Despite a sudden change in schedule, Terra Nova completed its clean sweep of the North Peninsula League cross country schedule this year with resounding varsity and soph-frosh triumphs last Thursday at Terra Nova.

Originally scheduled for Friday, the finals were suddenly switched to Thursday early last Wednesday evening, due to a scheduling mixup.

IT WAS thought by some that the unexpected change might hamper the Tigers, who had gone undefeated in all divisions during regular league play, because of the psychological edge they usually build up for big meets.

Terra Nova Coach Dennis Lanterman wasn't even able to notify some of his runners of the change until early Thursday afternoon. He frankly feared that they might lose their edge because of the Friday call-off.

No such luck for leading contender Jefferson, who itself had lost only one set of matches in the regular season and who needed a win in the finals in order to nab a co-championship with the Tigers, according to the NPL system of deciding final championships in cross country.

Lanterman revealed one final sidelight on the fantastic closing of Vincent's career at Terra Nova. In winning the finals race, Vincent bettered the time of Billy Ryan of Wilcox High, who won in the large school class during Terra Nova's recent invitational meet. Wilcox is the national high school two mile record holder.
