on a relay.

"It's not like college or professional where you are accountable for your actions," Watts said. "The coach at least hopes that when you are a young woman or a young man that you can kind of take care of yourself without your coach running around behind you. It's been a learning process just like it was as an athlete running. It's a lot of nurturing. It's more like being a father but I enjoy it. In one word, it's pure."




